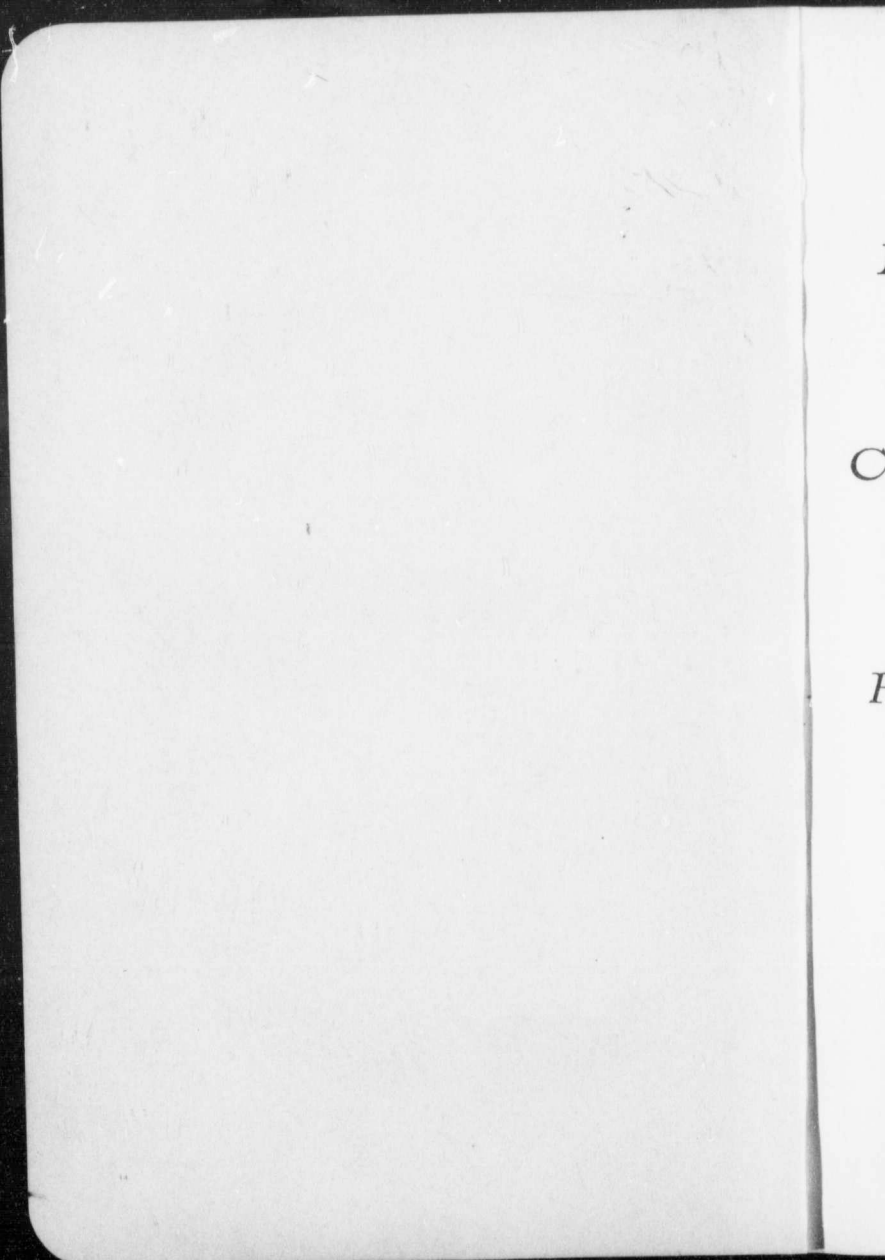

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NEW BRUNSWICK TRANSVAAL CONTINGENT FUND.

INCEPTION AND ORGANIZATION.

Never in the history of the British Nation has any action on the part of a foreign state called forth such widespread enthusiasm and expressions of patriotism, not only in the British Isles themselves but throughout the whole Empire, as did the issuing by Oom Paul Kruger of the Ultimatum of his little Republic—the Transvaal, closely followed by the alliance of the Orange Free State with its sister Republic. So suddenly was that Ultimatum issued, and so unprepared for such a contingency were the English military authorities, that for a time it looked as though the boast of the Republics, that they would drive the English into the sea, might be fulfilled. Under such circumstances as these it was not mere jingoism that gave rise to this patriotic outburst. It was fellow feeling for fellow Countrymen and the inborn love of fairness and justice in every English speaking man. Yet only a short time before little was realized in England and the Colonies of the true condition of affairs in the Transvaal. The Uitlanders, however, had suffered long, and had striven hard both with the Volksraad and in England to have their grievances listened to and understood, but in vain.

