LONDON, April 1.—The United States was handled without gloves by Lloyd George and Sir Edward Grey, the Ulster leader, in the debate yesterday in the house of commons on the second reading of the bill which is taken by the United States senate in adopting the resolution that had fostered secession. #### SAYS WIFE NEVER CAME TO HIM FOR KISS; JUDGE DISMISSES DIVORCE SUIT

NEWARK, N. J., April 1.—"I always did the kissing. She never came to me for a kiss." This was the answer of Robert Kollmar, manufacturing jeweler of Irvington, N. J., to his wife's charge that he never kissed her. Mrs. Edna N. Kollmar brought suit today against her husband for separate maintenance, alleging abandonment. In her petition Mrs. Kollmar stated "that his cold indifference and lack of affection caused her to suffer nervous prostration" and that she was compelled to leave him. The suit was dismissed by Vice Chancellor Fielder.

#### ATTACK DURRUS POLICE BARRACKS; TWO HURT

SKIBBEREEN, IRELAND, April 1.—More than 100 armed men attacked the police barracks at Durrus, 7 miles southwest of Bantry, County Cork, with rifles and petrol bombs last night. A portion of the building was blown up and two policemen were wounded, one seriously. After a fierce fight the raiders, of whom, two are believed to be wounded, were driven off.

### Fountain Sentenced to Be Hanged For Murder Of Wife and Children

WELLAND, April 1.—Frederick Fountain of this city was sentenced yesterday by Judge Lennox at the supreme court assize to be hanged on Wednesday June 16, for the murder of his wife and two children at their home in Culp Street, Niagara Falls, February 12, 1919. The sentence followed the verdict of guilty brought in by the jury at a second trial yesterday. Before sentence was passed Fountain was asked if he had anything to say and in a reply gave a lengthy discourse. Religious sentiment permeated his talk and he admitted having committed the crime, but claimed it was due to an uncontrollable impulse which prompted him to commit the deed. His talk made quite an impression on the court and the judge expressed sympathy for the prisoner, but said British laws did not allow murders to be committed on account of uncontrollable impulses, for if it did he said, civilization would never be secure. "The impulse over which you say you had no control to do wrong was evidently much stronger than the impulse to do right," stated the judge the law laid down is clear that the penalty must be paid, I therefore sentence you to be hanged on June 16 and may God have mercy on your soul. Fountain did not show any signs of emotion and was led quietly out of the court room. He did not look any worse for his fifteen months of jail confinement. The victim was employed at the American Cyanamid company before the murder. He was known to be a quiet, faithful employee, but was jealous of his wife, who was an English girl, employed as a nurse at a home in the West Indies where Fountain was working as a chauffeur. His mother resides in Jamaica. The murder was committed following a party given in honor of his wife's birthday. A male guest kissed her good-bye on his departure which aroused Fountain's jealousy. Before he committed the crime he wrote a letter telling what he was doing and left orders for the disposal of the bodies. He attempted suicide but the wound inflicted by the knife was slight and he made a quick recovery. His first trial was held last October when he was found guilty and sentenced to death by the presiding judge Logie.

