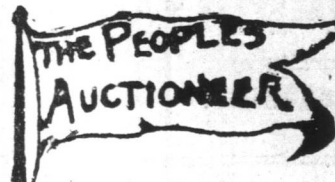

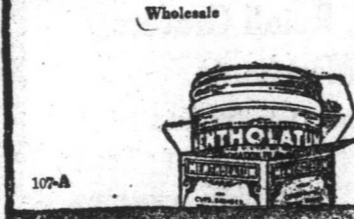

Does Another Mutiny Threaten?

Bolshevik Propaganda Causing Unrest In India--Military Forces Inadequate to Cope With any Uprising--Gompers Favors Treaty Ratification--Karl Trimborn is New German Premier--Hardings Nomination May Mean Democratic President.

UPRISING IN INDIA FEARED.

LONDON, June 14. Alarming confidential reports of an intended uprising in India in the autumn are reaching the Government, according to the Star to-day, which says that Bolshevik literature is known to be behind the movement. The India Office, when questioned with regard to the Star reports, declared that it had received no such information. However, the Star makes flat assertion and displays the news sensation. It is considered by the authorities at home, the Star says, "to be more than probable that the organization in Turkestan of a Red force to attack Persia and Afghanistan, is but part of a big plot, by which it is hoped to end our power in India. The opinion is expressed that should the whole Bolshevik plot mature, our present forces in India would be insufficient to cope with the uprising."

GOMPERS FOR RATIFICATION.

MONTREAL, June 14. "It is pitiable" that the United States has not yet ratified the League of Nations, President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, declared here to-day in an address before the Convention of the Federation. He said if the covenant was submitted to the American people "without any other entangling questions, it would be overwhelmingly accepted." "It is pitiable" that the United States has not ratified the League of Nations," said Gompers, "but has forgotten the effort of the nations of the world over to prevent another horrible conflict, such as was started about six years ago." "The Labor Party of the Convention," he added, would "help in the re-union of the working people of the world and would help workers in the most backward countries." Gompers made a strong appeal to the Convention to support the League and "lend a helping hand to the toilers of smaller nations, and aid them to take their place among the civilization of the world."

CANADIAN-EAST INDIAN LINE.

MONTREAL, June 14. A direct line of steamers from Canada to ports in the Red Sea, East Indies, Straits Settlements and Java, to be known as the Ellerman-Bucknall-Canada-India-Java Service, was announced by the New Zealand Shipping Company, Ltd., who have been appointed Montreal agents of the line.

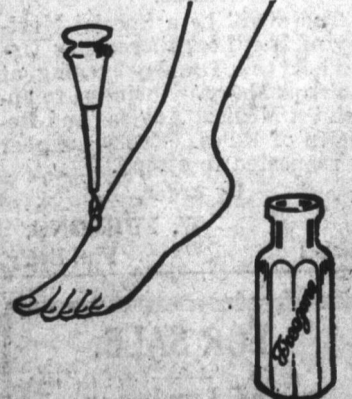

Legislative Council.

MONDAY, June 14.

The House opened at 4.30 p.m. The Bill respecting Certificates of Masters and Mates passed the third reading.

The Bill to regulate the Exportation of Salt Codfish, deferred from Friday's session, was in committee again. Hon. Mr. McNamara was the first speaker, who said although he was not a fish exporter yet he was deeply interested in the industry. He opposed the regulations and in criticizing them said that the results of last year's regulations were that he had 180,000 qtls. of fish in the country and 150,000 in foreign markets still unsold, estimating the loss at the conservative figure of \$6.00 per qtl., it left us out to the tune of nearly \$2,000,000. He did not mean, however, that this loss was all due to the regulations. Exporters were held up while our competitors were selling. In consequence of the regulations nearly all our journeymen coopers are out of employment, because of no demand for fish packages, and also the manufacturers of coopers' material were badly affected. Fishermen are now obliged to traverse Water Street with "yamies" under their arms, begging for purchasers. It is then under these conditions that we are asked to support the Bill. He did not oppose the regulations for the Standardization, cull, etc., of codfish, but, said the hon. speaker, "you cannot satisfactorily control the price of food products by legislation." He quoted Sir Ambrose Shea, who had said, "that the less legislation about fish marketing the better." To fix a price for our staple commodity was should first be sure that we can corner the market, or that we are the only producers of that commodity. Mr. Munn's letter in Saturday's Trade Review was read in part.

