

It is reported that the Bolsheviks are massing troops there and their numbers have more than doubled since the beginning of the war. Vice-Regal Visit.

Quite an honour was paid the I. C. Morris sailworks yesterday afternoon, when His Excellency the Governor called in and spent an hour with the proprietor and his staff. His Excellency has a keen eye for marine architecture and shipping, and he was greatly interested in the process of making sails, etc. He examined the different grades of hand work, and also the machine work, and did a little practical work himself by stretching a cringle in a large foresail, and by sewing two stitches in a five hundred yard mainsail, which is being made for Mr. Greenland's schooner Nevis, which sails in a day or two for the West Indies.

His Excellency congratulated the proprietor upon the system of his plant, and made a very complimentary entry of his visit in the Day Book at the office. He also shook hands with every man and lad present; and left amid the hearty cheers of the entire staff. A noteworthy feature of the visit was that the Governor used the nalm and needle of the veteran sailmaker of Newfoundland, if not of America, in the person of our respected citizen, Mr. John McGuire. He also was interested to meet the youngest journeyman sailmaker, in the person of Mr. Hugh Francis, who is still within his teens, but who has served a faithful apprenticeship, and is an excellent workman. Before the Governor left he addressed the staff and expressed his great pleasure at having an opportunity of meeting with the representatives of such an old and useful business as that of sailmaking, and he also expressed his thanks for the hearty reception accorded him, and made special reference to the strenuous conditions of trade during the war, and what an important part sailing ships had played in the commerce of that period.

No King of Prussia has ever lost his throne or been driven into exile before; and no war has ever brought misfortune on so many rulers or led to so many states being set up.