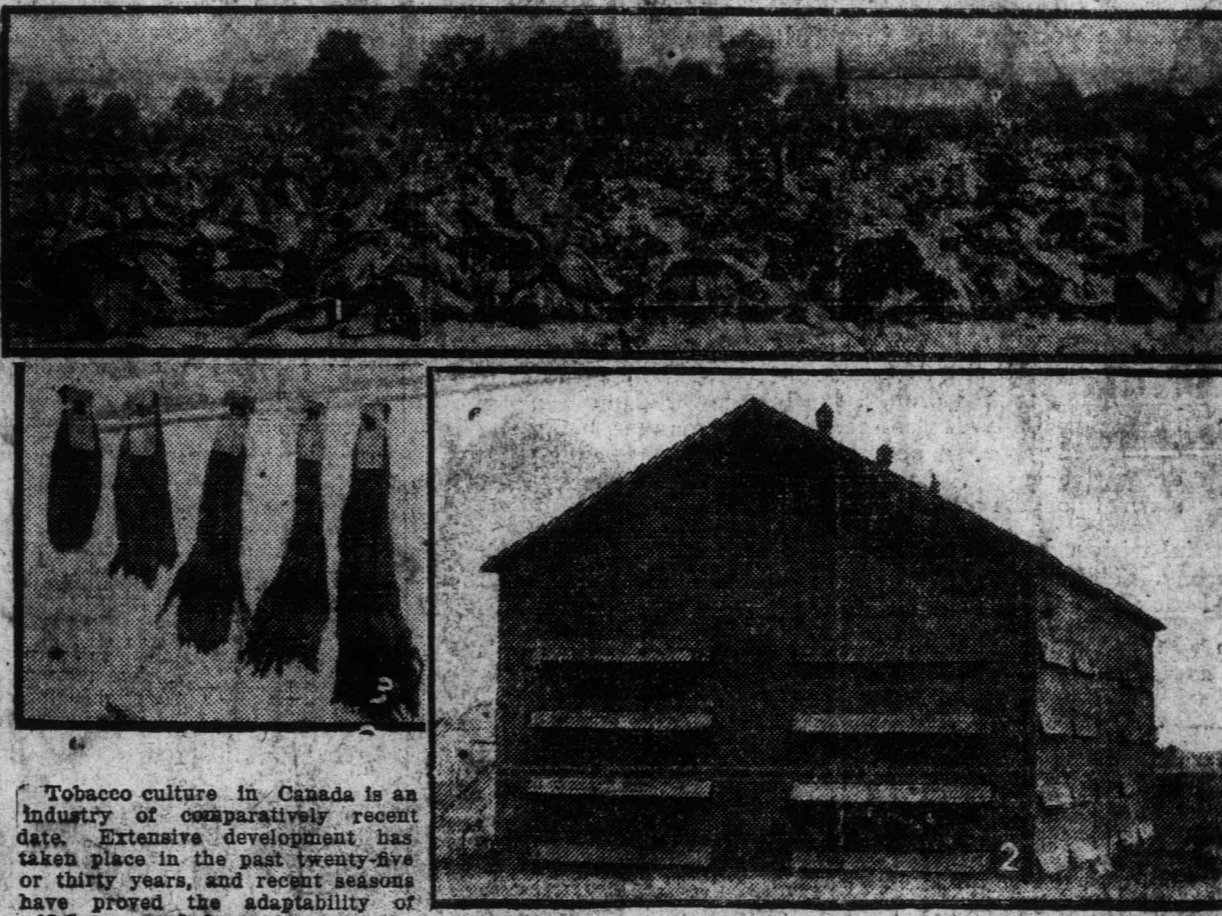
### Woman is Fined \$200 for Having Liquor Illegally in Her Residence, Facer Street

#### SAY PROHIBITION'S ONLY EFFECT IS TO RAISE COST LOWER THE QUALITY OF BOOZES

NEW YORK, April 1.—Does drunkenness increase under prohibition? In March 1919, there were twenty-four convictions for drunkenness in the West Side magistrate's court. National prohibition went into effect January 16, 1920. In March, 1920, there were thirty convictions for being intoxicated an increase of 25 per cent over last year. Magistrates have been assured by several prisoners that the only effect of prohibition has been the increase in the price of liquor.

### MY LADY NICOTINE IN CANADA



Tobacco culture in Canada is an industry of comparatively recent date. Extensive development has taken place in the past twenty-five or thirty years, and recent seasons have proved the adaptability of widely separated sections of the Dominion to this very profitable line of agriculture. Since the protective duty of 28 cents per pound has been imposed on all foreign leaf tobaccos, the Canadian industry has received a yet greater stimulus, and interest in the culture is becoming wider and more diversified yearly. The two principal provinces where tobacco has been successfully grown for many years are Ontario and Quebec. Very successful results have been obtained also at Kilmorynne, in the Okanagan district of British Columbia, and the growing of tobacco may be said to be firmly established as an industry there. Recent experiments in the Lethbridge irrigation district in Southern Alberta, would indicate great possibilities for the growth in the prairie province. Tobacco, in Ontario, is grown in the counties of Essex, Pelee, Kent, Prince Edward, Elgin, and Lincoln. A total of 9,226 acres among these counties was devoted to the cultivation of the tobacco plant in 1919, producing a yield of 10,789,400 pounds, or an average of 1,159 pounds per acre. The Burley variety, suitable for chewing, is grown in the counties of Essex, Kent, and Lincoln. Maryland tobacco has been introduced into Prince Edward County with success. During the past few years the growing of bright tobacco (the cured leaf) has extended rapidly on the light sandy loams near the shores of Lake Ontario, and some gravelly hills with good drainage. The annual production of this variety is nearly 1,000,000 pounds, with the yearly demand increasing. A limited amount of Seed Leaf and Fire-cured leaf of the heavier type is grown in certain sections. The cost of cultivation in the province, including the labor of the grower, has been estimated to be from \$50 to \$75 per acre, and the average yield about 1,300 pounds per acre. ### Chamber of Commerce Forum Put Itself on Record As Favoring All Clean Sport

