





men in the land cism, amounting almost to pessimis to sound a note of cheerful triumph the nation may feel it is time to pluck up heart. The man in the case here is Lloyd George. Perhaps no other man, even including Asquith or Sir William Robertson, can speak with quite the same authority of Britain's prospects. For eighteen months he combated, almost alone, the insane over-confidence that infected England so badly after the battle of the Marne He pointed out, as no one else, under standed of the people, could point out wherein lay the hidden peril to Great Britain. He saw, and stated, her only salvation to lie in immense and sustained effort. This attitude of mind, apart from his other great abilities pointed him out as the man to control and direct the wonderful munition organization which converted England into a vast arsenal. It is out of his knowledge of what has been there achieved that he speaks now. "There is no doubt at all," he says, "that the lesson of this battle is that we have simply to press on with all our resources, with all the material at our command, and victory will be ours." Which simply means that Lloyd George considers these resources and that material to be now at last suffi-

The vital import of this fact is apt to be overlooked, or the fact itself too readily taken for granted. The wonderful nature of the achievement is but from insufficient premises, the Germans concluded that Britain could not possibly bring her armies to such a state of efficiency and artillery equipment as to be a serious menac to their West front. The real height to which Britain has in fact brought her preparations is not yet faintly guessed in Germany. So, too, there is no doubt that the confidence of the Central nations has been sustained. in the face of the Russian avalanche by their conviction that the prodigal expenditure of ammunition by the Russian artillery would soon exhaust the supply. When they finally realise that the supply on both fronts is greater even than the demand upon it, the Germans will have to do a little more original thinking.

It would be interesting to know the mind of the German general staff on there is no bait. the West front. 

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
