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## The Organization of the Department

### GENERAL POWERS.

The Discipline (par. 337) defines the general powers of the General Conference Board of Temperance, Prohibition and Moral Reform as follows:—"The Board shall have general oversight of our Temperance, Prohibition and Moral Reform work throughout the Church, and shall have authority to make representations to governments, legislatures, and parliament in harmony with the declared principles and policy of the General Conference on all matters of legislation and administration which affect Temperance, Prohibition and Moral Reform."

Further specific powers are granted in the same paragraph to publish and circulate literature; co-operate with other bodies engaged in similar work; appoint Field Secretaries and define their duties; employ or authorize to act as specialists in moral and social reform work, etc., etc.

The Board is further empowered by General Conference (Journal, 1910, page 412) "to give as much practical effect as possible to the recommendations and principles embodied" in the report of the General Conference Committee on Sociology.

### DETAILS OF ORGANIZATION.

The General Board is composed of the General Superintendents, the General Secretary, the Field Secretaries, the Treasurer, and seventy-six other members, one-half elected by General Conference for four years, and one-half elected annually by the Annual Conferences. (Disc., par. 336.)

The Annual Meeting of the General Board is composed of the officers, the members of the Ontario Group, and one representative who shall be elected by each Annual Conference having jurisdiction outside of Ontario. (Disc., par. 342.)

The Executive Committee, elected annually by the General Board, is composed of the officers and twelve other persons, of whom not less than eight shall be members of the Board, and not less than six shall be laymen. (Disc., par. 339.)

The Group for any province is composed of the members of the General Board within that province, except in Ontario, where the representatives of Toronto, London, Hamilton, Bay of Quinte and Montreal Conferences compose the Group. A Group may be convened at the call of the Group Chairman or the General Secretary, to consider issues affecting that province, and the proceedings of these meetings shall be reported to the General Secretary (Disc., par. 342, sec. 2) for the information of the General Board.

The Annual Conference Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Reform is elected each year by the Annual Conference. Usually the members of the General Board within the Conference are included in this committee, and its meetings are held with the Provincial Group. This committee reports both to the Annual Conference and to the General Secretary for the information of the General Board. (Disc., par. 343.)

The Annual Conference Sessional Committee on Temperance and Moral Reform meets only during the session of the Annual Conference and is composed of one minister and one layman elected by each Annual District Meeting, and such other persons as may be added by the Annual Conference. (Disc., 144, sec. 6.)

The District Temperance Secretary is elected for each District by the Annual Conference on the nomination of the Conference Sessional Committee on Temperance and Moral Reform. (Disc. 343, sec. 2.) The General and Field Secretaries gladly give every possible assistance to District Secretaries. Should special information be desired upon any question it will be promptly sent on request.

Each District Temperance Secretary is expected to give direction, inspiration and assistance to the work of the Department throughout the District.

(1) By aiding the Circuit Superintendent and Circuit Committee to arrange for the Annual Temperance and Moral Reform Meeting in every congregation throughout the district, when pledge-signing and reformation work shall be promoted. A simultaneous campaign (Disc., par. 344, sec. 1) is recommended.

(2) By arranging for the Annual Offering for our work in every congregation throughout the district, using wherever possible the offering envelopes (pencils attached if desired), supplied by the Department. (Dis., par. 344, sec. 2.)

(3) By inaugurating wherever possible, and helping to carry forward campaigns for Local Option and Provincial prohibition; cam-



paings for pledge-signing in all our Sunday Schools and congregations; and campaigns against every moral or social wrong found in any community;

(4) By constantly reminding our ministers and people that the Department is always ready to render every possible assistance in every campaign for moral and social betterment, such as furnishing speakers or literature in campaigns—enforcing the laws concerning liquor, the Lord's Day Act, the Criminal Code against social vice, gambling, etc., etc., obtaining amendments to make existing laws more effective or new laws to bring about improved conditions; and aiding in the establishment and maintenance of social settlements, rescue homes, etc., in any community where such may be needed.

(5) By planning for the organization wherever possible of the Good Citizenship Brotherhoods, which have proven very helpful in meeting social needs and solving problems of citizenship, both in urban and rural communities.

(6) By reminding our people that while the Department stands ever ready to render every possible aid on behalf of temperance and prohibition throughout the whole field of the Church, it also stands ready to assist, by all proper means, every effort on behalf of social purity, against the horrible White Slave traffic, against the growing vice of gambling—as well as every other reform which seeks the uplifting of our citizenship, the righting of all moral and social wrongs, and the incoming of the kingdom of God among men.

(7) By informing the General Secretary concerning the moral and social conditions throughout the District, and every movement which seeks the cleansing of conditions and the welfare of humanity.

(8) By earnestly co-operating with the District Epworth League, as a member of its Executive (Disc., par. 330, Art. V), in the endeavor to increase the efficiency of the Good Citizenship Department of Local Leagues.

The Circuit Committee of Temperance and Moral Reform, composed of the Pastor and not less than three others, is elected by the Quarterly Official Board, at the second meeting thereof each year. (Disc., pars. 178, sec. 4; 343, sec. 3.) This committee is given general oversight of the work of Temperance and Social Service within the bounds of the Circuit.

A General Superintendent, if present, presides over the Annual Meeting of the Board, the Executive Committee and the Provincial Group. The meeting elects a Chairman for that session if no General Superintendent is present. The Annual Conference Committee elect their own Chairman.

The Treasurer is custodian of the funds of the Department. All payments are made by cheques signed by him, and countersigned by the General Secretary.

The General Secretary is elected by the General Conference, and is the medium of communication between the Board and all parts of the work. He is responsible for the administration of the business of

the Department, under the direction of the General Board. He conducts the correspondence of the Department. It is his duty to disseminate information bearing upon the work of the Department and to propagate the principles and promote the policy adopted by the General Conference on Temperance, Prohibition and Moral Reform. He is also required to travel throughout our Church holding temperance, prohibition and moral reform meetings, in co-operation with superintendents of circuits and chairmen of districts; to attend, when possible, the temperance anniversaries of churches and other meetings of a similar character, District Epworth Leagues and Sunday Schools, district meetings, Annual Conferences and Epworth League Conventions, as well as the sessions of the Annual Conferences. He is authorized to receive collections and contributions on behalf of the work, and may solicit personal subscriptions for the same.

#### FIELD SECRETARIES.

The Department also employs three Field Secretaries, who devote their time to work throughout the whole field, travelling constantly from place to place, rendering immense service to the Church and the nation in the establishment of the principles of Christianity in our civilization, and strengthening the work of the Department by vitally connecting the head office with all who look to it for guidance and inspiration.

#### OTHER WORKERS.

The Department also employs from time to time, for longer or shorter periods, specialists in moral and social reform work, who give splendid service in such spheres and localities as it is possible to utilize their services.

#### CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER BODIES.

Under the direction of Disc. 337, section 3, the Department is co-operating with the Presbyterian Board of Social Service and Evangelism in the conduct of Social Surveys, both of urban and rural communities, and in the establishment of industrial schools for wayward girls who will be lifted from evil environment and an effort made to save them from a criminal life.

The Department also co-operates with all temperance organizations in temperance campaigns for educational, legislative and administrative results in the upbuilding of a strong temperance sentiment and the effort to secure prohibition of the strong drink traffic.

Through the Department the Methodist Church has federation in the Social Service Council of Canada, and is affiliated in the National Committee for the Suppression of the White Slave Traffic.

This statement briefly explains the organization of the Department. With the increasing sympathy with its work that is everywhere manifest, we look forward with great expectations of blessing in the future. The Department began with an annual income of

about \$500. Last year the people kindly gave almost \$24,000, but with the increasing work, the enlarged outlook and the added undertakings of the Department, it is necessary, if the work is effectively done, that we should receive a much larger income this year. The estimates of the annual meeting call for \$33,000.

The Department is also co-operating with many other bodies, local, provincial and federal, organized for moral reform and social betterment, and helping to permeate Canadian citizenship with the gospel teaching of social righteousness for social, economic and moral development throughout the nation.

## Annual Report

### Department of Temperance and Moral Reform

#### INTRODUCTORY.

The fundamental idea of Christianity is "The Kingdom of God." Jesus Christ spake many parables concerning this Kingdom, taught His disciples to pray for its incoming, sending them forth to win all people to become its citizens and all nations to participate in its privileges and experience its blessings. The human conception of the Kingdom of God has changed with the passing centuries, ever bringing to wearied and sinful men a higher ideal of life and a nobler purpose for living. To-day we conceive that Kingdom to be inclusive of the whole life of man, not only his eternal and immortal interests, but his human and earthly relationships also. The programme of that Kingdom includes the winning of men unto God and His Kingdom, which work we call Evangelism; the proclamation of Christ's gospel to every human creature, and the extension of this Kingdom into every land, which work we call Missionary; the development of every life in spirit, mind, and body, and the training of individuals for life in the Kingdom, which work we call Educational; and the application of Christian principles to social life and the building of a Christian type of human society, which work is now called Social Service.

This vital message of the Kingdom calls the Christian Church to a most inspiring task. The clarion challenge of early Christianity receives fresh emphasis in this twentieth century as the servant of God awakes to the full purpose of the Master's words, "The Son of Man is come to save that which was lost." He has come to save the world—not a part of it, not a segment of man's being, not a number of people out of the mass; He has come to save the world in every part and process, to redeem man from his sins, and to redeem his environment, to make a new man, and to make a new community. Any other ideal does not approach the ideal of the Saviour of men. Any programme that falls short of this falls below the New Testament programme of the Kingdom. "To save the world, to make a

sweeter, brighter, gladder world, a safer world for boys and girls to grow up in, a happier world for men and women to pass through, a brighter world for departing saints to look back upon, to make straight paths for men's feet, to build on earth the city of God—this is the task which gives meaning to the life, this is the task to make the heart throb, this is an adventure worthy the Son of God, and the sons of God."

The Church has endeavored to reconceive the essential gospel of Jesus concerning the Kingdom of God on the earth, and accepting the divine commission in all its length and breadth is now set upon the splendid task of building that Kingdom among men.

Having in view this all-inclusive programme of the Kingdom of God, after careful consideration and faithful deliberation, the Social Service Council of Canada (formerly known as the Moral and Social Reform Council of Canada) has formulated the following definite programme for the Churches and other bodies federated in this Council, upon various economic, social and moral questions:

We affirm that it is Christianity that has largely created the present demands for social and economic justice, and for a larger realization of human rights and duties. But for the presence of Christian ideals in the world, there would be no such vivid consciousness of the existence of these problems. It is because of the leavening work of the gospel of Christ that men discern the moral issues involved in economic relations.

We believe that the Son of man is the final authority over all human life, in its social as well as its individual aspects. We believe that righteousness can be realized in the complex conditions of modern life only through the application to all human affairs of the principles of the Kingdom of God. We believe that it is the duty of a Council such as this to show how these Christian principles apply to human affairs.

We declare, therefore:—

1. For the application of Christian principles to the operations of industrial associations, whether of labour or of capital.

2. For a more equitable distribution of wealth. We hold that the distribution of the products of industry ought to harmonize with the teaching of the New Testament.

3. For the abolition of poverty. We realize that some poverty is due to vice, indolence or imprudence; but, on the other hand, we hold that much is due to preventable disease, uncompensated accidents, lack of proper education, unemployment, insufficient wages, and other conditions for which society is responsible and which society ought to seek to remove. We believe in the maintenance of such a standard of living that every person shall have sufficient fresh air, light, pure food, shelter, comforts and recreation to make the conditions of his life wholesome. We believe that whenever possible he should be led to earn these for himself and those dependent upon him; but that, when, through old age, accident, sickness or any other incapacity, the family

or individual is unable to become self-supporting, society should make adequate provision for them.

4. For the protection of childhood. We believe in the right of children to birth, health, happiness and mental and moral education. We believe in the protection of children from exploitation in industry, trade and amusement, and from work that is dwarfing, degrading, or morally unwholesome.

5. For such regulations of the conditions of the industrial occupations of women as shall safeguard the physical and moral health of themselves, the community and future generations.

6. For adequate protection of working people from dangerous machinery and objectionable conditions of labor, and from occupational disease; for such ordering of the hours and conditions of labor as to make them compatible with healthy physical, mental and moral life.

7. For provisions by which the burden imposed by injuries and deaths from industrial accidents shall not rest upon the injured person or his family.

8. For the release of every worker from work one day in seven. We hold that in a Christian society these things should prevail:—

(a) One day of rest for every six days of work secured to every worker.

(b) This one day of rest to be Sunday, except in cases of those engaged in work which from its nature must be done on that day.

(c) The pay of each worker for six days' work made sufficient for seven days' living.

9. For the employment of the methods of conciliation and arbitration in industrial disputes.

10. For proper housing. We believe that all dwellings should be sanitary, that overcrowding and congestion of population should be prevented, and that tenements and apartment blocks should be constructed as to allow a proper physical basis for family life. There is urgent need of a more uniform and rigid enforcement of the various by-laws governing housing.

11. For the application of modern methods in the care of dependent and defective persons by the adequate equipment and humane and scientific administration of public institutions concerned therewith.

12. For the development of a Christian spirit in the attitude of society toward offenders, and that it must endeavor to prevent the commission of crimes by furnishing a wholesome environment, and by such educative and corrective measures as will develop moral sense and industrial efficiency in the young.

13. For wholesome recreation. We believe that the play of children and the amusements of adults are of great importance to morals, and that they should be brought under social control, so as to free them from the evil effects of unrestrained commercialism, and make them minister to the physical and moral well-being of the people.

14. For the protection of society against all contagious diseases by compulsory notification to Medical Health Officers; that this should apply to venereal diseases; and that no one should be granted a marriage license until he or she presents a medical certificate of normal mentality and freedom from the venereal diseases.