The Chamber of Commerce last night at a meeting in the Y. M. C. A. discussed the sports situation in St. Catharines and put itself on record as being in hearty sympathy with and ready to support all kinds of clean sport. Captain A. H. Macdonald spoke on the subject of the Canadian Henley if added interest is shown in it by the regatta, an annual event which St. Catharines can make more successful. H. C. Griffiths of Ridley College also discussed the sports question in an interesting address. The meeting passed a resolution asking the directors to petition that the marathon trial Olympic finals be as being in hearty sympathy with and race course in this city. The Olympic executive has approved of this. Another resolution passed was that a track be built on the new sports grounds. A third resolution asked the Board of directors to name a committee to go into the whole question of the athletic and sport needs of St. Catharines.

### An Arts and Crafts Exhibition to Be Held Here During Next Month

The proposed exhibition to be held in this city early in May, under the joint auspices of the Arts and Crafts Guild and Chamber of Commerce will demonstrate that art and business are much more closely allied than generally supposed. When one stops to reflect that all branches of manufacturing, except the purely mechanical and utilitarian, are dependant on the person who decides the form, color, lines and decoration of the article, it will be seen that his person who is really an artist, whether good, bad or indifferent has a large part to play in Canadian industries. Why do goods made abroad seem to have more distinction, more "style" in so many instances? It is because, as "Industrial Canada" the official organ of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association tells us: after the development of machinery, "European manufacturers" lost little time in adapting many of their artists or the requirements of trade knowing that only by the use of thoroughly trained and well-paid designers could their prestige be maintained. "We in Canada seemed to accept this condition without question allowing Europe and the United States to import the better class of manufactures. These might equally as well be made here if we had made provision for the teaching of Industrial Design in the schools, and had adapted to practical purposes the wealth of artistic material lying close at hand. The exhibition will include, besides a splendid collection of modern Canadian paintings, fine articles of handicraftmanship, commercial design, and a section devoted to the arts and craft of the Home Countries, from which all our artistic talent and skill originally came from. The object of this section is to show not only what we owe along art lines to the Mother Countries of Britain and Ireland, but what beauty and inspiration there is in the native arts of more recent centuries, the Italian, the Russian, and Ruthenian, the Ukrainian, Bohemian, Roumanian, and Armenian. An exhibition of this sort, giving recognition to the finer qualities of our new neighbors, will do more toward creating a spirit of friendly co-operation among the native Canadians and foreign groups than almost anything else could do. Art, as has been often said, is a universal language. The co-operation committee now engaged in securing the interest of various individuals and organizations for the coming exhibition of Arts and Industries consists of Arthur E. Clever, E. C. Hesson, J. G. Williams, Miss Ina Larkin, Mrs. H. G. Williams, Mrs. A. Macdonald, Miss Clara Burgoyne and Mrs. J. R. Heath.

The Ontario Safety League continues to place a large amount of literature in the hands of motorists, school children, industrial workers, and others throughout the Province. In the first three months of 1920 the League has distributed an enormous amount of safety material, including 35,000 industrial safety bulletins; 32,400 school safety bulletins; 8,500 special bulletins; 8,500 traffic bulletins; 2,700 electric railway bulletins; 150,000 motorist's safety book-marks; 10,200 health bulletins; 6,500 news leaflets; 9,000 safety calendars; 12,000 leaflets to the "new man"; 125,000 gummed seals; 3,000 safety cards and posters.

The League will hold an annual meeting in Toronto, beginning Tuesday, April 13th at the King Edward Hotel.

**C. N. R. WILL NOT ELECTRIFY LINE!**

"The rumors in connection with the electrification of the roads operated by the Canadian National Railways are unfounded, so far as the general system is concerned," said President D. B. Hanna yesterday. "We have taken over the railway known as the Toronto Eastern Railway, and also some other lines, and we have an agreement with the Hydro to sell these roads to the Hydro Commission, and when taken over by the commission they will naturally be electrified. This also concerns that line known as the old Central Ontario Railway, where passenger traffic is far in excess of the freight transportation, but this applies to that section only, not to the Central Ontario Railways in general, some people have understood from my speech to the Canadian Club in rockville.

**PAINT LENGTHENS LIFE OF BUILDINGS AND MACHINES**

Many an old ship has stood the racket of ocean travel for years mainly on the strength of the tar or paint applied to her sides, but sailors do not wait for the ship's hull to become weather beaten before applying the first coat of paint. Farmers, on the other hand, seem much inclined to let their buildings reach a state of partial decay before making any special effort to safeguard them against the play of wind and water. As a matter of fact, nothing appys better than paint applied immediately after the building is constructed, in lengthening the life of the structure. The same applies to farm machinery parts especially the wooden parts and it will always pay to paint such repairs to machinery wagons, etc., as have to be made before the work season for these articles commences.

