"The government is well disposed toward the miners, and I have no doubt that it will take into consideration their representations when properly made.

"There is no doubt in my mind that the royalty will be reduced by one-half for the present, and that as soon as legislation will permit, something better will be granted. The government will establish an assay office in Dawson and buy all the gold at its full value. The miners will save thereby 6 or 7 per cent. on the actual value of their gold."

Judge Dugas went on to say that very soon the royalty would be abolished entirely. When the assay office is established the government will prohibit the use of gold dust as a circulating medium, he says, and buy it from the miners direct at a discount of 5 per cent. from its assay value, and place a high export duty upon it to hold it in Canada. This, he says, will allow a sufficient amount to carry on the expenses, and where the miner is now losing 16 to 17 per cent. on his gold, he will hereafter lose but 5. Segregating the 16 or 17 per cent. 10 per cent, is royalty and the 6 or 7 is actual loss by selling the gold to the Dawson banks for \$15 and ounce.

Boers Crossing Into Portuguese Territory to Escape British Patrols.

Lorenzo Marques, Sept. 24.—British patrols have reached the Portuguese frontier. Boers continue to cross about and below the portion held by the British. The horses of the Boers are in a terrible condition.

Mr. J. H. Merriman, who was colonial treasurer in the Schreiner ministry, declared in an impassioned speech that annexation would result in England losing South Africa, and in even worse things, for South Africa would lose England. Several opposition speakers condemned the premier's references to Mr. Kruger.

London, Sept. 25.—"Messra. Steyn and Reitz," says a despatch to the Daily Mail from Lorenzo Marques, "will remain with the fighting burghers, and it is estimated that a force of Boers aggregating from 7,000 to 12,000 is planning to harass the British lines of communication."
