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Some Facts About Co-operation.

Co-operation is no new fad. Agricultural co-operation in France dates back to about the 13th century.

No fewer than 1,541 new agricultural co-operative societies were registered in Germany during 1912.

The number of co-operative agricultural societies in France is more than 2,600.

In 1910 Italy had 1,616 co-operative distributive societies, and these sold products to the value of 105,668,935 francs.

Switzerland had 48,456 members in its 557 agricultural co-operative societies, according to figures compiled Jan. 1, 1910.

Russia had a conference at St. Petersburg in March, 1912, at which about 700 delegates gathered to further the interests of their co-operative societies and to draft an extensive new law governing the work of co-operative organizations.

Co-operation began in Denmark by the establishment of a co-operative dairy in 1882; the first co-operative store in 1882; the first co-operative factory in 1887. To-day 85 per cent. of the dairy products of Denmark, and 60 per cent. of the bacon are handled co-operatively. The egg societies are distinctly successful and the movement is recognized as being the fundamental cause of the prosperity of the country.

Co-operative marketing has been the foundation of success in the orange business of California. The percentage of the entire orange crop of California marketed by one co-operative exchange rose from 25 in 1899 to 65 in 1909. The losses through errors in the transmission of money, etc., in seven years was only at the rate of one dollar out of every 15,000.

The fruit growers of British Columbia are at the present time being gathered into co-operative societies for the sale of fruit, the provincial government advancing 85 per cent. of the capital necessary.

The Dominion Government has published a bulletin for the fruit growers of Canada in which co-operative selling of fruit is very strongly advised.

Without co-operation in the cheese-making and creamery business of Canada the Canadian dairy industry would rapidly dwindle away.

Co-operative grain marketing by the farmers of Western Canada has proven a success.

Co-operative selling of eggs has been satisfactorily tried in Ontario.

Editorial Notes.

The Berwick Board of Trade is considering a proposal to apply for the government grant for the Valley Exhibition in 1914. This annual exhibition is a splendid thing for the Valley, and Berwick with its central situation and ample warehouse space is well conditioned for holding the next fair.

Canada now ranks fifth among the world as a producer of wheat. Two years ago we ranked tenth. In 1908 the order of precedence in respect to production was as follows: United States, Russia, France, British India, Hungary, Argentina, Italy, Germany, Canada and Australia. This year Canada's wheat production will reach 211,000,000 bushels, or very close to India's yield in 1912. The world's production of wheat this year is estimated at 3,300,000,000 bushels, an increase of 4.1 per cent.

At the recent sitting of the Supreme Court at Kentville the Grand Jury presented Chief Justice Sir Charles Townshend, who presided, with a petition asking for improvements in the condition of the County Jail, both as regards the safe keeping of prisoners and for keeping prisoners who are confined for serious offences separate and apart from prisoners who are confined for minor offences or merely awaiting trial. There is no doubt but that this is a very important matter and deserves immediate attention. In spite of the fact that the County Jail was erected only a few years ago at a large expense, it is undoubtedly far from what it should be in the matter of accommodation.

While the matter of improvement is being discussed it would be well to go a little further and have some provision made for those who are serving sentences being suitably employed while sojourning in the County Jail. There is no reason why these prisoners should not be able to earn their board and at the same time contribute something towards the expense of their trial and commitment. Such a course is being followed in other places and there is no reason why it should not be so in Kings county. If such provisions were in operation there would be more likelihood of the law being enforced, which would tend to the advantage of citizens generally. Now that the Municipal elections are on is an appropriate time for a consideration of this matter.

Squandering Road Money

TO INFLUENCE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

(Correspondence to THE ACADIAN.) Halifax, Oct. 21st, '13.—The periodical carnival of road graft has come around again. The three events around which the squandering of road moneys in this province circle are the municipal elections, the local elections and the federal elections.

The most bare faced abuse of the road system is in connection with the municipal elections, for these always take place in November long after it is too late to expend any money legitimately for road making or ordinary repairs. This is a period of rain and storm and muck and mire. Mud and dirt scraped from the ditches or carted from elsewhere and placed on the roads at this time of year is only churned into a mire by the rains and vehicles and if not washed away before the frosts of winter come it is then made into a frozen mass only to disintegrate in the spring to make more muck and mire and be washed away by the spring rains. Thus, instead of the money spent improving the roads, they are only made worse and often times practically impassible in some sections of Nova Scotia. Yet this system is studiously and brazenly carried out in connection with every election.

To make earth roads satisfactory they must be made of dry earth in the dry season when they can be well ditched and rounded and packed before being soaked with the violent rains of the fall. Yet such are the dark ways and vain tricks for which the government machine is peculiar that the proper season for road making is deliberately allowed to pass in order that the road money may be available for election purposes.

Reports from many counties in the province state that there is now great activity in road making and the construction of small culverts, not with a view to improving the roads but for the purpose of trying to influence votes for liberal municipal councillors.

The liberal machine in this province has always woven the municipal councils into its meshes in order that they might control the revision of the voters' lists through liberal revisers appointed by liberal municipal councils. The liberal conservative party has never sought to take advantage of its control of a municipal council to cook the lists. It is the policy of the liberal-conservative party to accord to every duly qualified elector the right to be registered as a voter. But many liberal revisers in many counties in this province defy the provisions of the franchise act and resort to all kinds of expedients to prevent the registration of voters believed to be opposed to them.

The standing of the municipal councils throughout the province during the past three years will be interesting at this time. There are 24 municipal councils in the province. There are 10 liberal warden and 8 liberal conservative warden. There are 354 municipal councillors, 204 are liberal and 152 conservative. It is time for a change.

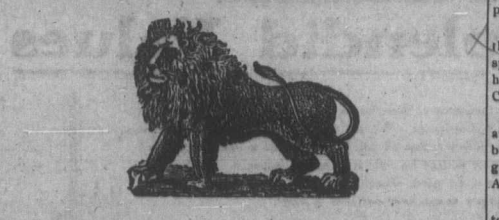

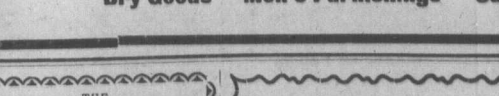

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his family, or on a farm of at least 40 acres solely owned by his wife, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a re-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.
