1. The Association of the Branch of the
2. Its object is to promote Curling in Canada and Ontario; to unite in one organization all other neighbouring clubs, to maintain connections with other Clubs, as a corresponding Club, as a corresponding Club,

4. The affairs of the Club shall be managed by a Representative Committee, hereinafter provided for, the office-bearers and committees for the year.
5. An Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held on the Second Tuesday

BY-LAWS, REGULATIONS, ETC.

I.—OF THE CONSTITUTION.

1. The Association shall be called the Ontario Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club.
2. Its objects shall be to promote the Game of Curling in Canada, and mainly in the Province of Ontario; to unite all the curling clubs in the Province in one organization; to hold fraternal intercourse with other neighbouring curling associations; and to maintain connection with the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, as a corresponding association.
3. Its membership shall consist of the members, *regular and occasional*, of all curling clubs which may be received into the Association, and conform to the rules thereof, as adopted.
4. The affairs of the Association shall be managed by a Representative Committee, composed of one representative appointed by each affiliated club, as hereinafter provided, which shall have power to elect the office-bearers of the Association, and to appoint committees for the transaction of the business thereof.
5. An Annual General Meeting of the members of the Association shall be held in Toronto, on the Second Tuesday in April of each year, to receive the

Annual Report of the Representative Committee, and take action upon the same; and to transact such other business as may be necessary.

6. No new law shall be enacted, and no existing law shall be altered or repealed, until approved of by at least two-thirds of the members present at the Annual General Meeting of the Association, and unless notice of such alteration or addition shall have been previously given at the preceding semi-annual meeting of the Representative Committee in October.

II.—OF CLUBS.

1. Any curling club shall be eligible to be received into the Association, which has a membership of not fewer than eight persons; and which has a constitution and a staff of office-bearers, including President, Vice-President, Treasurer and Secretary, and Representative Members.

2. Clubs may be received into the Association at any meeting of the Representative Committee; and provisionally at any meeting of the Executive Committee, until confirmed or otherwise disposed of at the next ensuing meeting of the Representative Committee.

3. Every club desiring admission to the Association shall furnish a list of its office-bearers and members, and name of club; and shall agree to be governed by the Rules of the Association; and must be proposed by one member of the Representative Committee and seconded by another; and a two-thirds majority of votes of those present shall decide the question.

4. Every club shall elect annually, and not later than ten days before date of the Semi-Annual Meeting in October, two persons as its representatives to the Representative Committee; the second to act only in the absence of the first, who must be a regular member

mittee, and of the club he represents, but the second may be a member of any affiliated club; and no person shall, at any meeting of the Representative Committee, represent more than two clubs.

5. No person can be a member *regular* of more than one affiliated club at one and the same time; and the lists of members sent in by the secretaries of local clubs to the Secretary of the Association for publication in the Annual for the season, shall determine the membership of each person and club for that season. The status of new members received into a local club, after publication of Annual, can only be established by the certificate of the Secretary of the Association, that their names have been added to the roll of the local club and dues paid. Should the name of any person be returned in the list of more than one club, such person shall be disqualified in all of them, until the General Secretary shall be notified by him that his name has been withdrawn from every list except the one to which it properly belongs. Persons who, from change of residence or other sufficient reason, find it desirable, may withdraw from one club and may be received into another during the curling season; but the change, before coming into effect, must be assented to by both clubs, and be approved of by the Executive Committee; but no such change, or any other reason, shall make it lawful for any curler to play in any one season for or on behalf of more than one club for prizes allocated by the Association, or given under its auspices. Any club playing an Association Prize Match with one or more curlers in its ranks not properly qualified as members, shall forfeit all right to the prize if it shall have been successful in the contest.

6. If any person becomes or is a member of more than one club, he shall not play in any match against the club of which he is a regular member.

7. Clubs may classify their members in any way they deem suitable, as Honorary, Regular and Occasional.

Entrance Fee and Annual Dues shall be payable for each member, *regular and occasional*, returned belonging to the club, but only members *regular* shall be entitled to take part in the Association games and be eligible to the Representative Committee and first Representatives.

III.—OF THE REPRESENTATIVE COMMITTEE.

1. The Representative Committee, composed of a representative from each affiliated club (see Cap. II, section 4), shall hold two regular meetings in each year, viz.: on the Third Tuesday in October, and on the day of the Annual General meeting of the Members of the Association in April, besides such special meetings as may be called by the proper office-bearers. At all such meetings seven shall be a quorum.
2. At the meeting in October the Representative Committee shall elect their office-bearers for the year ensuing, who shall also be the office-bearers of the Association, and shall come into office immediately upon their election, and continue until their successors are appointed. They shall consist of a Patron, a President, a First and Second Vice-President, a Chaplain, and a Secretary and Treasurer. At same meeting shall also be appointed the Standing Committees, viz.: The Executive Committee, consisting of the office-bearers and other six representative members; the Committee on the Annual, the Committee on Complaints and Appeals, and the Committee of Auditors; all members of the Association shall be eligible for any office therein, and the mode of election shall, in all cases, be by ballot, when more than one person has been proposed and seconded for any office.

Committee; and he shall sign the minutes of such meetings after they have been confirmed, and all official documents. The chairman at all meetings shall have a casting vote in case of a tie, as well as a deliberative vote.

b. The First Vice-President shall take the place and discharge the duties of the President when he is absent; and the Second Vice-President shall have the same authority in the absence of the President and the First Vice-President; and should all of them be absent from any regular or special meeting, it shall be competent for the meeting assembled to elect a chairman, who shall have, *pro tem.*, all the rights and powers of the President.

c. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep full and correct minutes of all the meetings of the Association, the Representative Committee and the Executive Committee, and shall conduct all correspondence arising out of same, and generally carry out the work of the Association. He shall levy and collect all dues and fees, and pay all accounts, and shall keep regular and correct accounts of all moneys collected and bills paid. His books and accounts shall at all times be open to the inspection of the office-bearers, and shall be balanced on the first of April of each year.

d. The Executive Committee shall constitute the board of management, and shall conduct the business of the Association.

e. The Committee on Complaints and Appeals shall receive from the Secretary and adjudicate upon all complaints and appeals from clubs in regard to their curling intercourse with each other, and especially with reference to competitions for prizes played for under the auspices of the Association, and shall report to the Executive Committee. Their decisions shall always be communicated to the contending parties in writing, and will be held to be accepted and acquiesced in, unless they are notified to the contrary within ten

days after their decision shall have been mailed to the said contending parties, and the reasons for non-acquiescence set forth in said notification.

f. The Committee on the Annual shall be charged with the publication of the Annual of the Association which shall be issued every year about 30th November and shall contain a list of the office-bearers of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club and of this Association, along with lists of the office-bearers and members of the clubs in connection therewith, the rules and regulations of the Association, the minutes of Annual General Meetings and of meetings of the Representative Committee, the financial condition of the Association from year to year, reports of competitions for prizes allocated by the Association, along with records of other matters affecting curling, and calculated to promote the game in Canada.

g. The Committee of Auditors shall examine and certify the Treasurer's accounts from year to year.

3. No complaint or appeal will be received unless sent in to the Secretary of the Association in writing, within one week from the date on which occurred the matter of the said complaint or appeal; and no complaint or appeal shall be decided until all parties thereto shall have been given an opportunity to state their case; and any party failing or neglecting to show cause within one week after being notified to do so by the Committee shall thereby be held to have departed from their claim, and to have forfeited all right to any further hearing.

At other meetings no business shall be transacted other than that for which the meeting was convened, and which had been clearly set forth in the circular calling the meeting. The President, the Secretary, or any five members of the Executive Committee, may convene a special meeting of the Representative Committee at any time.