15. For international peace. We believe that war is contrary to Christian morals, and that international disputes should be settled by conciliation and arbitration.

The value of this statement in its relation to the Kingdom of Christ is enhanced when it is known that all the following bodies, which are federated in the Social Service Council of Canada, were officially represented at its meeting: The Church of England in Canada, the Methodist Church in Canada, the Presbyterian Church in Canada, the Baptist Church in Canada, the Congregational Church in Canada, the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the Dominion Grange and Farmers' Association, the Salvation Army, the Canadian Purity-Education Association, the Evangelical Association of North America, and the Women's Christian Temperance Union.

As the work of the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform of our Church has proceeded we have been constantly impressed with the growing realization of the increasingly important responsibilities placed upon us by the Methodist Church.

During the past year we have pressed forward in this work of the Kingdom committed to our charge. We have ever sought the increase of the glory of God, and the betterment and welfare of humanity. Perplexed and bewildered oftentimes, we are encouraged by some victories and the assurance that the kingdoms of this world shall become the Kingdom of our God and of His Son. Our desire was a greater advance, larger achievement and more sweeping victories, in the everywhere struggle for righteousness in all the affairs of men. Back of all the efforts we have made, and running through them, have been unceasing prayer and adoration. At times we have felt that we were admitted to the very throne-room of the universe. God has covered our heads in the night of battle, and has ever been round about us to deliver us, and His Holy Spirit has ever been upon us. We give Him glory, and thank His people for the help that they have given us in prayer and counsel, in work and substance. We see that the glowing banner of the Redeemer must be flung out in all the great field of our endeavor—out from the sorrowed and sinful, the oppressed and overburdened, the crushed and undone hearts of humanity, a very neglected world, of the night, a sort of darkest continent, comes the bitter cry for the gospel of the glory of the blessed God, beaming in the face of Jesus Christ. Christ's witnesses and watchmen must survey, chart, invade and conquer the world for Him. The drunkenness, the vice, the violence, the industrial injustice, the indecent theatres, the immoral cafés, cabarets and hotels, the moral slaughter of girlhood and youth connected with the evil businesses of the twentieth century, shriek out a challenge to Christ's people. Watchman, what of the night?

## The Great Temperance Reform

It was recently said by the Bishop of Lincoln, England, "If we are going to get rid of the poverty, the bad housing, the dirt, the recklessness, the lax morals, the brutality of the slums, we must certainly remove these people from the drink trade or the drink trade from the people. Very much else, indeed, will remain to be done; but until we deal drastically with the drink, all other reforms will be either impossible or futile."

Said John Wesley, the revered founder of Methodism, "Touch no dram; it is liquid fire: It is a sure, though slow, poison; it saps the very spring of life."

The Methodism of Canada has never compromised with the traffic in strong drink. We have always been unfalteringly and determinedly aggressive in the unceasing struggle to destroy this enemy of the health, happiness, homes and hopes of the people. Whether the battle was for personal abstinence or provincial prohibition; local option in a municipality, or the banishment of the traffic from a county, or a larger area; the seeking of amendments to further extend the principle of prohibition in our license laws, or an effort to obtain a provincial prohibitory enactment; the enforcement of the prohibitive sections of the liquor legislation in any Province, in Newfoundland, or in Bermuda, or any other purpose whose object was a victory over the traffic in strong drink. There has been neither hesitancy nor inactivity. The declared principles and recommendations adopted by the General Conference of our Church have been loyally, earnestly, persistently and unhesitatingly followed. Their restatement will refresh the memory of our people and possibly prove of help in future campaigns:—

1. Total abstinence from all intoxicating liquors is the imperative duty of every individual.
2. The liquor traffic is a business antagonistic to every interest of the Church and State.
3. The traffic in intoxicating liquors for beverage purposes is immoral, and it is the duty of the civil government to prohibit it.
4. We condemn the license features of all statutes by which money is accepted for the legal protection of an immoral traffic.
5. The Government (Dominion, Provincial or Municipal) that accepts money for liquor licenses becomes a partner in the business, justly declared to be an enemy of God and man. We protest against the unholy alliance.
6. The only proper attitude of the Christian towards the unholy traffic is that of relentless hostility; and all members of the Methodist Church who possess the elective franchise are urged to use their influence to assure the nomination of municipal and parliamentary candidates known to favor and support prohibition, and to use their votes as a solemn trust to elect such candidates; thus promoting the

rescue of our country from the guilt and dishonor which have been brought upon it by a criminal complicity with the traffic.

7. Civic righteousness demands the extirpation of a traffic so fruitful of corruption in every department of civil government.

8. In view of the foregoing principles:

(1) We strongly recommend our people to push forward a crusade for total abstinence throughout our whole connection, using every agency of the Church to promote that end.

(2) We are deeply impressed with the importance of having scientific teaching on the baneful influences of alcohol and narcotics in every grade of our public schools.

(3) We advise our people, while prohibition is the unchanging purpose of the Methodist Church, wherever possible, to obtain Local Option as one of the best means of curtailing the evils of the liquor traffic.

This Department has always emphasized and sought to enforce these principles. The secretaries have been unceasingly alert to apply them in sermon, address, correspondence and conference. Through the pulpit, the platform and the press, in federation with other churches and many organizations, by interview with ministers and officers of the crown, superintendents and overseers of great industries, leaders in the labor movement, or leaders in society, we have ever continued to maintain our place on the firing-line in every struggle against the licensed liquor traffic, and in the vanguard of the army of temperance in its every campaign.

#### OUR PLEDGE SIGNING CAMPAIGN.

The Annual Meeting of this Board in 1912 authorized a pledge-signing campaign to cover the whole Church. The call to the Church was most cordially received, and on many of our circuits and missions with earnest enthusiasm, people and preachers co-operated in the campaign. The plan was to reach all our people through our Sunday Schools, our Epworth Leagues, our Brotherhoods and our congregations. Pledge Cards were furnished without cost upon the request of minister, Sunday-School superintendent, Epworth League President or any other officer of the Church. More than a quarter of a million cards were printed, and distributed throughout our circuits. Owing to the fact that the Circuit Schedules provide for only Sunday Schools to report as to the number that have signed the pledge during the year, we have the returns from only that section. The success of the campaign is clearly indicated in the returns showing that 46,720 persons in our Sunday Schools signed these pledges during the last Conference year. Correspondence indicates that many others signed the pledges in our Epworth Leagues and congregations. We believe the campaign was worth while for present results, and will tell in future battles against the liquor traffic.



We recommend that the Department continue this campaign this year, furnishing without charge the Pledge Cards (either the pledge for total abstinence, the four-fold pledge, or the five-fold pledge) to ministers and Sunday School Superintendents, as they may require them. We suggest that it be a condition of receiving these cards that a report shall be made before the next Conference, on a blank to be provided, as to the number of persons who sign them. We further urge that Temperance Sunday in the Sunday School be the day for this Pledge Signing Campaign. If, however, this day cannot be so observed, we urge every pastor and Sunday School Superintendent to arrange for special services on such day as would be most convenient.

The importance of pledge signing is universally recognized throughout Methodism. The far-reaching effects of tampering with strong drink are widely known. The words of Right Hon. John Burns, M.P., of Great Britain, concretely state this case: "Drinking excites where it does not divert their best faculties and qualities. It irritates where it does not brutalize, and makes for discord, strife and bitterness, where calmness, sobriety, kindness and decency should prevail. It is an inducement to laziness, and is often an incentive to the most exhausting and reckless work; it is the most insidious foe to independence of character; it undermines manhood, enervates maternity and dissipates the best elements of human nature, as no other form of surfeit does. It stimulates all the lusts of the flesh as no other form of excess is capable of doing, as the records of human depravity, misery and brutality too often reveal. As was said of it by Lord Brougham, it is 'The mother of want and the nurse of crime.'"

The value of literature for any campaign in behalf of temperance cannot be overestimated. We have recently sent to every pastor throughout the whole Church copies of recent important publications. Rev. Henry Carter, Secretary of the Temperance Department of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Great Britain, has prepared a very strong pamphlet, showing that drink is the enemy of every man. Using authenticated statistics and scientific experiments he proves that strong drink deleteriously affects the character, intellect, health and longevity of those who partake, as well as menaces the future of the unborn and increases infant mortality, develops feeble-mindedness and is an unequalled cause of child neglect and cruelty. The Scientific Temperance Federation has also issued a pamphlet "The Effects of Alcohol," which is described as simple enough for children, practical enough for thoughtful men, and interesting enough for everybody. The scientific method is again followed to illustrate how the use of alcohol affects the body processes, and intellectual work, causes crime and insanity, lowers the powers of the body to endure toil and resist diseases, injures the child and imperils the race. We have contracted for sufficient numbers of these pamphlets to send them to every minister. We believe they will prove more than ordinarily helpful for the presentation of the duty of abstinence; and we have a considerable supply which will be sold at very low prices.

## THE POST OFFICE AND STRONG DRINK.

Recently several manufacturers of liquor have used the mails for the advertisement of their wares, offering to send postage free and without charge samples of their wares. In a number of instances which have been reported to us bottles of liquor have been sent right into Methodist homes. In some instances, it is possible that the advertisement was answered and the liquor forwarded as promised. But in quite a number of instances reported to us bottles of spirits have been sent through the mails to persons who were known to be strongly opposed to the use of liquor. Possibly some persons thought it a joke upon these workers for temperance. Many persons have expressed very determined objection to the sending of bottles of liquor through the mails. In view of the recent announcement that a parcel post system would be introduced into Canada at the beginning of next year, it is very natural that great alarm should be felt as to the effect should liquor be allowed to be sent in that way throughout Canada. In the United States, where a parcels post system was recently inaugurated, the Government by specific regulation prohibited the use of the mails for the sending forward of liquors in any form. The recent Methodist Missionary Conference at Amherst, N.B., held in connection with the Annual Meeting of the General Board of Missions, heartily adopted the following resolution:

"Whereas, We believe it is the intention of the Government shortly to introduce a parcel post system in Canada; and whereas the Government of the United States excludes all intoxicating liquors from the mails; and whereas we believe that the great majority of the people of Canada are strongly opposed to the carriage of intoxicating liquors through the mails of His Majesty in our Dominion; therefore we the members of the General Board of Missions for the Methodist Church of Canada and the Methodist ministers of the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, together with representative laymen from all over the said Provinces now here in convention assembled to the number of about 300, as well as 700 citizens of the city of Amherst present at this meeting, respectfully request that all intoxicating liquor be excluded from the mails of Canada from the inception of such parcel post system and your petitioners will ever pray."

This Department some time ago entered a strong protest with the Postmaster-General against the use of the mails for sending alcoholic liquors, and upon the announcement that a parcel post system would be introduced urged that the regulations of this system should include the prohibition of liquor through the mails. No definite reply has yet been received.

We recommend that every minister be requested to call the attention of his people to this matter, and suggest that personal letters be written to Hon. L. P. Pelletier, the Postmaster-General, by influential

citizens, urging that Canada shall adopt a similar regulation as has been adopted by the United States.

(Note.—Since this report was written the announcement is made that the carriage of alcohol is prohibited in the Canadian Parcel Post.)

#### A NATIONAL PROHIBITION ENACTMENT.

The question of seeking the enactment of a Prohibition Law for the whole Dominion has been the subject of careful consideration in many parts of Canada. The Council of the Dominion Alliance gave the matter long and careful consideration. The fact that under Privy Council decision, the Provincial Legislatures have power to legislate only concerning the sale of liquor, leaving all legislation affecting manufacture and importation to the Federal Parliament gives emphasis to the importance of such a question.

This question has been frequently before the Parliament of Canada. Shortly after Confederation a determined effort was made to have Parliament enact such a law. The subject was debated during several sessions of Parliament, and in 1878 the Canada Temperance Act was enacted as a compromise. This law, adopting the principle of Local Option, gave counties and cities the right to prohibit the retail sale of liquor within their territorial limits. This law was adopted in almost all counties and cities in the Maritime Provinces, several counties in Quebec and in twenty-five counties and two cities in Ontario. It was subsequently repealed in all the places adopting it in Quebec and Ontario, and has remained in force in the Maritime Provinces until to-day, or until rejected for more advanced provincial legislation.

In 1891 a resolution in favor of a Dominion prohibition law was rejected in the House of Commons, the Government of that day preferring the appointment of a Royal Commission to enquire into the whole subject of liquor legislation. In 1895 this Commission presented to Parliament two reports—a majority report opposing, and a minority report favoring prohibition, and Parliament took no action in the matter.

In 1898 the Dominion Parliament, being again urged to enact prohibition, passed a measure providing for the taking of a general Dominion vote upon the question of whether or not it was desirable to enact a law of total prohibition for the whole country. This plebiscite was fixed for September 29th, 1898, and absorbed the energy and attention of temperance workers. It resulted in a majority of 13,687 for prohibition, the Province of Quebec giving a large majority against prohibition, and all the other provinces voting for it. After much consideration, and in response to earnest appeals from temperance workers, the Government and Parliament took the position that the vote would not warrant the enactment of a general prohibitory law.

Since that time the attention of the temperance workers has been absorbed in efforts within their respective provinces. Prince Edward

Island, wholly under the Canada Temperance Act since 1879 and 1880, excepting for some brief periods in Charlottetown, was brought under provincial prohibition about ten years ago and still continues to enjoy its benefits. The Nova Scotia Legislature has also enacted an excellent temperance law, which exempts the city of Halifax, where licenses are issued, but prohibits all retail sale of liquor elsewhere in the province, although it does not come into force in the counties where the Canada Temperance Act has been adopted until this Act is repealed. Campaigns are now being inaugurated in a number of counties for repeal, and we have the interesting position of temperance people working for, and liquor advocates working against, the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act. In New Brunswick there are several counties and cities where the Canada Temperance Act has been in force for about thirty years. In Quebec this Act is not now anywhere in force. In Ontario the Canada Temperance Act has been recently adopted in the District of Manitoulin, while a number of other counties and districts have inaugurated campaigns for the purpose of bringing the Act into force. In the Western Provinces the Act is not in force, although there have been several campaigns in British Columbia in recent years.

