How the Hamilton Local Electric Roads Give Sunday Accommodation.

TORONTO SERVICE AWAY BEHIND

What Would Double Yonge-Street Values—A Pointer For the Metropolitan Railway.

For the information of the farmers of Scarborough who are being asked to stop the Sunday cars going there that township, we print the time tables of the suburban electric lines running out of Hamilton and into the adjoining townships. These roads all run Sunday cars, and we have the word of property owners in these townships that their lands have almost doubled in value. Ontario has four suburban lines running from the city limits outwardly—the Lake Shore and Mimico, which has a Sunday service; the Weston and Islington road, which has no Sunday service; the Yonge-street line, which has no Sunday service; and the Scarborough line, which now has a limited Sunday service that certain parties wish to stop.

There is a pointer for the Metropolitan on Yonge-street in the Hamilton suburban time table, and that is that you can leave the car after the theatres are over and go out to Dundas or by the Radial. The Metropolitan has a car from Newmarket, leaving a little after 7 in the evening. The Metropolitan should have a car from all the way not earlier than 11 p.m., and one leaving Newmarket for here at the same hour. And when a Sunday service is added to the Yonge-street property, will double in value in two years.



William Elliott of Andley, Township of Pickering, who has just recovered from a long attack of typhoid fever, arrived here on a visit to the old home yesterday.

Mr. James Gibbard, late market gardener, on the Fleming estate, has quit gardening, and moved to the city.

In a hold on Don Mills Road, just north of the school, there are about twenty horses and cows in a starting condition. These animals are kept on all night, and much complaint is heard from passers-by, as these nights are too inclement.

In consequence of a breakdown in the machinery at the Don Valley Pressed Brick Works, a large number of men were laid off work yesterday. The works are rushed with orders for months ahead, and they expect to be in working order for Monday morning.

AGED WIDOW IN LAWSUIT.

Plaintiff, Who Fell on the Sidewalk, Gets Damages.

Five months ago, Mrs. Catherine Gilroy of 125 Parliament-street, an elderly widow, almost 80 years of age, tripped over a bit of plank on the sidewalk opposite Lima-place, and was considerably shaken up, besides sustaining a severe injury to her shoulder. Yesterday, she sued the city to get \$200 damages for the injuries she had sustained. The defendants wanted to settle the suit for \$200, but the case was referred to a verdict for Mrs. Gilroy, the damages being assessed at \$125 and County Court costs.

In the action of Chandler & Massey of 235 Yonge-street against their landlord, George Peers, a settlement was arrived at. If Peers pay \$800, he is to become owner of the boiler which the plaintiffs installed in his premises. Judgment for \$10,245.68, in favor of the plaintiffs, was entered in the suit of Ontario Bank v. Charles. Settlements were also announced in the cases of Eckardt v. Miller and Wilkie v. Wilkie.

The Pulp and Plaster Co. of this city was given judgment for \$800 against Maximus E. Loone of Napoleon, Ohio and Thomas E. Baird of Toledo, Ohio. These men gave Thomas Walter Horn the right of their invention in elastic pulp plaster, and he assigned the right to the plaintiff company. The company sued the men, to enforce the agreement, and claimed \$20,000 for the breach. No defence appeared, and a judgment was filed, the case being referred to Judge Street for assessment of damages, with the above result.

New York, Nov. 15.—Seth Low has appointed George L. Rives Corporation Counsel. This is the new Mayor's first appointment.



ANOTHER SUIT IN SIGHT

City and Street Railway Co. Cannot Agree On the Assessment of Street Cars.

AVENUE-ROAD EXTENSION GOES

Works Committee Endorses the Engineer's Report—Metropolitan Settlement Coming Soon.

The valuation of street cars for assessment purposes is a case of disagreement between the city and the Street Railway Company.

Outside of the assessment on cars, the Street Railway Company, as stated in yesterday's World, the company refuses to pay taxes on more than \$450,000 for cars, and, therefore, the city will fight out the matter in the courts.

Entertaining the Gas Company. The Mayor has written to the Gas Company again in connection with the proposed settlement and the changes in the original draft.

Large Interests. The Mayor goes on to say: "The city's interests on behalf of a large body of consumers are so large by the Confederation law, to which I believe you intend to give full effect, that it seems logical and proper that some representative of the city should be present at the annual and other general meetings in respect of any stock held by the city, and also being eligible in respect of such holdings to election as director."

Landowne-Avenue Crossing. Landowne-avenue crossing came up again when Ald. Graham moved that application be made to the Railway Committee at Ottawa to approve the plans for a subway, one-half of the cost to be paid by the railway, three-eighths by the city and one-eighth by the owners of the property benefited.