Good paint applied to farm buildings and machinery, not only prevents the good management employed in

servicing them, but calls attention to running the farm, a fact that helps greatly in case the owner wishes to sell either the farm or some of its products. Many farmers have paid so much attention to the economic value of the farm that they have neglected an important side of farm life. There is no reason why the farmer and his family should not have as attractive a home as attractive as the city dweller has. The farmer's neighbors as well as the passing observer, will judge him largely by the care he takes of his stock, his machinery, and his buildings.

Painting is the easiest and least expensive way of making sure of neat clean surroundings, and is the best way of preserving the lumber in buildings, implements or machinery. With spring approaching, the time has arrived for going the rounds of the machine shed to pick out these articles that can be moved to a warm building for retouching with paint in addition to their annual overhaul and repair.

**One Brother Dead, Second Found Dying**

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., March 3.—James Courtney was found dead in bed and his twin brother, John Courtney, seriously ill with pneumonia, yesterday morning in their hermit-like quarters in the rear of their brick block on Niagara Street, between Third and Fourth Streets. Both of the Courtneys are well over 70 years old and came here from Toronto about 50 years ago.

The two men had been ill for several days, and this morning John himself barely able to crawl over the floor, found that James was dead. He managed to attract the attention of neighbors, and Dr. W. H. Hodge, was summoned and said that James had been dead for several hours. John's condition is such that little hope is held out for his recovery.

The brothers for a number of years ran a shoe store on Falls St. but a few years ago sold out and built the block on Niagara St. where they have since lived in two small rooms in the rear. They had few callers, and lived the life of recluses, although it was known that they had plenty of money. Coroner Harry R. Emes is investigating the death of James.

The Canada Steamship Lines, through an official of the company, announced yesterday that their new passenger steamer for the Niagara run would very probably be constructed in Toronto. The steamer will be 420 feet in length, over 100 feet longer than the Cayuga, and will have a capacity of 4,000 passengers. It will be the second largest passenger steamer on the Great Lakes, and will be the largest passenger steamer ever constructed in a Canadian port if built in Toronto.

### Wilson Would Force Turks From Europe

ARGUMENTS STRONG FOR THEIR EXPULSION FROM CONSTANTINOPLE

WASHINGTON, (March 31)—Vigorous expression of President Wilson's opinion that "the often expressed intention of the allies that the anomaly of the Turks in Europe should cease" should be carried out in framing the Turkish treaty, characterized the American rejoinder to the recent Allied note transmitting information to the status of treaty negotiations.

While the strength of arguments for retention of the Turks in Constantinople was recognized, the note said, the American government believes that "the arguments against it are far stronger and contain certain imperative elements which it would not seem possible to ignore."

The American rejoinder was handed to the French ambassador here on March 24th for transmission to Premier Millerand and made public tonight by the state department on advices that it had been delivered.

#### MAPS OF EUROPE

The new maps depicting Europe as it emerged from the war are expected to arrive in the city soon, to be distributed free among the schools. As the new Ontario geography will not be ready till September of next

year, 40,000 copies of the new maps will be sent to the schools of the province.

Educationalists are awaiting with much interest the arrival of these maps, none of which have reached here as yet. Copies will be sent direct to the principals of the collegiate insti-

tute, while the school inspectors will take care of the supply for the public and separate schools.

The new Allan Theatre is so nearly completed that it is expected to open it within three weeks, The Journal learned today.

### Canadian National Railways Operated at a Loss of Just \$14,000,000 During Past Year

OTTAWA, March 31—The Canadian National Railways operated at a loss of \$14,000,000 during the fiscal year ended on March 31, 1919, according to the first annual budget submitted to the house of commons today by Dr. Reid, minister of railways.

The budget shows the loss divided as follows: Canadian Northern, \$6,500,000, and International Railway and Transcontinental, \$7,500,000.

In addition there were fixed charges of \$19,000,000 to be met.

Operating loss on G. T. P. \$5,500,000.

Fixed charges on G. T. P. \$8,500,000.

Out of every dollar earned by the roads, Dr. Reid said, 78 cents went in wages to the employees. Operating expenses increased from \$84,000,000 virtually to \$108,000,000. These advances were due largely to increases in wages under the McAdoo award, he explained.