In view of these facts, we ask, is the time ripe for a Dominion Prohibitory Law? The Council of the Dominion Alliance, after careful deliberation adopted the following recommendations:

"1. We recommend that this Council calls upon all organizations favoring prohibition in the different provinces to undertake at once a vigorous campaign to secure the election to the Dominion Parliament and Provincial Legislatures of representatives who can be relied upon to do all in their power to secure the enactment, by the bodies to which they are elected for, as complete measures of prohibition as they have jurisdiction to pass.

"2. That the Executive Committee be instructed to carefully consider the question of legislation to prevent the importation of intoxicating liquors from licensed territory into those provinces, municipalities, or other areas, in which prohibition laws are in operation, and to take steps to secure the introduction of such legislation into the Dominion Parliament at the approaching session.

"3. That this Council earnestly urges the friends of the temperance cause in every province in which a provincial prohibitory law has not yet been enacted to make a vigorous effort to secure the enactment of such a law at the earliest possible date.

"4. Recognizing that in face of the conditions confronting our Dominion, created by the tremendous tide of immigration pouring in amongst us from countries where the liquor traffic is not so effectually curbed as here, and realizing the importance of cultivating the highest form of sobriety, if we are to build a great democracy out of the many races that are now turning to Canada as the land of promise—the land which is to give the world a civilization embodying the best features of older civilizations without their drawbacks, we deem it all-import-

ant that every effort should be made to secure at the earliest possible date the enactment of a Dominion prohibition law of the amplest character.

"5. That we instruct our Executive Committee to take steps to secure the introduction of a declaration in favor of prohibition into the Dominion Parliament during the next session.

"6. That the method of securing Dominion-wide prohibition be left to the Executive Committee of the Council."

We recommend that our people be urged to co-operate most heartily in this campaign, and would express our conviction that a Dominion-wide temperance campaign would prove helpful in many ways to the workers for temperance in every part of Canada.

#### THE PROVINCES AND TEMPERANCE.

*British Columbia.*—The Annual Conference adopted the following recommendations:

1. Local Option. As a means towards total prohibition, the policy of Local Option in the prohibition of the sale of liquors has proved itself of such value as a means of destroying the liquor traffic that we earnestly desire such a law to be placed in the statutes of British Columbia. We cannot see any legitimate reason why so moderate a measure of social reform should not be given to the municipalities of this province, and we would call upon the Methodist people to petition the Government to enact such a law.

2. Hours of Sale. We recognize the value of the amendments recently made to the "Liquor Act" by the Legislature of this Province, especially in limiting the hours of sale throughout all the unorganized districts. We regret, however, that the Act was drawn in such a way as to deprive municipalities of the power they formerly held to further limit the hours of sale according to local needs and sentiment. We hope the Legislature at its next session will restore to the municipalities the power to add such further restrictions to the hours of sale as they desire.

3. Enforcement. Reports have come to us of the non-enforcement of the existing liquor laws in various parts of the province, and we find in tracing the responsibility that it is in a large measure due to some License Commissioners who are not in sympathy with a thorough enforcement of the Liquor Act. We believe it is the duty of the Government to maintain the majesty of law, and we think that the principle governing the appointment of all commissioners should be to choose men who are in sympathy with a fair enforcement of law.

We earnestly call the attention of our people throughout British Columbia to these recommendations, and direct the Department to urge the Government of the province to take action upon the matters named.

*Alberta.*—The Annual Conference adopted the following recommendations:

1. That we reaffirm our conviction that the total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquors is the only satisfactory solution for the evils and vicious social conditions arising from that traffic.

2. We rejoice greatly that the United Farmers of Alberta, by resolution at their annual convention, have affirmed the earnest desire of the 14,000 members of that organization that a law prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors in the province should immediately be enacted by the Legislature of Alberta; and we would hereby urge upon the Government the enactment of a Provincial Prohibitory Act similar to the Manitoba Act, which was declared *intra vires* by the Privy Council of Great Britain, and has been in force in Prince Edward Island for several years.

3. That we reaffirm our conviction that the present prohibition line in Northern Alberta should be maintained, and that the portion of the Province of Alberta not now under license should be retained as such in harmony with the expressed wish by recent petition, and otherwise, of a large majority of the settlers within that area.

4. That we reaffirm our conviction that, within the present License Districts of the Province of Alberta, no license be granted where no licenses now exist, except by a vote of the householders in the area affected, and upon securing the same majority as that required to bring Local Option into force.

5. We would further affirm our conviction that, in places where licenses are now in operation, no additional licenses be granted until a vote has been taken among the people within the area affected, and carried by the same majority as that required to bring Local Option into force; and further that all applications for new licenses be received and considered only at the time for the annual renewal of licenses

6. We would further request the Government and Legislature of Alberta to enact such legislation as will enable any municipality within the province to either limit or reduce the number of licenses issued in that municipality, upon a majority vote of the ratepayers therein; and that it be compulsory upon the municipal council to submit the matter to a vote of the people when ten per cent. of the ratepayers shall so petition the municipal council.

7. We would reaffirm our request to the Government and Legislature of Alberta, to enact such amendments to the Liquor License Ordinance of Alberta as will make illegal the sale of intoxicating liquors during the whole of every Good Friday, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, New Year's Day and election days in each year.

8. We would also request the Government and Legislature of Alberta to enact such amendments to the Liquor License Ordinance of Alberta as will render it impossible for a Justice of the Peace, a member of any municipal council, or a member of the Legislative Assembly of Alberta, to hold personally, or as a director of a company, a license for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

10. We further request the Government of Alberta to introduce into the curriculum of the public schools of the province some suitable text-book which shall teach the physical, economic, social and moral evils which result from the use of tobacco and alcohol.

11. We further request the Government and Legislature of Alberta to enact such legislation as will provide for the preparation of satisfactory and authoritative voters' lists for use in the elections of members of the Legislative Assembly, which would also be applicable to all Local Option contests conducted under the present law which names the license district as the area within which such a vote shall be taken.

12. We would reaffirm our requests for such amendments to the Local Option clauses of the Liquor License Ordinance of Alberta as will permit the bringing into operation of a Local Option law in any municipality, local improvement district, or such group of municipalities and local improvement districts as shall be desired to be grouped as a unit in any Local Option contest, upon a majority vote of the resident electors, such vote to be held at the time of the municipal elections, and without the requirement of the one hundred dollars deposit as at present.

14. We recommend the immediate inauguration upon every circuit and mission throughout the Conference of an earnest and aggressive temperance campaign for the education of the people as to the disastrous effects of the legalized liquor traffic upon the social, economic, commercial and political interests of our country, as well as the moral and physical consequences suffered by the person who indulges even moderately in the beverage of strong drink. To make such a campaign effective we recommend the following definite objects:

(a) Frequent meetings for the discussion of this many-sided question that we may develop a strong temperance sentiment among the people.

(b) Securing signatures to the total abstinence pledge by the children, youth and adults of our congregations.

(c) Enlistment of our people to work together, and to co-operate with all others, to secure the election of men of unimpeachable character, as municipal councillors, and members of our provincial and federal parliaments.

(d) A thorough survey of conditions in each community, and special study of the Alberta Liquor License Ordinance so that every inefficiency of the law to meet local conditions shall be clearly understood, thus enabling the people to demand amendments of practical value to the present law as it affects Local Option, or the necessary prohibitions and limitations under license, with the ultimate object of securing provincial prohibition.

15. Whereas efforts to put into operation the Local Option clauses of the Liquor License Ordinance of Alberta have revealed the weaknesses in the present law, which renders doubtful its effectiveness, therefore, we would affirm our conviction that it would be unwise under such conditions to attempt to bring on a campaign in more than

one license district at any one time until such time as it can be demonstrated that the law, or any amendments thereto, are effective.

16. We would further urge upon the Government and Legislature of Alberta the enactment of such legislation as would abolish intoxicants from all clubs in the province.

17. We urge upon the Government and Legislature of Alberta the enactment of such legislation as will prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors on all dining-cars within the province.

19. That whereas we believe that the laws relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors, gambling and other social evils are not being properly observed, we hereby urge upon the attention of the Conference Standing Committee on Temperance and Moral Reform, the taking of such action as may be deemed best to assure a better enforcement of these laws.

20. That we memorialize the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform, in co-operation with the Alberta Temperance and Moral Reform League, to test the effectiveness of the initiative and referendum by the preparation of a Prohibition Act to the full extent of the powers of the province, and to submit the same to the people at as early a date as possible.

22. That we urge upon the Temperance and Moral Reform League the taking of such steps as will unite all temperance forces within the province.

We direct that the Department shall render every possible assistance in all these matters, calling the attention of the Government thereto, and seeking to arouse all our people to heartily co-operate in the effort to secure the practical and desirable purposes sought by the Conference.

*Saskatchewan.*—The Annual Conference adopted the following recommendations:

The Committee has learned of certain proposals under discussion by the Provincial Council of Social and Moral Reform. We recommend that Conference, while reaffirming its ultimate purpose of entirely eliminating from the national life both drinking customs and all forms of the drink traffic welcomes the prospect of co-operating with others who are prepared to support measures which contribute to that ultimate object by immediate action to eliminate all places of public resort for social drinking. We recommend the Conference to co-operate with others to secure the abolition of the bar-room, both in hotels and clubs and to provide effective Local Option for the control or removal of all remaining forms of the drink traffic. At the same time we recognize the need of constructive provision and regulation of hotels for the accommodation of the travelling public.

We direct the Department to render every possible assistance to the campaign for advanced temperance legislation, and in any local effort to secure either Local Option or law enforcement.

*Manitoba.*—The Manitoba Conference adopted the following recommendations:



Whereas the question of temperance and temperance legislation is primarily a moral and not a political issue, and as such should be decided wholly upon the merits of the principle and issue at stake;

Whereas the political parties of Manitoba have reduced the question to the level of a party issue, thereby successfully defeating the desire of the churches, and the will of the intelligent electorate of the country; and

Whereas the Liquor Party has gained much by their policy of adhesion to the political party;

Therefore be it resolved that we as a Church adhere to the policy of the Moral and Social Reform Council of Manitoba in their efforts to banish the bar, making use of the electors' covenant and the pledging of candidates, believing this to be an advance step in our efforts to secure the total prohibition of the liquor traffic.

Your Committee would recommend the very excellent work of our own Temperance Department, and would wish still closer relations between our Church workers and our own Department of Temperance and Moral Reform.

We direct the Department to earnestly co-operate in the effort to banish the bar, and every other campaign which has for its object of reducing, limiting or prohibiting the traffic in intoxicating liquors.

*Ontario.*—The five Conferences where territory is within this province passed resolutions commending the Government for its excellent enforcement of the Liquor License Act and condemning the Government for its refusal to repeal the three-fifths clause affecting the adoption of Local Option by-laws; expressing satisfaction with the legislation that prohibits the sale of liquor in bottles by holders of tavern licenses and shortening the hours of sale in licensed places, but very greatly regretting that the shortening of the hours was not made to apply in the evening as well as the morning, and that the furnishing of liquor in the licensed clubs of the province had not been prohibited.

We direct this Department to make every effort possible to secure such amendments to the present liquor laws as will further restrict, limit and prohibit sales of liquor. The only worthy clauses in this Act are the prohibitive clauses, and we believe the more of that principle adopted in the law the better it will be for the citizens of the province.

*Quebec.*—The Montreal Conference adopted the following recommendations:

“1. That we recommend an increasingly effective agitation be carried on against the union of the grocery and liquor business in the Province of Quebec, seeing it gives the impression that alcohol is a food when in reality scientifically speaking it is a positive poison.

“2. That, in view of the fact that the ultimate and permanent success of the Temperance Cause in Ontario depends as much, if indeed not more, upon the prompt, energetic and firm enforcement of the Local Option By-law where adopted than upon any additional

legislation on the part of the Provincial Parliament, we urge upon all friends of the cause in the different 'dry' municipalities to be especially alert and active towards this end, willing ever to co-operate with efficient inspectors and just as ready to report those that are otherwise with a view to their removal from office.

"3. That we recommend that constant attention be given to pledge signing in our Sunday Schools against tobacco and alcohol.

"4. That we urge upon all temperance workers the desirability of becoming conversant with the existing laws touching upon the liquor traffic in their respective provinces, and in this connection we call attention to the fact that the law is so constituted in the Province of Quebec that if a petition signed by (30) thirty electors be filed with the clerk of a municipality requesting the Council to submit a by-law to the electors whereby they may vote against any liquor licenses being allowed in the community, it is not optional with the Council to refuse the said request and that moreover women may vote upon such a by-law.

"5. Finally, in view of the fact that a campaign may thus easily be brought about in every 'wet' municipality in Quebec and that the way is open for a similar campaign in over one hundred municipalities in Ontario in connection with the next annual municipal elections; that we take such active measures in each province as to give practical proof that it is our intention as a Church not to cease our efforts until this combined form of curse and crime be driven completely from our country."

We direct the Department to render every possible assistance in all these matters.

*New Brunswick.*—The New Brunswick Group of this Board decided to endeavor to secure a Conference of all Quarterly Board Committees of Temperance and Moral Reform at which it is intended to outline a general policy for an advance in temperance legislation in that province.

*Prince Edward Island.*—The Annual Conference adopted the following:

"This Conference heartily commends the action of the Prince Edward Island Government in its action at its last session in granting nearly all the amendments to the Prohibition Act which were asked for by the Provincial Alliance. Among these we would especially note the forbidding of treating on trains and in public places, and also the giving and selling liquor to minors."