IV.—OF ENTRANCE AND ANNUAL FEES.

1. The fees payable by clubs shall be an entrance fee, and annual dues.
2. The entrance fee shall be payable on admission, and according to the following scale, viz. :—

Clubs of 8 members and under 20	\$4 00
Clubs of 20 members and under 50	6 00
Clubs of 50 members and under 100 ..	8 00
Clubs of 100 members and over	10 00

3. The annual dues shall be payable in advance, the first annual payment to be made, with entrance fee, on admission, and at the following rate, viz. : A club rate of one dollar and fifty cents from each club, and an additional sum of ten cents in respect of each member, *regular and occasional*, of the club ; and no club shall be called upon to pay more than ten dollars for members' dues. The membership rate shall be doubled for names of members sent in after Annual is made up.

4. From these sources shall be formed a common fund to be under the control of the Executive Committee, and from which shall be defrayed the printing, advertising and incidental expenses of the Association, and the cost of medals and other prizes allocated by it.
5. No club in arrears shall be entitled to compete for any prize of the Association.
6. If any club shall fall three years in arrear of the payment of its annual dues, it shall be struck off the list of the Association, and shall not be reinstated except as a new club.

V.—OF THE GAME.

1. The standard length of the rink for play shall be 42 yards from hack to tee. If the ice turns out to be wet or soft before a game commences, or after it has been begun, the skips of both sides in the match, with the umpire as chairman, shall meet and decide whether the rink shall be shortened, and to what extent; and in no case shall it be shortened to less than 33 yards. The umpire shall have a deliberative vote, and, in case of a tie, a casting vote; when there is no umpire present the skips may call upon any neutral curler to act as umpire, who shall exercise all the powers of an umpire in the case. No important match shall be commenced if the ice be not in a condition fairly to test the curling skill of the competing players; and it shall be stopped and declared "off," if, after it has been begun, the condition of the ice, by reason of thaw setting in or snow falling, becomes such as not to afford a fair test of the curling skill of the competing players; or darkness comes on sufficient to prevent the stones at the tee from being distinctly seen from the further hack; and in all cases of stopped matches the postponed game shall be commenced *de novo*. The umpire's decision, regarding the condition of the ice and atmosphere, shall be final in all cases.

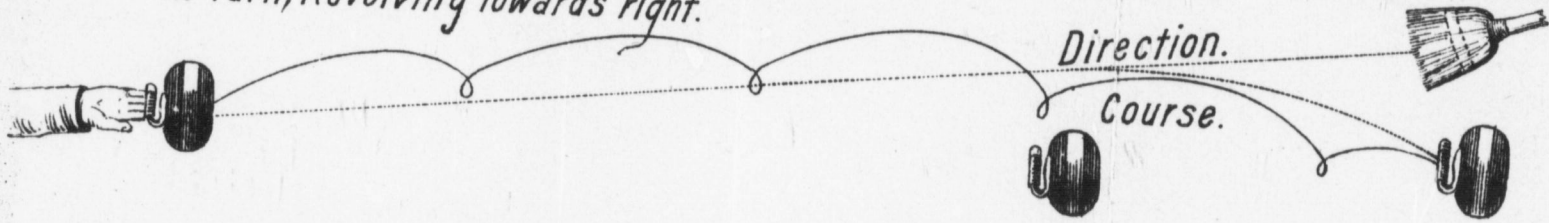
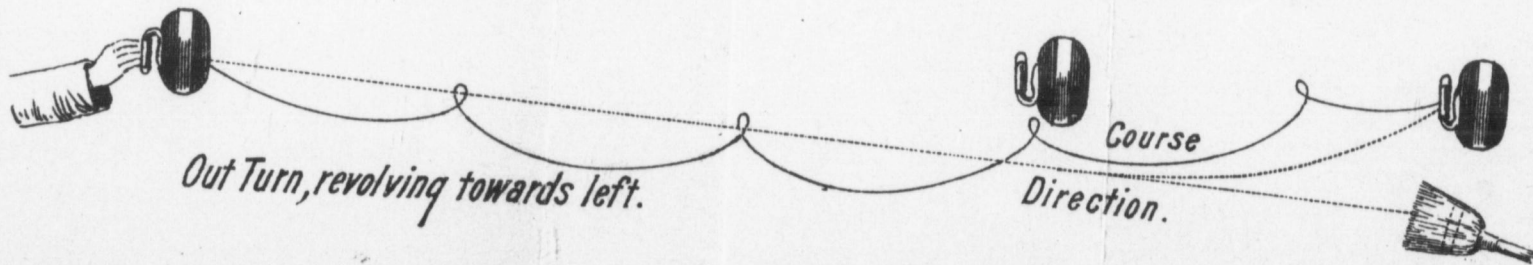
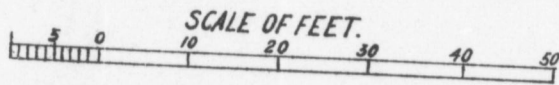
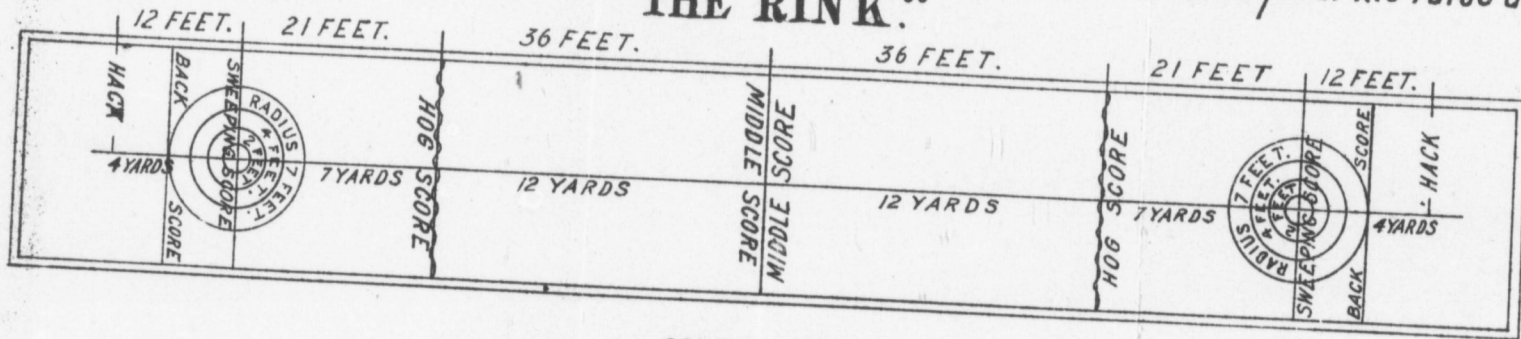


Diagram to be drawn on the ice previous to playing and referred to throughout the rules as

2. The tees to be made 38 yards apart, and around each as a centre shall be described a circle of seven feet radius, which shall be called the "Home," or "Ring." To facilitate measurements, intermediate circles may also be described around the tee. Every stone within, or resting upon the outer ring, shall be entitled to be counted in the game; no stone shall be considered *without a circle*, unless it is entirely clear of that circle, nor shall a stone be considered *over a line*, unless it has crossed and entirely cleared it. In every case this is to be decided by a square placed upon the ice.

3. From, and in exact alignment with both tees, a line, called the centre line, shall be drawn to a point four yards behind each tee; at this point a line shall be drawn, at a right angle to the centre line, on which the hack shall be cut. The hack shall not exceed six inches in length, nor shall the inner edge thereof be more than three inches from the centre line, so that all stones shall be delivered with their centre upon the centre line.