Hon. Mr. Gibbs took up the discussion next and for over an hour pointed out all the advantages the Bill would have, and also dealt with the objections to the measure which previous speakers had voiced. During the course of the argument Mr. Gibbs stated that as regards competition, he did not think that the Nova Scotians or Norwegians could catch fish any cheaper than Newfoundlanders. In fact they were higher priced men.

Here Hon. D. A. Ryan interjected and said Norwegian fishermen could be engaged at much cheaper wages and that we were now faced with greater competition than in many years.

Hon. Mr. Gibbs, continuing, said that when the regulations were promulgated last year he had consulted with the late Hon. A. F. Goodridge, who fully agreed with them.

Hon. Mr. Grieve:—That's a different story from what he told me.

Hon. Mr. Gibbs:—That might have been months after I consulted with

him. In any case England was most prosperous when prices were controlled by regulations, and why not it apply here.

Hon. Mr. Grieve:—Not export prices. Hon. Mr. Bishop replied to some questions asked by Sir P. T. McGrath at the previous session, and gave the history of the Consorzio, and how it became necessary to fight it. He explained the action of the Board of Trade and the fish exporters, and also showed how Hawes had saved \$100,000 for one shipper.

Hon. P. Templeman spoke on the regulations, and voiced a protest against having to sell through one man. In referring to the shortage turnout on the other side, he produced for the information of the House one of the scales used.

Hon. Mr. McGrath acknowledged the amount of information given him by the previous speakers for the Bill, but he noted that the Hon. R. K. Bishop, in replying to his questions, did not answer the—to his mind—

most important one, namely, Have our competitors any machinery like our regulations, in operation? The question could not then be answered. Several other questions put by Sir Patrick did not bring satisfactory replies, the speaker remarking that the more questions asked the more complicated the matter becomes. He thought that the clauses introduced in the Bill at the insistence of the Opposition in the Lower House were the ones that the Hon. Mr. Gibbs placed most emphasis on. He opposed the measure and asked Hon. Mr. Grieve not to then press his motion for a six months' hoist. The committee rose at 6.30 to sit again this evening. The rest of the order paper was deferred. The House adjourned till 4 p.m. to-day.

Fighting The Taxpayers.

If a Government were determined on self-destruction, they could not accomplish it more readily than by legislation such as has been introduced and is in contemplation. First there is the Fish Export Regulations and Standardization of Fish legislation, the control being vested in a Board which has been given absolute and arbitrary powers, such as should alone belong to the Legislative Assembly. Those Regulations do much to bring about present chaotic conditions and the congestion of the European markets which caused a drop locally in fish from a rate of \$12 to the present prices. We have been informed that dry codfish is unsaleable in the city to-day, and the few transactions, of the nature of a sale, which have taken place during the past month, found fishermen compelled to dispose of their holdings of last year's product at any price offered. (It is said that some were obliged to accept as low as \$2.50 per quintal.) It was a proclamation of the Honourable W. F. Coaker, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, on many occasions that "the price of fish is what he makes it." This declaration was shouted from the hill-tops when fish prices ruled at from twelve to fifteen dollars per quintal. But the megaphone is silent now. Still if the Minister of Marine and Fisheries is strong and influential enough to disregard and set at naught the law of supply and demand, why does he not now exercise that power which he once claimed to possess and bring the price of fish back to ten and twelve dollars per quintal. Union followers were assured that the return to power of the Liberal Reform Party

would mean twelve dollar fish, and it is now up to the Union Leader to redeem that promise or write himself down a political opportunist.

