

20,000 Motormen and Guards Quit Work Today, Protesting Wage Reduction.

TRAFFIC PARALYSIS SEEN

Carpenters Board Up the Entrances to Stations and Tunnels Now Under Guard.

Chicago, August 1. - Twenty housand motormen, conductors and guards on surface and elevated lines, went on strike at 4 o'elock this morning against a 17-per cent wage reduction, and the greater part of the working portion of Chicago's three million persons was today forced to

All rolling stock available, including every variety of wheeled, pullable, pushable, or motorized vehicle, was inadequate, and the brunt of the traffic fell on "shanks' mare."

Thousands started early afoot, and manufacturing districts seethed with pedestrians.

Streets in the downtown district, with the calling of the strike, automatically became one-way thorough But even that action by the police department was not enough to avoid badly-tangled jams of traffic, once the honking, shouting horde of motor-car drivers began their steady streams of workers into the business center.

Busses On Job summoned days ago by Charles C. Fitzmorris, chief of police, when a strike appeared to be inevitable.

The walkout really began at 11 clock last night, when the surface car men, ending runs at that hour took their cars to the barns. From then on, as runs were finished, the motormen and conductors left of work, and in the early hours of the morning the number of cars on the streets gradually dwindled to zero.

Negotiations have been under way between the surface line workers and owners for several days, after posting of the order for a wage reduction ment between the company and the workmen were announced as failures. 

AVAILABLE COAL SUPPLY IS LOW

Amount On Hand in Canada Drops 45 Per Cent.

Tonnage Arriving in London Is Now Cut in Half.

According to the recently published report of coal statistics for the month of April, 1922, prepared in the mining, mettallurgical and chemical branch of the Dominion bureau of statistics, it is shown as a result of the great coal strike now in progress, the net amount of coal made available for consumption in Canada during April declined to 45 per cent of the amount recorded for the previous month.

The output from Canadian mines fell off to 47 per cent of the previous month's record and to 62 per cent of the average output established for the month in the three preceding years. For the first four months of the calendar year the output from Canadian mines was 92 per cent of Imports from the United States declined in April to 31 per cent of the quantity imported in the preceding month, but were maintained at 83 per cent of the average for April for three preceding years,, and for the calendar year to date were only per cent less than the average quantity imported during the same period in 1919-20-21.

Following the declining output, and conforming to the domestic demand, exports of Canadian coal declined to 26 per cent of the preceding month's record, and to 55 per cent of the average for the same month of the three preceding years. While therefore, the coal made available for consumption in Canada during April was only 45 per cent of the amount made available in March comparison with previous records the amount provided was 72 per cent of the average established the month in the three preceding

Production Falls Off.

The quantity made available for four months of the present calendar year was 96 per cent of the average established for the period in the three preceding years. The Canadian coal visible at the end of the twelve months ending April, 1922, comprising all coal imported or mined in Canadian coal exported during the period, amounted to 30,345,000 tons, as compared with a total of 35,562,-000 tons for the twelve months ending April, 1921, and 26,679,000 tons

in the year ending April, 1920. The output of coal from all mines in Canada in April, 1922, amounted and 1,155,632 tons the average output for April of the three preceding

That the poisoning did not assume a fatal termination in this instance is due to the timely intervention of the family physician.