Long indeed had the trouble been brewing, and long had the ultimate outcome—a great and bitter war—been foreseen by all races in South Africa and by those in England who were in close connection with, or made a study of, the numerous political questions which were continually perplexing the minds of the thinking men of South Africa. On the other hand, the great majority of the English people, though they were convinced that the Uitlanders had grievances, believed that, what-

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ever they might be, they were greatly exaggerated, and were being pushed forward only by greedy capitalists, who expected to reap bigger profits under British rule. The old mistake which had never been entirely eradicated from the minds of many, that Cecil Rhodes had been the instigator of the revolutionary movement in Johannesburg at the time of the Jameson Raid and directly responsible for the Raid itself, had something to do with the apathy with which the British public regarded the troubles of the Uitlander. For Cecil Rhodes appeared to them as nothing more than one of the most fortunate of the South African multi-millionaires, instead of an Empire builder and the saviour of British supremacy in South Africa.

The people of England, perhaps justifiably, believed that if the grievances of the English Uitlander were as real and as many as they claimed, the British government would interfere on their behalf, and such an insignificant little country, as they regarded the Transvaal, would not for a moment dare to refuse any just demand from such a quarter. In the distant Colonies where the connection with the Transvaal was slight, the interest in the Uitlander was even less than in England.

Shortly before the war repeated attempts were made by the British Government to obtain better treatment for the Uitlanders at the hands of the Boers and a peaceable settlement of the whole matter, but without success. The result showed the public the unbending attitude of the Volksraad, and the nature of the people with whom the Uitlanders had to contend. The impression which had existed in certain quarters, that capitalists had exaggerated and even trumped up grievances, disappeared, and people generally began to realize what the condition of affairs had been for the past few years in the Transvaal. On looking into the matter more fully it became evident to British subjects all over the world that not only were laws made by the Volksraad intentionally unfair to the Uitlander, but that those laws were enforced more vigorously against British settlers in the Transvaal than against those of any other nationality. The Boer hatred of anything British became evident also when it was learnt that by unreasonable and incredibly high duties British South Africa and its railways were discriminated

against in the Transvaal, and that the Kaffirs in and around Johannesburg were unjustly and harshly treated because they had shown a leaning towards the Uitlanders at the time of the Jameson Raid. Coming as the culmination of this lately realized state of things, the haughty and sudden Ultimatum of the Transvaal, which was issued on October 10th, 1899, could not but stir up all that was loyal and true in the hearts of the people of the whole British Empire.

Operations had hardly been commenced when from all the Colonies came the request that they should be allowed to do their share in upholding the honor of the Empire. In Canada, the first suggestion that assistance might be accepted from this Colony caused an outburst of enthusiasm among the people. When it was known that the Mother Country had accepted Canada's offer of a contingent a feeling of pride was added to the increased enthusiasm all over the Dominion.

Whether wisely or not need not be discussed here, but in accepting the offer the War Office stipulated that no mounted men were required. It was at once decided to fit out with all possible speed and send to South Africa an Infantry Battalion to be known as the 2nd Special Service Battalion of the Royal Canadian Regiment of Infantry. The Battalion, consisting of eight Companies, was raised from all parts of the Dominion; "A" Company coming from the far West—British Columbia and the North West Territories—and "H" Company from the extreme East—Nova Scotia. New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island were allotted as the recruiting ground for "G" Company. At once the various recruiting depots were deluged with applications from young men anxious to do their share in proving to England and the World the loyalty of Canada.

In New Brunswick depots were opened at St. John and Fredericton, where between them 92 men were to be enlisted, Prince Edward Island supplying the remaining 33 men to make up the strength of the Company. The only difficulties about the recruiting were to pick the most suitable men from the many who presented themselves, and to keep within the number allotted to the depots, which difficulties were somewhat relieved when an order was received to recruit 17 men more in

St. John to make up the shortage in Quebec City. The applications for Commissions were proportionately numerous, and a similar difficulty presented itself to the Militia Department in the selection of officers. Those chosen for "G" Company were Major W. A. Weeks, of the Charlottetown Engineers, to be Captain; and Captain Frederick Caverhill Jones, Adjutant of the 3rd "N. B." Regiment Canadian Artillery, Lieut. J. H. Kaye, of the Permanent Infantry, and Lieut. C. W. Weldon McLean, of the 8th Princess Louise New Brunswick Hussars, then a cadet at the Royal Military College, to be Lieutenants.