The political measure of the leader of the Union Party has been taken by the country, but unfortunately too late to restore conditions. The gamble which has been made with the resources of the dominion has been a dangerous one, and those who threw the dice will have to shoulder the responsibility. The advice offered by men of experience was studiously refused. These men had spent a life time in the export trade of the dominion and had trade connections with every country in which our fishery products found purchasers. But the Union leader felt himself big enough and competent enough to throw their advice to the winds, and upon his own initiative to inaugurate a system at once despotic and destructive. As a result of this misguided policy the fishermen to-day are the first losers. Is it any wonder then that thousands of the virile young men of Newfoundland are emigrating to Canada and the United States? Is it any surprise that the prices of fish have dropped lower than at any period in our history? And the end is not yet. This dominion that flourished under the late Government and enjoyed a ten-year period of prosperity from the reaping of a rich and abundant harvest of the sea is now suffering from the blight of maladministration and its sons are being driven from the land of their birth to help build up the neighboring provinces of Canada, or to become citizens of a foreign land.

The progress and prosperity of the past decade seems to have been swept away in the past six months of Liberal Reform rule, and the question may well be asked, what will be the condition if the present agglomeration be permitted to control the destinies of the country for another three and one half years? The bare thought is productive of a shudder, for if such a future as faces Newfoundland at present is the result of six months' misrule what will the outlook be at the end of forty-two months more? The Public Treasury has been swooped down upon by the Government with one set purpose, and the position is perilous in the extreme. Notwithstanding, that does not prevent honorable members from enriching themselves out of the public funds in a manner which has amazed and astonished the whole population. The increase in sessional allowances to members alone

is in the vicinity of THIRTY THOUSAND DOLLARS. Ministers, too, are well looked after for in addition to their sessional pay they scoop in a salary of FOUR THOUSAND DOLLARS per annum. To a Minister holding dual portfolios this means EIGHT THOUSAND DOLLARS of the people's money to one man. In addition there are commissions fees and patronage sums to all heads of departments and to certain government members. Executive members without portfolios will also be well looked after in the way of perquisites and pay. The people as aforesaid have awakened too late to the flaying which they are receiving. They may have to go hungry and naked. In any case they will be taxed to the very utmost to meet the increased expenditures on salary and other accounts. With all this—prices still soar and many necessities are beyond the reach of the average earner. Hardships and privations must necessarily ensue. Meanwhile the Liberal-Reform Government goes merrily on its way and jauntily increases the salaries of its supporters, heedless of other and more legitimate demands. A carnival of extravagance has been inaugurated, but—there is a limit to the endurance of an exasperated people and the time must shortly arrive when demos will arise and cry—HALT!

A big quantity of lumber is arriving in the city by rail and water now. A train load from Spruce Brook, West Coast, has arrived for Mr. B. Bowering, contractor, while several vessels have also put in. Mr. Bowering is expecting very much more to arrive soon.

Green Bay Conditions.

Fish and oil Inspector Coyall, who arrived in the city on Monday, made what might be styled a record trip from Green Bay, which place he left on Sunday morning in a motor boat for Lewisport, where he made connection by train arriving here Monday at 1.30 p.m. Inspector Coyall reports that when he left Green Bay, not a sign of ice was about. In the district there is a lot of 8,000 barrels No. 1 Scotch Cure herring, selected from some 11,000 packages. These herring are of the finest quality and would command \$25.00 per barrel at New York, as they are large and full. There is also in the district some 4,000 barrels split herring of good quality. During the latter part of last month six men were tried, convicted, and fined at Little Bay for breaches of the Herring Fishery Regulations. Herring packers are beginning to pay more attention to their pack, as they find that only a No. 1 article will bring any buyers. Prohibition in the U.S.A. has been somewhat responsible for the loss of our herring trade, as before the restrictions these fish found a ready sale to the Free Lunch counter people.

Side Talks by Ruth Cameron

A BUREAU OF INFORMATION.

