# NEW BRITISH-JAP FAR EAST TREATY AGREE TO MAKE WAR IN COMMON

Armies and Navies at the Disposal of Either Power.

Jap Tutelage of Korea Recognized === Treaty Made for Ten Years.

London, Sept. 26. - The text of the Anglo-Japanese agreement, which was signed on Aug. 12, and a dispatch to the British ambassador at St Petersburg, forwarding a copy of it, with instructions to communicate it to the Bussian Government at the sensition Russian Government at the earliest opportunity, have been issued.

The preamble declares that the Governments of Great Britain and Japan, being desirous of replacing the agree-ment concluded Jan. 3, 1902, by fresh stipulations, have agreed upon the following articles, having for their object the consolidation and maintenance of the consolidation and maintenance of general peace in the regions of Eastern Asia and India, the preservation of the common interests of all the powers in China by insuring the independence of the Chinase English of the Chinase E and the principle of equal opportunities for the commerce and industry

Governments will communicate with one another fully and frankly, and will consider in common the measures which should be taken to safeguard those menaced rights or interests.

#### Will Make War Together.

Article 2.—Should either of the high contracting parties be involved in war in defense of its territorial rights or special interests, the other party its ally, and both parties will conduct a war in common, and make peace in mutual agreement with any power or powers involved in such a war

Article 3.-Japan, possessing paramount political, military and economic interests in Korea, Great Britain recognizes Japan's right to take such measures for the guidance, control and protection of Korea, as she may deem advance those interests providing those the principle of equal opportunities for the commerce and industry of all na-
