

On Thursday, the 17th, field ice was met and the ship had to be carefully navigated, keeping well south to avoid it. The next day, Friday, the ship was caught in the ice floe in lat. 48.19 N., and long. 46.50 W. She was practically stopped all that day, only steaming 16 knots in the 24 hours. Numerous icebergs were passed. On Friday night last a huge berg about a quarter of a mile long and a hundred feet in height above the surface of the water was sighted. t is fitting that the best and high-expression in literature of the est expression in literature of the events surounding the Coming and the Life of the One Perfect Man should have adequate expression in Music.

Great Art is Revelation, and the Great Artist is he who conveys to the aind of the listener the greatest numr of the greatest ideas at once pure and uplifting. Therefore, words and music must be in perfect, harmony with each other to fulfil in the highest sense the aim of a Song or Choras, and it is this characteristic that makes "The Messiah" great.

At the very least it is more than twenty years since The Messiah, as a whole, has been given here. Since the lays of Rowe, Handcock and Walker there has been a dearth of any ampitious oratorio works and I hope that it will be shown at the rendering of The Messiah next Thursday, that it is certainly not the fault of the pubic that such performances have been are, and that a full hall will encour ge Mr. Allen and his singers, who have been working hard for the past six months, for the most part having two practices each week. Excerpts from the oratorio are better than othing, but the logical sequence of Prophecy, Birth, Life, Passion and Resurrection (so beautifully expressed in Holy Scripture, and taken and rranged therefrom by Charles Jennens), as developed in The Messiah just necessarily carry one along in the spirit of reverent wonder and praise, and in the unfolding of the story Wonderful, one will forget singers and players, and feel only, with renewed emphasis, some realization of the tremendous sacrifice that wa

The Messiah is divided into three parts. The first part deals with the rophecy of His Coming and His Birth and opens with a recitation by the tenor soloist "Comfort ye, comfort ye my people, saith your God.

Prepare ye the way of the Lord; make straight in the desert a highway for our God;" the first chorus being "And the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together; for the mouth of the Lord has spoken "But who may abide the day of His coming? And who shall stand when He appeareth? For He is like a refiner's fire." A good chorus is a Son is given, and the Government shall be upon His shoulders; and Hisname shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, the Mighty God, the Everlasting Father, the Prince of Peace."

The chorus "Glory to God" begins as Handel wrote of it "From afar and rather softly," with the idea of the gradual approach of the angels, and ends also softly, with the idea of the gradual vanishing of the angels. The well-known "He shall feed His flock," so often sung with an utter disregard to the correct flowing time, closes this part. 





This is the striking utterance which begins the last will and testament of J. P. Morgan, who died at Rome, March 31st last. The amount bequeathed in trusts named by specific sums is under twenty million dollars, but the entire residue of estate is left to J. P. Morgan, jr., who is designated by his father, becomes chief heir not only to his fortune, but to his many charitable and artistic activities. Public charity bequests are comparatively in which Mr. Morgan's benefactions are already known. The disposition of the estate follows: The first provisions are those of his own family. To his wife Frances Louis A. Tracey Morgan, an income for life from the trust fund of one million dollars with power to dispose of the capital by will. Mrs. Morgan is already entitled to an Junius Spencer Morgan's father) by deed dated July 1st. 1867. The will provides that she is now to receive for life an income from adher total income from these two trusts shall (aside from income of one million dollars fund) amount to \$100,-000 a year. Mrs. Morgan also receives during her life Cragton, Morgan's country house at Highland Falls, N. Y., also the Morgan home at No. 219 Madison Avenue, New York city together with furniture, paintings, etc., (except family portraits) in both houses. His son John Pierpont Morgan, jr., receives an outright legacy of \$3,000,000; three daughters receive each an income for life from a trust fund of \$3,000,000. Morgan's two sons-in-law receive each an outright legacy of a million. To each of the employees at time of death, in the firm of J. P. Morgan & Company, of the city of New York, except Charles W. King, above named, an amount equal to one year's salary, and to each person who survive him who was at the time of the dissolution of the firm of J. S. Morgan & Company, London, as employee thereof, an amount equal to one year's salary. Morgan's valet, Edward Phillips, rectives a legacy of \$15,000. Various annuities are provided to other serants in recognition of faithful service. A charitable bequest that \$100,-000 for a House of Rest for consumpives he designated as Amelia Sturge's Morgan Memorial Fund, is in memory of Morgan's first wife. Mr. Morgan having thus provided for immediate relatives, various friend employees, servants, charity, etc., declares that the residue of his property shall be equeathed to his son John Pierpont Morgan, jr., his heirs, for his and their own use forever.
