# HISTORICAL MEMORANDA

IN CONNECTION WITH

# THE FREE CHURCH, COTE ST.

# CRESCENT STREET PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

The Congregation was organized, and for seven years ministered to by Deputies from the Free Church of Scotland.

1844.-The Rev. W. C. Burns, arrived in the Summer, and preached to large audiences in St. Gabriel Street Free Church.

The REV. J. MACNAUGHTON, of Paisley, arrived a little later, and continued the work in the same church.

- 1845.-The REV. J. BONAR, of Larbert arrived in Spring, preached in St. Gabriel Street Free Church till a temporary wooden church was erected in Lagauchetiere Street. He opened this Church on May 11th, and on the 25th of May ordained the first elders, viz.: John Redpath, James R. Orr, David Ferguson, Evander MacIver.
  - The REV. W. ARNOT, of Glasgow, arrived about this time, and sup-
  - plied the pulpit till the end of September. The Rev. A. N. Somerville, of Glasgow, took charge during October and November.
  - The REV. W. C. Burns, in November, received but declined a call to labour in Canada, the Congregation promising to support him. In December he was again urged to fall in with this request, but finally declined on January 19th, 1846.
- 1846.—The Rev. G. Stevenson, of Peebles, ministered from January to April.
  - The Rev. T. Maclaughlin, of Peebles, ministered during May and June.
  - The REV. J. MUNRO, of Ratherglen, ministered during July and August.
  - The REV. J. ALEXANDER, of Kirkcaldy, ministered from November to March, 1847.
- 1847.—The Rev. J. B. Duncan, then a student, ministered during April and part of May.
  - The REV. J. MACGILLIVRAY, of Aberdeen, opened the Church in Cote Street, on Sabbath, the 16th May, preaching morning and evening, while the Rev. Henry Wilkes preached in the afternoon.
  - The REV. J. BUCHANAN, of Bothwell, ministered from May to October.
- The Rev. R. Bremner, of Glasgow, ministered from November to April.
- 1848.-The Rev. J. Patterson, of Tranent, ministered from May to October.
- 1849 .- The Ray. J. Lewis, of Leith, ministered from April to August. The REV. J. C. BURNS, of Kirkliston, ministered from September to February, 1850.
- 1850.—The Rev. J. C. Fairbairn, of Allanton, ministered from August to October.
- 1850.—The REV D. COUPER, of Burntisland, ministered from November to February, 1851.

1851.-The Rev. D. Fraser, ordained Pastor, August 8th, 1851. 1859.—The Rev. D. Fraser, translated to Inverness, Scotland, February 3rd, 1859

1859.—The Rev. B. F. Greig, ministered four months from April, 1859. The REV. HUGH COBBAN, of Braemar, ministered from Sept. 1859, to Jan., 1860.

It was moved by the Rev. Principal MacVicar, and seconded by M1. George Parker:

"That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to the Clerks of Session and Deacons' Court, the Treasurer, the Secretary of the Weekly Offering Fund, and the Seat Book Keeper, for the valuable service rendered by them during the past year." Carried.

It was moved by Mr. James Slessor, and seconded by Mr. John Anderson:

"That the thanks of the Congregation are due, and are hereby tendered to Mr. S. S. Bain, Miss MacMaster, and the Choir, for the efficient services rendered during the year." Carried.

After remarks by the Chairman, the business of the meeting was brought to a close, and an adjournment made to the Lecture Hall, where refreshments had been provided by the ladies.

We look back on another year of fellowship in Christian work with mingled feelings. Again that antediluvian dirge, all the more melancholy because of its monotony, has to be repeated,—"And he died." The young and the old, those whom we hoped to have been our strength and joy, those who had finished their labours, have passed away. A glance at the obituary record will show the blanks that have been made. Let us who remain so number our days that we apply our hearts unto wisdom.

There were registered during the year 17 Baptisms, 19 Burials, and 11 Marriages. The number of names on

the Communion Roll is 521.

All branches of Christian activity in which the church is engaged have been carried on quietly and successfully during the year 1888. There is nothing remarkable to be recorded, yet there are not wanting proofs that there is a deepening interest in spiritual things among us. It is a great encouragement to a minister of the gospel to know that his words are helping the spiritual life of his hearers; and just as I sat down to write this address a note came into my hands, part of which I will transcribe, as it expresses what not a few have been saying to me by word of mouth. "I feel led to express to you my sincere gratitude for the

blessing I receive through your instrumentality Sunday after Sunday. Especially did I find the service yesterday morning [Jan. 20th,] helpful and uplifting to me; and it struck me while thinking over the matter last night, and writing, as my custom is of Cate, a short account of the sermon, as nearly as I could remember it, that I would just write and tell you, that I among many others doubtless, have got real upbuilding by the tudy of James as taken by you Sunday after Sunday, and by the service as a whole. It is helpful to me to know that even a child is made the better by anything I may do or say, and I have no doubt that it will serve as a matter of encouragement to you, to know that one and another of your hearers are stimulated to fuller spiritual life by your words; or better still, by God's Spirit talking through you The services, together with the class on Saturday afternoons, have had a decided tendency to make me more swift to hear and love the word, and I know it is more to me than it used to be. Still I never remember the time when I was not glad to read it, but now I understand it better. I regret that I shall not be in town next Sunday, so that I will miss the next sermon upon being doers of the Word and not hearers only."

