Educational Report.

This report is always an interesting one...

The Alliance states that there was a perceptible diminution in regularity of attendance...

The total registration showed a slight increase, the figures being 105,331 as compared with 105,137 in 1887.

The increase of school sessions was 16, increase of schools in operation, winter, summer, 45, decrease in registered pupils, winter 1731, summer 149; increase in total number different pupils, 94; in total number of teachers and assistants, 10; in total number of schools in operation, 23, but increase in number of 43.

The government expenditure on common schools for the winter term was \$25,000.81, and for the summer term \$25,000.00, a decrease of \$312.46 for winter term, and \$147.01 for summer.

For county and municipal the expenditure was \$13,306.67, an increase of \$613.34 over the previous year. The total government and public expenditure for education was \$38,307.48, as compared with \$37,348.21 in '87, an increase of \$959.27.

Only 61 sections were without schools out of the total of 1890 sections. By the number of Annapolis Co. is represented by 6. Annapolis fell a little below the provincial average of some, which is 1 in 4.1, her average being 1 in 4.2. She stands higher than some of the other counties however.

The average salary for male teachers of the first class throughout the province was \$437.74, and for female teachers \$298.11. It gives us pleasure to note that Annapolis Co. is above the provincial average in remunerating its first-class teachers.

For female teachers it stands third on the list of the highest averages in the province. The superintendent says in connection with salaries:

"In most of the grades there have been slight reductions in the average rate of salary. As the expenditure on education has continued to increase, it is becoming clear to every one who is thoughtful on the subject that the most effective way to improve the remuneration of teachers lies in the surrounding their work with the prospect of advancement. An elevation of the standard of admission in the direction of a specific professional training would benefit no one interested so much as the teaching body itself. Until a clear elevation of supply and demand is brought about, recommendations on the subject of salaries, whether given to employers or employed, can produce but little effect."

Total number of candidates examined in '88 was 1221, and in '89 1488. Received class applied for, 715 received license of some grade, 576 failed to obtain a license of any grade.

The superintendent again urges the fact of special professional training. He says that "scholarship, though of prime importance, is not in itself a sufficient preparation for the highly complex work of training youth. Our existing tests should be taken to prove, not that a successful candidate is qualified to assume the duties of a school, but simply that he has intellectual requirements and culture qualifying him for entrance on a special course of preparation, the object of which is to secure for consideration the following:

"The awards of the Annual Provincial Examination shall be simply certificates, according to class, of superior general scholarship, but shall in themselves confer no authority to teach.

The authority to be acquired by adding to a general scholarship certificate, graduation at our own or other approved normal school, or a diploma certifying due professional competency, obtained at a properly searching and comprehensive examination in the theory and practice of teaching."

We agree with the Superintendent upon this point. It is just as reasonable to expect that a school teacher should have some trained knowledge of the profession as it is to expect that a student should have some knowledge of the profession. Enrolment will be greater, as sections will have to pay more for trained teachers than those who will go for what they can get, and there will be some inducement for clever men and women to take up teaching as a life profession.

The total sectional assessments for the past year shows an increase of nearly \$10,000.

The above will of course only give an imperfect idea of the Superintendent's interesting report, but it will suffice to show the general standing of educational institutions throughout the Province.

On Tuesday night, of last week, the Halifax Board of Trade passed the following resolution:

"Whereas, the Missing Link on the Western Counties railway between Annapolis and Digby remains unaltered, and the question of completing such W. C. B. R. and uniting it with the W. and A. R. under one control, is now receiving the attention of the W. C. B. R. in most desirable, but such completion alone will have but little effect in meeting the requirements of the western part of Nova Scotia, and the Board of Trade deem it of the highest importance that the railways of the W. C. B. R. and A. R. be completed as a part of the I. C. B. system, this extending to a very large and populous part of the province, that is interested in the advantages of a consolidated management and placing the western counties of the province on an equality with eastern counties receiving the benefits of the I. C. B. system; and further resolved, that the representatives of the city and county of Halifax in the Dominion Parliament earnestly co-operate with such other members from Nova Scotia as may favor the aforesaid consolidation scheme in urging upon the government and parliament of Canada the adoption of the policy herein recommended."

That's what is wanted. Keep up the agitation!

Local and Other Matters.

The dwelling house and property of the estate of the late Wm. Carlton, Esq., was sold at public auction last week to Rev. J. Hart, municipal treasurer, for \$1,000.

A large number of eminent Montreal physicians are in favor of the admission of women to their profession. Only one or two among the whole faculty showed any opposition whatever.

In the local house the bill to repeal the law which excludes certain Dominion officials from voting in Municipal elections or sitting as councillors, received the three months' notice. In total vote stood 18 to 19.

The debate on Sir Richard Cartwright's reciprocity amendment came to a close on the 19th, when the bill was divided, resulting in a vote of 121 to 78, a majority of 44 against the amendment.