4. Other lines, called the MIDDLE SCORE, the HOG SCORE, the SWEEPING SCORE and BACK SCORE, shall also be drawn on the ice at right angles to the centre line. The MIDDLE SCORE shall be drawn at midway between the two tees, to point out the place at which sweeping may ordinarily be commenced. The HOG SCORE shall be drawn at a distance from each tee of one-sixth of the length from hack to further tee; and shall indicate the point, which if a played stone fails to pass, it shall be counted a hog, and removed from the ice, unless it has been prevented from passing by striking another played stone resting inside said hog score. The SWEEPING SCORE shall be drawn across the tees, for the guidance of the skips in sweeping. The BACK SCORE shall be drawn just outside and behind the 14 feet circle around the tee (the home): all stones having passed this score must be removed from the ice.

5. All matches to be the majority of shots won after playing a certain number of heads, or definite period of time, to be agreed on by the competing clubs before beginning to play. In the event of both parties being equal at the conclusion of the match, play shall be continued, under the direction of the umpire, by all the rinks engaged, for another head, or for such additional number of heads as may be necessary to decide the match.
6. Every rink to be composed of four players a side, each using two stones, and playing one stone alternately with his opponent, and the rotation of players observed in the first head shall not be changed during the match.
7. The two skips opposing each other shall settle by lot, or in any other way they may agree upon, which party shall lead in the first head, after which the winning party shall lead.
8. The skips shall have the exclusive management and direction of the game for their respective parties, and may play last or in any part of the game they please; but are not entitled to change their places when once fixed. When their turn to play comes, they shall each appoint one of their players to act in their places as skips of the game, and must take the position of ordinary players, until they have played and returned to the tee-head as skips.
9. Players, during the course of each end, shall be arranged along the sides, but well off the rink, as their skips may direct; and no party, except when sweeping according to rule, shall go upon the middle of the rink. Skips alone to stand within the 14 feet circle, or home; the skip of the party playing to have choice of place, and must not be obstructed by the other in front of the tee, while behind it the privileges of both as regards sweeping shall be equal.

If a player should play out of turn, the stone so played may be stopped in its course and returned to the player ; should the mistake not be discovered till the stone be at rest, or has struck another stone, the opposing skip shall add one to his score, and have the option of allowing the game to proceed, or of declaring the end null and void. But if another stone be played before the mistake has been noticed, the end must be finished as if it had been played properly from the beginning.

12. If any player engaged, or belonging to either of the competing clubs, shall speak to, taunt, or otherwise interrupt any other player, not of his own party, while preparing to play his stone, and so as to disconcert him, one shot shall be added to the score of the party so interrupted, for each interruption, and the play proceed.

13. If in sweeping, or otherwise, a *running* stone be marred by any of the party to which it belongs, it shall be put off the ice, and the opposing skip shall have the option to add one to his score and allow the game to proceed, or to call the end null and void ; but if marred by any of the adverse party, it shall be placed wherever the skip of the party to which it belongs may direct. If marred by any other means the player shall replay the stone. Should any *played* stone be displaced by any of the players before the head is reckoned, it shall be placed as near as possible where it lay, to the satisfaction of or by the skip opposed to the party displacing. If displaced by any neutral party, both skips to agree upon the position to which it is to be returned, and if they fail to agree the umpire shall decide.

14. The sweeping shall be under the direction and control of the skips. Except when snow is falling

upon or drifting over the rink a stone shall not be swept until it has crossed the MIDDLE SCORE, and shall not be swept by the party to whose side it belongs until it comes to the SWEEPING SCORE, but all stones which *they have passed the sweeping score* may be swept EITHER SKIP ONLY. Skips will have liberty to sweep behind the tee at all times, except when a player is receiving directions to play from his skip. All sweeping shall be across the rink, and the sweeper must be in front of the stone being swept, and at one side thereof; and no sweepings shall either be moved forward or left in front of a running stone, or of a stone "at rest." It shall not be allowable for the party to whom a running stone belongs, to place their broom before it or behind it to screen it from wind, unless with consent of both skips; and the use of a broom or any other instrument as a fan, either to promote or retard the running of a stone, is strictly forbidden and is to be dealt with as "a running stone," marred by the party to which it belongs. See sec. 13.

15. All stones shall be of a circular shape. No stone, including handle, shall be of a greater weight than fifty pounds, or of a greater circumference than thirty-six inches, or of less height than one-eighth part of its greatest circumference.

16. No stone or side of a stone shall be changed after a match has been begun unless with the consent of the opposing skip. Should a stone happen to be broken during a game, the largest fragment shall be considered in the game for that end, and the player shall be entitled to use another stone or another pair during the remainder of the game.

17. Should a played stone roll over, or stop on its edge or top, it shall be put off the ice. Should the handle quit the stone in delivery, the player will not be entitled to replay the stone unless he retains his hold of the handle.

18. No measuring or shots allowable previous to the termination of the end. Disputed shots to be deter-

mined by the vice-skips; or, if they disagree, by the umpire; or, if there is no umpire, by some neutral person chosen by the skips. All measurements to be taken from centre of tee to nearest point of stone, after removing stones intervening.

19. If any of the competing rinks is not ready to begin play at the hour named for a match, one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting.

VI.—OF ICE RINKS.

1. All District Medal matches and general competitions at the Points' Game must be played on new or virgin ice, or on neutral ice; and all important matches should be played on the same.

ICE FOR CURLING SHALL BE DEEMED NEW OR VIRGIN ICE:

- a. When it has not previously been played on.
- b. When, since last played on, it shall have been flooded so completely, as that the water shall have come to its natural level, over the entire ice surface, before freezing.
- c. If, after being last used for curling, the ice shall have been refaced by sprinkling with water, and the tees changed, either at least two feet sideways or ten feet lengthways, so as to get rid of grooves or channels formed in the course of play.
- d. Shaving off nodules or protuberances from the surface of the ice, or the application of any other mechanical operations, having for their object the bringing of the ice to a true and correct level, shall not be held as degrading ice otherwise entitled to be called new or virgin ice; but such operations must be

carried out under the direction of the umpire; and no case shall any special preparation of the ice made, intended, or calculated, or having for its object to facilitate the making of any particular shot, or otherwise pervert the ice surface from the true and correct level.

e. It is desirable that artificial single rinks should be constructed not less than 18 feet in width by 152 feet in length, so as to admit of changing the tees both sideways and lengthways.

VII.—OF MEDAL COMPETITIONS.

1. To promote curling intercourse and friendly rivalry between clubs comprised in the Ontario Branch, medals, to be called Royal Canadian District Medals, shall be allocated annually for competition, according to the rules of the game, between each two clubs which did not win one in the previous season.
2. Medals to be competed for by the individual members of the club, at the Points' Game, shall be allocated to such clubs as are thought too far distant from other clubs to compete with them, and to any club left out in making the distribution of the clubs into pairs.
3. The Representative Committee shall have the sole power of disposing the clubs into pairs, and of appointing umpires to superintend medal competitions; and in doing so they shall take into account distance, facilities for meeting, and all specialties, including the relative number of regular members in the clubs. The arrangement of the clubs for medal competitions, and appointment of umpires to superintend them, shall be made at the meeting of the Representative Committee to be held in October in each year.
4. The umpire appointed to superintend a District Medal Competition shall correspond with both clubs,

and endeavour to get them to agree upon time and place for the contest; if they cannot be brought to a mutual agreement, he shall, in his discretion, appoint both time and place for the competition, making his decision so that it will be fair and equitable to both parties, and shall give notice to both in writing, allowing reasonable time for them to comply with the appointment.

5. Should either club fail to appear on the ice, agreeably to appointment, the medal shall be awarded off-hand to the club putting in an appearance, provided the umpire be satisfied of its having complied with the regulations. Should neither club appear on the ice, the allocation shall lapse and become void.