We direct the Department to render every possible assistance in securing the enforcement of the law, and in every effort to further temperance work in the pioneer prohibition province of Canada.

*Nova Scotia.*—The Annual Conference adopted the following:

"Your Committee are pleased to report that there has not been any desire on the part of the temperance workers in this province to rest upon work already done, but rather are determined to 'Go For-

ward' until they secure a workable and effectual prohibitory law for the Dominion as a whole."

The Laymen's Association of the Conference adopted the following:

"That this Association, while not making any recommendation with the advisability of repealing the Canada Temperance Act, in order to bring the Nova Scotia Temperance Act into force in counties now under the Canada Temperance Act, does earnestly press upon all the ministers, Quarterly Board officials and members of the Church in this province the importance of unitedly and earnestly working in support of any campaign that may be initiated by the temperance organizations of a county to replace the Canada Temperance Act by the Nova Scotia Temperance Act.

"That we urge upon all officials and members of our Church the importance of co-operating with the men of other denominations in bringing out and unitedly supporting candidates for municipal, city and town councils, who may be depended upon to insist upon the enforcement of the temperance and moral reform legislation of the country.

"That we urge upon all ministers to preach strong temperance sermons from time to time, and especially while temperance campaigns are on."

The Nova Scotia Temperance Alliance has decided to conduct campaigns in several counties for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act. The Nova Scotia Temperance Act, placed upon the Statutes by the Government of Nova Scotia in 1910, and amended in 1911, 1912 and 1913, can be used with better effect than the Canada Temperance Act in the suppression of the liquor traffic in the province. It is superior in many respects.

Some of the outstanding advantages of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act are:

#### ALL ALCOHOLIC DRINKS PROHIBITED.

1. The prohibition of the sale or keeping for sale of all drinkable liquids containing alcohol.

Various kinds of beer with a light percentage of alcohol, very injurious to the system, are being legally sold in Scott Act counties—the N.S.T. Act prohibits the sale of such drinks.

#### JAIL PENALTY AFTER FIRST OFFENCE.

2. The jail penalty must be imposed after one first offence. The inspector is liable to a penalty of \$20.00 if he does not regularly proceed from first to second or subsequent offence. This provision does away with the system in many municipalities of enforcing law to obtain revenue rather than to suppress the traffic.

#### NO "PERSONAL USE" PROVISION.

3. Under the amended Scott Act liquor can be legally shipped by Halifax dealers for personal use into Scott Act counties. Halifax is thus the provincial bar-room for Scott Act counties.

But liquor cannot be legally shipped by Halifax dealers into Nova Scotia temperance counties. The penalty is \$50.00 for first offence, \$100.00 for second and \$200.00 for third and each subsequent offence.

#### SAFE-GUARDING OF COURT RECORDS.

4. Stipendiary Magistrates must send to the County Prothonotary a certificate of each conviction and such certificate in all proceedings upon an information where a previous conviction is charged is sufficient evidence of such previous conviction.

This provision in the N. S. Temperance Act means the safe-guarding of papers absolutely necessary for efficient enforcement.

#### LESS DIFFICULTY IN MAKING SEIZURES OF LIQUOR.

5. Any inspector or police officer may at any time, without warrant, enter and search premises where he believes liquors are kept for sale or disposal contrary to the provisions of the Act, and seize any liquors unlawfully kept.

Under the Scott Act the officer requires a search warrant and it can be executed only between 6 a.m. and 9 p.m.

#### DISPOSAL OF FRAUDULENT SHIPMENTS.

6. Any inspector or constable may without warrant seize and remove liquor he finds in transit in any vehicle or at any wharf, warehouse or other place. The Scott Act is ineffective where liquor is in actual transportation in a truck or wagon within a municipality, and in all seizures the Scott Act officer must have a warrant.

If it appears to the magistrate that such liquor was consigned to some person in a fictitious name, or was shipped as other goods, or was covered or concealed in such a manner as would probably render discovery more difficult it is *prima facie* evidence of violation.

#### LIQUOR PEDDLERS MAY BE SEARCHED.

7. Any person who may be suspected of selling liquor from or keeping for illegal sale in his pockets or from or in any vehicle, may himself or himself and his vehicle, be searched, and if any liquor be found he may be arrested.

#### CLUBS CAN BE SUPPRESSED.

8. Under the amended Scott Act clubs are common. The N. S. T. Act prohibits such places; the keeping or having in any house or building or in any room or place occupied or controlled by any incorporated or unincorporated society, association or club or any member or members thereof or by any person of any liquor, is a violation of the Act.

#### PRESCRIPTIONS BY PHYSICIANS.

9. Under the Scott Act a physician who prescribes liquor for other than medical purposes is liable to a fine of \$20 for first offence and \$40 for subsequent offences.

Under the new Act prescriptions can only be given to persons whom the doctor has visited professionally within three days, and the penalty for violation of this provision is \$50 for first offence and \$100, or two months' imprisonment, for second.

#### ENFORCEMENT.

10. It is made the express duty of the Council, police and temperance committee and every officer and inspector to enforce this Act and take necessary proceedings to punish offenders.

We direct the Department to render every possible assistance in these efforts to secure better conditions in Nova Scotia.

### Community Social Surveys

Among the outstanding labors of the Department during the past year has been the Social Surveys conducted in co-operation with the Department of Social Service and Evangelism of the Presbyterian Church. The services of Mr. Bryce M. Stewart, an expert in Social Survey work, were engaged, and Social Surveys were conducted in Vancouver, Fort William, Port Arthur, Sydney, Halifax and Hamilton. The Reports of these Surveys have been printed in book form, and will be gladly furnished to interested persons upon application.

As the Social Survey is a recent development in methods of church work we include in our report the following informing description of 'The Community Social Survey, which recently appeared in *The Christian Advocate*, of New York, written by Elbert M. Conover:

"A community survey is a scientific investigation of social conditions, their exhibition as classified facts, and proper deductions from the facts. The survey is a measurement according to objective standards of social phenomena, in normal or pathological social life. We note certain objective conditions, and by investigation and deduction may point out probable consequent effects. The social survey makes it clear that sociological problems are not 'set up,' or imagined by a theorist in his study, but exist in reality. Nor does the scientific investigator become despondent upon the revelation of social disorders, but determines the cause, and is in position to apply adequate remedial measures. Washington Gladden writes, 'The dominant function of the Church in the life of to-day . . . is the Christianization of society.' (*Religious Education*, June, 1913.) The social survey is a factor in constructive social work.

"We begin a scientific investigation of a community with clearly defined purposes in mind. We desire to obtain an accurate description of conditions affecting every phase of community life. We must know the community. We are to discover the causes of recognized problems; to point out the results of certain realized conditions or the approaching problems and prevent pathological conditions in the

social organism. As one has expressed it, 'We may head off the slum.' Slum conditions exist as really in small communities as in large cities; here, too, we find the miserable tenement and unsanitary conditions. The survey is of essential importance in any work of constructive social upbuilding. If the community is to advance toward the community ideal, there must be a thorough searching out of every social condition, and the obstacles to reconstruction must be discovered and removed, until conditions are such that every individual has full opportunity for the expression of complete living. In order to initiate a survey we will have to convince those concerned of its importance. Its great value will appear more clearly in the process of discovering facts and problems.

"The findings of a survey must relate to a certain period in the community history. It is necessary, therefore that there be sufficient investigators to complete the work within a limited time. Care must be taken to secure accurate descriptions and to secure all the facts concerned in the makeup of the community. One unknown fact may explain an otherwise inexplicable condition. There must be no preconceived notions as to what the conditions are or should be."

The following must characterize the community social survey:

(1) The survey must contain an account of all the material resources of the community, including resources available in the soil, water-power, factories, mines, forests, and the climatic and scenic attractions. The stage of the development of the material resources may be compared with the possible state of development.

(2) There must be a complete description of the population, including the number, the different nationalities and races represented, with strength of each, movements of population, and a record of sexes and ages. The economic status will be shown, whether laborers, farm owners or renters, or owners of places of business, professional men, etc. The constructive work for a community will depend upon the people to be served and the people available for utilization in service. Many communities do not realize the significance of their boy population until the number of boys is plainly set before them, with the facts concerning the influences that are moulding their lives and thus determining the future of the community.

(3) The condition of home life is the great determinant of community life. It is therefore important to set forth the facts concerning homes, sanitary arrangements, cultural influences, etc. The economic state of the people must be shown—it may appear that deficient homes are caused by unjust labor conditions.

(4) The psychological makeup of the people must be known. There may be insane, subnormal, or deficient individuals. Or there may appear in some communities certain peculiar mental conditions. The deficiency of whatever type may be caused by isolation of family or community, the latter resulting in ignorance, narrowness and intermarrying with consequent effects seen in deteriorated families. The

mental attitude of the people must be taken into account in relation to progression in educational work, religious co-operation and reform movements. The narrow-mindedness of a community, or over-emphasis of individuality, may explain the existence of too many competitive religious denominations, isolated schools and lack of social life.

(5) The recreational and social life greatly determines the health of a social organism as well as of a human body. Complete information on this point must be had.

(6) We must know of the means of transportation and communication between the community and the outside world. A vital connection exists between distance to markets and sources of supply and economic and cultural conditions. The first work in reconstruction of community life may be agitation for better roads, telephone or better mail service.

(7) Perhaps the most important facts in the community survey will appear in the survey of the institutions in the community. The number of churches may show that there are too many organizations and buildings to be maintained—a scattering of needed forces. The number of young men, young women, boys, men, laborers or land owners reached by the Church when compared with the number of each in the community will show whether the Church is ministering to all, or leaving some to their own resources. We must know just what the Church is doing. If it is only holding the regulation services, there may be absolute failure in ministering to the community, and is striving to be ministered to. The Church must provide, or know that there is provided under good influences, recreational, social and cultural life. In many places a scarcity of young people in the membership is co-incident with lack of social or cultural work in the Church. We must know the condition of the educational system and point out the inadequacies. The lodges and organizations for mutual social, economic or cultural advance must be noted, with the character and extent of their work. The status of all the institutions must be noted. It often appears that the conditions which an institution was planned to meet have changed or disappeared, while the policy and method of the institution have remained unchanged.

(8) We must discover and exhibit the conditions that are detrimental to the community life. The saloons and all other places of unwholesome associations must be known, with the frequenters. We recently heard the pastor of a village church say that he did not know where the boys of the village spent their evenings. However, there is a saloon, a brightly lighted saloon, on a prominent corner, while the church and a hall owned by the church are closed and dark. With the detrimental influences we will include unjust industrial or political conditions.

When we have a complete tabulation of the facts concerning the community life, the next work of the constructive surveyor or "social

engineer" is to influence the building up of a strong community structure, the foundations to be laid according to the conditions exhibited in the survey. The proper remedial means must be applied to correct apparent pathological social conditions. The facts must be used to urge activity on the part of the people. Institutions must be organized to supply that which is lacking and which can be supplied by organized effort. Institutions—religious or social—which fail to utilize every available opportunity to serve must be persuaded to perform their whole duty of ministering. If any classes in the population are not being builded into the social structure of the community, they must be shaped and fitted so as to be at the very best possible advantage to themselves and to the structure as a whole.

The survey should be applied to city, town, or country community, for only a thorough investigation will make apparent all influential factors in social life.

Community social survey work is being continued under the same arrangement as last year. We have secured Rev. W. P. Riddell, Ph.D., as expert, and he is already at work in a survey of London and a rural survey of Huron County. During this year we are hopeful to conduct these surveys in a number of urban and rural communities.

#### MARITIME HOME FOR GIRLS.

Another co-operative effort with the Department of Social Service and Evangelism of the Presbyterian Church is the establishment of a Home for wayward girls in the Maritime Provinces. This Christian enterprise was begun in Nova Scotia, and the Home will probably be located in that Province. The purpose, however, is to include New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and arrange to receive the delinquent girls from all the Maritime Provinces. A strong representative Committee has been appointed, and efforts have begun in real earnest for the establishment of this Home. The following statement issued by the Committee quite fully explains this most worthy Christian enterprise:

*For whom is it?* Delinquent Protestant girls. Not an orphanage. Not a home for mental defectives. Not a rescue home for adult prostitutes. Wayward girls can be reformed only when kept separate from other classes.

*Why Protestant girls alone?* Because there already exist institutions for Protestant boys and for Roman Catholic boys and girls of the delinquent class.

*Who is to control the Home?* The Board of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church and the Board of Social Service and Evangelism of the Presbyterian Church, acting through a local Board of Management. The Baptists of the Maritime Provinces intended to deal with the matter at their annual Convention this year, but consideration was unintentionally omitted. The Executive of their Convention are in hearty sympathy with the project, and



promise to see that the matter is brought before their 1914 Convention for definite action. In the meantime they commend the scheme to the sympathy and financial support of all Baptists in the Maritime Provinces. The Bishops of Nova Scotia and Fredericton were approached on the matter, but felt themselves unable to commit their respective dioceses to co-operation without consulting their Synods. They are, however, personally in favor of the movement and are prepared to urge Church of England people to give the scheme their sympathy and support. It will be a Protestant Home, on broad non-sectarian lines.

*How Will It be Supported?* Chiefly by Government grants from the Province sending the girls. The three Provinces have engaged to do this, and Newfoundland is yet to be asked. Any further amounts needed for maintenance will be provided by the churches in control. There will be no annual public appeal for running expenses.

*Where Will It be Located?* On the outskirts of some town or city, where it will have the advantages of the town water, light, sewerage, etc. It will occupy at least ten acres, to allow for plenty of outdoor life. The site will be chosen by the two church secretaries. Both gentlemen live in Toronto, and will be uninfluenced by local patriotisms and jealousies.

