MERY DEL VAL'S MISSION

Is Not to Undo the Immutable Decree of the Holy Father.

Montreal, March 31 .- (Special.)-The Quebec Conservative papers publish this morning two important cables said to have passed between a prominent Roman Catholie of this city and an influential ecclesiastic in Rome, neither of whom, however, is named. The latter, nevertheless, is believed to be Archbishop Begin, They are

"News circulates here that the Papal delegate named by the Pope on the subject of Manitoba schools is important. Liberals affirm that he comes to force acceptance of the school settlement, and to blame the bishops. Will you obtain and send positive information? Our population desire exact information. (Signed) "O."

THE VATICAN'S ANSWER.

The answer came yesterday, as follows "Rome, March 30. The answer came yesterday, as follows:

"Rome, March 30.

"To C., Quebec:
"Monsignor Raphael Mery Del Val has been named apostolic delegate to Canada. His mission is not to becare the approval of the school settlement and by Mr. Laurier with Manitoba. That settlement is not acceptable. Rome condemns 1, and the Congregation of the Propaganda is unable to approve this precauded settlement, which is contrary to 'Latholic doctrine. The Holy Father and the Cardinal Prefect have declared to several canadian bisbops, not only Mgr. Langevin and Mgr. Begin, that the pretended settlement cannot be accepted, and they have agreed to fight it. The Pope has not changed this decision, which is immutable, and the detegate has not been sent to undo what His Hellness has encouraged the bishops to do. Mgr. Mery Del Val does not, then, go to Canada to have the bylaw accepted, neither to blame your bishops, who are held here in high esteem. He is not sent on a report of the propaganda, but on the recommendation of the Pontifical Secretary of State, to obtain a settlement more favorable and more conformable to Catholic doctrine. The Hon.