I quote the greater part of this note for several reasons. To be thus openly told that spiritual benefit has been received is great encouragement. To know that there are hearers who ponder the Word spoken and try to retain it in the memory is a great stimulus to a preacher. I sometimes say that the hearers who help a preacher most, are those who come furthest to his church; for it would be a shame to bring them so far, if they got nothing for their pains. Their very presence is a stimulus and encouragement, especially when the preacher knows that they have come, it may be at great self-sacrifice, for the reasons indicated above. Again it is an encouragement to know that the hearers are pondering the passages beforehand, and thus preparing themselves to receive his instructions. And, lastly, that they regret having to be absent because they shall lose the current of the exposition. May we have

many such hearers.

I have received very great encouragement within the past few weeks through the liberal offerings of your substance, and it would ill become me not to refer to them here; but such things as these are even a higher encourage-

ment. To quote the words of John the beloved, "Greater joy have I none than this, to hear of my children walking in the truth." Indeed, after all, the one springs from the other. Given perfect submission to the truth of God, and there will never be any difficulty in regard to the gifts of our substance. In receiving these gifts, nothing cheered me so much as to be told again and again that they were to be looked upon as tokens of benefit received through my ministry. Therefore again, I can say with Paul, that I am thankful for them, "Not because I desire a gift; but I desire fruit that may abound to your account."

# Report of the Deacons' Court

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31st DECEMBER, 1888.

The Deacons' Court in submitting to the Congregation its Report for the past year, does so with thankfulness to God for the measure of success with which we have been blessed.

### WEEKLY OFFERING.

The year's work under this head has yielded satisfactory results.

The total received during the year has been \$9627.55, of which \$8439.08 in envelopes, and \$1188.47 in plate collections, showing a weekly average of \$185.15. These

tigures show a gain of \$46.57 over the year 1887. While it is cause for thankfulness that we have not gone back upon our record in this connection, the Court still feels it necessary to press upon the Congregation the importance of the scheme, and to urge upon all who may not yet have fallen in with it to commence the New Year by doing so.

#### PEW RENTS.

The total income from this source for the year has been \$4223.19, being \$164.18 less than for the previous year. A reference to this account will show that we began the year with a balance in hand of \$960.17, while at its close there is a debit of \$783.68, thus showing that our payments have been \$1743.85 in excess of our income for the year. This is accounted for by the extraordinary outlay for repairs to roof of Church, painting, &c. of Lecture Hall, School Room, &c., referred to in last report, as well as other special demands, amounting in all to \$250000. It is a matter for gratification that the Court has been able to carry out these works without calling upon the congregation for help, and it is believed that the balance against the account will be covered by the income of the present year.

#### BUILDING FUND.

There has been carried to the credit of this fund, from the Weekly Offering account, the sum of \$1311 23 to apply in liquidation of the Church debt. In our last report reference was made to the purchase of land, adjoining the Church, on Dorchester and Crescent streets. It having been decided by the Court, with the concurrence of the Pastor, that it would not be expedient to erect a manse upon the lot acquired in Dorchester street, it was agreed to offer the lot for sale, subject to certain conditions for the protection of the Church. This action having been approved by the congregation at a recent meeting, and a purchaser having been found, the lot will be disposed of at a price which will cover its cost.

The lot on Crescent Street has been turned to account by the erecting upon it of a house for the Church Officer, the cost of which it was hoped would have been covered by special subscriptions, but so far we are short by \$676.59, which with a small amount yet due to contractors we trust will shortly be provided for.

Taking into account these transactions our liability in

regard to the debt is as follows:

It may be in order here to refer to an effort now being made to liquidate this debt and provide for other objects, which the following extract from the minutes of a meeting

of the Deacon's Court will more fully explain:

"The Rev. A. B. Mackay submitted a plan to clear off the whole indebtedness of the Church, renovate the ceilings. build a porch at the Crescent Street door, put in an Organ, and any other objects of which the Deacons' Court should approve, if there be any money left after the first named ends are attained. This was to be done by soliciting subscriptions payable from 1st January, 1889, in any number of instalments that the subscriber finds convenient, only with the understanding that any balance of subscription left unpaid at the end of each year should bear interest at the rate of 5%. It is also recommended that all subscriptions should be paid up by the year 1894, which is the Jubilee of the Congre-This plan was unanimously approved of by the Court, and a small committee, with the pastor as Convener, appointed to carry it out, and it is hoped that in a very short time the work will be accomplished.