No sooner was it assured that a contingent would be sent, and that Saint John would be called upon for its quota, than those who knew it would be impossible for them to go, began to consider and suggest ways and means for helping in a substantial manner those who might be accepted. On Friday, October 20th, 1899, a recruiting office was opened in St. John, and on the same day a notice appeared in the papers from His Worship Mayor Sears, addressed to the Loyal Citizens of St. John, calling upon them to meet at the Mayor's office on the following day at 3 p. m. At this meeting, which was largely attended, after considerable discussion, it was proposed that the rate of pay for the men volunteering for the Contingent being small, a fund should be opened to increase their pay by 50 cents a day over and above their Government pay; and it was thought that the entire New Brunswick Contingent should be treated in the same way as the St. John men. A Subscription List was opened at the close of the meeting, a letter from Messrs. Manchester, Robertson & Allison first being read enclosing a cheque for \$250, and over \$800 was subscribed then and there. In accordance with the announcement made by the Mayor at the meeting, the names of the committee to solicit subscriptions and control funds were announced in the papers on Monday morning, with the request that they meet at the Mayor's office at 10 a. m. that day. They were: The Mayor, Senator Dever, John V. Ellis, M. P., Lt.-Col. Tucker, M. P., Hon. A. T. Dunn, M. P. P., Wm. Shaw, M. P. P., H. A. McKeown, M.P.P., J. Douglas Hazen, M.P.P., Lt.-Col. J. R. Armstrong, Lt.-Col. Markham, Lt.-Col. McLean, Lt.-Col. Jones, Surgeon Lt.-Col. Daniel, Major Sturdee, Major Edwards, the Deputy Mayor.

Ald. Robinson, Ald. Christie, Ald. Colwell, Ald. Allan, Ald. McGoldrick, Ald. White, County Secretary Vincent, Police Magistrate Ritchie, W. S. Fisher, Count de Bury, J. R. Ruel, Thomas Gilbert, M. Gallagher, H. C. Tilley, Joseph Allison, John Kerr and Thomas McAvity.

Nearly all the Committee were on hand at the hour named, also L. P. D. Tilley, whose name was then added to the list. Carrying out the opinions expressed at the general meeting on the Saturday before, the following resolution was moved by Mr. J. V. Ellis, seconded by Ald. Macrae, and carried: "Resolved, that there be raised a sum of money which will enable the Committee to allow 50 cents a day to each man and non-commissioned officer supplementary to the regular pay for a period of six months, or as near to that time as the money collected will allow, and to further assist the men in any other way that the fund will permit." Lieut. Col. Armstrong moved, seconded by Mr. J. Douglas Hazen, that \$200 be sent to the Red Cross Society. This was carried, as also a motion by Lieut. Col. McLean that a ladies' auxiliary be appointed to act with the committee. On motion of Mr. J. V. Ellis, seconded by Senator Dever, Mr. James R. Ruel was appointed Treasurer, and the Bank of New Brunswick the place of deposit. Mayor Sears then allotted various districts of the City for the purpose of making collections therein to different members of the Committee.

At 11 o'clock a meeting of the Common Council was held. At it the Mayor was instructed to send \$200 to the Red Cross Society in lieu of the \$200 voted at the meeting of the Fund Committee, and the following resolution was passed: "That as a guarantee fund sufficient to pay an additional 50 cents a day to the volunteers from New Brunswick, the Chamberlain is hereby authorized to pay on the order of the Treasurer of the Provincial Volunteer Fund, when the amount is required, a sum not to exceed \$2,000."

On Tuesday, the 24th, the Mayor of St. John sent to the Mayors of Campbellton, Chatham, Newcastle, Moncton, Fredericton, St. Stephen and Marysville telegrams stating that a fund had been started to provide additional pay and assistance to the New Brunswick South African Contingent and inviting their co-operation and contribution.

As a result of the prompt action on the part of the Committee and the Common Council, the fund began to grow at a rapid rate. Before the New Brunswick men left St. John they had the satisfaction of knowing that their native Province was doing something in recognition of their loyalty, and that the fund had reached the respectable sum of \$4,000 in Saint John alone, outside of the guarantee made by the Council, and that large amounts had already been collected in other parts of the Province, such as Fredericton, \$500; Moncton, \$500; St. Stephen, \$500; Chatham, \$400; Marysville, \$300; besides smaller amounts in many other places.