Outside Water Service. Elias Rogers' application for a water service on East-street brought up a well-known question as to giving city privileges to persons outside the city limits.

DuPont Street Cars. The Toronto Railway Co. offered to extend the tracks on DuPont-street as far as Water-street as early as the next spring.

Avenue-Road Extension. The Avenue-road street car extension came up again. The Engineer recommended that the tracks be laid to the city limits.

New York, Nov. 15.—According to the London representative of the Journal of Advertiser, the Ontario Board of Health is bringing to a close negotiations with the city of Montreal, Quebec, regarding the construction of an aqueduct below the city of Montreal, on ground bordering on the Boulevard de la Conception.

SHOCK EVERYTHING. Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 15.—A special from Blackfoot, Idaho, states that the damage to property in that county from the recent earthquake will amount to at least \$100,000.

Slavery of Prejudice. New York, Nov. 15.—The Berlin correspondent of the London Times and the New York Times reports an address delivered by Superintendent Gemmill at the grave of Lieutenant Blackwelder, who was killed in the Boer war.

Another Suffered Choir. Carlton-street Methodist Church will shortly follow the example of St. Lawrence's, in holding a "Suffered Choir" service.

Straddle Row Inventor Dead. Monmouth, Ill., Nov. 15.—William M. Weir, late president of the Weir Plow Co., died at his home here.

APPEAL DISMISSED. Ottawa, Nov. 15.—The Supreme Court judgment was reserved in Hopkins v. Upgreville, and the next case, King v. Lewis, the last on the Ontario list, was called. In this case, the appeal is from a judgment, refusing a mandamus to compel the respondent, a magistrate, to commit for trial a man charged with perjury, whom he had tried summarily and discharged. The court held that the case could not be heard, as no printed case notes were filed, and it was struck from the list. The court then adjourned until Saturday next for delivery of judgments.

CITY NEWS.

At Osgoode Hall, The Court of Appeal gave out four judgments yesterday, as follows: McHugh v. G.T.R., appeal of the railway company allowed, reversing the decision of Mr. Justice Ferguson. Campbell v. C.P.R., the plaintiff's appeal from the trial judge is dismissed with costs.

Dunn v. Morning Publishing Company, the appeal of defendants from the Common Pleas Divisional Court is allowed with costs, and the decision of Mr. Justice Street, the trial judge, is confirmed. The plaintiff, Gerald Dunn, sues the Morning Company for wrongful dismissal from their employment as a book agent. His action is therefore dismissed.

Holmes v. Goderich, the plaintiff's appeal from a Divisional Court is allowed with costs, and the decision of Chief Justice Armour at the trial is confirmed. Chief Justice Falconbridge yesterday handed out judgments in the action of Mrs. Mary Cassels of Smith's Falls against the town of Smith's Falls and the Canadian Pacific Railway. Mrs. Cassels sued for \$5000 damages for the death of her husband, caused, she claimed, by the neglect of the town and the railway company to keep the crossing in proper condition. His Lordship found that Cassels was responsible for his own disaster. Mr. S. Cartwright, registrar of the Court of Appeal, has been appointed referee in a dispute between the city and the General Hospital trustees over the transfer of some property in connection with the Don Improvement.

Suit has been instituted by the widow of John Morrison, late of 200 North Ligar-street, against the Grand Trunk Railway Company for \$15,000 damages. Mrs. Morrison's husband was killed at New Hamburg, while examining certain air-brakes of the train on which he was employed.

Greater Accommodation Needed. Highly satisfactory reports were presented at the ninth annual meeting of the East End Creche or Day Nursery, held at 350 Wilton-avenue on Thursday evening. Controller Lamb presided.

This organization takes charge of children, leaving their mothers free to go to their daily work, and during the past year 77 boys and 78 girls were cared for. The total receipts amounted to \$908.78, and after all expenses had been met a balance of \$161.13 remained on hand. During the year 113 women were given employment.

Short addresses were delivered by Rev. Mr. Atkinson, Rev. Mr. Moore, J. D. Ivey, J. P. Rogers, Dr. Bryans, Dr. A. C. Courtice, Mr. Morris and Mrs. Harvey. In view of the increased demand for accommodation, a committee composed of Messrs. J. P. Rogers, J. D. Ivey and Dr. Bryans was appointed to consider ways and means of enlarging the premises.

A Board of Management was also appointed as follows: President, Mrs. J. McDonald; vice-president, Mrs. J. P. Rogers; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Dr. Tupper; recording secretary, Miss M. Rogers; treasurer, Miss M. Carlyle; board, Mrs. R. Y. Manning, Mrs. A. M. Ivey, Miss M. A. Ivey, Mrs. Dr. Bryans, Mrs. J. Thomson, Mrs. Goldie, Mrs. Moody; medical advisers, Dr. Bryans, Dr. C. Carlyle.