6. When the umpire appointed to superintend a Medal Match finds that he will not be able to do so personally, he shall appoint another curler, well conversant with the game, to act as his deputy, who shall have all the powers of the umpire, but the report of the match must be countersigned by the umpire, and all such reports must be transmitted to the Secretary of the Branch within three days after the match has been played, and must contain the names of the players in each rink on both sides, the number of heads played, the result of the match and of each separate rink, as well as the place where and the time when played, and such other information as the schedule may call for.

7. Should the two clubs meet agreeably to appointment to play the match, and the umpire or his deputy not be present, the skips representing the competing clubs shall meet and appoint any regular member of any associated club as acting umpire for the occasion, who shall have all the rights and privileges of the regular umpire.

8. All medals not played for, during the season for which they are allocated, shall be withdrawn.

9. All District Medals shall be contested for by at least eight players a side, and no club shall be

compelled to play with more than that number unless its membership exceeds twenty; and, if beyond that number, not any more than one rink of four men for each complete series of seven regular ordinary members on its list.

10. All competitions for District Medals shall be played by twenty-two ends or heads; unless, before beginning to play, some other number of ends shall have been agreed upon by the competing skips.


11. Umpires in all cases are enjoined to hear objections from the losing party before awarding medals.

VIII.—OF THE POINTS' GAME.

1. Rinks shall be laid off in accordance with the diagram given for this game in the last published Annual. Within the 14 feet circle, a circle 8 feet in diameter shall be drawn around the tee, and a centre line or score from the hack to the hog score; and the length of the rink from hack to tee shall be 42 yards.

2. Lots shall be drawn for the order of playing; each competitor shall change position one place each point, thus: The first player at any of the points to be the last in playing at next point, and the second player at any point to be the first at the next, and so on. Each competitor shall use two stones, and play them, the one immediately after the other, and shall not during the competition change the side of a stone, or the stone itself, unless it happens to be broken.

3. Every competitor to play four shots at each of the nine following points of the game, viz.: Striking, Inwicking, Drawing, Guarding, Chap and Lie, Wick and Curl In, Raising, Drawing through a Port, and Chipping the Winner, according to the following definitions, and each successful shot shall count one:

a. *Striking*.—A stone placed on the sweeping score, and with its inner edge two feet from the tee, to be struck out of the 14 feet circle.

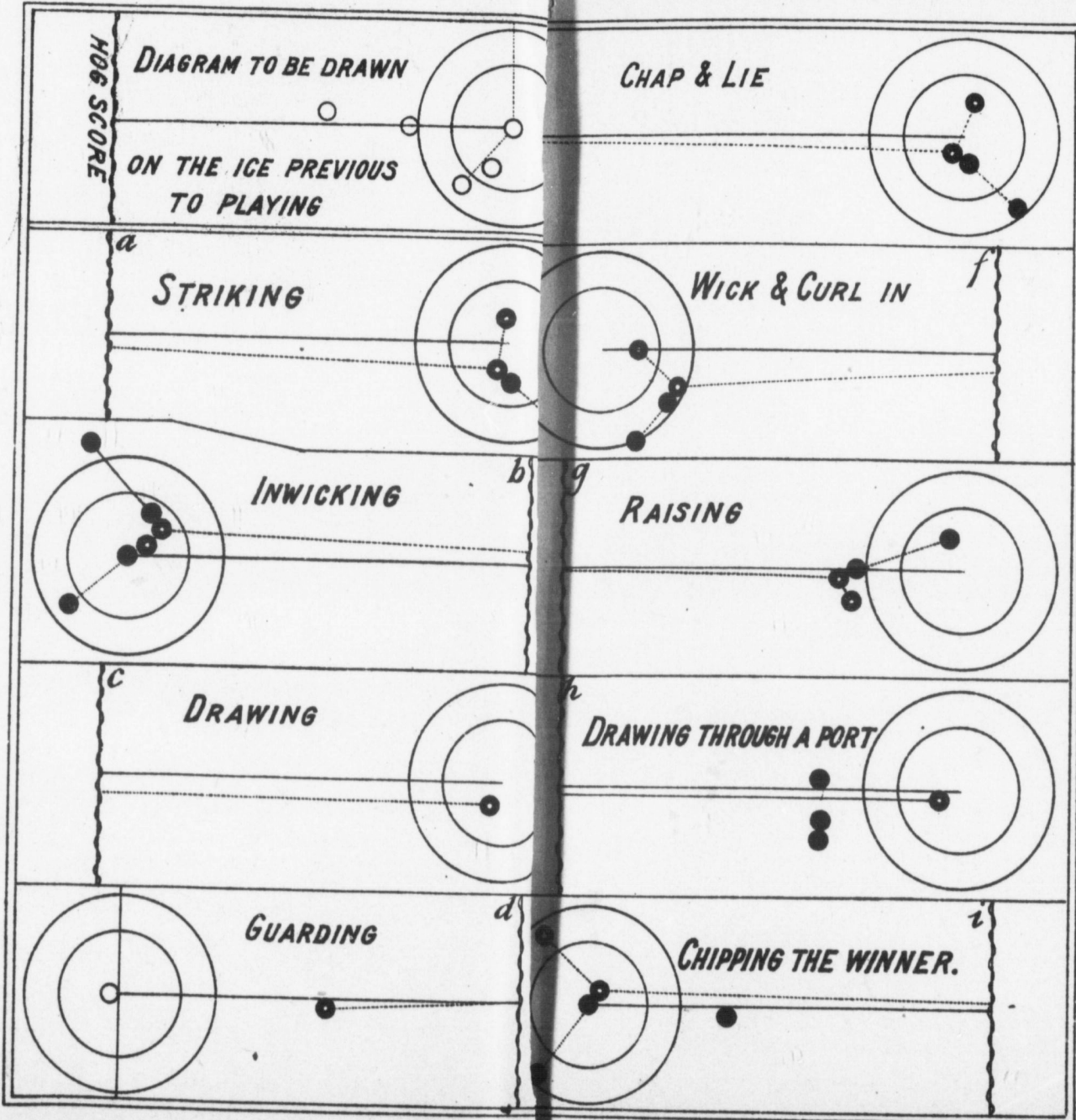

b. Inwicking.—One stone is placed upon the tee, and another with its inner edge two feet distant from the tee, and its fore edge on a line drawn from the tee at an angle of 45 degrees with the centre line; the stone played must hit the latter, and perceptibly move the former. ♣

c. Drawing.—The stone played to lie within or on the 8 feet circle.

d. Guarding.—The stone played to rest on the central line; to be over the hog; but must not touch the stone to be guarded placed with its fore edge on the tee.

e. Chap and Lie.—The stone placed on the sweeping score with its inner edge one foot from the tee, to be struck out of the 8 feet circle, and the stone played to rest within or on the same. ♣

f. Wick and Curl In.—A stone to be placed with its inner edge six feet distant from the tee and its fore edge on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line; the stone played to hit this stone and rest within or on the 8 feet circle. ♣

g. Raising.—A stone placed with its centre on the central line, and its inner edge seven feet distant from the tee, to be struck into or on the 8 feet circle.

h. Drawing through a Port.—One stone to be placed with its inner edge on the central line, ten feet in front of the tee, and another stone placed parallel thereto and with its inner edge two feet from the central line; the stone played to pass between these two stones, without touching either, and to rest within or on the 8 feet circle. ♣

i. Chipping the Winner.—A stone to be placed on the tee, and another with its inner edge ten feet distant, just touching the central line and half guarding the one on the tee; the stone played to pass without touching the guard and perceptibly move the other. ♣

13 In Striking, Inwicking, Chap and Lie, Wick Curl In, Drawing through a Port, and Chipping Winner, two of the chances to be made on the side of the tee, and the other two chances on the other

4. In the event of two or more competitors making the same number of shots, they shall each play five shots at Outwicking; that is, a stone placed with its inner edge six feet distant from the tee, and its centre on a line making an angle of 45 degrees with the central line, to be struck within or on the 8 feet circle. If the competition cannot be decided by these shots the umpire may order two to be played at one or more of the preceding points, until a decision can be made.