At 5.45 p. m. on Wednesday, October 25th, the Saint John quota left for Quebec, amid the wildest enthusiasm. Nearly all places of business had closed at 5 o'clock, in response to a request to that effect published by the Mayor. Before leaving the Barracks each man was presented with a sovereign from the Volunteer Fund, and each officer with a silver match box with the City's Coat of Arms on the outside. The following day they reached Quebec, and on the 30th, with the rest of the Battalion, sailed from there for Cape Town on the S. S. "Sardinian."

From this time on the fund continued to grow quickly and steadily, the various subscriptions being acknowledged in the daily papers from time to time. On November 29th word was received that the Canadian Contingent had arrived that morning at Table Bay. The following day they disembarked and on the next proceeded to the front.

Pursuant to a notice published by the Mayor, a meeting of the "Members (subscribers) New Brunswick Volunteer Contingent Fund," was held at the Mayor's office on Monday, Dec. 4th. At this meeting, on motion, L. P. D. Tilley was appointed Secretary. After reports had been read by the Treasurer and His Worship the Mayor, it was moved by Mr. J. V. Ellis, M. P., seconded by Lieut. Col. Armstrong, and carried, that the Treasurer be authorized to pay out of the monies collected fifty cents a day, monthly, for three months from 1st November, to each non-commissioned officer and man of the New Brunswick Contingent, or to the person or persons indicated in their respective orders. On motion it was carried that the

Committee meet at the Mayor's office at 3.30 p. m. on the second Monday in each month, and that the Secretary publish due notice of such meetings in the St. John papers.

Immediately after the departure of the 1st Contingent, Canada made an offer of a second, but that offer was not accepted until after the three reverses of Stormberg, Magersfontein and Colenso, which followed one another so rapidly on the 9th, 13th and 15th of December respectively. This time the War Office asked for mounted troops and artillery, and the Canadian Government decided to send two Battalions of Mounted Infantry and three Batteries of Field Artillery. The Mounted Infantry was designated the Canadian Mounted Rifles (the name of the 1st Battalion being changed to Royal Canadian Dragoons just before their return from South Africa); the 1st Battalion was drafted from Eastern Canada and Manitoba, and the 2nd Battalion from the North West Territories and British Columbia. The Artillery were all taken from the East; "C" Battery from Western Ontario and Manitoba, "D" Battery from Eastern Ontario, and "E" Battery from Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

Of these New Brunswick was to supply the following: for the 4th Troop, "B" Squadron C. M. R., St. John, to send 14 men and Sussex 10; for "E" Battery, Woodstock to send 20 men, and Newcastle 16 men, besides which St. John sent 7 men to make up deficiencies in Quebec's quota of the Artillery; in all sixty-seven men.

As in the case of the 1st Contingent, the applications, both from officers and men, were far in excess of the number to be taken. The only officers chosen from New Brunswick for this Contingent were Captain C. F. Harrison, of the 8th Princess Louise New Brunswick Hussars, to be Transport Officer for the Mounted Rifles, and Captain W. C. Good, of the 10th Field Battery, Woodstock, to be Lieutenant in "E" Battery.

On Saturday afternoon, the 6th of January, 1900, the seven men recruited in St. John to make up the Quebec quota, left for Quebec, and though it was only known a short time before that they were to leave that day, they were given a good send-off by the citizens. On Monday evening, the 8th of January, the St. John contingent of the Mounted Rifles met at the 62nd

Fusiliers' Club Room and were marched to the Institute, where speeches were made, and the men were given a sovereign each from the Volunteer Fund, and Major Borden, who had been appointed Lieutenant to command the 4th Troop of "B" Squadron, was presented with a match box similar to that received by the 1st Contingent Officers from New Brunswick. When the men formed up outside to march to the station, they were picked up and carried on the shoulders of the crowd. At the station the thousands who had collected heartily cheered them. At Sussex they were joined by their comrades who had enlisted there, and who had been feted that evening. At Woodstock and Newcastle equally enthusiastic farewells were given the Artillerymen.

