### WHAT THE JURY FOUND.

"Fair dinkum, is Australian for 'on the level.'" "Yes," said the German, "I am Major Fair dinkum." At the inquest they found that he had died of "lead in the head."

### GENERAL VACCINATION IN HALIFAX DECIDED ON

Halifax. — The city health board yesterday decided to order a vaccination in the city. This, health officials say, is purely a precautionary measure. The smallpox epidemic appears to be well under control. There are now forty-two cases as compared with seventy-two some weeks ago.

President Wilson has asked Charles L. Hughes, his opponent in the last election, to assist the Attorney General in probing the aircraft scandal. Mr. Hughes has accepted. He is an investigator of proved vigor and competence. The Americans will get the truth ultimately.

### BRITISH MADE SUCCESSFUL RAID

LONDON, MAY 17—We carried out a successful raid last night in the neighborhood of Beaumont-Hamel and captured few prisoners," says Field Marshal Haig's communication issued this evening.

"This morning a hostile post north of Meris was rushed by our troops. Its garrison was killed or driven out. On the remainder of the front there is nothing to report beyond artillery activity by both sides."

A great Allied offensive in 1920 is the idea of the Ottawa Citizen. "Evidently," it says, "the present year must be a defensive one for the Allies. The presence of half a million American troops does not change the situation and this in itself should give some idea of the magnitude and seriousness of the great task that comforts the Entente powers when the drive begins, and of the necessity for preparations on a gigantic scale. Next year will see the mechanism being assembled and 1920 should see the great offensive under way—a movement that must not stop until the Allies are treading German soil."

### PRICES OF WOOL AT 1917 FIGURE



### MANURE AND ACID HAOSPHATE BRING LARGEST CORN YIELD.

In the preparation for large corn crops one of the greatest factors contributing to high yields on long-cultivated soils is the use of barnyard manure protected from rains and reinforced with acid phosphate. During spring months before plowing it is possible this material should be spread over the field, and then operations can proceed rapidly when the plows are started.

Thirty-five bushels of corn has been the acre-increase from an application of 8 tons of stall manure to which was added 320 pounds of acid phosphate. This application also increased wheat following corn by 15.8 bushels per acre and clover hay, 2,414 pounds. The acid phosphate is mixed with the manure and both are spread on corn ground before it is ploughed.

With corn at \$50 per bushel, wheat \$2.0 and hay \$20.00 a ton, the increase from a ton of manure alone would be worth \$9.92; and from a ton of manure and 40 pounds of acid phosphate, \$13.47.

### U. S. TO SEND THREE MILLION BUSHEL WHEAT TO BELGIANS.

Washington, April 22nd. Food shipments to the civilian populations of the allied countries will be suspended for ten days to move three million bushels

of grain to the Belgians, who are declared to be in desperate straits. For Occupied Territory.

A part of the wheat will go to the population in the German occupied territory of Northern France. The decision to concentrate on the shipment of this grain was made following the receipt of urgent cablegrams from the Belgian Relief Commission's representative in Brussels. One of the cables said: "Provided all shipments now en route arrive and provided an equal of the country Belgium and Northern France will be without bread from exotic grains for 20 days."

Struck by the necessity of coming at once to the rescue of Belgium, in her now desperate plight, the Belgian Relief Committee in Canada have decided that the best way to help is to take under their care the children of Belgium; for this purpose the following two courses will be followed.

1. Establishment in Brussels a CANADIAN BUREAU. This bureau will be administered by Mr. Baetens, a member of the Commission for Relief in Belgium, who will look specially after the numerous orphans of Belgium, whose conditions beggars description. Charity will be given in the name of Canada and in this way Canadian donations will not lose their identity.

Active help to the thousands of little Belgian children who have so suffered from privations as to have their health critically impaired. These children are taken out of Belgium into Holland, Switzerland and France, where they are looked after under the supervision of Mr. Berryer, Minister of the Interior of Belgium to whom the Canadian donations will be sent direct.



### MEMORIAL SERVICE.

On Sunday evening the Baptist Church was prettily draped with flags and ornamented with plants etc., when Rev. A. W. West delivered the memorial service for Walter A. Brown of the 85th Batt. His remarks were full of pathos and yet with deep inspiration as he told of the work of this noble young soldier and his sacrifice. Special music was given by the choir including a solo by Miss Neary and the Last Post rendered on the coronet by Mr. Roy Walsh.