Construction during the present year, he said will be limited to the completion of the lines in the West. No more work will be done for the present on the Hudson Bay Railroad. An increase of 25 per cent based on last year's earnings, and favored by the board of management, would approximate \$30,000,000, Dr. Reid stated. Any such increase for government roads also would have to be granted the Canadian Pacific, he said. He declined to decide as minister of railways, whether a general increase should be granted to show a surplus for the government lines, saying he would leave the question to the house and people of the Dominion.

Consequently she left Saturday, after informing the Superintendent that he ordered was "too nerve racking" and has not returned.

Dominion of Canada  
  
Department of Finance

ALL persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:—

1. Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$1,000 or more.
2. All other individuals who during the calendar year 1919 received or earned \$2,000 or more.
3. Every corporation and joint stock company whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

**Forms** to be used in filing returns on or before the 30th of April, 1920.

ALL INDIVIDUALS other than farmers and ranchers must use Form T-1.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS must use Form T-1A.

CORPORATIONS and joint stock companies must use Form T-2.

**Penalty**

Every person required to make a return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of Twenty-five per centum of the amount of the tax payable.

Any person, whether taxable, or otherwise, who fails to make a return or provide information duly required according to the provision of the Act, shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty of \$100 for each day during which the default continues. Also any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister, shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a penalty not exceeding \$10,000, or to six months' imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.

**General Instructions.**

Obtain Forms from the Inspectors of Assistant Inspectors of Taxation or from Postmasters.

Read carefully all instructions on Form before filling it in.

Prepay postage on letters and documents forwarded by mail to Inspectors of Taxation.

Make your returns promptly and avoid penalties.

Assistant District Attorney Exonerated of Bribery; Free to Start Inquiry

NEW YORK, March 31—The extraordinary grand jury, investigating the conduct of three assistant district attorneys filed a presentment in the state supreme court late yesterday afternoon exonerating Assistant District Attorney James E. Smith charges of alleged bribery contained in a letter found in Mayor Hylan's files. The grand jury reported that the charge of which Assistant District Attorney Smith was exonerated originated in a letter, sent by Mayor Hylan to the Police Commissioner Enright on March 12, 1919. The letter said in part: "There seems to be a common report around town that Rothstein, the gambler, gave \$20,000 to a lawyer who was formerly a magistrate which so the report goes, was divided equally between an assistant district attorney and a magistrate. However the case against Rothstein was dismissed." "Testimony taken by us," the presentment said "has clearly identified the case referred to as that of Arnold Rethstein, arraigned on a charge of felonious assault on January 23, 1919 in the seventh district magistrate's court and discharged by the presiding magistrate on January 28, 1919. The other persons referred to are Emil Fuchs, formerly a city magistrate; James E. Smith, an assistant district attorney; and Francis X. McQuade, a city magistrate." "In the investigation of this charge the grand jury added, "we have exhausted all sources of information available to us and we have not found the title common report described in the above extract from the mayor's letter has any foundation whatever in fact." This presentment exonerating Mr. Smith of the only charge officially against him before the extraordinary grand jury, it was explained, gives him a clean bill of health and will permit him to proceed immediately before the regular grand jury with his investigation of alleged police department irregularities. The Toronto Globe failed to reach the city today owing to missing a train.

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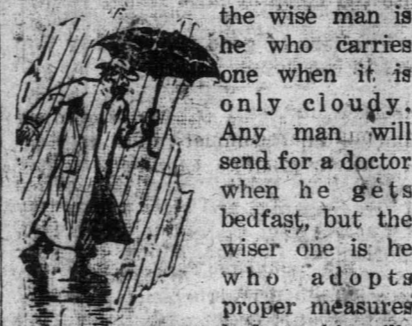

### Growth Shows Desire To Extend Army Work

Commissioner W. J. Richards, chief of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada, has completed his fifth year in that capacity. During that time the Army has seen one of its greatest periods of usefulness. This period takes in the "war years." The great war had been under way since August and new problems presented themselves to the organization when he assumed command. These problems required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attended those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.

Commissioner Richards is a forceful man. He is a man of few words. He believes in doing things. During the five years, more than 11,000 persons are recorded as having sought salvation. Notwithstanding the losses due to war, there are today nearly 2,000 more names on the Membership Roll than there were in this territory five years ago.

In July, 1915, Canada East was separated from Canada West, the dividing line being Fort Arthur. Even in view of this, there are now only forty one fewer officers in active ser-



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vice in the Eastern territory alone than there were in the combined territories five years ago.

In the Field Report two very striking indications of financial growth are given. In 1914, the Self-Denial total for the combined territories was \$48,726. In 1919, for Canada East alone, it was \$75,591. Harvest Festival returns have been doubled.