The 2nd Contingent sailed from Halifax on three transports. The first two were to have sailed on the 18th of January, but after much work had been done in fitting them out, one of them—the "Montezuma"—was rejected by a medical board in consequence of typhoid fever being found among the crew. The first boat to leave—the "Laurentian"—sailed on January 20th, having on board "D" and "E" Batteries; on the 27th the "Pomeranian" sailed with the 2nd Battalion of the C. M. R., and on February 21st the troops which were to have gone on the "Montezuma," viz., the 1st Battalion of the C. M. R. and "C" Battery, sailed on the "Milwaukee;" making on all three steamers a total of 1,320 officers and men, 1,172 horses, and 18 12-pr. guns. All the transports made uneventful passages, the "Laurentian" arriving at Table Bay on February 16th, the "Pomeranian" on February 26th, and the "Milwaukee" on March 21st.

On the day the Mounted Rifles men left St. John the regular monthly meeting of the Subscribers to the New Brunswick Transvaal Contingent Fund was held. At it the Treasurer, Mr. J. R. Ruel, moved, seconded by Lieut. Col. Geo. W. Jones, a resolution to the following effect, which was carried: That as provision had been made for each of the members of the 1st Contingent enlisted in New Brunswick, by public contribution, that similar provision should be made for the men from New Brunswick composing the second contingent, and that a memorial be addressed to the Lieutenant Governor in

Council recommending that a sufficient sum be granted to meet the just demand which had arisen. A Committee composed of his Worship the Mayor, Lt. Col. McLean, Lt. Col. Jones, and Mr. George Robertson, was appointed to wait upon the Provincial Government in regard to their contribution.

Immediately a fund was started for the Second Contingent men, and most of the subscriptions sent in for some time were marked for that Contingent. At the February monthly meeting His Worship the Mayor asked the Committee to relieve him of the duties of Treasurer of the 2nd Contingent Fund, and on motion Mr. J. R. Ruel was made Treasurer of the amalgamated funds.

On March 5th a special meeting of the Committee was held in consequence of the illness of the Treasurer, at which a motion was passed, instructing the Secretary to convey to Mr. Ruel their regret on hearing of his recent illness, and hope that he would soon be restored to his former health and strength. It was also moved by Lieut. Col. McLean, seconded by Ald. Robinson, and carried, that Mr. Howard D. McLeod be appointed acting Treasurer, which position Mr. McLeod accepted. At this meeting it was also ordered that the amounts which had accrued due to Corporal Frederick W. Withers, Pte. Joseph N. Johnston and Pte. Patrick McCreary, who were killed in action in South Africa, be paid to the respective persons designated in their written orders left with the Treasurer for that purpose. At the March monthly meeting of the Fund Committee it was moved by the Mayor and seconded by Dr. Daniel, that two months' allowance from January 8th be paid the men of the Second Contingent. The death of Mr. James R. Ruel having occurred, the following resolution of condolence was adopted by the meeting and ordered to be conveyed to the family of the late James R. Ruel :—"Resolved, The New Brunswick South African Contingents' Fund Association hereby record their sense of the loss which their Association has sustained in the death of Mr. James Rhodes Ruel, their late Treasurer. Imbued with the desire to take a foremost part in the movement of the people of New Brunswick in recognition of the patriotism of the men of this Province who had enlisted for active service in South Africa on behalf of the Empire, he willingly accepted the responsible and onerous position of Treasurer of the funds

"so generally and generously subscribed for their benefit and welfare, ensuring confidence in the due application of the monies contributed—its duties he performed with exactness and prompt intelligence, and with the same zeal and faithfulness which characterized his long official life. The Association also desires to express to the family of the deceased their sympathy with them in their bereavement."

On motion of Lieut. Col. Armstrong, seconded by Lieut. Col. Markham, Mr. Howard D. McLeod was duly appointed Treasurer of the New Brunswick Contingents' Fund.

When, on March 12th, ten men, the number allotted to Saint John to send as part of the re-enforcement of 100 men for the 1st Contingent, left Saint John, the enthusiasm of the people was as great as it had been at the time of the departure of the 1st and 2nd Contingents. These ten men joined their comrades at Halifax, and with Strathcona's Horse sailed from there on the transport "Montrey" on March 16th, arriving in Table Bay on April 10th.

For some time subscriptions continued to come in, though not so rapidly as at first; the monthly meetings were held regularly at Mayor Daniel's office, at which the Treasurer submitted reports of monies received and paid out; and at each meeting a month's allowance was voted to be paid to the men of the Contingents. The war dragged on and the men did not return within the time it was at first thought they would. While subscriptions began to come in more slowly, the drain on the fund went on undiminished, until it was found by the Treasurer's report of September 19th that \$500 was needed to pay the men the 50 cents a day until the 1st of September—the furthestest date to which it was intended the men should be paid. Mr. Charles F. Kinnear volunteered to solicit the subscriptions necessary, and the deficit was in a short time subscribed and the fund closed.