A pleasing incident was the unspoken presentation to the Church by Conductor and Mrs. William Clarke of a Church service flag the blue of the large flag surrounding a white centre upon which were forty six maple leaves representing the 46 enlistments from the Baptist church and congregation. Eight of those maple leaves had turned to Gold on the flag showing that eight out of that noble band including the one for whom the memorial service was held, had made the supreme sacrifice.

**Women May Study Medicine and Dentistry at the University.**

MONTREAL, May 10.—McGill University has let down the bars to women so far as to admit them to the study of medicine and dentistry, the corporation of McGill announced yesterday. It is stipulated that the women who are to be admitted to these courses must have taken a degree in arts from a recognized university, or must take the double course of B. A. and M. D., or B. C. and M. D. at McGill University, or have taken the first and second years on arts at McGill, and "thus give evidence that they are sufficiently mature and otherwise qualified to take up the study of the professional branches."

CAPT. William Stewart MacTier, who was reported yesterday to have been awarded the Military Cross for gallantry in the firing line, is the son of Mr. A. D. MacTier, general manager of eastern lines of the Canadian Pacific Railway. Capt. MacTier went to the front with the first Canadian Contingent and has been twice wounded, the first time at Ypres, and lately at Vimy Ridge. At the outbreak of the war, Capt. MacTier was on the ocean returning from Europe, and immediately on landing joined the Thirtieth Battalion, under Lieut.-Col. (now Brigadier-General) Loomis, D.S.O. He went to the front with that unit and fought with it when it covered itself with glory at Ypres and Festubert. He was then wounded by shrapnel and returned to Montreal to convalesce. On returning to the front he was attached to Brigadier-General Loomis' staff, he having taken over the command of a brigade in the mean time. At the serving in this capacity for a short time one of his feet gave out and an operation was necessary. On his return to the front on this occasion he was transferred to a Montreal Highland Battalion and promoted to his captaincy.

**SUEZ CANAL BRIDGED TRAINS RUN DIRECT, CAIRO TO PALESTINE.**

Cairo, May 16.—(Via Reuters Ottawa Agency)—The swing bridge over the Suez Canal at Kantara has been completed, affording direct railway communication from Cairo toward Palestine.

**HEART OF AMERICANS IS IN THE WAR.**

OTTAWA, May 21.—"Gentlemen, we wrestle, not against flesh and blood, but against powers, against spiritual evil in high places, and our flags entwined are the flags of the Almighty bearing His truth; our sons, the messengers of the Almighty, bearing His message of righteousness," declared United States Secretary of Commerce, William Redfield, addressing the Canadian Club yesterday afternoon.

The distinguished American statesman made a brilliant speech on what America is doing in the war, dealing in extenso with the question of her entering struggle. He declared that it was not until a few weeks ago that it could be said that every element of distrust among the people of the United States had been wiped out of existence for it had been imbedded deeply in the hearts of the American people for scores of years past that they should have nothing to do with the affairs of Europe and it had required a complete reversal of American thought to bring them into line. Referring to American and Canadian soldiers as fighting for home, the honor and purity of womanhood, for the protection of childhood and to defend the civilization of a thousand years now questioned and attacked by the Hun, Mr. Redfield said he was glad to tell his audience that there was gathering to the south a power greater than he could even venture to think.

Referring to the loan, Mr. Redfield, said it had not been a question of getting the money for there existed no fear that this nor further loan would not be subscribed. There was a serious question that it could be shown that the heart of the American people was in the war and he said this had been shown by the seventeen million subscribers which meant a bondholder in every family throughout the American republic. "This is a tremendous record." The speaker said, amid applause, "and one Germany listens to with fear."

**REGULATIONS FOR EATING PLACES.**

Following announcement by the Canada Food Board that, on and after June 1st, no person may legally operate a public eating place without first having obtained a license, the Board has now issued regulations which will govern such licenses.