Do you use the public library? I do not mean simply as a place to get the latest novels and magazines, but as a bureau of help and information? In one of the recent magazines, there is a most interesting article on a former city dweller's successful experience in cutting the cost of living by getting an acre within easy commuting distance of his business, and supplementing his income by raising his own fruit, vegetables, chickens, etc. One day a "arm of bees clustered on one of his bushes, whereupon with the help of neighbors he lived them and two years later had three swarms of bees and a season's yield of 48 pounds of honey.

The whole article was most worthwhile, but one thing that particularly interested me was this sentence in regard to his work with the bees: "Books on bee culture from the library have helped, as well as visits to the stores where bee supplies were sold."

Now, how many people there are who never have thought of making that practical use of the library.

The Man Who Knows About Bees.

They would have asked their neighbors who had some casual knowledge of bees, but they would not have thought to go to the library and ask the man who knew enough about the subject to write books on it.

Any one who has learned to use the nearest library as a sort of consulting bureau has taken a long step in intelligent self-help.

I always had a great admiration for an elderly aunt of mine who, when she was troubled with a visitation of "crimson ramblers," went to the library, read up on their habits in the encyclopedia, and thereby located the source of the pest in the moulding and got rid of moulding and pest simultaneously.

Ways One Library Has Helped.

One of the officials of the New York Public Library, who wants to encourage the use of the library for everyday practical matters as well as for increasing general culture, has made public an interesting collection of ways the library has helped. Here are two interesting ones: A poultryman who came to the library to get novels for his wife,

found to his surprise that there were practical books on hens. He enlarged his place and rebuilt his henhouses according to the expert's advice, and reports that he has trebled his business.

How He Found His Men.

A manufacturer sought information as to where he could get skilled workers. He was shown a Massachusetts report on statistics of manufactures and was able to find his men through it.

Many questions which are asked me, would not be asked if the inquirers knew how to use their library. I do not mean to imply that I am not willing to answer. Far from it. Only it is in the nature of things that you can find fuller information in a book, and get it more quickly.

Sometimes the library will not contain the book you want, but if it is a book of information of general interest, the librarian will usually be glad to buy it. Give him a chance.

Some say that the attitude of the public in buying only what is strictly necessary has much to do with a falling off in prices recently.

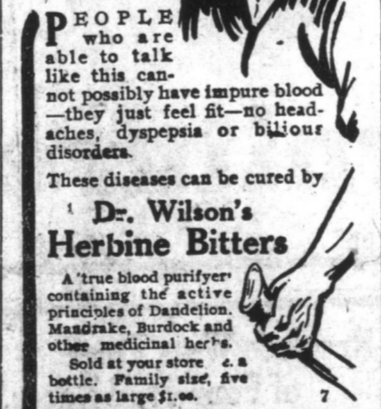

A DEMAND.

LONDON, June 14. The Russian Soviet Government has asked Finland to agree to an immediate armistice, according to information received here to-day.

BATTLE STILL CONTINUES.

WARSAW, June 14. Polish troops, which were withdrawing from Kiev, now occupy a line running from the lower Priprut River through Malina and Jitomir to Beerdithof. The battle is continuing.

RAILWAY RATES TO ADVANCE.

LONDON, June 4. In the House of Commons to-day, the Minister of Transport stated that further increase in railway charges could not be avoided.

NO AID GIVEN.

LONDON, June 14. The First Lord of the Admiralty, Hon. Walter Long, stated in the House of Commons to-day that the British commanders in the Black Sea had been instructed not to assist either the offensive or defensive operations. The Prime Minister again denied that the British had assisted General Wrangel's attack.

AN AUTUMN SESSION.

LONDON, June 14. Hon. Bonar Law announced in the House of Commons to-day that an autumn session of Parliament was inevitable. The House would adjourn he said, at the end of July. The Commons to-day further considered the Home Rule Bill, but no particulars developed.

WAR ON RATS.

NEW YORK, June 14. Extermination of rats, about the piers in New York, as a measure of prevention against Bubonic Plague, which has broken out in Vera Cruz, will be sought by health officials. Dr. Frank Monaghan, Acting Health Commissioner, made public this announcement to-day. Dr. Monaghan said he would confer with shipping interests to-morrow to urge that measures be taken to get rid of rats and clean up wharves.

