heed to a country which has proved false to itself and to all that it has

That is best and greatest? This is only part of a prospect which stares us in the face. We need but continue as we are to make it certain. Not by its patriots, not by its defenders on land 2.40 p.m. yesterday, inward. patriots, not by its defenders on land and sea, not by the people at large, but by some half-dozen miserable politicians. By men, possessed of authority and influence to which they have no right, who have as much con-cern for the war and its result as if they were on another planet, who have no concern for anything except their own petty ambitions and the re-tention of their seats in a Governtention of their seats in a Governtention of their seats in a Govern-ment which they disgrace. Happily, this is not a description of the Gov-ernment as a whole. There are a few Men among it, who know their duty and are not afraid to do it. But they are not allowed to do it; they are in a minority, outnumbered and outworld Save minority, outnumbered and outvoted by the rest, the pro-Germans. We know who they are and we know the others. Let both come out and deothers. Let both come out and de-clare themselves openly, or we shall do it for them. The country has had enough of drifting, of temporising, of shilly-shallying, of the manoeuvres of these persons, whose very attitude towards this great question is a gross insult to those whom they profess to represent. The country has made up its mind on the matter. It may be unfortunately necessary that we should have a Government, but that is no reason, and will not be allowed as a reason, why we should lose our Regiment. By eating


