

### A Hard Sentence

Mrs. Edith Rigby, the well-known suffragette of Preston, was sentenced to nine months' hard labor on the charge of setting fire to the country residence of Sir Wilfrid H. Lever at Rivington, Lancashire, on July 8th, and causing damage estimated at \$100,000.

The prisoner who is the wife of a physician, admitted her guilt, and also confessed to being the perpetrator of the bomb outrage at the Liverpool Cotton Exchange on July 5th.

### Rev. Hans Schmidt in Tombs

Sobbing, "I am guilty, I killed my wife," the Rev. Hans Schmidt, assistant pastor of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church, New York City, is locked up in the Tombs prison, charged with having murdered Anna Aumuller, parts of whose dismembered body were found in the Hudson River.

According to Inspector Joseph Faurot, chief of detectives, and Deacon Murphy, Assistant District Attorney, Schmidt has made a complete confession and admits having killed the girl in an apartment after midnight on August 31, using a butcher knife to cut her throat, after which he dissected her body in the bathroom.

Schmidt told the police and Mr. Murphy that he put the body up into six bundles and carried them from the house, one bundle at a time took a Fort Lee ferry boat and, when in midstream, threw the bundle into the river.

The priest met the girl, who was twenty one years old, at the rectory of St. Boniface's Church, where he was an assistant pastor before going to St. Joseph's Church. She was employed as a servant there. He admits having been on terms of intimacy with her, performing the ceremony himself. A marriage license was found among his belongings in his room in the St. Joseph's Church parish house. It was issued last February, but Schmidt says that he married her only a few weeks ago.

Schmidt, who a few hours before had been hearing confessions, was accused of the crime and was confronted with the photograph of the girl, which he had left behind. He collapsed, but when he regained his composure he hastily put his hand in his pocket. He drew out a safety razor blade and attempted to slash his throat. Inspector Faurot grabbed him by the wrists and thereafter he was under restraint. Another razor was found in his pocket after he had requested permission to go to the bathroom.—Ex.

### Recipes

#### THE PRIZE SPONGE CAKE

One and half cups of sugar, 1-2 cup of cold water, 1 3-4 cups of flour, 3 eggs. Separate eggs and beat yolk very light, add sugar and water flour is added next. Beat well before adding the whites. Now beat the whites very stiff and fold in, do not beat. No cream tartar or soda is needed when the eggs are put in this way Flavor with lemon, salt to taste.

#### HEMITS

One-fourth cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 1 egg, 1 4 cup milk, 1 cup raisins, 1 teaspoon cinnamon, 1 2 teaspoon cloves, 1 2 teaspoon nutmeg, 1 2 teaspoon vanilla, 1 1 2 cups flour, 1 1 2 teaspoons baking powder. Cream butter, add sugar gradually, then egg well beaten, alternate milk and flour. Mix all ingredients thoroughly, grease pan and drop by teaspoon, well apart, bake in moderate oven.

#### SWEET PICKLED PEACHES

Put 2 pounds of brown sugar, 2 cupfuls of vinegar and 1 ounce of stick cinnamon in a saucepan. Bring to the boiling point, and let simmer 20 minutes. Drop 1 2 peck peaches, one at a time, quickly in hot water then rub off the fur with a towel. Stick each peach with four cloves. Put into syrup and cook until soft, using one half the peaches at a time.