DETERMINED.

DUBLIN, June 14. The railwaymen refuse to abandon their strike, although advised to do so by the National Union of Railwaymen. The strike was an outcome of the men's refusal to handle munition trains.

NO DECISION ON NAVAL POLICY.

OTTAWA, June 14. Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, Minister of Naval Service, in the House to-day, made his awaited statement on the Canadian naval policy. He intimated in this, practically repeating his statement of some weeks ago, that no decision of a permanent naval policy be reached till after the next Imperial Conference in 1921, but supplementary estimates were to be brought down this session for two millions and a quarter dollars. He gave details of a cruiser, two destroyers and two subs, which are a gift to Canada of the Imperial Government and in passing, cited an important, and hitherto unpublished memorandum presented by overseas Premiers to the British Admiralty.

BILL WILL PASS.

LONDON, June 15. Governmental determination to pass the Irish Home Rule Bill was expressed in a long, emphatic statement to the Commons when the discussion of the Bill in committee stage was resumed by the House yesterday. The members were warned "that any supposition of an intention to abandon the measure is quite illusory." Some observations were made during the consideration of an amendment to the measure, moved by Sir Edward Carson, and designed to omit a section of the Bill giving control of Irish railways to Irish Council.

MURDER CONSPIRACY.

LONDON, June 15. An Anarchist conspiracy against the Soviet Government reported from Moscow, says an Exchange Telegraph despatch from Berlin, dated Sunday. The plan was to murder Premier Lenin and Bucharin, President of the State Interparliament, during the May Day celebrations. This plan, however, was a failure and the date of the murder was set for June 21, according to an account received in Berlin. Under the second plan it is declared Finance Commissary Krestinsky and others of the Bolshevik Commissaries, including M. Zinovieff, also were to be killed. British officials are unable to confirm or deny the report of a conspiracy against the Bolshevik Government.

STILL FURTHER REDUCTION.

BERLIN, June 15. Germany has requested the Supreme Council to grant a further delay of three months for the reduction of the German army to 100,000, says the Tageblatt. It was recently announced

that the reduction of the German army to 200,000 had been accomplished.

TO HELP IRELAND.

MONTREAL, June 15. The "Self-determination for Ireland League of Canada" is the name of a new organization formed in Montreal for the purpose of setting in motion a programme outlined by the President of the so-called Irish Republic, Eamon DeValera, at Plattsburg, N.Y., recently. Two executives have been appointed to carry out the work of the League, prior to the Irish race convention in Toronto at exhibition time.

WILL EVACUATE BATUM.

LONDON, June 15. The British are about to evacuate the Black Sea port of Batum, according to the Daily Mail, which says the 2,000 soldiers there are to be removed to Constantinople, on British warships, within a fortnight.

Woman's Rights in China

A paternal government in the province of Hupeh, China, is endeavoring by official action to bring the women to order and reason in the matter of clothes. "Women and girls are not permitted to wear extraordinary clothes," runs the official order which the police have been instructed to enforce. "The women's dresses, which were generally adopted by the Chinese sex previous to the first revolution in 1911, are better suited to young women because they are not too short or too narrow and they should be used again." The official order gives further particulars of the abuses which it alleges have taken place by which, in the matter of clothes, it is not possible to distinguish the Chinese women of "respectable and good families from those who are not." But the significance of this solicitude on the part of the military governor of Hupeh is found in the part of the order which states that the importance of bearing and clothes is to be recognized, "in view of the fact that women are playing an important part in modern politics in western countries, and there is sufficient reason to believe that this awakening of the gentle sex will soon be extended to the Far East."

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NOTES OF TRAVEL:

And Reminiscences of a Pleasant Tour.