*What Will Be the Nature of the Home?* It will be a school. Not a permanent refuge for the girls, nor an institution to be supported by their labor. Its object will be the physical and moral rehabilitation of the girls, that they may be restored to society as good citizens. They will be taught the usual school branches, together with such useful arts as home-making, dressmaking, etc. Not farming, for there is no demand for female farm labor in Canada. Not cane-plaiting, or any other trade which presents few opportunities for earning a living. The girls will be kept out of the way of doing harm till they respond to the moral and religious training given. The keynote of the Home will be its invisible discipline. They will be housed in cottages as much like homes as possible.

A Superintendent will have to be very carefully chosen, for on him, or her, will depend the value of the training. Follow-up work will be done by Probation officers, who are already provided for in Nova Scotia, at least, by the Children's Protection Act, 1912.

*Is the Home Needed?* Urgently! Read the statement below of Mr. Ernest H. Blois, Superintendent of Dependent and Neglected Children for Nova Scotia. No one can sepak with more authority for Nova Scotia, and we are informed a similar condition exists in the other Provinces.

*Why is this Statement Issued?* Because the initial capital cost must be raised. The committee is aiming at \$30,000. Twenty Halifax men have given \$4,000 already. All Protestants who wish to see our imperilled and wayward maidens saved from lives of vice are invited to help.

*Statement by Mr. Ernest H. Blois.*—Let us consider, briefly, the necessity for attempting to establish another charitable institution. At the present time there is no institution these Provinces to which delinquent Protestant girls may be sent. The law forbids placing Protestant children in Roman Catholic homes or institutions. What, then, is to be done with these girls? What has been done with them in the past? Some have been placed in Roman Catholic institutions; others have been sent to the county jails; but the greater number have been permitted to remain at large, spreading disease and schooling younger children in the mysteries of crime and debauchery.

We are told that the grand jury at the recent sitting of the criminal court was astounded at the depravity of certain girls. These girls had been before the juvenile court as "neglected," but as there was no institution to send them to, the court was obliged to leave them at large. There are many such cases, and they are not confined to the city of Halifax nor the larger towns. From all parts of the Provinces the same question is almost daily asked: "What can we do with delinquent and neglected Protestant girls?" A short time ago a Protestant girl of little more than thirteen years of age was sentenced to one year and eleven months in jail. The judge was in no way to blame. The child was clearly dangerous to society, and the common jail was the only place to which she could be sent. A county court judge told me recently that he was obliged to send two young Protestant girls under fourteen years of age to the jail for short terms, while for the same offence he sent a young Catholic girl to the Monastery of the Good Shepherd.

A judge in writing to me on this subject says: "It is a shame and a disgrace there is no place but the jail to send young Protestant girls." Some people may consider there are so few of these children that there is no necessity for burdening the charitable public with another institution. From my knowledge of conditions in this Province, I believe there are upwards of fifty young girls who should be cared for in a proper training institution. The number is probably much larger. I am speaking only of cases where attention has been drawn to them by the courts or reports to my office. The greater part of them are girls of immoral character, though there are quite a number for petty theft and other offences. There are also a considerable number of young girls reported as "neglected" who are sometimes, but not always, immoral, but who are "suffered to be growing up without salutary parental control and education or in circumstances exposing such child to lead an idle or dissolute life."

Early last winter such a case was reported to me from a prosperous provincial town. Investigation showed there were three young girls "neglected" within the meaning of the Act. Two were Roman Catholic, the other a Protestant. The two Roman Catholic girls were placed in the Catholic Girls' Home, where they are receiving excellent training and education. The Protestant girl was left in her home.

A few weeks ago I was again called to that town. The "neglected" girl had become a street-walker, a common prostitute, and one of the most disgusting criminal acts had been committed by her.

Here in the city of Halifax there are a number of cases known to the Juvenile Court of young girls of immoral character who are more dangerous to the welfare of the city than even typhoid. These children, ranging in age from twelve to sixteen, are diseased and are spreading the disease broadcast through the city. I know of a girl of fourteen who diseased a boy of fifteen.

I am quite aware of the difficulty of raising money for this undertaking at the present time. I do not know how the money is to be obtained. I do know there is need for immediate action, and I believe the Protestants of the Maritime Provinces will respond to the committee's appeal to place delinquent young girls of the Protestant faith on an equal footing with their Roman Catholic sisters.

#### GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

There are many other matters dealt with by the Department. Most of these, however, are dealt with in the Reports of Committees and Resolutions adopted by the Annual Meeting.

## MINUTES

# The Annual Meeting

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### Department of Temperance and Moral Reform

The Annual Meeting of the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church convened in the Metropolitan Church, Toronto, at 10 a.m., on Tuesday, 21st October, 1913.

The following members were present:

Smith, B.A., and Hugh Dobson, B.D., Field Secretaries; Rev. John Coburn and David Archibald, Esq., of the Toronto Conference; Revs. R. J. Garbutt, LL.D., and W. H. Cooper and Messrs. D. C. Taylor and Wm. McIntosh of the London Conference; Revs. Heber Crews, B.A., and J. S. Williamson, D.D., of the Hamilton Conference; Revs. John Garbutt and J. S. McMullen of the Bay of Quinte Conference; Revs. W. H. Sparling, D.D., and Wm. Howitt and Elmer Davis, Esq., of the Montreal Conference; Rev. G. W. F. Glendenning, Nova Scotia; Rev. W. G. Lane, of the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Conference; Rev. Edwin Moore, Newfoundland; Rev. A. W. Kenner, Manitoba; Rev. Hugh Dobson, B.D., Saskatchewan; Rev. J. M. Harrison, Alberta, and Rev. W. Lashley Hall, B.D., British Columbia.

Letters of regret over inability to attend were read from Rev. S. D. Chown, D.D., Mayor S. Carter, J. J. Mason, and Mayor A. Shaw.

Rev. J. H. Hazlewood, D.D., having been elected member of the Board for Toronto Conference by the General Conference, and being now a Field Secretary and hence a member as an officer of the Board, presented his resignation as General Conference representative for Toronto Conference on this Board. On motion his resignation was accepted. The members of the Toronto Group, being called as provided by Discipline, par. 337, section 7, elected Rev. J. W. Aikens, of Toronto Conference, to fill the vacancy. This election was reported to the Board. Rev. J. W. Aikens was duly notified of his election, and attended the meeting.

The General Secretary reported that during the year Rev. John Garbutt had resigned as Field Secretary, to which position he had been elected by the last Annual Meeting. The Executive Committee, on February 19th, 1913, accepted the resignation. At a subsequent meeting of the Executive Committee, on April 24th, 1913, Rev. T. Jackson Wray of Saskatchewan was elected, but on June 7th,

1913, he sent in his declination of the appointment. The office has not been filled, except that under the provision of paragraph 337, section 5, Rev. Hugh Dobson, B.A., B.D., of Regina, had been employed as a Social Service Evangelist. The General Secretary then nominated Rev. Hugh Dobson, B.A., B.D., as Field Secretary of the Board, to reside in Regina, Saskatchewan.

Moved by Rev. J. S. Williamson, D.D., seconded by Rev. W. Lashley Hall, B.D., that the nomination close, and that Rev. Hugh Dobson, B.A., B.D., be elected to the position of Field Secretary, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Rev. John Garbutt and declination of Rev. T. Jackson Wray. Carried.

Rev. Hugh Dobson, B.D., briefly addressed the meeting accepting the appointment.

The following resolutions, passed by the General Board of Missions, were read:

1. "That whereas the work of the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform seems according to Discipline to permit overlapping work already undertaken by this Board in various cities,

"Be it resolved that a special committee of the Board be appointed to meet with a special committee of the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform so as to suggest to the General Conference a method by which these two great Departments may co-operate; and that this committee report to their respective Executives."

2. "That the Church, through the Missionary Society and the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform, be requested to seek out men and women who have shown special interest in social questions and ability in social service, and secure their training with a view to their becoming leaders."

On motion these resolutions were referred to the Executive Committee, with power.

The request of Rev. Peter Bryce, Earls court, Toronto, that The Children's Home and Day Nursery become associated with the General Board, and that a grant of \$400 per annum be made thereto, was referred to the Committee on Finance.

The reports of the Sessional Committees were subsequently received, considered and adopted, as follows:

### Committee on Political Purity

Your Committee recommends:—

1. That the work of the Political Purity Associations of Halifax, N.S., and Westmoreland, N.B., reported to have been encouragingly successful in eliminating undesirable features from the recent Provincial and Federal elections, be commended as worthy of attention and imitation by like-minded citizens of other constituencies.

2. That Christian men of both political circles be urged to make their influence powerfully felt in their own respective parties in favour of selecting as candidates for Parliament such men, and such men only, the influence of whose private and public life tends to promote that righteousness by which alone any nation can ever be exalted.

3. That inasmuch as we recognize that in the ultimate analysis the success of any moral or religious movement depends more upon the character of the men interested than upon the correctness of the methods adopted, we call upon parents, Epworth League Presidents and pastors to prayerfully, prudently and persistently impress upon all—especially upon the young still untrammelled by party prejudice—the sacred nature of all duties connected with Christian citizenship to the end that with the increasing years of this century there may be an increasing number of

Men who can stand before a demagogue

And brace his treacherous flatteries without blinking.

Tall men, sun crowned, who live above the fog,

In public duty and in private thinking.

4. That we very heartily endorse the policy of publishing the names of donors and amounts donated to all funds for election campaigns in Canada.

### Child Welfare Committee

Your Committee recommends as follows:

1. Whereas there is a growing knowledge of the fact that the ultimate purpose of Government is the protection and development of life, rather than the protection and accumulation of personal profits and property; and

2. Whereas we are beginning to see that the only legitimate uses of personal profits and property is the protection and development of the life of the people; and

3. Whereas the life of to-morrow depends almost wholly on the bent of character, the health of the child of to-day, and its environment;

Therefore, be it resolved that this Board urges the heartiest of cooperation of our Church and of this Board with all agencies that make for child welfare.

In relation to this question, attention is called to some of the facts bearing upon it.

1. Due to the complex and strenuous business life of to-day making such large demands upon the time and thought of men, to the multitudinous demands of social customs upon women, to the rapidly changing standards of living and its increased cost, and at the same time to the half knowledge which the mass of people have with regard to the hygiene of reproduction. There is on the part of man the tendency to evade the responsibilities of rearing a family while at the same time increasing indulgences under the protection of the idea of the sanctity of the home.

(a) We recommend the recognition of the right of the child to be born, and to be well born; as well as the pernicious effect of evading such responsibilities.

2. With the rapid extension and development of the public school and Sunday-school systems, both of which have been of such tremendous import in child welfare, the tendency on the part of so many parents to cast off their responsibility upon these institutions and neglect the welfare of the child.

(b) We recommend the urging upon parents that they give more definite attention to the moral and religious training of their children, especially in the way of companionship. We further urge in all relief work that family rehabilitation be the aim of the effort.

3. With the rapid growth of cities, the abnormal increase in speculation and the overcrowding of the population, the child has been forced to find its recreation and exercise on the city streets and the back alleys. The restless, playful, fun-loving spirit has led the child



into committing of acts on account of which he has been credited with criminal intent. Three evils have resulted: In street games the boys become expert in gambling. In and out of the street and the alley the child has received a knowledge of and a training in sexual vice. Sex perversion often has resulted, and lastly the child has been caught, taken into custody, and under the influence of our courts of justice and penal methods has become confirmed in crime.

We recommend that cities and municipalities undertake to provide recreational centres and public playgrounds, making provision always for such supervision as will make the play itself an education of the conscience of the child.

We recommend that our Normal Schools be urged to give a place to the training of play supervisors. We recommend the establishment in all of our cities of Juvenile Courts, the appointment of Probation Officers, and such a change in our methods of dealing with the youthful offender as will better help him or her to the development of a better life.

We recommend the establishment of Industrial Homes for boy and girl delinquents in each of the provinces, where they will be under the influence of home life, religious supervision, and have out of doors work.

It is becoming increasingly evident that the leaving of feeble-minded children without special care and protection has increased illegitimacy of offspring, and by hereditary transmission is increasing steadily the number of feeble-minded.

We therefore recommend that our Provincial Governments be urged to provide suitable detention and protective homes for the feeble-minded children.

The moving picture has become a means of education, and has high cultural value. We recognize the varied and constant use to which it must be put.

We recognize also the splendid services rendered by the boards of censorship in the various provinces, but it is also evident that our youth at the age of puberty and thereafter are constantly confronted with pictures representing all the forms and attitudes of love-making and proceed to the exercise of them before the age at which nature has developed its moral safeguards, reducing the age and duration of adolescence and perverting the minds of our youth.

To prevent the trading on the lower elements of our nature, and therefore the increase of evil by the culture of those elements, we advocate the community taking over the picture show and thereby eliminating the element of private profit.

We recommend that parents everywhere be urged to explain frankly to their children the function of sex and the principles of reproduction, and we commend such scientific courses of study in botany and physiology in our public and high schools as will acquaint our youth and their teachers with the penalties God through nature imposes upon all sex perversion.

Wherever industrial development takes place, there is found a tendency to exploit child labor.

We recommend the adoption and rigid enforcement of compulsory education in every Province in Canada and the enactment of such legislation as will prevent the exploiting of child labor.

We recommend that the Executive provide for an enquiry into the employment of youth under sixteen years of age in street occupations with a view to making recommendations regarding street employment of youth.

We heartily commend the action of the Legislature of Ontario in the enactment of the Curfew Law, and the earnestness of the Government in the efforts being made to secure the enforcement of that law, and we earnestly recommend the enactment and careful enforcement of such Curfew Laws by every Provincial Legislature and secure the enforcement throughout the towns and cities of Canada.

We call attention to the necessity of moral training and religious instruction in our public and high schools and urge earnest study and effort towards such purpose.