Licenses are required by every hotel, boarding house, cafeteria, club dining car, steamship, ice cream stand and every other place whatsoever, where meals or refreshments to the number of twenty-four or more per diem are served to persons other than members of the family or household of the proprietor.

**INDIA WILL DO MORE.**

Simla, India, May 16.—(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—As a result of the Delhi conference the provincial governments have held meetings, unanimously reaffirming the resolution of loyalty and promising all possible aid. The government of India has already decided immediately to recruit more than half a million men and organize central provincial publicity bureaus.

**DOZEN U-BOATS SUNK IN BRITISH WATERS.**

This record for a month—Two others, at least, known to be destroyed in the North Sea.

New York, May 17.—(Montreal Gazette Despatch)—The Times this morning publishes the following:—"Twelve German submarines were sunk or captured in British waters by British and American destroyers during April. This was a record. In addition to this number, at least two other U-boats were destroyed during that period. One was sunk on April 8 in the North Sea while making an attack on a convoy to Holland. The other was sunk on Friday, April 26, during the forenoon while attempting to attack a convoy of transports filled with American troops on the way to France."

**QUEBEC USING HYDROPLANES TO PROTECT FORESTS.**

Quebec, May 16.—The St. Maurice Forest Protective Society has engaged two aviators who with hydroplanes will patrol the wilds of Northern Quebec and other forest territories for the prevention and discovery of forest fires. This mode of protecting forests in Quebec will be introduced this summer. The news has been given out today at the Quebec provincial forestry department.

**WOULD MAKE MARRIAGE COMPULSORY IN GERMANY; CHILDLESSNESS A CRIME.**

LONDON, May 17.—The German commission appointed to examine the decline in the birth rate in Germany has reported a recommendation for the compulsory marriage of Germans before their twentieth year is passed, according to a despatch to the Daily Express from Amsterdam.

Financial assistance will be granted by the state, according to the plan, which provides penalties for those failing to comply. Provision is also made for the punishment of married couples who remain childless.

**CANADIAN WOMEN IN THE AIR FORCE.**

Toronto, May 1.—Canadian women will probably soon be enlisted as members of the Royal Air Force branches in Canada. One of the officers of the force here admitted this morning that this was becoming necessary. They will be employed as chauffeurs and in other auxiliary capacities.

**NEW BANK HOURS AT END OF MONTH.**

Under a decision reached by the Canadian Bankers' Association chartered bank throughout the Dominion will observe new hours, after the end of this month, opening their doors at 9.30 and closing at 2.30 on each week-day except Saturday. On Saturday the hours will be 9.30 to 12. The change is stated to have been made necessary by the depletion of bank staffs through the enlistment of so many clerks. It is presumed that the new arrangement will be in effect for the remainder of the year.

**AIRSHIPS IN DAY.**

Besides That the British Damaged Six Others—Twelve Allied Machines are Missing.

DUBLIN, May 17.—A prohe aerial fighting on Saturday, twenty-seven German airships were destroyed, three were driven down out of control and three German balloons were burned, according to the report on aerial operations issued by the war office tonight. Twelve British machines are missing."

The United States has inaugurated an aeroplane mail service between Washington, Philadelphia, Boston and New York. The planes which begin this service will carry from 300 to 600 pounds of mail. It is expected to make the journey from Washington Philadelphia, 135 miles, in an hour and twenty minutes.

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Apple Blossom Time at Hillcrest Orchards, Kentville

**THE SECOND SPRAY**  
Pests Destroyed.

In ordinary years this is the most important spray and should never be omitted. If the first spray has not been given it should be applied a few days earlier than indicated in the illustration. This is the time that apple scab usually be-

gins to show and especial care should be exercised in its application to prevent this disease getting a foothold on leaves and blossom stems and causing a heavy drop of the fruit. Bud moths, fruit worms, canker worms, tent caterpillars and brown-tail moths are among the biting insects destroyed and the residue from this spray is of service in the control of the codling moth in Nova Scotia. In many

places this season the canker worm will be the most important pest to control at this time, and arsenate of lead as recommended is the best method to employ.

Retail grocers are given until June 1 to obtain licenses from the Food Board.

tion the viceroy calls upon all  
loyal Irishmen to defeat the con-  
spiracy.