L. C. MORRIS,
CHAPTER XVI.
AT CHICAGO.

The very name of Chicago seems to remind one of enterprise and industry, because it is always spoken of as a go-ahead city. Such were our ideas as we entered it, and such were our ideas as we left it. While there we were shown a square, which is claimed to be the busiest spot in the world at certain hours of the day. It is the square at the corner of Madison and State Streets. We said to the person who called our attention to the spot, that we always understood, that the busiest spot in the world was somewhere about London Bridge, or at New York, or at Alexandria, or Cairo in Egypt; but our informant maintained that he was right, and stated that it was agreed by recognized authorities, that this particular square, in the city of Chicago, from 3 p.m. to 5, was the busiest spot in the world. This claim being maintained, we took particular notice of the place, and found some things which corroborated the assertion. The street presented a busy scene, and the policemen at the crossing were having a very strenuous time of it. The taxis were speeding along in every direction, and so great is the number which pass in

the afternoon, that it is not permissible to pack or stall them in the street any longer than is necessary for the occupants to get out—at most, only three or four minutes are allowed. So great is the traffic at this particular place and time, that it is only by strict adherence to the rules that the highway is kept clear. The place does not permit of delays; as for loiterers, or idlers, they would be swept off their feet—such a place has no room for, nor has it any mercy, upon such people.

Like all large cities, Chicago has its tall buildings, and fine architecture; but we were a little disappointed in some of the streets, they are quite narrow enough; and considering that the city is a comparatively new one, we had expected to find all the streets wider than they are. But streets in big cities are much wider than they look; it is the high buildings which lend the appearance of narrowness; hence it is, that streets, which, when laid out, looked wide and spacious, appear narrow when tall buildings are erected upon them. At the same time some of the streets of Chicago are none too wide. The

site of the city is near Lake Michigan, and the drive-way along the waterfront is one of the finest, and most beautiful of the many which we saw. It is wide and well built, and runs for miles along the great lake, and is daily frequented by tens of thousands of people. Such a drive-way is worth millions of money to a city like Chicago, and whoever laid it out and reserved the site, have done great service to posterity. Had the same precaution been taken with the streets of the modern city, the congestion which now hampers the public, could have been averted; but unfortunately, congestion is the bane of many cities,

and until some very direct and drastic reform is adopted in this matter, the evils of such conditions must continue. At every point in all our tour we saw notices posted, in reference to the health of the people, and in every case a strong appeal is made for a universal combat with tuberculosis. At hotels, and theatres, and in parks, and at railway stations, and in schools and halls, this great challenge stands out, and as far as can be done the public are co-operating. This is very commendable, but much of it we fear is in vain.

It is an old saying that "prevention is better than cure," and in this truth lies the remedy for tuberculosis. But until prevention is possible, the cure cannot overtake the disease; because as fast as one case is cured or stamped out, others are germinating, and one of the hot-beds of the germ is the congested condition of city life. While people live in old buildings, which at their best were never sanitary, and which must ever be detrimental to health, it is useless to think that certain diseases will be stamped out. They cannot be. The fresh air which is necessary to all animal and physical life, is contaminated in such dwellings, as are seen in the older cities, and while these buildings continue to be occupied, and crowded, and over-crowded, the deadly procession of the disease must go on, and in its course, cut down its victims. This is how the situation appealed to me, and I made a careful study of it; and if the vast number of gaunt faces, and sunken eyes, and pallid cheeks, which I saw are an index of the health and vitality of the city people, then the situation is ghastly as well as lamentable. Ten times ten thousand houses in the big cities are occupied, which should long ago have been demolished. Hundreds of narrow streets are crowded, which a generation ago, should have been widened. Thus the game goes on, and thus the great, and at the same time, beautiful cities, are generating diseases, and destroying the people.

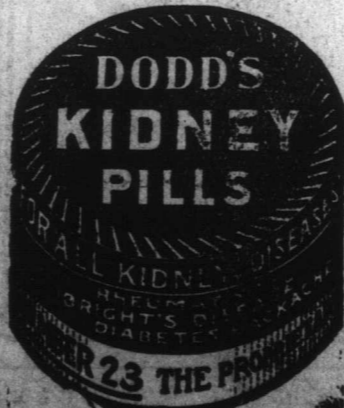

Fifteen million pairs of silk stockings made from wood pulp were exported from the United States last year to compete with the product of the Oriental silkworm.