Ever since July wounded and invalided men had been coming home in small batches, but it was not until November that any of the Contingents returned in a body. Six Companies of the 1st Contingent, including "G" Company, returned to Canada direct from South Africa on the transport "Idaho," landing in Halifax on November 1st. The New Brunswick men arrived here the following day. That was a day which

had long been waited for by the loyal citizens of Saint John. When it arrived the opportunity was not lost of giving the returned soldiers a Royal welcome, and of making it an occasion of unbounded enthusiasm. Mayor Daniel requested that the day be made a public holiday, and with few exceptions the request was complied with.

The men arrived on a special train a little before noon, and were met at the station by the Mayor, Aldermen and thousands of citizens who had been waiting there for hours. When the cheering at their arrival had subsided, the men were drawn up on the platform and presented with an address by the Mayor. After that they formed the chief point of interest in a procession which marched through the principal streets. The procession was composed of the local Militia, the Boys' Brigade, various Societies and Clubs and the Fire Department, with decorated apparatus. Many of the Societies and Clubs, as well as business houses and private persons, had symbolic floats in the procession.

One of the principal features of the reception for the returned soldiers was a banquet given by the ladies of the Soldiers' Wives' League and the Red Cross Society at the St. Andrew's Rink on the Saturday evening following. Besides the soldiers who had returned the day before and previously, there were about 400 guests. The arrangements, which had to be on a very large scale, were most satisfactorily made, and the result reflected the greatest credit on the ladies, who had spared no trouble in their efforts to make the banquet a success. Among the guests were the Mayor and Aldermen, Officers of the local Militia, including retired Field Officers, the Chief Justice and Justices of the Supreme Court, the local representatives in the Dominion and Provincial Parliaments, Senators, War Veterans, Editors of papers and Clergymen of all denominations.

The menu was particularly attractive and appropriate. It was in the form of a Lee-Enfield cartridge, with the Coat of Arms of the City on the outside. Inside the cartridge, wound round a wire stuck in the inner end of the bullet, which could be pulled out of the cartridge, was the menu proper, and many were the names of delicacies to be found thereon.

The 2nd Contingent returned on January 11th, having landed at Halifax the previous day from the transport "Roslin Castle." They arrived in Saint John on three trains, but on the arrival of each enormous crowds were at the station to greet the soldiers. The largest number arrived about five o'clock in the afternoon, among whom were many belonging to Woodstock and Fredericton. After being driven through the streets, accompanied by the bands of the Artillery and 62nd Fusiliers, they were taken to the Dufferin Hotel, where the Fredericton and Woodstock men were made the guests of the City. The Saint John men then dispersed to their homes to receive the greetings of their families before returning to the hotel to attend a banquet given in their honour by the City at half-past nine o'clock.

The banquet was attended by the aldermen and many prominent citizens, Mayor Daniel being in the chair. There were also present many of the men of the First Contingent, and besides the Saint John men who had returned that day were Lieut. Good and the Woodstock men. The Fredericton men were not able to remain in St. John for the banquet, as a similar entertainment had been arranged for them that evening at Fredericton. After the toast to the Queen, Mayor Daniel read an address to the soldiers, to which Lieut. Good and several of the men responded. Speeches were made by many of the citizens present, and healths were drunk and cheering and singing indulged in, in a manner that could come only from the overflow of spirits—of the soldiers from the joy of being at home once more, and of the others at having them return with honour.

In the meantime several New Brunswick men had returned who had enlisted in different parts of the Dominion outside of New Brunswick, and went representing those parts. These men put in claims for a share of the fund, but no provision had been made for them when the calculation of the amount required was made. While the claims of some of these for a share of the fund were strong, the rule had been laid down that the money should be divided among the men of the New Brunswick Contingents, and the committee felt that special cases could be added only with the sanction of a general meeting.

On April 18th, 1901, a meeting was held to decide what disposition should be made of these claims. By the Treasurer's report it appeared that there was still a balance on hand, a portion of which would be needed to print the accounts. It was decided at the meeting that seven of the claimants were bona fide New Brunswick men, and on the suggestion of Lieut. Col. Armstrong and Mr. H. D. McLeod, it was ordered that \$500 be divided among the seven, thus leaving a sum sufficient only for the necessary printing.