5. In the Points' Game the Rink may be swept often as required during the intervals between the playing of stones, but no running stone shall be swept.

NOTE.—It will save much time, if, in playing local medals, two rinks be prepared lying parallel to each other, the tee of the one being at the reverse end of the other rink; every competitor plays both stones up the one rink and immediately afterwards down the other; finishing thus, at one round, all his chances at that point.

The above rules and definitions for the Points' Game in Chap. VIII. are applicable only to medals given by the General Association, and are not intended to supersede any regulations made by local clubs, in competition for their own private medals.

Mr. R. Crawford moved, seconded by Mr. Boyd, That the minutes of last meeting having been published in the Annual, the reading of them now be dispensed with, and that they be confirmed; and it was carried.

Letters were read from the Secretary of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, and the Secretary of the newly-formed Maritime Curling Association.

Mr. McCracken moved that these letters be received and laid on the table, which was seconded by Mr. Malcolm, and carried.

The Secretary then read the following Reports, viz.: Reports of Competitions in season 1885-86, for

ROYAL CANADIAN DISTRICT MEDALS.

Last season, 28 medals were allocated for competition among the affiliated clubs, of which 2 were for Local, and 26 for inter-club matches; and of these 1 Local and 24 District Medals have been played for, and duly reported; and once more we have the pleasure of reporting the grateful absence of complaint and appeal. All the reports bear abundant evidence that the interest which attaches to these matches continues unabated, and that the honour of winning and possessing a Royal Canadian Curling Medal, or of adding one more to the number of those previously won, is still an object of high ambition in every club; and while the keenness of the rivalry is in no degree lessening, the spirit of fairness and of generous feeling towards opponents seems to be increasing, as is clearly indicated by the continued absence of appeals against

the conduct of winning clubs or the decisions of the Umpires; and thus the liberal allocation of these medals is promoting not only skill in Curling, but also friendship and good-will throughout the whole Province.

We would recommend that, in all cases where the two clubs, to whom a medal has been allocated, have not played the match by the 10th of February, the Umpire shall then exercise his authority to name time and place for the competition, as provided in Rules, chap. vii., section 4.

The Secretary then read Report of Competition for the Ontario Tankard, of which the following is the summary, viz.: The Primary Contest was carried out in every one of the Groups, and was taken part in by sixty-one clubs, the result being that Thamesville Club proved winner in Group No. 1, Bright Club in No. 2, St. Catharines Club in No. 3, Guelph Club in No. 4, Listowel Club in No. 5, Collingwood Club in No. 6, Toronto Granite Club in No. 7, Bowmanville Club in No. 8, and Brockville Club in No. 9; and all of these clubs were engaged in the Final Competition, which was won by the Toronto Granite Club. *For Report at length see pages 127-130.*

There was then read the Report of Match, Toronto and County of York vs. Province of Ontario.

This match, authorized at last Semi-Annual Meeting in October, was played at Toronto, on Wednesday, the 27th January, and was very successful; twenty-two Rinks, one from each of as many clubs in the Province, represented Ontario, while the City and County made up an equal number by drawing 5 from the Caledonian, 4 from each of the Granite and Moss Park, 3 from the Toronto, 2 each from the Scarboro' Heather and the Maple Leaf, and 1 each from the Scarboro' and the Markham Clubs. Several other Provincial Rinks had promised to take part in the match, but were, for various reasons, unable to be present, and their competitors on the side of the City and County were thus compelled to play friendly games with each other, or to remain simply spectators.

The ice was in splendid condition, the playing good, and in most cases, the competing Rinks were very evenly matched.

At the close it was found that the City and County had succeeded in piling up a score of 398, while the Province had only reached 382, thus leaving the City and County winners by 16 shots; an average win of less than one shot to each rink engaged.

The City Clubs entertained the visitors to refreshments during and after the match, and a general good time was enjoyed, and the desire was universally expressed that a similar match be repeated annually.

It was then moved by Mr. J. D. Henderson, that these reports of matches now read be received and adopted, which was seconded by Mr. W. D. McIntosh and carried.

The Secretary next read the report on the Annual. The continued appreciation of the Annual issued by the Association affords the deepest satisfaction to the Committee. The large issue of seven hundred copies has been nearly disposed of; and the volume, although enlarged in size and improved in appearance, is still self-sustaining. That portion of it devoted to the recording of club matches might be considerably extended, and the extension would not only enhance the value of the Annual, but would also promote the prosperity of the club whose "work on the ice," during each successive season, is therein recorded; and the Committee are hopeful that for next Annual the number of clubs furnishing reports of their matches, both with other clubs and within their own membership, will be largely increased.

The appeal made by the Committee last year for short, practical papers on matters connected with curling is again renewed. The subject of the preparation of ice for curling, although ably treated in a valuable paper by Mr. Hampton in the Annual for 1883, is neither exhausted nor generally understood; the lighting and ventilation of covered rinks, and the best material for their floors, are deserving of consideration; and the internal management of clubs, particularly in regard to the formation of the members into rinks for ordinary, and also for special matches might well form the theme of interesting papers.

The original curling songs in last Annual are a credit to their authors and to Canada: that by Mr. McLachlan has been reproduced in whole or in part

by journals of established literary repute; and the other, by Mr. Douglas, has already become popular at the social gatherings of the brotherhood. We hope still to advance in this line, and thereby to promote that geniality and good fellowship which should ever be associated with curlers and the game of curling.

The Committee are fully conscious that the success of the Annual depends largely upon the zealous labours of the Secretaries of the local clubs in its behalf; and, while gratefully acknowledging and thanking them for their efforts in the past, they trust that they will use even greater diligence, first, in furnishing matter for the Annual, especially in the form of club matches; and second, in promoting its sale in their respective clubs.

It was moved by Mr. Hodgetts, seconded by Judge Dartnell, that the report be received and adopted; and it was carried.

The Secretary then read the Financial Statement (see page 140), and, on motion of Mr. Boyd, seconded by Mr. Davison, it was received and adopted.

The General Report of the Executive Committee was then read as follows, viz.:—

The progress made by the Ontario Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club during the past year has been quite satisfactory—five new clubs have been received into the Association; a large number of District and Local medals have been competed for; the primary and final competitions for the Ontario Tankard have been conducted; the Annual has been issued and distributed among the clubs; the match between the city of Toronto and the county of York on the one side, and all the rest of the Province of Ontario on the other, was played, and proved such a very agreeable meeting that it is likely to become an annual event; and all the operations of the Association have been carried out energetically and pleasantly; the finances show a handsome surplus, and the Branch stands to-day in a very happy position.

Your Committee are gratified in being able to report that, notwithstanding the changeable character of the weather during the past curling season, not one Association medal has been awarded to any club through the default of their competitors by absence, but all have been actually played for, and thus the main purpose for which they are allocated has been fulfilled.

The competitions for the Ontario Tankard were specially interesting; an unusually large number of clubs took part in the Primary, which, for the first time, was conducted in every one of the groups; and, when the clubs winning in the group competitions came forward to take part in the Final, it was found that of the nine only one had previously achieved this honour. The final contest was very exciting, and on the second day the playing was excellent, and the clubs well matched.