We recognize the very great value of the work done by Mr. W. L. Clark in dealing with boys and their life problems, and we recommend that if possible a suitable woman should be secured to do the same work among girls dealing with their life problems.

We commend to all school boards and to our people throughout Canada the principle of medical inspection of schools, and that more attention be paid to ventilation and other hygienic conditions of schools, churches and public buildings.

We urge the establishment of Child Welfare Branches in the Health Departments of our various cities throughout Canada.

In view of the fact that the use of cigarettes by young people not only stirs the lower passions, but also has a tendency to blunt their higher faculties, we strongly urge that parents prevent by education and authority the formation of the cigarette habit by their children and that the existing laws against the sale of tobacco to minors be strictly enforced.

### Committee on Social Evil

In approaching this many-sided problem of the Social Evil, we are duly sensible of its complexity, and appreciative of the truth that mankind is neither made good, nor kept good, by Act of Parliament. We are equally sensible of the part played by conditions in making it easy or hard for goodness to flourish, and recognize the wholesome part played by law in the determining of conditions, making it easy to do right and hard to do wrong.

The Social Evil is both a legacy and a besetment. Its ravages are so frightful, visiting with disease and death the innocent with the guilty, the wife with the husband, the child with the parent, that Christian patriotism, no less than Christian piety, demands that

right-minded persons the world over combine to stamp it out. This can be done readily, effectively, by obedience to the primal law of chastity. The laws of health and propagation, of transmission and heredity, know no double standard. These laws are inviolable for men equally with women.

We recognize that much of the evil is due to false views of life and artificial conditions, involving both sexes. Home and family are fundamental to right living—by the ordering of Heaven. The heart of man hungers for its mate, and this heart hunger is divine, all-potent for good or evil, and eradicable. Some are born eunuchs, some have been made eunuchs by men, and some have made themselves eunuchs, devoting themselves to the single life, for the sake of the higher interests. But vast numbers have no such reasons to plead.

Let it be recognized and honored as of divine institution and fundamental, that the married state is the normal state for men and women. We view as contributory to the loosening of moral fibre the pressure of circumstances as well as laxity of moral ideas. Often the one is the outcome of the other. Late marriage and deferred or denied motherhood are not wholesome phenomena. Waste and wilfulness, the temptation to over-dress, and perversions in modern fashions, licentious displays, appeals to eye and ear, the wage question, the inexperience of youth, wretched surroundings, starved affections, and many other factors enter into the problem, contributing a challenge to the constructive Christian thinker. One point is fixed. From the institution of the home, and the home alone, can spring Christian virtues. Jesus Himself had a home life from birth to manhood. At all costs, the family must be safeguarded from within and without. On its maintenance depends the continuance of Christianity. On the Christianizing or otherwise of human conditions depends the existence or extinction of social vice.

By legislation, by education, by all the influences available, we must preserve the race from contamination. So great a menace threatens in the nature of the case, at the very springs of life, that we are arrestingly reminded of the fate of ancient cities and civilizations which passed into decay and disappeared.

Comradeship, friendly intercourse between men and women, is to be cultivated as of the highest and holiest helpfulness. Noble womanhood is ever a redeeming power in the life of man. In saying this we at once ban all unholy familiarity. We suggest as one of the mightiest safeguards to men and women the cultivation of a noble reserve. True maidenhood is hedged about with noble modesty and at the peril of lost womanhood that hedge must not be broken through. The personal solution for old and young is to be found in keeping the heart open to the mighty, pulsating, hallowing, influences which stream from the magnetic figure of Christ and become effective in

exact ratio to the extent to which we submit ourselves, our lives, our bodies, our thoughts to His all-mastering sway.

1. We hail the welcome signs of a changing attitude at large in respect to the social evil. It is no longer accepted as an inherent necessity. On this point the highest expert medical opinion is pronounced, authoritative and final, expression to which is given in part by the great Medical Congress recently held in London, England.

2. The futility in consequence is definitely recognized of any and all policies of toleration, segregation or reglementation. We stand irrevocably against all raising of revenue from human weakness or human vice, by periodic fines or otherwise. We blush to acknowledge that in some parts of Canada, principally British Columbia, the policy of toleration and segregation, and even reglementation, is countenanced in defiance of established conclusions, no less than the provisions of the Criminal Code of Canada.

3. We rejoice in the more humane point of view with regard to the victims of social vice which is coming to be recognized in the treatment advocated—substituting the home and the hospital for the law court and prison.

4. We believe it to be the part of Christian wisdom, no less than Christian duty, to disseminate accurate vital data, and note with great pleasure the efforts being put forth in this behalf by means of a carefully selected but unequivocal literature. We owe it alike to our sons and daughters and to the sons and daughters of others to see that they are not destroyed through ignorance. "My people perish for lack of knowledge." In this connection, we commend the splendid efforts of our Department, at once sane and sympathetic.

5. We record our gratification at the recent formation of the National Committee for the suppression of the White Slave Traffic, and the success which bids fair to attend its work.

It is with much satisfaction that we refer to the attendance of the General Secretary at the International Congress held during the past summer in Great Britain for the suppression of the white slave traffic.

6. Satisfaction is afforded by the amendments made this year to the Criminal Code, which for the first time seeks to put offenders of both sexes on a par and thus makes possible the effective prosecution of the male prostitute. In securing this most wholesome addition to our judicial procedure, we take pride in the part played by this Department, to which we believe much of the credit is due.

We, however, call attention to the regrettable omission of proposed amendments touching the raising of age of consent, making punishable all employers who seduce female employees, and making adultery and lewd cohabitation criminal offences. These things touch most closely the end we have in view. We most earnestly press upon the General Board the vital importance of securing these amendments as soon as may be possible. Unprotected maidenhood appeals to us.

The close relations between employer and employee, in the case of domestic servants in particular, call for all the safeguards possible.

7. It is appropriate in this connection to refer to the appointment by the Government of a special Commissioner to enforce the law against procurers, as indicating the right policy to be pursued.

8. Under the stimulus of the awakening spirit, successful campaigns for the cleaning up of communities have been conducted in Quebec, Halifax, Winnipeg, Calgary and Lethbridge. In these cities, and throughout the Provinces generally, east of the Rockies there is now no official toleration of sexual vice.

We deeply regret that this cannot be said with regard to British Columbia, to which reference has already been made. With deep reluctance we have to acknowledge that the Government is officially on record in favor of the policy of toleration and segregation. It is with a sense of humiliation, mingled with astonishment, that we call attention to the indefensible attitude of the Attorney-General in connection with Vancouver. In closing the prison doors to convicted offenders and blocking the due process of law, he has placed the Crown Minister above His Majesty the King. We would respectfully suggest that highest legal counsel be taken and such steps adopted as are necessary to end, if possible, this anomalous situation, wholly unprecedented, we believe, in British history, and a national scandal to Canada.

9. The declared policy of the Board to at once enter upon the institution of Redemptive Homes appeals to our hearts and our deliberate judgment as a true interpretation of the responsibilities resting on the Methodist Church. Information given by the General Secretary of the beginnings already attempted and the successful results bring the greatest satisfaction.

10. It appears to us to be a wholly unwise condition, having regard to the facts in the case, which permits of the employment of white women by Oriental employers. We understand that prohibitory legislation recently enacted in the Province of Saskatchewan has been held to be *intra vires*. While on Christian principles we are fundamentally opposed to fostering race prejudice, we are bound by the same principles to guard womanhood to the utmost of our power.

### Committee on Industrial Problems

No thoughtful person looking over the condition of the world to-day can fail to see the evidences of social unrest everywhere manifest. With the cost of living more largely increased in Canada during the past ten years than in any other country, and that cost still rising, with greed of gain and luxurious living and poverty and misery both increasing, with the evidence thrust upon us that the excessive wealth of some is obtained by the impoverishment of the

many, the exploiting of the future citizenship and the draining of our country of those resources that should naturally belong to the people, with the constant supplanting of labor by cheaper labor, with men by the thousand seeing nothing ahead of them but death or the poor-house, and nothing for their children but the same sort of grinding, toilsome battle for the most meagre life, while the labor unions, the church, and the very sordidness of social plutocrats are all conducing to stir in the breast of the working man the spirit of democracy, is it possible there can be anything but unrest? From the tangled skein of our complex life, we believe that certain threads may be straightened out and woven by the application of the principles of the Gospel of Jesus into a garment of praise.

1. We recognize in our present economic system a pitting of the brains and the wealth of the world against its incompetency and poverty. This tendency works itself out in the purchase of franchises respecting public utilities and the tendency to monopolize public wealth and acquire public privilege. The organization of great numbers of men and women, sometimes of girls and boys, for the sake of securing profits from the money invested and the privileges secured, must follow, the profits being the excess of moneys received over and above the cost of production. It is evident that there are two ways of making profits: i.e., by keeping the cost down, and by keeping prices up, or by both combined. The interests of the Directors, many of whom are absentees, having no interest in the concern but what their invested money gives them in the profits it yields them, their interest is therefore to make the plant cost them as little as possible, consistent with increased profits. The same thing is true as to wages. It is not consistent with increased profits that devices to ensure the safety of a worker either from accident or from occupational disease be installed unless the price of the product be increased, or unless the management be liable to substantial penalty for either illness or accident or death incurred in his work by a servant of the Company. The system is a reversal of the principles of Christ and arises from a false objective on the part of those operating such concerns. At present we calculate costs and values in terms of dollars and cents; eventually all costs of necessity must be expressed in terms of flesh and blood. It is the method of the bankrupt to estimate the profits on part only of the costs. All the costs must be included before profits can be rightfully declared. The objective is profits, whereas it should be life, the life of all the workers and the lives of those dependent upon them, as well as the life and character of ensuing generations. We believe that a living wage must be considered to be not only enough to pay rent for a habitable house, the maintenance of the minimum of coarse furniture and the obtainment of the coarsest and cheapest food necessary for a bare living. We recognise, too, the immense value of frugality and economy in domestic arrangements. But we do affirm that a living wage

for a man should be sufficient to enable him, by the practice of prudence, care and morality, to house, feed, clothe and educate his family in respectability, to give him some property of his own, to lay up during his working years enough to sustain himself and his wife in old age. This would enable the mother to remain at home, to mother and train her children and to make home for all.

2. To give a workman interest in his work would be both humanity and good economy at the same time. In order to do this, we recommend the system of profit-sharing, the installing of clean and beautiful lunch rooms and game rooms for use during off hours, the reduction to the minimum of hours of labor, the introduction, where not already found, of devices to ensure the lives and safety of workers, and we would go further and recommend that he be given, after a certain term of service, a personal monetary interest in the concern, and also that in any other ways possible a human touch be given to his relations to the management, as we are convinced that only the calling out on the part of both the workers and the employers of the spirit of a common humanity in both and toward both will be sufficient to finally settle the social and economic strife.

3. We are aware that the wages of many women working in factories, stores and offices are so low that they cannot be expected to live, and to live clean lives. It does seem incredible that any person or company of persons doing business in a civilized country to-day should so magnify the value of profits as to buy them at so terrible a cost to our working sisters and so incalculable a tax upon the generations succeeding. We therefore call upon every employer of women to see that they be paid a wage sufficient to procure for them an ample life with some refinements, and that in their places of employment they be treated with such consideration as rightfully belongs to the wives and mothers of the future generation.

4. We deplore the fact of strikes entailing great loss to the community, the managers and the workmen and their families. We exceedingly regret the conditions which cause the strike, the violence sometimes practised by workmen, and the readiness of some employers to call into action the police or the militia. And we hope and pray for the time when so large a sense of human kindness may dominate our business as to make the value of manhood the paramount consideration, and when the interest of each shall be the welfare of all, and the welfare of all the interest of each.

5. To lift from the mind of the average worker the common dread of losing his job or hers, we recommend that the Provincial Governments be requested to provide and to operate employment agencies at all the large centres of population throughout the several Provinces, without direct cost to the people.

6. In cases of accident, death or disease traceable to one's occupation, where one so injured is believed to have a claim for damages against an employer, we believe that such claim should be recognized

as of sufficient value to prevent the necessity for the public coming to the financial aid of him or his family because of inadequate compensation, and that in case an appeal be taken from an award made to him in compensation, the cost of such appeal or appeals be borne by the Government of Canada.

7. We hope the day has forever gone when a business involving the lives and work of many hundreds or thousands of our citizens, and of great interest to the common citizenship and of great influence upon the common welfare, can be put forth as a private business. The public has great interests at stake in it which must be recognized and acknowledged.

### Committee on Social Surveys

We are all convinced that in the work of Social Service our policy should be constructive rather than repressive and palliative; and preventive as well as curative of the social ills of to-day. The physician, if he be wise, before prescribing makes a very careful diagnosis and examines the history of the case. The scientist, before arriving at his conclusions, seeks to acquaint himself with all the facts having relation to the subject under study. This survey of facts, this diagnosis of the patient, is the first step towards the end in view.

In Social Service, the first and most vitally constructive thing to do is to observe and set down and look squarely in the face of the facts of our social life—that is the meaning of the Social Survey. It aims to make possible an improved society by portraying the actual conditions of the society that has to be improved. During the past year, with the heartiest co-operation of the Board of Social Service of the Presbyterian Church, Miss Carson has conducted general surveys in Toronto and Montreal. The general survey is a rapid observation of the conditions intended to suggest the lines along which a more intensive survey should be taken or along which action ought to be taken immediately. Such surveys have also been made by Mr. Bryce M. Stewart in Vancouver, Crow's Nest Pass, Fort William, Port Arthur, Hamilton, Sydney, and Halifax, and by Dr. Riddell in London and the county of Huron. Rev. J. S. Woodsworth is now conducting a survey of the city of Regina. The Saskatchewan Committee, appointed by the General Boards of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church and the Board of Social Service of the Presbyterian Church, has laid out a plan for the survey of typical conditions in city, town, village and rural life in that Province.

