





LONDON, April 13. The Governor, Newfoundland: The French Government reports. that a German counter-attack on Les Eparges was repulsed during the night of Sunday and Monday.

The Russian Government reports the repulse of great enemy forces in direction of Rostoki on the 10th, extra and the development of a violent battle in the region of Uszok Pass, which the enemy still holds. 

ent, or training to go there. Limerick also has altered its opinion of the British army. Officers, who during the week secured 300 re cruits in Limerick, were heartily welcomed by the people, and the recruits were lustily cheered when they presented themselves.

Perhaps for the first time in Irish history such scenes have been witnessed, and certainly there has been a change from the days when an Irishman who joined the army was shunned by many.







Perley, acting Canadian High Commissioner in London, has been notified that the British Commissioners of Customs British Commissioners of Customs and Excise have been authorized to remit the customs duty on gifts sent to the United Kingdom from the Oversea Dominions and intended for free distribution during the war, provided: (a) That the gift is from the Government of the Dominion conterned, or is vouched for by such Government as being intended for free distribution and not for sale: (b) Government as being intended for free distribution and not for sale; (b) that the goods sent are intended for the use of sick and wounded saffors in hospitals, or of Belgian refuges, or for the relief of distress in the United Kingdom, and (c) that they are addressed to hospitals and convalescent homes which the War Office or Admiralty declare to be properly accredited by them, or to a central authority to be proved by the Board of Customs for distribution to refugees in authorized depots under the authorities' direct control or to an agency for relief of distress approved by the committee on the relief of distress.