St. Alban's Cathedral Chapter. The regular meeting of the Chapter of St. Alban's Cathedral took place on Thursday. The November meeting is usually of an annual character, similar in some respects to the Easter vestry meetings of parochial churches, as the financial year ends on Oct. 31. Accounts presented showed that the offertory receipts for the year in respect to the Easter vestry meetings at the services held in the church had amounted to \$1188, and the expenditure in connection with that part of the work, including some exceptional items, \$2110. The treasurer reported that during the year some reductions of the list had been effected to an amount of \$1200. An offer to provide the cost of an additional stall was presented and accepted. It was stated that this was the twentieth stall taken

up, fourteen paid for in full and six partly paid. Reports were presented to the effect that a Cathedral School Corporation had been formed, and had built an addition to the chapel, which had cost \$2500, and provided for a hundred pupils, with approved modern arrangements and equipments, and that a very efficient staff of teachers is now employed in this work.

Star's Suit Dismissed. After a ten-weeks' continuance, the Non-Jury Assize was yesterday adjourned. The last case tried was that of the Star Life Insurance Company against the company. In 1898 the corporation assumed the company for \$800 on \$25,000. This was its income from all places in the Dominion. In 1900 the corporation assumed the company for \$1137.15. Part of this was of Reversion was made for the balance. In September of last year the court restrained further levy and distress. Then the corporation was brought in which it asked the court to order an assessment only on the amount of years' arrears returned, and that an injunction be granted against any further levy. The defence said that this court had no jurisdiction, and that the company didn't appeal to the County Court but to the Divisional Court. Judge as it had a right to do. Judge Street held that this contention was right and dismissed the suit with costs.

Police Court Record. Elijah Kidd, who was committed to the Central Prison for six months from Perth for being drunk, was brought into the Police Court yesterday and charged with stealing a coil of garden hose from Lady Stovenden's house in Perth. He was given five months, to run concurrently with his present term. For trespassing on the property of Messrs. Bertrams, the defendant was fined \$3 or 30 days, and Jennie Gray \$1 and costs or 30 days. Sam Warden, an inmate of the Central Prison, was given five months for being drunk in Michigan. John Thompson, charged with stealing rubber hose, was remanded for a week. The defendant was remanded on a charge of vagrancy, was released on suspended sentence. Mabel Johnson, charged with theft from Mrs. Penzell, was further remanded for a week. Myrtle Colwell, who was arrested with her, was released, the charge against her being withdrawn.

Menber Goes to New York. T. C. Robbette was arrested by Detective Black on Thursday night on a charge of defrauding David K. Tebeust, a member of the Ontario Legislature. He was remanded to the County Jail. He waived extradition proceedings and was taken to New York by Detective McConnell.

Court's Three Choices. T. C. Robbette saw the Attorney-General yesterday in connection with the case of Fred Lee Rice. Mr. Robbette says that he has been offered three choices, to quash the conviction, to grant a new trial, or to let the case go to the Supreme Court.

Widow Gets Everything. The will of the late Alexander Newlands, carpenter, of Scarborough, was pronounced in the County Court yesterday. He owned No. 10 Henry-street, worth \$2500, and had \$2500 in mortgages, \$250 cash and \$75 in bonds. Everything in his will went to the widow, who is sole executrix.

Dear Season Closed. The dear season in Ontario closed yesterday evening, and the hunters report that game has been plentiful. Until all the returns are sent in to the Parliament Buildings from the deputy game wardens, it will be impossible to find out how many deer have been shot.

G. C. Creelman Succeeds. Prof. William of the Guelph Agricultural College, owing to his other duties, has resigned his position as supervisor of the three dairy schools in Ontario, and G. C. Creelman has been appointed to succeed him.

BAVARIA'S PRO-BOERS. Impossible to Take Steps in Interest of "the Brave Boers." Munich, Nov. 15.—In the Bavarian Chamber today, during the debate on the general financial situation, there was considerable criticism of the subsidies of Bavaria's representatives in the Reichstag in regard to the South African war and in connection with domestic matters. The Premier, Baron Von Crailsheim, during the course of an emphatic general denial of the allegations made, declared that, however regrettable it was, it was impossible for the Imperial government to take steps in the interest of "the brave Boers." It was a great advantage for Bavaria to be a member of the German Empire, which no more than any other great power could nowaday be expected to work for the Boers. As to the charge of Caesarism, it was a matter for congratulation that the Emperor took such energetic steps in the interest of the Boers. The world would stand loyally by the Empire. As to the words attributed to the Prince Regent, they will not do anything to be wrung from me," they never had been uttered, for the simple reason that no one desired to attempt to wring anything from Bavaria.