The management of the group competitions seems to require some change, as dissatisfaction has arisen on more than one occasion, in cases where the Umpire in charge was connected with a club surviving towards the end of the competition; and your Committee recommend that, when in the "primary," the competing clubs have been reduced to not more than three, the Umpire, if a member of one of the surviving clubs, shall cease to act and shall appoint a Deputy-Umpire from one of the retired clubs, who shall conduct the further matches in the competition.

Your Committee find the presence of nine competing clubs in the final not desirable, and they recommend that the number of groups be restricted to eight as before: the plan adopted last season, of playing off the Bye in the first drawing, by a special match on the evening of the first day, was necessary to prevent the competition extending into a third day, but it was felt to be only the less of two evils.

Your Committee made choice of an appropriately ornamented banner as a fitting trophy to be presented yearly to the club winning the Ontario Tankard, as a

permanent memento of their success—and carried out their resolution last year. It was exhibited in an unfinished condition during the final competition, and was universally admired, and the Granite Club deem it the most precious ornament of their elegant club-room.

Your Committee would impress upon all associated clubs the necessity of holding their Annual Meeting for organizing early in October, so that office-bearers may be elected, and a list of them sent to the Secretary of the Association, AT LEAST 10 DAYS before the Annual Meeting in October, in order that the newly chosen representatives who are to manage the affairs of the Branch Clubs during the ensuing season, may be invited to the meeting, and further that the Club Membership Lists may be sent forward in time to be published in the Annual of the R.C.C.C., which unfortunately was not the case last year. Your Committee desire to urge that this matter be attended to by every one of the affiliated clubs.

Your Committee have great pleasure in extending a friendly welcome to the newly-formed Maritime Curling Association; they understand it has been established to do for curling in the Maritime Provinces what the Ontario Branch has done for it in Ontario, and on the same general lines; they wish the Association every success, and invite friendly correspondence and coöperation as far as practicable.

During the past year several curlers, occupying very high rank in the brotherhood, have been removed by death. In our own Association we had, very soon after our last annual meeting, to lament the decease of Captain Charles Perry, of the Toronto Club, and a few months later the death of the Honourable Peter Gow, of the Guelph Club, who was the first President of the Ontario Branch; in concert with the sister Branch in Montreal, we mourn the sudden death of Colonel Dyde, an old and honoured curler; and with the parent club we sympathize over the departure

from this world of Dr. Sidey, for many years a leading member of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, and to whose genial muse and wise counsels that club is largely indebted; and our own club not a little, in smoothing the way for the present satisfactory relations between the Ontario Branch and the ever-honoured Royal Caledonian Curling Club, the mither of us all.

Dr. James Ross moved, seconded by Dr. Beaton, that the report now read be received and adopted; and it was carried.

Mr. J. D. Henderson gave notice that, at next meeting, he would move that, in the Primary or Group competition for the Ontario Tankard, the umpire shall give at least three days' notice before bringing on any of the matches.

Mr. Russell moved the adoption of the motion, of which he gave notice at last meeting, in reference to clubs making default, by not competing for District medals; it was seconded by Mr. Henderson, and, after being amended by omission of the clause, "and approved by umpire," it was carried.

Mr. Russell then moved in terms of notice of motion regarding medals awarded to clubs without being actually played for; it was seconded by Mr. Boyd, and, on being put to the meeting, it was declared lost.

The letter from the Secretary of the Maritime Curling Association was then taken up for consideration, and, after some general conversation, it was moved by Dr. Beaton, seconded by Judge Dartnell, and carried, "That the matter be left to the Executive Committee, to take such action in the case as they deem proper."

Dr. Ross gave notice of the following motion, to be submitted at next meeting, viz.: "That in the Primary Competition for the Tankard the words 'not less than' be inserted in the fourth line of Rule No. 2, between the word 'with' and the words 'two rinks a side';

Same day and place met the Annual General Meeting of the Ontario Branch—same Chairman and Secretary. It was moved by Mr. Boyd, seconded by Mr. D. Walker, and carried, "That the minutes of the meeting of representative members be held as read, and that they be approved.

of Toronto and County of York on the one side and the rest of the Province of Ontario on the other side be repeated during the coming season, and that the President and the first Vice-President of the Association be the managers of the respective sides.

The consideration of the acceptance, by the Grand National Curling Club of the United States, of our proposal to have an inter-club match on a large scale during the ensuing season was then taken up; and, after several members had expressed themselves very strongly in favour of an international match on a scale of reasonable magnitude, and against any such match on the scale of only a few rinks a side, it was resolved that the matter be remitted to the Executive Committee with full powers.

The Secretary was instructed to convey to the Maritime Branch of the R. C. C. C. the congratulations of the Ontario Branch on the formation of their Association, our best wishes for their success, and our readiness to coöperate with them in promoting the game of Curling throughout the Dominion of Canada.

Mr. John Bain submitted the following notice of motion, viz.: "That when a player has gone to the hack to play, he shall not leave that end until he has played both of his stones."

Mr. Badenach moved, seconded by Dr. Ross, and it was carried, That the umpires of the several groups be strongly recommended to endeavour to arrange matches between the groups during the coming season.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Michie, the retiring President, was moved by Mr. Badenach, seconded by Mr. Campbell, for his admirable conduct in the discharge of his important duties; it was warmly supported by Messrs. Walker and Flavelle, and unanimously adopted.

Mr. Badenach moved a hearty vote of thanks to the Secretary-Treasurer for his valuable and onerous services, and that he be presented with the sum of

one hundred and fifty dollars, which was seconded by Mr. Davison, and carried.

Mr. Campbell moved that a vote of thanks be tendered the Chairman for the very efficient manner in which he has conducted the business of the meeting; this was seconded by Dr. Boucher, and carried. Mr. Flavelle, in replying, expressed his high sense of the honour conferred on him by his election to the position of President of the Ontario Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club, and his firm conviction that the Association would continue to prosper, and that the game of Curling was destined to exert an ever-widening and most beneficial influence, especially upon the young men of our fair Dominion; and he then declared the meeting adjourned.

THE PAST AND THE COMING SEASON'S CURLING.

Although the weather, during the past curling season, was somewhat changeable, and the winter was prematurely brought to an end by the unusually early advent of spring, the facilities enjoyed by the curlers of Ontario in their well-constructed and well-managed rinks enabled them to enjoy a full average amount of play. All the principal public "events" came off satisfactorily, so far as "fit" ice was concerned; and the numerous private matches recorded in the daily press bear ample testimony to the assiduity with which the game of curling is followed in this Canada of ours.

For the coming season we have to look forward to a considerable number of interesting competitions, open to members of the Ontario Branch—

1. The Governor-General's Prize—Primary Competition at the Points' Game; and Final, club *versus* club, with two rinks a side, at Ottawa.
2. The thirty-three District Medals allocated by the Ontario Branch.
3. The Ontario Silver Tankard Competition: 1st, the Primary, between all the clubs in groups; and, 2nd, the Final, between the winning clubs of the several groups.
4. The Clubs in Toronto and County of York *versus* the rest of Ontario, as last year. A large gathering is expected, and a very pleasant match.
5. A challenge match between the clubs forming Group No. 7 *versus* those of Group No. 8, and the other groups will doubtless follow the example.
6. An International Match between the curlers of the United States *versus* those of Ontario—about a

hundred rinks a side are expected; and, in all probability, the place of meeting will be Toronto.

7. The Scottish Counties' Medal, at present held by Lanarkshire. Challenges from natives of any other Scotch county may be addressed to George H. Gillespie, Esq., Hamilton (see Annual for 1886, pp. 126, 127).

OBITUARY.