The process by which trees become silk stockings is a comparatively simple one.

Wood pulp is treated with caustic soda to form a sodium; this is dissolved in carbon disulphide. After being filtered and allowed to ripen by standing, the product is forced through tubes into a liquid which solidifies the threads. When completed, the threads are similar in appearance to the fibre produced by the silkworm.

The artificial product is said by experts to be more lustrous than natural silk.

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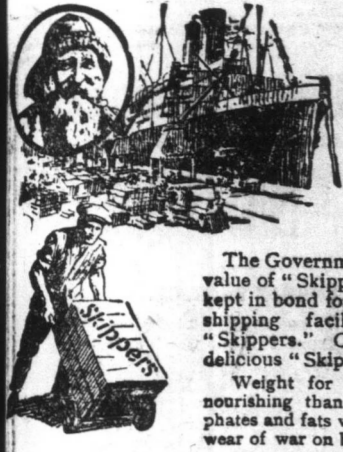

Capt. Lanning Replies To Doctor Grenfell.

Evening Telegram.

Sir:—I very much regret I did not see Doctor Grenfell's reply to my letter of March 3rd until to-day, when I received a copy by way of the States. If you will pardon the lateness of the hour in which I am replying, the question of Doctor Grenfell's medical and missionary activities on Labrador, I shall be much obliged with the favour of your space for a second letter. Doctor Grenfell regards I am either unacquainted with the facts or intentionally misrepresenting his work. I am not guilty on either charge. I know Newfoundland and that of Labrador as well as the Doctor, and have an added advantage of being born on the North coast and spent nearly twenty years watching the waves around the shores. I have no prejudice against Doctor Grenfell or anyone associated with him or his work, and I have always been ready to be an opponent of the methods he employs (or of the methods he has been permitted to employ) during his lecture tours in various efforts to raise subscriptions for his ambitions and enterprises. I have been a member of Doctor Grenfell's audiences both in Canadian and American cities and I know whereof I speak. The main gist of my criticism of the March 3rd letter was that Newfoundland has lost prestige as an independent and self-governing country, and her people, both at home and abroad, have been humiliated in the minds of the outside world through the medium of Doctor Grenfell's lectures, and this contention I repeat with—as much emphasis as before—and to this end I am quite willing to accept his challenge and debate the problem with him, when an opportunity offers in an open forum, either in St. John's or any other city on the American continent. The mere fact that his work receives the support and encouragement of well-educated Americans, or people from Europe, is to my mind an argument to the contrary. As well might the learned Doctor claim that the atrocities of German Militarism during the war were justified, because they were condoned and encouraged by the master minds and best educated men within the German Empire; or that the continuance of the Drink Traffic in Great Britain is justified because it is supported and encouraged by a large number of statesmen and Judges, and the majority of her Bishops and Clergy. Doctor Grenfell, like most of the people who hail from the European side of the Atlantic, succumbs to the inherited idea that every move or purpose sanctioned by the holders of empty imperial titles, stands above dispute and criticism. The idea is as fallacious as it is insulting to an intelligent and reasoning mind, for while a move-

might be philanthropic and endowed with many blessings and at the same time be sanctioned by a Lord, an Honourable or even a Sir, there is absolutely no reason why it could not possess the same merits without such sanction.

Doctor Grenfell says: "Newfoundland as a whole, was never a drunken country, and no one ever accused her of it." In this statement the Doctor errs deliberately or his memory fails, as I have heard from his own lips in the crowded auditorium of Convocation Hall, Toronto University, and elsewhere, the most deplorable comments on the drunkenness of Newfoundland in general and of St. John's in particular, during his campaign to raise funds for the Seamen's Institute, which he purposed having dedicated to his memory in that city.

