It was not at all that they had not colleagues able to fill a Cabinet, and whom their companions would have followed with confidence; but they had all agreed cheerfully to the proposition that Mr Mowat, from the high position he had formerly taken in Parliament, from his eminent personal and political integrity from one end of the country to the other, was the fit man, if he could be obtained, to lead the Reform party of Ontario. November Fair.

We scarcely ever recollect a November Fair so remarkable at one and the same time for extreme dulness of prices and exceeding impoverished condition of eattle offered for sale. In the latter respective the unexampled drought of the preceding season has played a most important part, and the consequence we see to-day in the learness of the cattle and the large numbers in which they are offered for sale. Very much the same state of things exist throughout all the feeding districts in the Province, and on principal Provincial markets are there've glutted with an inferior description: of bedf. Buyers were to-day very, say in their purchases, the condition of the cattle forbidding anything like sale by weight. Buyers did not calculate to give more than from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per hundred pounds. A few transactions were effected by farmers anxious to fill vacant stalls in their feeding stables, but such cases were exceptionally few, feed being in far too limited supply on most farms to carry the ordinary quantity of stock through the winter. We should imagine, in spite of this threatened famine, most of the stock on the ground to-day will require to return to their old quarters for another month, unless meanwhile disposed of. The date of the Ciristmas Fat Catit Show has not yet been fixed, but will likely be so in in the course of the ensuing week.