Your Committee heartily commends this work and urges the adoption of the survey wherever possible.



The next great constructive and practical thing to do, as it appears to the Committee, is to preach and evangelize—to portray to people the Kingdom of God and to declare its coming, when the Father's will shall be done on earth as it is in heaven, and to call upon the people everywhere to commit themselves to its propaganda and its life. This is what is comprised under the term of Social Service Campaign. It is Evangelism with a goal in view—a definite work to do.

Your Committee very earnestly commends to all our pastors the work of Social Service Campaigns. We also call attention to the social Service Congress to be held next March under the auspices of the Social Service Council of Canada.

And once again, we are of the opinion that the next great constructive and preventive thing to do is for the people to establish and fix in reality the vision made visible by the preacher and evangelist, to build cities and plan towns and rural communities patterned after what they saw in the mount, and guided by the knowledge gained by the survey of facts.

In other words, your Committee commends society building, city planning, town planning, rural planning, with its two-fold goal, beauty and efficiency, in all community life. And they do this with the firm conviction that slums are no longer necessary and that cities are now being built under regulations which make slums impossible; and further, as among the important features of this town and community planning, we commend to the earnest study of all great-minded and practical business men, the health considerations of this movement, and the prevention of overcrowding by housing enterprises that are so necessary to the better sanitation in our modern city.

We commend most heartily the efforts of the Government of Saskatchewan towards better society building as shown in their tax reform and land regulations relating to surveys of townsites and subdivisions and their manifest sympathy with the town and rural planning movement.

### **Committee on the Country Church Problems**

We very much deplore the conditions which have gathered around our Country Church, rendering her less efficient than in former times. The Country Church has had a splendid record in the production of a high type of manhood. A large percentage of the most responsible places both in Church and State have been filled by men from the country. And in fact a considerable percentage of the most active members in the city churches are from the same quarter. Such being the case, it becomes us to guard with great care this recruiting ground and thus seek to perpetuate its usefulness.

In recent years the rural districts of our country have been passing through great economic changes. From the Eastern Provinces many

have migrated to the West. A considerable number of those remaining have early retired from the farm and removed to the town and city, producing a class in themselves there. Some of their places have been filled by those of other church leavings, or no church leavings at all, and quite a considerable number have been filled by renters. In this way, in some places, the personnel of the community has been very largely altered. Add to this the change in conditions produced by the radial lines of railway, the telephone and rural mail delivery bringing into the country many of the conveniences of the city. In this it will appear that the rural problem of to-day is very different to the rural problem of former times. This, however, does not explain everything; if so, Methodism would still hold the same position relatively with other denominations, as there have been practically no removals from our country. In the last census, while the population of Ontario increased fourteen per cent., Methodism increased only one and a half per cent.; and while Canada's population increased thirty-four per cent., Methodism, as a denomination, increased only seventeen per cent. We have to look elsewhere to find the full explanation. Can it be that there has been a decline in Methodist zeal? A failure to keep the fires burning brightly on the altars; a failure to consider these changed conditions and suit our message to meet the change in the needs?

We need to get back to Christ's methods, His way of reaching the heart by sympathy and helpful service. The Church, and particularly its ministry, must enter more heartily into the country life with its problems—its financial problems, its social problems.

We greatly rejoice in the work of Rural survey which has been done in various parts of our country, and would strongly recommend that such surveys of all our rural districts be undertaken as early as possible.

We would also recommend that our Executive consider the advisability of establishing a Rural Interests Bureau as a means of communication between Methodists who wish to purchase and Methodists and others who wish to sell their farms, or who in other ways might find mutual help in business through such an agency.

We strongly recommend that more emphasis be placed on Sabbath School work in the rural districts as a means of reaching the adults of the congregation. Rally Day, and especially Decision Day, should be observed in all our Sunday Schools.

With all the changes in our country the same sources of power that were available to our fathers are open to us. We are resolved to use them to the full for the glory of God and the salvation of men.

## Committee on Commercialized Amusements

Your Committee on Commercialized Amusements, Immoral Literature, etc., beg leave to report as follows:—

1. Recognizing as we do that rational and recreative amusement should have a place in every normal human life, we deplore the fact that many forms of public amusement are so commercialized as to become mere money-making institutions, and would urge that efforts be made to secure the elimination of the element of private profit from public amusements.

2. The theatre is one of the oldest forms of amusement. Properly conducted, it might be a means of education and of clean and helpful recreation for the people. Canadian theatres, however, do not appear to be conducted according to the high ideals which should govern an institution claiming to educate and uplift the people, but on the infinitely lower plane of commercial gain. Plays are staged, not with a view to their power to instruct or even amuse, but with an eye on the box office receipts. The records of our courts, and other sources of information at hand, show that recently companies of actors from other countries have come to Canadian cities and have put on the stage productions so vile as to shock the moral sensibilities of all decent people.

We are convinced that under present conditions the influence of the stage is baneful to our Canadian life. It is our considered conviction that until these deplorable conditions are changed the theatre cannot be considered a safe place in which our young people may find their amusement.

We instruct our officers to request that the authorities in every Canadian city and town give due diligence to the enforcement of our criminal law against all purveyors of public indecency. We are glad to note increased activity in some quarters along this line, but entirely disapprove of a form of censorship that visits a first performance of a play, and contents itself with ordering the elimination of objectionable features. Our conviction is that the same law of decency should apply to the stage as to the street and other public places: viz., prosecution, not elimination. We emphatically protest against the exhibitions which make a frank appeal to the sensual in men, by exposing on the stage semi-naked women, or women clad in flesh-colored tights as closely resembling nakedness as possible. We would suggest that in cases in which actresses desire to appear in tights, they be compelled to use some color which shall not in any way resemble human flesh.

3. We note with approval that Toronto has appointed a censor of theatres whose duty is to keep immoral actors and actresses, and companies known to have presented immoral plays elsewhere, out of Canada. We regret that the immigration authorities, who on occasion can be so strict in cases of much less importance, have refused to act

in this matter. Appeal has been made to the Honourable the Minister of the Interior, and it is our hope that he shall take such action as shall debar this very undesirable class from coming here to debauch our people. We submit that if the present regulations are not wide enough to cover such cases, the regulations should be amended as may be required.

4. We further recommend the officers of this Department, as they have opportunity, in conference with other social reformers, shall study the theatrical situation with a view of finding, if possible, some constructive policy. The theatre, we believe, is here to stay, and, for good or ill, to be a great factor in our modern civilization. Can anything be done to free it from the incubus of commercialism, and at the same time purge it of all that is unclean?

5. As an antidote to impure entertainment and brutalizing sport, we would urge our ministers and people to encourage all clean, healthy, recreative pleasure, especially among our young people. We are also of opinion that the time has arrived when communities, as such, should provide social centres for the people where proper recreation under careful supervision may be enjoyed.

6. One of the most baneful influences in our modern life is that of immoral books, papers, pictures, post cards, etc. We are glad to know that our postal and customs authorities have prevented the entrance of much of this moral poison. We request them to be ever on their guard in this matter, and we call upon all officers of the law in every part of Canada to vigorously prosecute and severely punish all within our borders found either manufacturing or selling these things.

7. As the Committee on Child Welfare has reported fully *re* Moving Pictures, we feel it is unnecessary for us to make a pronouncement.

8. *Pool Rooms.*—This Board realizes the exceeding grave dangers surrounding the pool rooms ordinarily carried on in our cities, towns and villages, because of their tendency to lead our youth into the habit of gambling, as well as introducing them to many other forms of vice;

We would therefore urge upon our Quarterly Board Committees on Temperance and Moral Reform in every community to discover what are the civic regulations affecting the control of these places, and all other matters concerning the municipal license granted for them, and inform our people;

Further, we urge our congregations in every place, through our Quarterly Board Temperance and Moral Reform Committees, to seek such regulation as will safeguard our youth, both as to age and hours the place may be open, and to insist upon the strict enforcement of all these regulations in all places.

9. *Prize Fights.*—We most definitely and unanimously condemn the degrading and brutalizing exhibitions held at various points throughout our country; one held during the past year resulting in

the death of one of the participants. We would urge the Dominion Government to so amend the law as to leave no room for doubt in its interpretation and to make more reasonable the enforcement of the law in this matter.

10. *Gambling*.—We express our very strongest convictions that gambling in every form is injurious to the moral character of the people. The fact that race-track gambling is legalized when carried on within the grounds during the race meet, but illegal elsewhere, increases the difficulties of enforcement. It is our conviction that gambling of every sort should be made illegal, and the law so constructed that its meaning would be very clear, and enforcement more reasonable. We express our hearty approval of the request, now before the Government of Canada, to so amend the Criminal Code that all race-track gambling should be made illegal.

Further, we recommend that application be made for legislation which will make it possible to secure conviction in gambling cases without having to prove that a "rake-off" was received by the proprietor.

11. *Gambling Practices at Agricultural Exhibitions*.—Your Committee has been reliably informed that at many agricultural fairs throughout the country fakirs and professional gamblers are permitted to carry on their evil practices to the debauching of the people, and injury of these worthy institutions. We would urge upon the Provincial Governments and the managers of these fairs to take whatever steps may be necessary to put an end to these evil practices.

## Committee on Finance

Your Committee recommends:—

1. That the Financial Statement for the year ending July 31st, 1913, be adopted.

2. That our thanks be tendered to the auditor in view of his exceeding fidelity in the performance of his duties, and for kindness far beyond what his remuneration for this work would demand.

3. That we rejoice over the success of the Association of Christian Stewards, as presented by its efficient Secretary, Rev. R. W. Woods-worth, and would recommend that personal subscriptions and public collections be forwarded from our churches and people to this Association to assist in carrying forward this good work.

4. That the request of Earls court for \$400 in behalf of the Social Service Work carried on by the institutions in connection with that congregation be referred to the Executive Committee with power.

## Report of Committee on Resolutions

### *Thanks to Treasurer.*

That the thanks of the Board be tendered A. D. Watson, M.D., for his valuable services as Treasurer.

### *Liquor in Militia Camps, etc.*

That this Board express its appreciation of the action of Colonel the Hon. Samuel Hughes, Minister of Militia, in prohibiting the sale of liquor in canteens in connection with training camps and officers' and sergeants' mess. We express the hope that the Minister of Militia will see his way clear to abolish the sale of liquors in all barracks throughout the Dominion.

### *Liquor Carried by H. M. Mails.*

That we protest against the action of the Government in allowing intoxicating liquors to be carried through His Majesty's Mails, and that we request the pastors of our various charges to bring this question before their respective Boards for action. We would also suggest that the electors be requested to write letters to the Postmaster General requesting him to prohibit such shipments through the mails.

### *No Liquor on I. C. R. into Prohibition Territory.*

That this Board commends the action of Hon. Frank Cochrane, M.P., Minister of Railways and Canals, in forbidding the carrying of liquor by the Intercolonial Railway into prohibition territory.

*Dominion-Wide Prohibition.*

That while we rejoice in the many victories won by our Local Option campaigns throughout the Provinces, we consider that the time is now ripe for an earnest, persistent effort in connection with other bodies toward securing Dominion-wide prohibition.

*Club Licenses.*

We deplore the action of the Government in licensing club houses and ask that the practice of issuing liquor licenses to clubs be discontinued.

*Methodists and the Liquor Traffic.*

The attitude of the Methodist Church towards the traffic in intoxicating liquors has always been an uncompromising insistence upon prohibition. This has been officially declared in our General Conference, preached from our pulpits, printed in our papers, taught in our Sunday Schools, reiterated in our homes, and insisted upon everywhere. Again and again have our Conferences, District Meetings, Quarterly Boards and other courts of the Church called upon the electors within our membership to vote as they pray, and give their influence and support to the principle of prohibition rather than to use their franchise as partisan politicians.

(a) We therefore call upon our people in every part of our Church to support these principles in every election contest by their votes, and as they have opportunity to make their influence felt in behalf of the greatest amount of prohibition.

(b) We recommend the Secretaries, Executive, and the various Provincial groups of this Board to give careful attention to the Liquor License Acts, Provincial Temperance Acts, Local Option Legislation, Canada Temperance Act, and all other laws affecting the liquor traffic, with the object of seeking amendments to these various laws which will make them more effective, more easily enforced, and to remove legal technicalities which have rendered them almost futile.

(c) We desire to express our very hearty appreciation of the prompt and strong way in which complaints of violation of the Liquor License Act have been investigated, and prosecutions conducted, by the officials of the Government of Ontario. We desire also to commend the authorities of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, who also have fully investigated every complaint forwarded by this Department, and conducted prosecutions wherever sufficient evidence has been obtained. We suggest to our people that in every instance where it appears that the law is being violated a full statement of the facts be sent forward to the General Secretary, who will promptly take up the matter with the authorities.

(d) That this Board is strongly convinced that laws affecting the social welfare of the people, such as the Temperance and

Liquor License Acts, the Lord's Day Act, the Criminal Code, should not depend wholly for their enforcement upon either the people of a locality, or the officers in a municipality, but upon the Provincial Department of the Attorney-General, where the British North America Act places the responsibility of administration of our laws. We therefore urge that every possible effort be made to secure uniform methods in this regard, and strong representations be made to the various Provincial Governments in this matter.

(e) This Board of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Methodist Church greatly deplors the sale of intoxicating liquors in railway dining-cars, in railway stations, and on passenger boats; we believe the sale of liquor in these places often proves a most subtle temptation to young men, leading to their downfall, and also frequently unfits employees for the responsibility of work given into their hands. We rejoice over the regulations of many railway companies and other industrial concerns requiring total abstinence on the part of their employees both when on and off duty, and express our surprise that any company making such regulation should engage in the sale of liquor either on train, or boat, or in station. We recommend that this Department apply to the Parliament and Legislatures for such legislation as will make illegal all sale of liquor in dining cars, railway stations, or on boats, in every part of Canada, and bring all possible influence to bear upon Parliament and Legislatures in behalf of this legislation.

