Dr. Bryce Calls on the Medical Council to Impeach and on Conviction Discipline Such Offenders for Unprofessional Conduct Worse Than Confessed Quacks.

London, April 24.—Mr. J. K. Merriman, former Treasurer of Cape Colony, now a representative of the Afrikaner Bond, speaking at a meeting of the League of Liberals today, against aggression and militarism, said military law, the subjugation of all law, had been established in Cape Colony.

Mr. Merriman detailed instances of the punishment of the Dutch military law, usually on the testimony of natives and employees.

Ottawa, April 24.—The Metropolitan Rifle Association team wins the fifth Imperial rifle match.

Ottawa has the honor of having a team of riflemen whose scores in a rifle match over the course of the match were as follows: 1st, Metropolitan Rifle Association; 2nd, 13th Regiment; 3rd, 77th Regiment; 4th, Q.O.R.; 5th, 1st Regiment.

Canada has done remarkably well in this match. The Ottawa teams being not alone in carrying off the honors, the 13th Regiment team of Hamilton coming second, the 77th Regiment Westworth third, and the Queen's Own Rifles, Toronto, fifth.

These are the principal places in the match, and are all taken by Canadian teams.

WRESTLED WITH ESTIMATES. Controllers in Session All Afternoon and Chop Off Amounts Totalling \$6000.

\$500 GRANT FOR HORSE SHOW

Was Re-recommended - Threat Made That Show Might Be Moved From Toronto.

The consideration of the estimates of the Works Department occupied the Board of Control's attention yesterday afternoon. For repairs to macadam roadways, constructed as local improvement, \$2000 was asked, but the Controllers thought this could stand a cut of \$1000, and, accordingly, the item was reduced by that sum. The estimate for tools and repairs of \$1200 was also to the board's mind a little too much, and \$200 was chopped off. Item after item was challenged and questioned, but an opportunity for using the axe was not afforded until \$6000 for tools and miscellaneous was wiped out. The Engineer was told he would have to be satisfied with \$2000. The estimate of \$500 for painting the Board of Control's buildings was also cut to \$300, and the Engineer will paint only those bridges which need it very badly.

The \$500 maintenance for the Rosedale Ravine drive was made \$400. The result of the Controller's labors for the afternoon was a reduction of \$3000. After Civic Grants.

Applications for civic grants continue to pour in. R. Y. Ellis asked for an extra grant of \$200 for the Industrial School of Art. He asked for an extra grant of \$200, but they want an additional sum to bring the grant up to \$1000.

Another application for a grant of \$400 for the Dominion Day Regatta Committee. Aid. Lamb asked if it was fair that the whole lot be given to the regatta, and a comparative few.

Aid. Sheppard thought it would be money well spent because the regatta had the effect of keeping people in town on the holidays.

Aid. Hubbard said interest in the regatta was waning, and, besides, he doubted if the Dominion Day Regatta Committee, in the position they took in connection with the Horse Show.

Aid. Lamb also declared it was time a stop was put to grants. He intended to pursue a consistent course and vote against them all.

Aid. Frame was in favor of making the board do no action.

Stewart Houston, for the Horse Show Committee, came before the board and permitted in his efforts to secure the \$500 referred back by Council.

The board recommended the grant of \$500.

Will Keep Document. Corporation Counsel Fullerton reported that there was no particular objection in relation to the agreement signed by President Mackenzie and President Warren in connection with the Dominion Day Regatta.

The board, however, decided to keep the agreement.

T. Estlin's request that their garage be removed daily was referred to the Street Commissioner.

F. B. Featherstonhaugh and John Ellis' suggestions for a southern entrance into High Park were referred to the Street Commissioner.

Corporation Counsel Fullerton asked for instructions as to whether he would proceed to England this summer to be present at and assist in the case of the City of the Toronto Railway Company, re: mileage question, which comes before the Privy Council.

The Mayor and Corporation Council will talk the matter over and report.

Government Thanks City. Aid. McMurrich, chairman of the Parks and Exhibition Committee, has received a communication from Col. Deist, chairman of the Imperial Government, thanking the city for the use of the stables in the Exhibition grounds, in which it stored the horses purchased here for South Africa.

City Hall Notes. The sub-committee on Reports of the Public School Property Committee met yesterday, and recommended a detailed report to the consideration of the board.

As the first draft of the report shows estimates in excess of their appropriations, many items had to fall under the axe.

Police Court Record. Rita Bond was fined \$10 and costs or three months by Magistrate Deaton yesterday for keeping a disorderly house at 101 West Adelaide-street. The case of Charles Bond, charged with assault on a woman, was dismissed.

Daniel Sharpe, who was drunk, assaulted P.C. Sanderson, was sent down for 30 days. For assaulting a constable, Edward Sebastian and Charles Deed pleaded guilty to stealing a number of articles from A. W. Carrick's house on Wellington-street and were remanded till the 29th. Fred Tannah and John Martin will be tried on the 29th on a charge of attempted tip-tapping.

ASSIZE COURT CASES.