#### ALLOCATIONS TO MISSIONS.

After providing for the usual fixed charges against the Weekly Offering Fund, as well as for special allocations during the year, as detailed in the treasurer's statement, there remains a balance of \$1874 for distribution which the

Court recommends should be made as follows:-

In addition to the above there is to be added the sum of \$416, contributed at Wednesday evening meetings, specially devoted to Foreign Missions.

#### PEW REPORT.

Mr. R. N. McCallum, of No 2217 St. Catherine Street, remains in charge of the letting of pews and sittings, where the Seat Book and plans of the Church may also be seen. Applications for seats should be made to Mr. McCallum or to the Church Officer.

The total number of sittings let in the Church is 759 of which 615 are in the area and 144 in the gallery.

#### FOREIGN MISSION SCHEME.

Referring to the recent appeal by our Pastor for the wherewithal to support a missionary of our own in the foreign field, the Court has much pleasure in stating that the response has been such that we are now in a position to undertake this important work.

### CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report, the Court feels warranted in looking upon it as indicating a hearty interest on the part of the congregation in the various schemes of the Church. Yet there is room for improvement. Are there not "tithes" which if brought "into the storehouse" might prove a blessing, not only to the giver but to the whole Church.

The Bible Class, conducted by Mr. Johnston, is not included in these figures. The present number on the roll

of this class being 113, with an average attendance of 62. While the number enrolled in Sabbath School is about the same as in preceding year, it is gratifying to know that the average attendance is in excess of 1887.

#### MISSIONS.

We are thankful to report that the interest of the school in this important work has been more than maintained. The year 1887 showed the best results to that date in Missionary offerings, but this has been surpassed in the year 1888. Our total being \$447.14, as against \$407.74 in 1887. This sum has been contributed in the following manner:

We also continued the plan of last year by inviting contributions of books, toys, fruits, etc., as a Thanksgiving offering, which was most liberally responded to, and divided between the "Children's Ward" in the Hospital and the Creche.

The allocation of this sum will be made at this meeting. In addition to the above sum, Mr. Johnston's Class has collected \$88.22.

### LIBRARY.

Since our last report additions have been made to the Library and a catalogue prepared, and as a result we find that the Scholars are making good use of the books.

### PAPERS.

The papers furnished the scholars during the year have been the "British Workman," "Children's Friend," and "Infants' Magazine," all of which seem to be much appreciated.

### PIC-NIC.

Our usual pic-nic was held at "Otterburn Park" on Saturday, 9th June last, and having been favored with exceptionally fine weather, and the presence of a large number of the friends of the school, a most enjoyable time was spent. The teachers would again tender their hearty thanks to the friends who assisted them, financially and otherwise, in carrying out this undertaking.

#### REWARDS.

At a meeting of Teachers held immediately after the holidays, it was agreed to offer prizes for the best examinations on the lessons for the last quarter of 1888, the school being divided into three sections for the purpose. Some twenty scholars presented themselves for examination, and the examining committee report very satisfactory results. The prizes to the successful competitors will be presented this evening. It will also be in order to refer here to the periodical recital to our Pastor, of the Shorter Catechism by the young people of the congregation. It is gratifying to know that a very large number present themselves from time to time, and that the work is thoroughly well done. The usual prizes to Miss Shaw's class for diligence in missions will also be given.

#### MEETINGS.

The usual monthly business meetings have been held the attendance at which has been exceptionally good, while the meeting for prayer, each sabbath afternoon has also been well sustained.

#### OFFICE-BEARERS.

With all the causes for encouragement and thankfulness with which we have been blessed during the year, there is one matter which has given us much anxious thought and deliberation. We refer to the resignation of Mr Morrice, our superintendent, who after faithfully serving the school in various capacities for the past 25 years, has been compelled, owing to ill health as well as other duties, to relinquish the active management of the school mature consideration, the teachers felt it to be their duty to release Mr. Morrice, but in doing so have his promise to accept the position of honorary superintendent, thus keeping up his connection with the school as well as ensuring, what we all feel we have, his continued interest in the school. Our earnest prayer is that he may speedily recover his health and strength, and that many years may yet be given him to go in and out amongst us.

We have also had some changes in staff of teachers, and would specially refer to the withdrawal of Miss McDonald, who for a period equal to that of Mr. Morrice has been most diligent and faithful in her work. The following new teachers have joined us, viz: Mrs. Archibald, and Misses Jennie Baillie, Christina Slessor, Kerr, and Messrs. McGregor, Alexander Murray, and Hector Mackay.

### CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report we would seek to do so with much thankfulness to God for his manifest goodness to us during the year, and tokens that His word has indeed been fruitful in gathering in some of our number into His Kingdom. May the blessing of the Lord be with us during the year upon which we have entered be the prayer of all interested in our work.

Our annual pic-nic was held at Beauharnois on June 23rd. We went by boat, and a very pleasant day was spent.

We have a well filled Library of good books, which are used freely by the scholars; religious papers and tracts are

also supplied liberally to the scholars.

Prizes are given to those who have repeated the Shorter Catechism and Golden Texts correctly for the year, and a Silver Medal and books to those bringing in new scholars during the year.

The lady teachers have met every Tuesday since October, till the end of December, as a Dorcas Society, and clothing, shoes, &c., are distributed to those children in need.

Singing classes, conducted by Mr. A. Hyde and Miss Dawson, have been held every Tuesday since October.

The Band of Hope has been resumed under the leadership of Mr. A. Hyde. Meetings are held every Friday fortnight, when a choice programme is given, and temperance principles instilled into the children. We have continued the departure taken last year in electing a chairman and Secretary from among the members, which gives general satisfaction.

We have pleasure in reporting an increase in Missionary

collections over any previous year.

Last year the collections amounted to \$215.31, and this year they reach the sum of \$253.74, being an increase of \$38.43.

# Mission Work in Griffintown.

So far as attendance at the services is concerned, this has been the most encouraging winter your missionaries have known. Not only has the attendance, especially on sabbath evenings, been *large*, but what is better, it has been regular. The renovations recently made in the building have done much towards brightening our services more, perhaps, than some people would have imagined. A piano, presided at as hitherto, by Miss Christina Johnston, has been used in leading the service of praise; but we still feel the need of a choir. In all well organized mission stations, the ministry of song has been found to be an important evangelistic agency, and we should therefore be delighted if musical members of the congregation would come to our assistance. We cannot help feeling that as it is, and long has been, the congregation leaves this mission work to be be carried on too much by proxy. The fact is surely a striking one, that immediately after Jesus had bidden His disciples pray the Lord of the harvest that He would thrust forth laborers into His harvest, He turned, and, as it were, bade them answer their own prayers. "Behold." he said, "I send you forth."

City mission work demands great faith and patience. There are so many exhibitions of the spirit of which our Model, (Himself, the perfect city Missionary), complained in His own ministry—adherence for the sake of the loaves and fishes—that it requires constant watchfulness to avoid doing harm while attempting to do good. Thanks to the thoughtful kindness of many of the congregation, we have again been placed in a position to relieve much actual distress, especially during the cold weather; but in some cases, we would have felt inclined to afford assistance in some less humiliating form than that of fuel and clothing, were it not for the almost unmitigated suffering inflicted on helpless children by the iniquities of their parents. While not unmindful of the teachings of Him who has revealed the Father's kindness, even "to the evil and unthankful," we are still of the opinion that the truest kindness is that which gives a needy man employment; and we sincerely

regret that it continues to be so much harder to find Christians who are in circumstances, and at the same time

willing, to exercise this sort of benevolence.

With regard to spiritual results, our labors have not been wholly unrewarded; but we more and more feel the folly of dependence on purely human methods, and the need of unceasing prayer for a manifestation of that Power which alone can move the world and reclaim the masses drifting all too rapidly away from Gospel influences.

# Memoranda.

Public Worship on Sabbath commences at 11 o'clock A. M. and 7 o'clock P. M.

SABBATH MORNING PRAYER MEETING in the Library at 10.15 o'clock.

Weekly Prayer Meeting in the Lecture Room every Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.

SABBATH SCHOOL AND BIBLE CLASSES meet every Sabbath afternoon at 3 o'clock. The Teachers' meeting for business is held on second Thursday of each month.

The Sacrament of Baptism is dispensed at the forenoon service on the first Sabbath of each month. Applicants must give notice to the Minister during previous week.

THE ELDERS visit their districts quarterly and distribute cards for the Communion. Any who may not receive their cards from the Elders, can get them at the close of the Friday Preparatory Service, or from the Elders at the door on Communion Sabbath morning. When members change their residence, immediate notice should be given to the Elder of the district or to the Minister.

THE SACRAMENT OF THE LORD'S SUPPER is dispensed on the second Sabbath of March, first Sabbath of June, last Sabbath of September, and second Sabbath of December.

THE STATED MONTHLY MEETING OF THE DEACONS' COURT is held on the first Monday of each month, and the monthly meeting of Session immediately thereafter.

MEETING FOR MUTUAL EDIFICATION, in the Library every Monday evening during the winter season.

THE LADIES' VISITING AND AID SOCIETY meets once a week during the working season. All the Ladies of the Church are members of this Society.

THE MISSION BAND meets fortnightly on Thursday, at 3 P. M., during the winter season.
