#### SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mail over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available inion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewar er Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon

Duties.—Six months' residence upen and culivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empta quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre, Duties.—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six 'years' from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres

extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Mr. Fowler will seek bail for the prisoner, who in the meantime been committed to jall.