(f) While we rejoice that the Legislature of Ontario during last session enacted legislation as follows: increase in license fees in cities of 100,000 by \$600.00; shortening hours when bars are open by changing opening hour from 6.00 a.m. to 8.00 a.m.; making clear that a tavern license for selling confines the sales to persons who shall consume the liquor on the premises, and providing that the occupant of a livery stable or other place where people resort shall not permit liquors to be consumed on the premises, except by employees, members of the family, or guests not being customers; we express disappointment that the Legislature did not reduce the hours of sale in the evening, requiring the bars to close hours earlier than at present; and did not remove the disability of the three-fifths clause in connection with Local Option, and this Board representing the Methodist Church desires to call the attention of the Government of the Provinces to the importance of these amendments, and urges that legislation be enacted next session upon these questions.

(g) We rejoice that the Government of Quebec has appointed a Royal Commission whose functions are "to study the sale of intoxicating liquor and the changes which it is expedient to make in the License Law." We are pleased to learn that the Commission has already done considerable work, and we earnestly request our ministers and people throughout the Province of Quebec to lend all possible assistance to the Commission, and when the question of amendments



is being considered seek in every just and honorable way to secure the very largest amount of prohibition, the greatest restrictions, and withal fair and reasonable methods of enforcement.

(h) This Board notes with satisfaction the growth of temperance conviction in every part of Canada, and rejoices over the practical methods that are being adopted for extending the principle of prohibition. In a number of counties in Ontario, where a number of municipalities have adopted Local Option by-laws, campaigns are begun for the submission of the Canada Temperance Act, with the purpose of prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquor throughout the whole county. In Nova Scotia campaigns are now being inaugurated with the object of repealing the Canada Temperance Act and bringing into force the more effective Nova Scotia Temperance Act. These campaigns are definitely with the object of securing the larger benefits of legislation which provides a greater amount of prohibition for these communities. We rejoice that this Department has already arranged to render efficient assistance in all these campaigns as opportunity is given, and is always ready to render such assistance.

(i) This Board is delighted to learn from the Newfoundland Annual Conference that plans are formulating for the submission of a plebiscite on prohibition in that Colony. We express the hope that the campaign may soon be launched, and assure our friends there that this Department will, if it is desired, render every possible assistance in such a campaign.

(j) We rejoice over the very great benefits which have everywhere followed the adoption of Local Option by-laws wherever adopted in any Canadian Province, and urge their earnest co-operation with the people in every community to secure the adoption of Local Option by-laws.

(k) We are gratified that the Department of Temperance and Moral Reform of the Church has rendered such efficient assistance in all campaigns where opportunity has been given, and we heartily approve of the plans which have been made by the officers of the Department whereby help can be so readily given in any campaign where pulpit or platform aid is desired, or the very best of literature may be obtained at prices considerably below cost.

#### *English for Coming Canadians.*

The inflowing tide of non-Anglo-Saxon immigration has thrust upon our Dominion many difficult problems of extreme urgency. The responsibility for the solution of these problems rests heavily upon the Church of Jesus Christ, and a large share devolves upon this Board of Temperance and Moral Reform, because through social service properly presented those who come as strangers may soon develop into splendid citizens. The importance of teaching our language and impressing upon them our ideals cannot be overestimated.

In consequence, our General Secretary readily consented when he was invited to act as a member of an Editing Committee to rearrange and adapt the Roberts system of teaching English to coming Canadians. The other members of the Committee are Rev. J. G. Shearer, D.D., of the Presbyterian Board of Social Service, and Rev. C. E. Bishop, B.A., National Secretary of the Young Men's Christian Association.

We rejoice to learn that a large part of the work has been completed, and there is now ready for use in Canada the following:—

- (1) Manual of Instructions for Teachers.
- (2) Forty Lessons on domestic, commercial and industrial life.
- (3) First Reader, "Winning Qualities," being examples from British and Canadian literature.
- (4) Second Reader, "Makers of Canada," in which the life and service of various explorers and statesmen are used for lesson purposes.
- (5) Third Reader, "Winning the Dominion," of the same nature but more advanced than the Second Reader.

A Fourth Reader will also be prepared, probably under the title, "Civics for Coming Canadians."

This course of English for coming Canadians, it will be observed, is really a course of training also in Canadian citizenship. It is as simple as such a system can be made, and any intelligent man or woman can use it. Every minister or missionary where non-Anglo-Saxons, even in small numbers, are found should provide himself with a supply of the necessary material and establish classes. This is of first consequence, not only for the future of the nation, but for the future of the Church. It is of prime importance that the Church itself should use the opportunity this affords of establishing a point of sympathetic contact with these newcomers. If we go to them with the gospel of service, which they appreciate, they will quickly accept from our hands the gospel of salvation, otherwise we shall find that their prejudices will make it well-nigh impossible for us to reach them with the Evangel. We heartily commend this system to our people in every community where such work can be undertaken for the teaching of non-Anglo-Saxons, and suggest that all interested people correspond with our General Secretary concerning the system, and that supplies be ordered through him.

#### *Treatment of the Criminal.*

This Board very heartily rejoices over the very wide application of the more humane methods which have recently been introduced into our country in regard to the treatment of the criminal. The Ontario Prison Farm at Guelph has already demonstrated that the new method of humane treatment of prisoners is infinitely preferable to the former method. We rejoice that Manitoba is now constructing a prison farm near Winnipeg, and that other Provinces are beginning

similar institutions. We are greatly rejoiced over the success of the Toronto Gaol Farm, and commend the Governments of Ontario and Alberta in having enacted legislation which enables a group of counties to unite in the establishment of gaol farms for their united municipalities.

We commend this new method to the Federal Parliament and Provincial Legislatures throughout Canada, and direct our Department to urge the enactment of enabling legislation by each law-making body.

We also commend the Parole System for treatment of prisoners and congratulate the Government of Canada upon the careful and wise administration of this law.

We recommend that the Government of Canada be urged to enact legislation which will adapt the principle of indeterminate sentence to the criminal laws of Canada; and, also, that legislation be enacted which will make provision for the support of the wife and family of a prisoner during the period of his incarceration.

We further direct that the attention of authorities be called to the importance of providing accommodation for the care of persons arrested under warrant, during the period previous to their being brought to trial. We believe that such persons who may be arrested for the first time should not be forced to a companionship with hardened criminals, the effect of which is to educate in crime.

*Rev. J. W. Aikens.*

That this Department desires to express its high appreciation of the work done by our brother, Rev. J. W. Aikens, while he was a Field Secretary of this Department. We pray that the Divine blessing may be upon him in his work as pastor of a great city church where he will have ample opportunity to further the work of Social Service.

*Direct Legislation Acts.*

That we greatly rejoice that the Legislatures of Alberta and Saskatchewan have enacted Direct Legislation Acts.

This Board would call to the attention of the Groups of this Board in these provinces to this legislation, with the request that the legislation will be thoroughly studied by them; and, if thought necessary to make the Acts effective, application be made to the Legislature for amendments;

And, further, we direct the Department to urge each Legislature to enact legislation which will provide for Direct Legislation;

And we refer the resolution *re* Direct Legislation adopted by Alberta Conference to the Alberta Group for action.

*Revision of Constitution.*

That the Secretaries be a Committee to revise the Constitution, presenting their recommendations to the Executive, and to be sent on to General Conference; and we recommend that the name of the Department be changed to "The Department of Social Service."

*Illustrated Lectures.*

That the Secretaries be authorized to employ lantern slides in connection with their work.

*Penalty for Keeper of House of Ill Fame.*

That this Board desires to protest against the practice of punishing by fine rather than by imprisonment those guilty of keeping houses of ill fame. We contend that in no case should money taken from such a traffic be put in the public treasury, and protest against the system of fine because it requires the keeper and inmates of such houses shall return to their illegal business to secure the money with which to pay these fines. We urge magistrates and judges all over the Dominion to imprison without the option of a fine all men or women who are convicted of engaging in the nefarious traffic of prostitution, and that a copy of this resolution be sent to the press.

*Tobacco and Cigarettes.*

Whereas Government returns indicate that the consumption of tobacco in Canada is increasing year by year, and apparently the growing youth of Canada in increasing numbers are acquiring the habit of its use and suffering physically, mentally and morally thereby, we would urge upon our ministers and people to inform themselves and others as to the results of the use of tobacco as declared by science, and scatter this knowledge throughout their community; we would urge all people to render assistance in the enforcement of the law which forbids the sale of tobacco to persons under sixteen years of age; we would urge all our people to strengthen and assist those noble women of the W.C.T.U. in their appeal to Parliament for a law to prohibit the manufacture, importation and sale of cigarettes or tobacco for manufacture of cigarettes; and we suggest to all Methodist people to obtain copies of the present law regarding selling to minors (supplied free), the scientific facts as to the effects of smoking tobacco, and the leaflet on "Tobacco, Religion and Morals," supplied below cost by the Department.

*Lord's Day Defence.*

We heartily commend the work of the Lord's Day Alliance to all our people. It has won noble victories, and none greater than recently, in the defence of that great charter of human liberties—the Sabbath Day. The encroachments upon the day that God made for man by the stressful materialism, by the commercialization of pleasure, by the over-emphasis upon money making and amusement participation has already robbed many thousands of their day of rest. We desire to unite with all patriotic Canadians in defence of this ancient assurance of our liberties, safeguard of our prosperity, and helper to human betterment. The work of the Lord's Day Alliance deserves the very hearty support of Canadians.

*International Peace—One Hundred Years of Peace.*

In the merciful providence of God and by reason of the wisdom of the statesmen of Great Britain, Canada and the United States, it has come to pass that for one hundred years there has not been a regiment raised or a threat of war made by either of these nations of our North American Continent, nor has either a sentry or a fort guarding a single mile of the more than four thousand miles across which our frontiers extend. While we give thanks to the great Giver of peace for all the great benefits flowing from this fact, we see in it a presage of the time when the horrible catastrophe of war shall be no longer tolerated among men, when peaceful arbitration shall settle national disputes and when men shall acknowledge by their reasonable tolerance and Christian common-sense that men are brothers all, that the wilful extravagances and barbarous cruelties of war may never be repeated. May God speed the day! We call upon all our people as loyal Canadians and Britons to enter heartily into the celebration of the Centenary of Peace when the time arrives for such celebration; and we recommend that the Sunday nearest the selected date shall be an occasion when every pulpit shall preach appropriate sermons.

*Militarism, Boy Scouts, Cadets, etc.*

While we welcome most heartily every rightful method of discipline for the growing boys and young men of Canada, we just as deeply deplore any method of discipline whereby they may become tainted by any expectancy of war or the development of a spirit of eagerness to take up arms. Men were not created to be killed, but that they might be given ever-increasing life; not to kill one another, but to serve one another; and in this day of universal commerce, universal dependence, universal evangelism and a growing universal democracy, the time for war—the most brutal of all national blun-

ders—is past. Discipline, yes, most enthusiastically yes; but militarism, no, most emphatically no.

#### *Municipal Ownership of Public Utilities.*

While believing unalterably in private property rights under rightful conditions, we also clearly see there are certain utilities that have their value from the fact that they are used by all, or by most of, the people. Surely such should be owned by all the people and operated by them—or their representatives in the municipality—for the benefit of all the people. The sale of franchises and rights respecting properties, the granting of properties, privileges and powers to private individuals or to private corporations, cannot be the right thing for the people, and we recommend that all such properties, privileges and powers be retained for the public, and so operated that the Canadian people shall all receive benefit from their operation. Canadians should not barter their birthrights; free people should not tolerate their own enslavement.

#### *Opium, Cocaine and Habit-Forming Drugs.*

The alarming increase in the use of opium, cocaine and other habit-forming drugs may well arouse Canadian citizens to more effective and determined efforts regarding their use. The successful raids upon Chinese merchants and other depots where opium and cocaine are distributed, with the punishment of the vendors, emphasizes the fact that, despite the prohibition of importation and the forbidding to sell these drugs, the business is being carried on in this Dominion. We very earnestly recommend that (1) literature be prepared to inform the people upon the degrading influence of these drugs; (2) efforts be made to secure more effective enforcement of our laws concerning the sale and use of these drugs; and (3) the attention of magistrates be called to the fact that the profits to the merchant handling these drugs is so great that confiscation of the drugs found and a monetary penalty do not secure discontinuance in the illegal business, and we venture to suggest that persons convicted of selling these drugs should be sentenced to a term in the gaol.

#### *The Unfit and Sterilization.*

Whereas legislation has been enacted in some countries whose object is to prevent the mental unfit and moral degenerate—especially of the criminal class—becoming parents of children; and whereas there are many in Canada belonging to these classes, we recommend our General Secretary to give careful study to the operation of these

laws and to report upon this whole question to the next annual meeting of this Board.

*The Brotherhoods in the Church.*

We greatly rejoice in the growth of this movement. In many of our churches to-day the men unite in meetings which have far-reaching influence. The organization of the Federation of Brotherhoods within our Church has been most helpful. The local Brotherhoods have been especially active in their endeavors to interest the thousands who have ceased to care for religion and religious duties, both native born and the newly arrived from other lands, in the principles of righteousness which make for a better manhood and a nobler citizenship. Many victories have been won for God. Many men have been saved from ruin. We earnestly recommend that in every congregation the men of the Church organize into Brotherhoods for social service in behalf of the work of Christ among men; and further, we express the hope that the coming General Conference shall enact legislation as to Brotherhoods which will render them more efficient in their splendid efforts to produce a better Canadian citizenship.