**In Communication With Ger-  
mans.**

LONDON, May 17—A des-  
patch to the Exchange Tele-  
graph says a proclamation was  
issued tonight, signed by Edw.  
Shortt, chief secretary for Ire-  
land, asserting that certain per-  
sons in Ireland have been in  
communication with Germany,  
"reflecting on Ireland's fair  
name."

A proclamation calls upon all  
loyal subjects to aid in defeating  
the manoeuvres. It urges  
voluntary recruiting so that  
compulsion may be averted.

LONDON, May 19—The Ob-  
server, commenting on the Irish  
situation, says:—"A brave step  
has been taken in Ireland. For  
grave reasons, Friday morning,  
Professor De Valeria, president  
of the Sinn Fein party, and  
many other extremists of the  
name organization were arrest-  
ed."

"The reason is that these  
avowed separatists and pro-Ger-  
mans have once more been in

reasonable touch with the en-  
emy, despite the leniency with  
which they were treated after  
the last Dublin outbreak, revolt  
and sabotage.

**GERMAN AVIATION HAS  
CEASED TO BE A FORCE  
FOR SERIOUS RECKONING**

LONDON, May 22—(Associat-  
ed Press)—German aviation  
has proved a signal failure in  
the great offensive on the west-  
ern front, according to an officer  
correspondent of the Morning  
Post. Writing from the front  
he says:—

There are

being the tremendous wastage  
caused by the incessant attacks  
of the British and French pil-  
ots on German machines, the  
second being the bombing of  
airdromes.

"The conclusion seems man-

### OBITUARY OF EDGAR J. ELLS

On Sunday afternoon, May 5, the Sheffield Mills community sustained a severe loss in the death of Mr. Edgar Ells. For many years he had been afflicted, but about 10 months ago his affliction took a decided turn for the worse, necessitating his removal to the Halifax Infirmary where he underwent a surgical operation which produced great relief but from which he never recovered. Mr. Ells will be ever remembered as the courteous and genial station Agent of Sheffield Mills station, which position he held for 14 years. He was a man of broad deep sympathies. No man came to him with his troubles and needs without receiving the same counsel and immediate help.

In politics he was an ardent Liberal. His faith in the Welfare remained unabated to the end. One of his regrets on his bed was that he could not back up the policy of his leader with his vote at the poll.

His father, Mr. Nathan Ells, was for many years an elder of the Canard Presbyterian church and Mr. Ells was a loyal member of the same church.

He leaves behind him his widow, a daughter of the late Mr. Cyrus Webster of Sheffield Mills, and two sons, Mr. Percy of Meadow View Farm and Mr. Eugene of Boston. One brother survives his, Mr. Rufus Ells of Sheffield Mills.

The funeral was largely attended. The Rev. A. J. Prosser conducted the service and the Rev. John U. Bell delivered the address.

For driving an auto while Halifax Echo—it is reported now that the proposal to erect a temporary railway depot building at the South End terminals has been abandoned and that North street station building, so badly damaged by the explosion, is to be put in repair for use as a station until the war is over.

Real estate experts have estimated the fortune of the late Mrs. Potter Palmer, who died in Florida on Sunday night, at between \$10,000,000 and \$15,000,000.

June fifth has been fixed in Wasington, D. C. as the date for registration of youths who have attained 21 years since the first army draft registration June 5, last year. It is estimated that about 800,000 men available for military service will be found among the new registration this year.

All blotinum in the United States has been commandeered by Government. It is selling at \$105 an ounce and dealers are under heavy penalties for withholding any of their stocks. Iridium is selling at \$1,75 an ounce and palladium at \$1.05 an ounce and these also have been commandeered.

A number of changes are being made in the staff of King's college, among them the resignation Of Pro. Harley from the chair of English in order to resume parish work. He is spending the summer at Conquerall, and will take up permanent work in the autumn.

There are no meatless days in London restaurants now. Restrictions on eating meat in restaurants have been made unnecessary by the meat rations system now in force.

The shipyards of J. Coughlin and sons at False Creek, B.C. on the 16th were damaged by fire to the extent of \$2,000,000.

The Presbyterians in United States are planning a Fund of \$100,000 000 to meet the needs of the denomination following the war.
