CHURCHILL'S EXPLANATION OF HIS RESIGNATION.

LONDON, To-day. In a speech in the Commons yester-day Churchill declared if any operations in the history of the world were worth carrying through with sustain ed fury and utter disregard of life, the operations in the Dardanelles were worth it. We are passing through a bad time, which probably it will be better, Churchill said. Documentary evidence would make this clear without detracting from the gallantry and devotion of Rear Admiral Sir Christopher Cradock, who lost his life when the Good Hope went down. The suggestion he had overruled naval advisers and kept the old cruisers, Hogue, Cressy, Aboukir at sea, thus causing their destruction by German's submarines last year was characterized by Churchill as un-true. The British Government were all extremely distressed by this decision, as it seemed everything was going to be thrown away for the sake of three or four days continued resistance. I offered to go to Antwerp and report on situation and the offer was accepted. I crossed immediately and next day after consultation with the Belgian Government and British Staff Officers at Antwerp, I proposed tele-graphically that Belgium should con-tinue resistance and that the British and French Governments should say within three days whether or not they could send a relieving force. Day after day, a relieving force from Britain in any case was sent to Ghent and other points in time for the retreat. British troops insured the safe retirement of the Belgians. Simultaneously Britain encouraged the dedence of Antwerp by sending a naval origade and taking other minor measres. These proposals were accepted y both Governments. I was informed of the dimension of the army to be sent for communication with the Bel-gians and was told to do everything ossible to maintain the defence Meanwhile this I did without regard o consequences in any direction. Churchill argued these operations should not be regarded as an event which led only to misfortune. He believed military history would hold that the consequences conducted to advantage in others on the west, as the operations led Germans to believe a large army was arriving from the sea. It is true, added Churchill, these operations were begun too late, but that was not my fault. On September 6th, nearly a month before I drew the attention of Premier Asquith, Earl Kitchener and Sir Edward Grey to the dangerous position developing at Ant-werp and the grave consequences to dmiralty interests which the loss of e fortress would entail.

Three Furkish regiments and three German submarines are reported to have been stationed at the Bulgarian port of Varna in expectation of Russian at-

TURKISH INTRIGUES IN PERSIA.

TEHERAN, To-day. A Persian proclamation issued at the Russian Legation, addressed to the Persian people, states in view of useless measures taken hitherto against the corrupting gold of Ger-many by Turkish-German agents who are seeking to compromise the friend-ship of Russia. Student Spy Shown Mercy by Britain.

neth Triest and of Edith Cavell.

An instance of the human conduct of Great Britain's government in dealing with a spy comes as a distinct contrast to the murderous cruelty of the Germans in the case of Miss Edith ! Cavell, head nurse of a hospital, who was put to death in the gray dawn in a Brussels prison despite the fervent pleas of the American and Spanish ministers. The Herald has learned that Kenneth G. Triest, whose father. Wolfgang Gustav Triest, almost abandoned hope of saving his son's life after the slaving of Miss Cavell, is to be returned to the United States, in care of his father.

All that was asked by the British authorities was that Mr. Triest, sr., whose home is at No. 970 Park avenue, should go to England under a safe conduct from the British Embassy in Washington and take his son away. 300 bdls. No. 1 Hay. This charitable decision has been communicated by the British Embassy to the State Department in Washington.

Two countries' ministers pleaded for Miss Cavell in the very same city in which she was shot to death. In the case of young Triest, whose guilt was palpable, a plea from Theodore Roosevelt, 3,500 miles away, did much to save the young man and give him his liberty. All that the parents of young Triest, who is nineteen years old and was a Princeton University student, hoped for was to get the death sentence commuted on account of his alleged feeble mentality. But even that hope was swept away when it was learned that alienists had declared that Triest was not mentally irre-

Posed as Canadian.

He had posed as a Canadian, enlisted in the British navy, taken the oath, and then, it was learned through intercepted letters, had written of his idea of trying to get to Germany and away a secret code and other details of the service he had learned.

Protest But Navy Department Won't Grant Shore Leave to Men of Interned Ships.

Washington, Nov. 9-German oficers on the interned naval auxiliary cruisers Kronprinz Wilhelm and Prinz Eitel Friedrich have complained to the Navy Department against their continued confinement, which is the result of the decision of that department to permit no more leave of absence to officers on those vessels on parole on account of the disappearance mysteriously of eight officers of the Kronprinz and the Eitel. It was learned that several applications of the officers for shore leave had been refused.

Despite the protest of the German officers it is learned that it is the present intention of the Navy Department to continue indefinitely in force the order which directs Rear Admiral Beatty, commandant of the Norfolk Navy Yard, not to grant further leave of absence to the German officers.

The officers asserted that their paroles would be observed. As the men who disappeared on the Eclipse were officers, it was decided not to take any more chances.

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