A vote of thanks, moved by Mr. W. E. Vroom, seconded by Mr. W. O. Purdy, and heartily endorsed by Premier Tweedie, was then extended by his Worship the Mayor to Mr. Howard D. McLeod, for the indefatigable, careful and satisfactory way in which he had performed the exacting duties of Treasurer of the fund.

A final meeting was held on the 4th of October, 1901, when the Treasurer's supplementary statement to date and the Auditors' Report thereon were submitted and confirmed and on motion of Senator Ellis it was resolved that the entire matter of printing the transactions and disposing of the balance, if any in the hands of the Treasurer, after printing and other bills have been paid be left in the hands of a committee consisting of the Treasurer, Mayor Daniel, Lieut. Cols. Markham, Armstrong and McLean.

At a subsequent meeting of the above Committee it was decided to hand over the balance of the funds to His Worship the Mayor towards the New Brunswick South African Soldiers' Memorial Fund.

As will be seen by the accounts, the large sum of \$26,426.03 was collected—a very creditable showing for the Province when it is remembered that it also did its share in contributing towards the Canadian Patriotic Fund.

While the present war with the Transvaal is the first occasion on which New Brunswick has sent men to the assistance of the Empire in foreign parts, it is not the first time that the Province has contributed money for the help of the mother land. As long ago as 1798, when the national existence was at stake because of Bonaparte's ambition to crush by invasion the power of England, an appeal, made to the nation

to replenish the exhausted exchequer, was responded to by the people of New Brunswick. At that time, although the population of the Province was only 15,000, the large sum of £3,000 was contributed. Though the cause was fortunately not so urgent as that of a century ago, the raising of the fund accounted for in this pamphlet shows that the same sentiments prevail today in the hearts of the people of New Brunswick as actuated their Loyalist ancestors.

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Treasurer's Report.

To the Subscribers of the New Brunswick Transvaal Contingent Fund:

"When the subscriptions were started in St. John in October, 1899, it was understood that the men would only be in service for a period of six months, and it was arranged that a sum of fifty cents per day, over the regular pay received from the government, would be allowed each man enlisting in, and going from New Brunswick, and this allowance held for his return, or paid to the family of the soldier upon his order (a form therefore being provided), a very great number did this, and it proved of great service in many families that were depending on the soldier when at home.

The war assuming greater proportions a second contingent was called for, and the men enlisting in, and going from New Brunswick, in this contingent were promised the same treatment as the first contingent, that is, 50 cents per day, and payable in the same manner. Upon their departure the enthusiasm of the people increased and personal subscriptions were freely made—the provincial government making a grant of \$5,000—the City of St. John and many of the municipalities of the province making liberal grants. With these increased subscriptions the committee of management were not only able to pay the allowance for the promised period of six months, but to extend the payments several months beyond. But the time came when it was found that the allowance must cease, and the 31st of August, 1900, was the date fixed as the latest to which they could be made. To do even this the fund was not sufficient and special appeals were made in St. John to meet this, and it was done with success.

Of the men enlisted in New Brunswick, 110 went in the first contingent, 67 in the second, and 10 in the reinforcements to the first contingent.

The men of the first contingent, who did not obtain their discharge prior to 31st August, 1900, received allowance for 304 days. Second Contingent, 235 days, and reinforcements 112 days.

Of the members of the first contingent there are six, and of the second five, yet unpaid, but a sum to meet their allowance is set apart for the purpose.

Several soldiers hailing from New Brunswick, who served through the campaign, have made claims for allowance that have not been granted by the committee for two reasons. The first and most material is, that there are no funds on hand to do so, and the second, that some of these men enlisted in Nova Scotia and some in Quebec, serving through the war in companies going from these provinces, and some unable to enlist in New Brunswick as the ranks were full, went to Halifax and thence to South Africa, attached to no corps or company, but on arrival there were taken on, and served through the campaign, returning to Canada with those who had regularly enlisted, receiving regular and honorable discharge.

None of these men were on the Nominal Roll received from the militia department, Ottawa, as soldiers enlisting in New Brunswick and were never reckoned with as soldiers entitled to receive allowances from this fund.

Had these men in any way been represented as forming a part of the quota going from New Brunswick, the committee would have made further appeal to the public for funds to do so.

I have to submit report of the transactions in connection with the funds to 31st of March, 1901, as follows :

A general statement of the receipts and expenditures.