In January, 1895, the Nova Scotia Steel Company acquired the interests of The New Glasgow Iron, Coal and Railway Company and of the Nova Scotia Steel and Forge Company, and carried on the business previously conducted by these companies until the present year.

In the year 1900, The Nova Scotia Steel Company purchased as a going concern the business and property of The General Mining Association.

The General Mining Association was formed by Deed of Settlement in 1829, and (inter alia) took over the lease of the Duke of York's extensive coal areas in Nova Scotia. In or about 1858, by arrangement with the Provincial Government of Nova Scotia, the Association released some of its rights and secured the exclusive right to all coal seams in certain areas. The leases have been renewed, and are now held under the general law of Nova Scotia. The Association had disposed of some of these coal areas before the property was purchased by the Nova Scotia Steel Company, but had retained the Sydney Mine and Point Aconi areas, which contain a superior quality of coal, with good facilities for shipment.

The Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Limited, has acquired the whole business property and assets of the Nova Scotia Steel Company, Limited, as a going concern.

PROPERTY

The properties now owned by the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, Limited, consist of: 1. All the lands, shafts, buildings, plant and railways used in connection with the coal mines, together with the leases of the coal areas which were acquired by the Nova Scotia Steel Company, from the General Mining Association. The profits of the combined business for the year 1900, exclusive of bounties, as certified by the auditors, amounted to \$530,581.

This makes the profits of the combined properties, exclusive of bounties, for the three years, \$1,138,140, or a yearly average of \$379,380.

WAR HERO KNOCKED TO DEATH

Passed Unscathed Thru 13 Years of Bloody Campaigns, But End Came at Last.

BALAKLAVA VETERAN'S VIOLENT EXIT

Ambrose Short of Lockport Passes in His Checks at the Heels of a Horse.

Lockport, Nov. 15.—To pass thru campaigns in India, to form one of the first British units to see the light in the Crimea, to come unscathed thru the historic charge of the Six Hundred at Balaklava, and then to retire to private life, to the peace and quiet of the grocery business, and to be killed to death by the delivery of a horse, was the fate of Ambrose Short, hero of many wars and formerly a sergeant in the service of the Queen.

Ambrose Short, a well-known merchant of this city, died about midnight last night from the effects of injuries received last Sunday from being struck by a horse. Mr. Short went to the barn to feed his grocery delivery horse, and, falling to speak to the animal, he was thrown, his horse kicked out, and struck him in the abdomen. The blow knocked Mr. Short down, and he has continued sinking, but he evaded the additional blows, and finally crept to the house.

Doctors were called, and it was found he had sustained a fractured rib and severe bruises. Their fears of internal injuries were only too soon realized, as he sank rapidly, passing away at an early hour this morning.

Death was a relief to the veteran, for he suffered untold agony. He remarked that a horse's kick could deliver a heavier wound than the spears of Indian men on the shores of Coosatick.

For thirteen years Sgt. Short served in the British army, receiving an honorable discharge, a certificate of good conduct from his captain, and a recognition in the English army, a gold medal from the Queen and other medals for heroic and distinguished services on the field of battle.

Ambrose Short was born in Bristol Eng. in 1837. His parents were of humble origin, but industrious, hard-working, honest people. Ambrose did not care to become a hater like his father, but applied to be a soldier. At the age of 17 he ran away and joined the army. After but a year's war was on. He joined the famous 60th Regiment, serving at the siege of Sebastopol, Inkermann, Alma and Balaklava. In the last memorable battle he participated in the famous charge as a member of the Six Hundred, led by Earl Cardigan against the Russian batteries, and was one of 150 who rode back again, knowing that "kossaks had blundered."

After the Crimea war he served in India, winning recognition as a brave, intelligent soldier, and being promoted to the position of first sergeant.

Upon leaving the army Mr. Short married Anna Johnson of London, and came to this city in 1868 to settle in P.A.A., New York. There he lived 20 years, and then moved to Lockport, where he died 16 years ago, and two years later he married Miss Seal of Lockport.

He is survived by five children, Alice, Katherine and Frances, William and Alma E., the latter son named after the hero of Alma.

About a year ago a man by the name of George Mills of West Wilson was driving thru Lockport and noticed Mr. Short's wagon. He made inquiries, and, finding the owner of the vehicle, recognized him as an old comrade in arms. Mr. Mills is also a veteran of the Crimea war, and was in the 88th Regiment.
