





Expert Tells How to Protect Garden Plants From Cold.

Readville, Mass., Sept. 18. (A.P.)-Put a damp, warm air jacket on your garden plants if you want to protect them from frost this autumn. That is the advice of Alexander McAdie. director of the Blue Hill Observator who speaks as one with authority of the subject because of his success aiding grange growers in Californ to keep their crops from freezing.

"Your grandmother brobably loved flowers and took good care of them," said Director McAdle, who also is professor of meteorology at Harvard. She had the right idea, when the crisp early fall nights came round. of protecting the flowers from frost by wrapping newspapers around them parefully pinning the paper so tha there would be no gaps and wide-oper places. In this way her plants would keep their blooms until October.



Anthracite.

Despite the fault that anthracite coal wage controversies so often occupy much frontpage space in newspapers there is a considerable number of persons who do not know that this fuel is found in a comparatively small part of Pennsylvania. No commercially worth while amount of anthracite is found in any other part of the United States. It is confined to nine countles in an area of about 496 square miles in the northeastern quarter of the state. Five of the nine counties yield more than ninety per cent. of the annual production. The coal is found at all depths ranging from outcroppings on the surface to about 1400 feet underground. It is found under cities, rivers and other streams. There is no strictly Bituminous coal is found in central and western Pennsylvania in more than a score of counties. There are more than 300 anthracite collieries, employing approximately 155.000 men and boys. Of these about 40.000 are skilled miners who blast the coal. These men hold certificates obtained after two years experience in the hard coal mines under the mining laws of the state.

Of the oceans, the Atlantic has been more thoroughly surveyed than any other.

Probably not one in a thousand persons who traverse the Atlantic knows that at various stages of the trip liners actually sail over mountains. Fewer still realize that in some stances the peaks of these mountains are almost uncomfortably close to the surface.

The biggest of these submarine mountains is known to science as Mt. Laura Ethel. It lies roughly midway between Liverpool and New York, and is at least 12,000 feet in height, its summit being less than one hundred feet from the surface.

Another mountain, Placentia, in the South Atlantic, is almost an island, for its peak is less than twenty feet from the surface!

The Faraday Hills, in the North

tlantic, have been the subject of much exploration by means of soundings. Recent investigations show that the currents have deposited at the base of the biggest of the group the wreckage of over five thousand vessels of all kinds.

It seems, therefore, that the dis-inction of being the real "Davy Jones's Locker" can with good reason be ascribed, as it has been, to this serie under-sea locality.



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
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