A statement giving the names of the individuals, corporations, churches, societies, etc., contributing, with their respective subscriptions, amounting in all to \$26,353.14.

A statement of payments, giving the name of each soldier to whom an allowance was made, and the sum he received, amounting in all to \$23,824.00.

Vouchers for all payments are on file.

There is shown in the general statement of account, a balance of cash on hand of \$1,695.25, from which is to be deducted unpaid allowances to members of the first and second contingents, \$1,049, leaving a net balance of \$646.25.

Lt. Col. Armstrong congratulated the committee on the successful accomplishment of the purpose for which the fund was created. All the men who enlisted in New Brunswick had been paid, and there still remained a small surplus. Some New Brunswick men who for various reasons had enlisted outside the province had applied for aid from the fund, and it might be well to divide this balance among them. He moved that the statement just presented lie on the table and that the treasurer read the list of applicants.

H. D. McLeod named the following who had applied for a part of the fund:

B. McCallum, of Douglstown, N. B., who was working in Windsor, N. S., when the call came and had enlisted there with H Co., with which he served through the war.

W. H. Coates, of Buctouche, had been attending McGill College in Montreal and had enlisted there.

Fred W. Kirkpatrick, who had enlisted with H. Co. at Halifax, was a native of St. John.

C. F. Peterson, of the Fredericton military school had been transferred to Quebec just before enlistment began and had joined F Co. there.

Geo. Glew, of Woodstock, tried to join the second contingent in this province and failed, but was taken on at Halifax.

Fred R. Gorham, of the 2nd contingent, had enlisted at Quebec in the 2nd contingent.

William McLellan, of Newcastle, had failed to get enlisted in New Brunswick and had smuggled himself on board the transport. He was accepted at Cape Town and served with the R. C. R.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie brought up the case of Harry Wetmore, who died of fever in South Africa. H. D. McLeod said his name was not on the roll, nor had he ever seen it mentioned among the sick lists. A further search revealed the name of A. Wetmore in one of the militia orders, but the place of his enlistment could not be found. The matter has been referred to the Canadian patriotic fund.

The treasurer stated that of the \$646 balance now on hand, if \$146 were taken to defray the expenses of printing and pub-

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lishing the complete list of subscribers and other statements in connection with the fund, the remaining \$500 could be divided among the seven applicants in the proportion of \$79 to each of first contingent men, and \$61 to each of the second.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie moved that the balance be so appropriated.—Carried.

E. T. Sturdee, W. O. Purdy and W. E. Vroom were appointed an audit committee to examine the treasurer's accounts and report.

Before bringing the meeting to a close his worship thought some recognition should be made of the indefatigable industry and zeal of the treasurer, H. D. McLeod, to whom the success of the movement was largely due.

A vote of thanks to Mr. H. D. McLeod was moved by W. E. Vroom, seconded by W. O. Purdy, heartily endorsed by Premier Tweedie and cordially tendered the Treasurer by His Worship the Mayor.

H. D. McLeod gratefully and appropriately responded.

It was decided to include the motion in the published report.

Auditors' Report.

ST. JOHN, N. B., MAY 17th, 1901.

His Worship the Mayor, and Subscribers to the South African Contingent Fund:—

Gentlemen,—Having been appointed by you to audit the books and accounts of Mr. H. D. McLeod, the Treasurer of the South African Contingent Funds, we have to report:—

That we have been shown the system for receiving and paying the moneys of the Funds as inaugurated by the former Treasurer, the late Mr. Ruel, and continued by Mr. McLeod, and have had free access to the books and vouchers; we found it impossible in the limited time at our disposal to compare all entries and payments, but we have examined a sufficient number of credits and disbursements indiscriminately to satisfy us that all are in order; the total amount shown to 31st March last, as received from all sources is \$26,353.14, and this has all been paid out to member: of the different Contingents except \$1,049 held, but not yet claimed or paid over, and \$646.25 balance, of which \$500 has since been divided among seven members of the Contingents, New Brunswickers, who joined outside the Province, and \$146.25 will be expended in printing the reports. This total of \$1,695.25 was deposited in Savings Bank and Bank of New Brunswick, as per bank books exhibited to us; there are no other claims as far as we know against the funds.

An immense amount of work has devolved upon Mr. McLeod in keeping these accounts. We have much pleasure in bearing testimony to his excellent system and careful thought of all details, and the thanks of all concerned are due to your Treasurer for his painstaking efforts.