The idea forced itself very much home to me during the war, and my life overseas in England and Scotland, where I have seen more drunkenness and demoralization in one street length of an industrial centre than anywhere else in the world. During the year 1917 the Association of Brewers in Great Britain made fifty million pounds sterling in excess profits, and there was scarcely a single day in that year when the casualty list did not score a thousand. In that year, too, the submarine menace was at its zenith, and the loss of ships was making conditions very serious in England, yet the demand of the Brewers was such as to control the entire carrying capacity of one million tons of shipping, the monopoly of one million tons of coal, and the consumption of two hundred million tons of sugar rations. One sees then that if charity began at home Doctor Grenfell would not be in Newfoundland to-day and whereas in the scattered and isolated sections of Labrador he ministers to a few thousand, if he were anywhere in the

British Isles he could do good to millions.

Somewhere among the injunctions of the Scriptures there is a command: "Let not thy right hand know what thy left hand doeth," which does not fit in logically with Doctor Grenfell's work on Labrador. Along the British Columbia coast line, between Vancouver and Alaska, a similar work to Doctor Grenfell's is being carried on by a Rev. Antle from Twillingate, Newfoundland. One has to travel along that coast line to appreciate the wonderful work Rev. Antle and his staff have done and are still doing. He has established hospitals, missions and mission schools by the dozen among the Indian settlements north of Prince Rupert, and outside of the immediate field of his endeavours, one never hears of the man or his work. There are no expensive lecture tours of the large cities of the world, no cringing appeals to charity for pennies and old clothes, and above all, no system of self-advertising that is in any way offensive or discouraging to the pride and dignity of B. C. as a Province. The contrast is one I have often studied, especially when one finds everywhere he travels that Doctor Grenfell is widely known and accepted as a self-sacrificing hero and great philanthropist to the cause of Newfoundland and her people. I am by no means persuaded that the learned Doctor is half as anxious to be freed from the lecture platform as his statements would lead one to suppose; as well might ex-premier Asquith of Great Britain express to me his desire to quit parliamentary life and as readily would I believe him. Both gentlemen are born to the lecture platform, and to public eye—the only difference lies in the methods each employs to achieve the same object.

Doctor Grenfell says: "If Captain Lanning's love for his country should be the means of guaranteeing \$70,000 a year to carry on Hospital work on Labrador, we will put up a statue to his memory." In answer I say that Captain Lanning's love for his country was one of the influences which caused him to throw over hard-won professional interests in Canada and join in the maelstrom of the war, the means whereby he lost four of the best and most productive years of life, in the course of which, like thousands of others of his countrymen, he gladly would have given the rest if the call had come; but it is by no means strong enough to compel him to go abroad into the world and by grossly distorting the national life and needs of his country beg for aims, nor will it permit him to stand silently by while others are guilty of a similar offense. I can assure the learned Doctor, too, that Captain Lanning is not in the least envious of statues or titles. Statues to the dead in some cases are well merited and desirable—the dead can neither resist nor help the affliction anyway—but titles to the living are nowadays a joke and an abomination. A few of these inflictions have come to Newfoundland and others have come to Newfoundland and others who saw the tragedy in all its sinister phases, they have completely lost colour, and one can be forgiven if he has learned to look with contempt upon them. In my letter of March 3 I did not suggest the closing down of Hospital work on Labrador, nor did I for one moment dispute the fact that Doctor Grenfell has done much good. What I really suggested, and what I continue very strongly to suggest, is the closing down of Doctor Grenfell's lecture campaign abroad to collect pennies and old clothes for his Mission and Hospital work. Newfoundland has too long occupied a place side by side with Armenia as a begging country, and I advise that the Newfoundland Government finance Doctor Grenfell for his Hospital work to the extent of his liabilities. A country who financed her war obligations as did Newfoundland, equipping and maintaining an army in the field, and attaining for herself a place among the Empire's Dominions, should be able to take on an additional taxation of \$70,000 to provide Hospital attention to the people of La-

brador if such an expenditure is necessary.

So far as Doctor Grenfell is concerned, I shall feel much more inclined to believe in the sincerity of his work and efforts when he spends his own money for his Hospitals and Missions, when he finances his own lecture tours abroad, and when he ceases to advertise himself and win notoriety at the expense of charitably disposed admirers, and the pride and dignity of the Dominion of Newfoundland.