DIED, AT GUELPH, ON THE 24TH DAY OF FEBRUARY, 1886, AGED
SIXTY-EIGHT YEARS, THE

HONOURABLE PETER GOW,

The first President of the Ontario Branch of the R.C.C.C.

Mr. Gow was a native of Johnston, in Renfrewshire, Scotland, and came to Canada in 1842; after remaining about two years in Brockville he removed to Guelph, and finally settled there. Although for many years largely engaged in manufacturing, he always took a very active share in public affairs, and was held in high esteem by all who knew him; for twelve years he was a member of the Municipal Council, and held the office of chief magistrate for two years. In the wider sphere of political life he was elected for four consecutive terms to the Ontario Legislature (in three of these elections by acclamation); and, during Mr. Blake's Premiership, he held the office of Provincial Secretary with ability and honour.

Mr. Gow was a keen curler, and was ever foremost in promoting the game, as long as his health and strength permitted. On the formation of the Ontario Branch he was unanimously chosen President, and in that position contributed not a little to the establishment of the Association.

THE LATE

COLONEL JOHN DYDE,

C.M.G. and A.D.C. to the Queen.

By the sudden death of Col. Dyde, on 5th March last, in the eighty-ninth year of his age, the city of Montreal lost one of its most prominent citizens, and the curling fraternity one of its most genial and enthusiastic veterans.

His parents were English, and, prior to his birth, resided in Paris, France. His father, being a Royalist, was arrested by Robespierre and thrown into the Bastille, his mother escaping to Altona, Denmark, where he was born on the 24th March, 1797. Shortly afterwards the French invaded Denmark and captured Altona, necessitating another flight, this time to Hamburg, which his mother safely accomplished, disguised as a fisherman, with her baby packed in a box and carried as baggage. On being released from prison the father joined his family at Hamburg, and shortly afterwards they sailed from that port for Canada.

In 1810 John Dyde the younger entered the service of the North-West Fur Company, and in their employment spent many years in the far North-West, where, while faithfully discharging his business duties, he distinguished himself in all field and manly sports; on his return to Lower Canada he resided in Quebec until 1838 or 1839, when he removed to Montreal, and took up his permanent residence there. Although not exactly a native Briton, Col. Dyde was most

enthusiastic in his loyalty to the British Crown, and took a very active part in Canadian militia affairs, in which he rose to the full rank of colonel, and was rewarded for his services therein by being made a C.M.G.; and in 1879 he was further honoured in being appointed an A.D.C. to the Queen.

Col. Dyde was also a keen curler, and took the liveliest interest in everything pertaining to the royal game. While in Quebec he was connected with the curling club there, and, on removing to Montreal, he became a member of the Montreal Club, and was one of its most active members. For many years preceding and at the time of his death he held the office of President of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Caledonian Curling Club; and, until within two or three years, he was an active participator in the game, and was wont to attribute his longevity and robustness to the delightful and invigorating exercise which the game of Curling affords its votaries.

His tall, commanding form and soldierly bearing made him conspicuous wherever he appeared, while his noble, affable, and generous nature secured for him universal respect and esteem. When he died he left hosts of mourning friends, and no enemy. Verily, we shall not soon look upon his like again.

THE ONTARIO SILVER TANKARD.

REGULATIONS FOR THE COMPETITION.

1. There shall be an Annual Competition for the Tankard, open to all clubs affiliated with the Association.

2. For the Primary Competition, all the clubs in the Branch shall be arranged in groups of six or more in each; and the clubs in each group shall play off against each other, with not less than *two rinks a side*, as they may be drawn, No. 1 vs. No. 2, No. 3 vs. No. 4, and so on, or in any other mode of drawing the umpire of each group may decide upon; and the winning clubs in each contest shall, in like manner, be drawn to play against each other, until only one club remains undefeated; and the finally winning clubs of all the groups shall meet in Toronto, at the call of the Secretary of the Branch, to carry out the Final Competition in the same manner, with two rinks a side; and the club remaining undefeated shall be declared the winner for the year, have its name engraved as such on the Tankard, and be entitled to have it in keeping until the next competition, and to the possession of such other trophies as may be awarded to the winning club. The name of the club playing the final contest with the winner shall also be recorded on the Tankard as the "*last competing club*."

3. At the half-yearly meeting of the Representative Committee, in October, the clubs shall be arranged in groups, and one club in each group shall be appointed to nominate an umpire for that group, who shall take the entire management of the Primary Competition therein, and report to the Secretary of the Branch agreeably to a prescribed form, setting forth the names of the clubs in the group, the parties to each successive contest and their results, and the name of

the club winning the last match. All of these reports must, without fail, be in the hands of the Secretary of the Branch Club *before or on the 10th day of February*, AFTER WHICH DATE NONE WILL BE RECEIVED.

4. In the Primary Competition the players of any of the clubs may be changed for the successive matches; but in the Final Competition the players who represent a club in the first contest must continue unchanged as long as the club remains in the competition. Should any player become, from sickness, unable to appear on the ice, the next player before him on that side shall play with two pairs of stones; or the second player when it is the first who is absent.

5. That, when the umpire for the group is a member of one of the competing clubs, the two clubs shall mutually agree upon time and place for the match; but if they fail to do so, then the umpire shall report the same to the Secretary of the Association, and the President shall decide the matter; and when the competing clubs in a group have been reduced to not more than three, the umpire, if a member of any of the surviving clubs, shall appoint a deputy umpire from one of the retired clubs, who shall conduct the further matches in the competition.

6. In all the Primary Competitions the decision of the umpire shall be final.

7. Immediately on receipt of the returns of the Primary Competition, the Secretary of the Association shall appoint a time for the Final Competition, and shall give notice of the same to the clubs reported as being the survivors in the various groups; he shall also recall the Tankard from its custodians, so that it may be on exhibition during the Final Competition, and handed to the winning club at its close.

8. That, in the Final Competition, if a winning club be present from more than eight groups, a second drawing shall be played off on the evening of the first day, so as to leave only two drawings to be played off on second day.

In all the matches for the Tankard, both Primary and Final, if any of the competing rinks are not ready to begin play at the hour named for the match, *one end shall be counted as played for every ten minutes' delay*; and the opposing rink, if ready to play, shall count one point in the game for each such period of time it is kept waiting—and each game shall consist of twenty-two ends.

10. As only those clubs which have been reported to the Secretary of the Branch, by the 10th February, as survivors in the Primary Competition can take part in the Final Competition, the last winner in each group will take care that the report of their success be duly made before that date.

THE FINAL COMPETITION

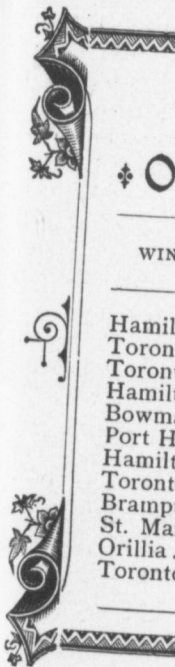

Mr. Taylor replied in a neat speech, expressing his deep gratification that the honour of victory, and the valuable trophies attached, had fallen to the Toronto Granite Club; that while he had great confidence in the skill of the players representing the club of which he was honoured in being President, he had not been altogether free from doubt during the contest with the far-famed men of Guelph, and that his pleasure now was greatly enhanced by the period of anxiety which preceded the victory. THE CURLING SERMON.