#### PLUM GUMBO

Wipe 5 pounds of plums, remove stones and cut pulp in pieces Chop 2 pounds of seeded raisins. Wipe 3 oranges, and cut in thin slices crosswise. Put fruit in preserving kettle, add 5 pounds of sugar, bring gradually to the boiling point and let simmer until of the consistency of marmalade

#### Making a Success With Apples

An Ohio orchard company produced 3,500 barrels of apples last year from a young orchard growing on a hill land that is selling unplanted at \$60 per acre. The varieties grown are Ben Davis, Rome Beauty, Grimes Golden, Yellow Transparent, Jonathan and Baldwin. Over \$200 was realized from plums grown as fillers between the apple trees. The apples are graded and packed in boxes and barrels, labeled with the name of the variety, the growers' name and their guarantee, with the motto, "Same All Through—U C Top U C All". Particular attention is given to the marketing. The manager says, "The selling end is fully one-half of the business of fruit growing." Most of the crop is put in cold storage in the city until Spring, when it is placed on the market and disposed of at a good price. This year a hillside storage

house will be built on the farm and the apples kept there until ready for market. It is also planned to build a reservoir on one of the hills to provide water for irrigating the trees during dry weather. This reservoir will be kept filled by the use of a hydraulic ram. The apple trees are kept mulched with manure and straw, much of the manure being hauled from town, a mile and a half away. About five pounds of nitrate of soda is scattered around each tree each season. And of course, they are kept pruned and sprayed. The junior member of the company is a former student of the College of Agriculture, Ohio State University.—Ex.





Renovating Hints

This is a good way to treat a room if the wall paper is hopelessly faded but in good condition otherwise. Do not remove the paper but paint the entire surface with a pretty shade of paint; one coat is sufficient. When dry place pictures, molding at the top if rooms are low studded, or at the depth of wall paper border if ceilings are high. This treatment is good for bedrooms.

If your grass rug or matting is faded get a package of dye in any shade you wish and make according to directions. Put your rug on the lawn and go over it with a flat paint brush dipped into the hot dye. When dry the result is surprising.

Having cleaned my own suede shoes and being so successful, I pass the method on to others:

Put the shoes on shoetrees, but if you do not possess these, stuff the shoes with soft paper. Then rub well with a rag moistened with spirits of turpentine. When this is finished place the shoes in the air to dry and no smell of turpentine will remain.

This is a good way to dry clean a white sweater:

First powder some lump starch and rub it well into the dirtiest parts, then roll the jersey up tightly and leave the starch in over night.

The next morning shake and beat out every bit of starch, and you will find the sweater to be quite clean.

**HALIFAX INFLUENCE**

Halifax does more than send supplies of liquor into towns, villages, and rural communities. Its licensed bartenders are training schools, whose bartenders become the most defiant dive keepers in the different places where liquor is illicitly sold. In addition to this "the trade" in Halifax co-operates with the town or village law-breaker when a fight is on for law enforcement.

Is it any wonder that good citizens throughout the Province are filled with indignation as they think of the far-reaching injurious effect of the Halifax trade?

"It is no exaggeration to say that the licensed traffic in Halifax is an unmitigated curse to the rest of Nova Scotia."

**IS THERE A REMEDY**

Is there a remedy? Certainly! The time has come for action.

By vote of the citizens of Halifax, or, better, by vote of our legislators in the House of Assembly, the license system ought to be abolished within a year. It has been tolerated too long.

On the requisition of one-fourth of the resident ratepayers of the City of Halifax, the City Council must direct that the votes of the electors of the City be forthwith taken for or against the granting of licenses. If the electors declare against license, the City becomes dry. At the present time signatures are being obtained to the necessary petitions and within a few months the citizens of Halifax may decide to abolish the traffic.

If they do not so decide, if they rather decide to permit a traffic which is not only a menace to the moral and economic life of the city, but to the province at large, "it is not unreasonable to predict that the members of the House of Assembly, representing the various constituencies and interested in the welfare of the whole province will be constrained by direct legislation at an early date to abolish the traffic."

**SATISFACTORY CONDITIONS**

Conditions will be satisfactory in the Province, so far as provincial legislation is concerned, only when we secure the abolition of the licensed traffic in Halifax and the thorough enforcement of the Nova Scotia Temperance Act in every county.

To obtain thorough enforcement, the Inspector-in-Chief must be empowered to send deputies to prosecute violators of law where local officials are inefficient.

Sentiment in Nova Scotia demands the overthrow of the liquor
