The council is aware that this amount is small, but the principle involved is a practical acknowledgment of the debt of gratitude for the material assistance and protection rendered the colony, past and present, and an evidence of lovalty to His Majesty the King.





AN ABUNDANT HARVEST

Gen. Bingham, Three Deputies and Secretary Lose Their Jobs Thru a Mayoral Decree

NEW YORK, July 1.—One of the most drastic upheavals in New York City's police history came to-day, when Mayor McClellan summarily removed Commissioner Theodore A. Blingham for insubordination, after the latter's refusal to comply with certain orders issued by the mayor yesterday.

The mayor's orders came at the conclusion of his investigation into the alleged police persecution of George B. Duffy, a Brooklyn lad, who, it was claimed, had been repeatedly arrested without just cause, and whose photograph was retained in the rogues' gallery, despite the failure of the police

ment.

The resignations of Deputy Police Commissioner Hansen, F. H. Bugher and Arthur Woods, and of Secretary Daniel Slattery were accepted by Commissioner Bingham just before he was removed from office. He had declined to dismiss Hansen and Slattery.

As the head of the new regime, the mayor at once appointed William F. Baker, hitherto a deputy commissioner, who indicated that a considerable change in the policy of the department was to be expected. "The law will hereafter be enforced," he declared, "with reference to the fact that New

There were many ready to-night to take up the cudgels in behalf of Gen. Bingham, and there were indications that some of the political reform organizations of the city would register their opposition to the mayor's action.

The splendid promises for a big crop of cereals in Ontario are not proving ike we are getting.

Barley, fall wheat, spring wheat an oats are all rapidly heading out over the country, and unless we have cop-ous showers during the next few days there will be a decidedly light crop of

As it is, there is not going to be the yield in Ontario that was expect-ed. A great deal of grain was sown late owing to the wet spring, and this late, owing to the wet spring, and this will not bring much in harvest.

The early sown crops are all doing well, and there will be some very fair yields of fall wheat, goose wheat, barley and early oats.

A large acreage of buckwheat is going in, and it is quite likely some of the late sown grains will be plowed up and sown to this cereal.

Corn is looking well and the pro-

Corn is looking well and the pro-vince has a larger acreage than ever, Roots are only fair. Turnips should have rain now to produce germination. The hay crop is being saved now, and the weather is all that can be asked for curing the hay. Old meadows are poor, but new clovers are better

are poor, but new clovers are bett than the average crop. In fact conditions now have to exceedingly favorable in order to even keep up Ontario's average yield.

But there is no blight or bug on the crops as yet. Peas have a big acreage and so far the government report, while probably overly optimistic, in many points tells of fewer parasitic enemies on peas than have been known

Harvest in Ontario is approaching fast. Next week some fall wheat fields of the Lake Eric districts will be ready for the binder, while a rainless week will paint the big part of On-tario with the yellow gold of harvest.