A call has been extended to accommodate the expenses of the combined Presbyterian Churches of Bridgetown and Annapolis, and moderation in the call granted by the Presbytery.

The burning of Mr. W. R. Troop's barn on Friday night last caused a great excitement in town. The reflection of the flames was so very bright that several parties shooed out fire, the barn was brought out, and everybody for a time was running around trying to locate the fire.

Mr. R. M. Lydiard, station agent at Berwick, died on Monday evening last week. He was a popular member of his official and private relations, and his death is much regretted.

Mr. G. E. Lydiard, a brother of the deceased and a former agent of the station, is expected to get the vacant position.

The Jesuit bill, passed by the Quebec legislature, is one of the chief topics for newspaper discussion in the Upper Province. The opponents of the bill are fighting their best for disallowance. The Mail and Globe are both arranged against the bill. It is expected the bill will be discussed in the Dominion House this week.

The steamer Yarmouth will not leave Boston on Tuesday morning, March 26th, but will remain over until Friday, the 29th. After the first of the week, leaving Yarmouth on Wednesday and Saturday evenings; returning leaves Lewis Wharf, Boston, every Tuesday and Friday at 10 p. m.

Last week a long discussion took place in the local house over the proposed Income Tax Act. The income clause received a full measure of attention. Mr. Laurance, who moved for certain amendments is of the opinion that the proposed system is to be used for income, and quotes a decision of the Supreme Court of Massachusetts, in support of his argument. He also wants income assessed for school purposes. He also considers that all money owned by an individual should be taxed, i. e., if he was possessed of \$20,000 he should be taxed upon that and not upon \$2,600. The bill was referred to the committee on law amendment.

On Friday night last, about 10 a. m., Mr. W. R. Troop, of Grandville, lost his large barn and all its contents, with the exception of stock by fire. One of the cattle got loose and he took it along, went into the barn to put the animal up. He set the light on the main floor, in such a place as he thought would be safe from any accident. He then went out to the barn after the horse, and returning a few moments later he saw that the whole main floor was in flame, and the fire was spreading with such terrific rapidity that he was unable to get into the fire could have caught him from the fire. The barn was one of the largest in the County, being 100x40. ANAPOLIS ITEMS.

The fruit steamer, Henri IV, finished loading on Saturday night and sailed at 10 p. m. Sunday morning. She took away nine thousand and ninety barrels of apples, three thousand deals, and two hundred and twenty tons timber. It is expected that the steamer will bring good prices to recoup, in a measure, the losses sustained by our farmers in previous shipments this season.

H. F. Adams, Baptist minister from Yarmouth, who has gained some notoriety there by his fearless and persistent advocacy of temperance principles from his pulpit, delivered a stirring temperance sermon here on Sunday afternoon, in the Methodist Church, to a full house. He spoke again in the evening at Grandville, and on Monday evening, in aid of W. C. T. U., to a large and responsive audience, and with the result that a goodly number of ladies enrolled themselves in the same and became members of this worthy organization.

Rufus Hardwick, who has the contract for the erection of the light house, began work on that structure on Monday, and is situated on the vacant government lot between C. W. McCormick's and Dr. A. C. Cunningham's stores, and on the same lot as the vacant government lot below.

Albert Bishop, on Monday, began to demolish the old dwelling house situated on A. Fullerton's farm, preparatory to the erection of a fine residence on the same site, for which he has the contract, and which will doubtless be an ornament to that neighborhood.

General satisfaction is felt at the prospect of work on the Missing Link being resumed at an early date, especially in view of the hope that it is the first step in the erection of the whole road between the over and made part of the intercolonial system.

The Goldenrod Bros. have removed their new rotary saw mill from Lequille to West Dalhousie, where a large lot of logs awaits to be operated.

Messrs. Pickles & Mills have loaded their schr. with plings, and has sailed for Boston.

Large quantity of mining machinery and other freight is being shipped from the vessels, and hauled out to the gold mines. The roads have been, and are still, awfully bad out that way.

South Farmington Notes.

It may be interesting to your readers to know how many apples are handled during the year at this place. In 1887 there were shipped by rail, 291,424 bushels; in 1888, 291,424; in 1889, from August to March 26th, 802,326 bushels, with some three to four thousand yet to ship. If our markets had been good and all the apples sold, they would be in good shape for the buyers, but a serious time there would have been in N. S., but our put apples up in proper shape and steps putting the good apples in the ends and filling up the middle with anything handy, they never need expect to get a good price or name in the English market. Packing apples puts me in mind of what I heard a minister say while preaching. He said last week No. 2 apples were put up and market No. 1, this year the Lord gave them all No. 2 to save them the trouble.

Your readers all seem to have a fast town. We have one here—a Frenchman—called Joe Howe, owned by the Southport Bros. They refused, a few days ago, two hundred dollars for half interest in him. He is looking fine this spring, and shows great signs of speed.