Lawyers Get a Verdict Against J. P. Coleman-Suit Against a Trust Company.

J. P. Coleman, a former Torontoian, who now lives in California, was sued in the Assize Court yesterday by Millar, Riddell & Levescott, barristers, for \$500.88 for services rendered. The only defence put in by Coleman was that the bill was over six years old, and pleaded the statute of limitations, and also that E. Hewitt, a former Toronto alderman, was responsible for half the amount. As several items on the bill are not six years old, Mr. Justice Lount gave judgment in favor of the solicitors for \$104.08, and used it in the amount of the bill with interest to date of this action.

The case of Knowles v. Toronto General Trusts Co. will be tried next Monday. The late E. A. Knowles had his life insured for \$15,000 for the benefit of his wife and children. The corporation, as executor, it was stated to the court, treated his insurance as part of the estate, and used it in the payment of his liabilities. The suit is to recover it.

The action of J. A. Banfield against the Hamilton Brass Manufacturing Co. to get \$1300 commission on the sale of cash stiers, was commenced, and will be continued this morning.

DOMINION GOVERNMENT BESIEGED.

Veterans Under the Impression That a Land Grant Policy Has Been Inaugurated at Ottawa.

Ottawa, April 24.—The Militia Department is being inundated with applications for grants of land from veterans of '98, who appear to have conceived the idea that the Dominion Government has embarked upon some such policy. In every case they are told that no such grants are being made, but that the Ontario Legislature has sanctioned grants to the soldiers from the province who served in South Africa.



OTTAWA MUSKETRY SCHOOL.

Local Officers Have Strong Opinions on the Matter, but Dare Not Express Them.

THEY DO NOT WANT THE SCHOOL.

Afraid to Speak Loud, for it Would Queer Them in the Militia Department.

pressed in a letter received by The World from W. Andrew Collins, captain, R.C.M.F. of this city. He complains regarding the establishment of a school of musketry at Ottawa. The estimates provide for a school of musketry and Capt. Collins kicks and he should know something about it, being a fully qualified militia officer.

holding certificates from schools of cavalry, artillery and infantry, and also a R.M.C. certificate. He claims that the school should be taught with other subjects that are to be intelligently understood by assistants to the school.

He points out that the good men the Canadian militia want for officers cannot go thru the strict examination in the militia district and then go down to Ottawa to qualify in musketry.

He says that the non-coms, too, to get their musketry instruction with their own time for a man with military aspirations to get his examination here.

Make It Altogether. Capt. Collins' communication recommends that the militia district be empowered to give the musketry training in conjunction with the ordinary course, and he makes a most emphatic protest against the establishment of a separate school of any further kind in Ottawa or anywhere else.

He further advocates the Morris rifle range as a sufficient education in marksmanship for all the soldiers. Thus they could learn sighting and aiming, and be made acquainted with the rifle. The Lee-Metford, which is the British rifle of to-day, must be properly introduced to the militia, and they will know Canadian soldiers so that they will know how to use it when it becomes necessary.

Officers Must Keep Muzzles. The question of the establishment of a musketry class at Ottawa makes the Toronto militia men feel very sore, but they are all in such a position that they cannot say what they think.

The World talked to a lot of soldiers last night and this is what they said: Lieut.-Col. Bruce of the Royal Grenadiers has evidently given the matter considerable attention, but he did not care to discuss it with The World. He said: "I have strong views on this matter, but as a commanding officer it is not proper for me to express either approval or disapproval through the press, of the action of the Militia Department. This I may say, however, that quite apart from the merits or demerits of the proposal, it is a very serious matter, and shooting is giving free ammunition, taking care that its expenditure be carefully and judiciously looked after. Without this, theoretical training will be of very little use."

Major Manley was asked what he thought of it, but he hurriedly answered he had no time to discuss such a foolish thing as the School of Musketry. Practical training was what the soldiers needed.

Lieut.-Col. Delamere of the Queen's Own Rifles said: "It is a weighty matter. He had his own opinions regarding the proposition, but he would not express them to the press."

The most interested and hardest-working man to promote shooting in the 4th Highlanders is Capt. C. C. Bartholme. All he said was: "It is a weighty matter, and I do not care to pass an opinion upon it."

Major Green, who has just returned from a tour of fighting in West Africa, declared that Canada needed a musketry university. They have one in England, he said, and it would be a great thing if one is established here.

Wants It in Toronto. Lieut.-Col. Davidson: The idea seems to be all right, but the school should be in Toronto.

Capt. R. K. Barker: They should have such a school in Canada. I don't care where it is, but we should have it.

Capt. Cockburn, V.C.: Please let me go, I have no opinion to make to a newspaper on anything.

Several officers spoken to refused to have their names used, because they were of the opinion that the establishment of a musketry station in Ottawa would be a lot of rot, and they would get into trouble if they said so for publication.

Nevertheless, that seems to be the sentiment of the majority of the officers, and the committee of the non-coms, on a recent course for musketry, can better be imagined than described.