In an out-of-the-way part of Scotland lies the parish of Birketneuk, with its market town of the same name—the latter a village of one long street, with a row, more or less complete, of one-storied, thatch-covered houses on either side, and the parish kirk and manse in the rear of an open square not far from the middle of the "toun." The minister of the parish, the Rev. Dr. Waterstane, was a son of the late Tammuz Waterstane, a small farmer and cattle-dealer, who, before he slept with his fathers, had his pious project fully completed in not only having his son Wull "waggin' his head in a poopit," but that poopit nae less than that of the parish kirk of his own native Birketneuk. Dr. Waterstane, although not remarkable for depth of learning or burning eloquence, was a most exemplary man, and faithfully watched over his parishioners, and was duly esteemed by them—indeed it is said that from them he got his title of "Doctor," from being the "coo doctor" of the parish; and, when questioned by the presbytery, he based his right to the title on the solid foundation of doing the work. He also occasionally exercised his hereditary talent at "a bit deal" o'er a beast, and with such skill, that it became common among the villagers to say of any one who had made a bad bargain, that "he had been swappin' kye wi' the minister." He was also the skip of one of the crack curling rinks, and had on several occasions saved the honour of the parish by his skill wi' the stanes; but in this particular he was rivalled by Geordie Johnston, the flesher, a bit of a sport, and owner of the noted "Birketneuk Maid" (which had beaten everything in the shape of a trotting horse), and who had for his third player the minister's brother Tam, who had succeeded to the family business. Tam was a reckless, roarin', drinkin', deevil-may-care fellow, fonder of merriment than money, and nothing

did he enjoy better than "doing" his brother over a beast. It was about the hinder end of winter, when the minister and Geordie had been higgling over the price of a cow, that the conversation turned upon curling, when the latter jumped to his feet and said he would "curl him for't on the Monday. There'll be plenty of ice, though it's a thaw; and I would like tae tak' the conceit out o' ye." Fond of curling as of cattle-dealing, the doctor agreed, though reluctantly. "It was against the claith awee tae curl for a wager," a remark which provoked the rejoinder from Geordie that he wished "it had been against the claith tae tak' five pouns off me wi' that auld bull ye selt me"; and so the match was settled for the Monday.

Dr. Wull Waterstane had never studied a sermon in his life, and it was not likely that he was going to study one on the eve of a great curling match. He trusted to be equal to the occasion, and he was; for the wind-up to his discourse is still, and long will be, considered the finest piece of pulpit eloquence ever heard in the kirk of Birketneuk.

Sunday was a cold day, and there were not many forward—three in the east gallery, four in the west, and about a dozen scattered through the body of the "bit biggin'," and the tramp chorus, executed by the feet of all to the last psalm, was, perhaps, excusable; but they all warmed up when the preacher, after a long pause, said: "Life, ma brethren, is like unto a game at curling. Without a bit rag tae cover oor bits o' bodies, we are sent out into this cauld, cauld atmosphere. But we gather claes as we gang on, till we hae to enter on the great, great struggle. And out we gang, reckless of the frosty friendships we meet, wi' oor besoms and oor carpit bauchles, and oor crampits, and oor bottle o' whiskey and cheese an' breid. And as we enter on the slippery, treacherous board, some of us fa', and ithers, again, tumble through the thin ice a' thegither; but we help ane anither as best we can, till we come to a piece whaur it will bear us.

Then, ma brethren, we get ready oor besoms, and sweep the ice clear o' the snaws of mischief and villany, and lay the rinks for the great bonspiel of existence.

"And for the sake of bringing it hame mair clear tae ye, ma brethren, there is mysel' skippin' the rink o' the righteous, wi' John Paterson, our faithful elder, ma third haun'; William Watson, second, and Peter, the beadle, leedin'. And in the rink of the unrighteous there is Lucifer and his frien' Beelzebub, ma brethren, and his chosen representatives in this pairish, their helpers and successors, and aibler deevils, may be, than themselves. I mean Geordie Johnston, the flesher, and ma brither Tam, the horse-dealer—and Geordie, need I say, skippin'.

"Noo, ma brethren, rin doon the deevil and his rink as muckle as ye like, but dinna ony o' ye think for a single meenit that they canna play. *No, no*; they're a' clever—a may say owre clever.

"Noo, we hae curled awa' a day. Sometimes we were up, and sometimes they were up; and whiles, ma brethren, they played strong, and we worked oor righteous besoms and soopit them out a' thegither; and sometimes we played a wee hard, and they carried us through a' ice with their infernal besoms of corruption. And whiles we were weak, and no owre the hog score, I'm sorry to say, and whiles we were aff the ice a' thegither. But at times we played cautiously and carefully, and, with the richt strength and the richt curl on, sailed through the narrowest of ports, and refusing a' the wiles of the fast-worked besoms of temptation stuck hard and fast at the pot-lid of success.

"But, oh! ma brethren, it has come to the last heid and the last stane; and oh! it's sair tae say, but we are par, and the unrighteous lie shot. And, oh! if ye but saw hoo it's gairdit—jist an inch o' its cheek bare through the only port. If we played it hard, ma

Here the preacher made a pause, which was broken by John, the elder, suggesting slowly, and apparently strongly affected: "Would ye na' try a bit inwick aff the pillar o' redamption"; "or a rattle on the gairds," struck in Peter, the beadle, who fancied he saw a' the stanes as if they were materially before him. But the minister resumed: "No, it will not do; an inwick is impossible, and a stramash would dae nae guid, for a' oor stanes are ayont the tee. But I'll jist, ma friens—and be ready wi' yer besoms—try to draw canny through the port, lowly and reverently, and wi' the richt curl on." A breathless silence ensued during the time the preacher was supposed to walk down the rink to the crampit. Peter, the beadle, said afterwards he could see the whole thing just as clear as if it had been done before him; carefully, he said, he saw him lift his stane and wipe the sole of it wi' his cowe, adjust the crampit, and, elbow oot, put it on the ice like a duck on the water.

At length it was apparent to all that the stone was on its course.

"Let him alane—I'm on him," burst from the pulpit; "it will do it; bonnily it works doon owre the hog, the hanle half turnin' as if tae luk at me. Not a cowe, my freens, not a cowe; through the ports of the wicked, clear of all guile and waywardness, it catches the face of the unrighteous interloper, and, gently moving it aside, lies shot; and the righteous have, ma brethren, triumphed once more."

There were many approving head-shakings as the Book was closed with the familiar thump, and some of the hearers felt a difficulty in keeping themselves from ascending the pulpit-stairs and giving him a shake of the hand.

Next day there was a thin drizzling shower falling as I made my way through the village, and across the

intervening fields to the pond. The sun was shining with great warmth, and the softening winds were raising pools of water in the hollows where had been hard sheets of ice. Still, the board had been so strong that I did not feel astonished, on rounding the corner of the woods, to see the curlers busy on the bosom of the loch below. I hurried forward, impatient to see the game so cleverly outlined from the pulpit. There was the minister, indeed, and the other three of the righteous, and the rough, rude Geordie, and rantin', roarin' Tam, singing and sooping and winking to his fellow-curlers who took up the places of Lucifer and Beelzebub, two brother cattle-dealers. Numerous allusions were made to the sermon, which the ne'er-do-weel brother had heard of; and it was sore on all of the other side to see them, benefited by the softness of the ice, keep three winning shots, which they had got the first heid, still to the fore. Would they have won, however, is a question which cannot now be answered. The Doctor's rink lay four, as he said, on the gradually yielding ice; but Tam contested the fourth shot, and, as they crowded all together to see the last stone played, the ice broke, and they were left struggling in the water. Wet, cold and hungry, they made their way home, each side claiming the game; but the minister, after all, had the last stone to play, and, preaching his sermon over the soft ice, made out unaccountably that his rink had gained a signal triumph.—*Abridged from the Glasgow Herald.*

TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

The GRAND TRUNK, the CANADIAN PACIFIC, and the NORTHERN and NORTH-WESTERN RAILWAYS have granted to Curling Clubs associated with the Ontario Branch of the R. C. C. C. special rates of fare when travelling, in bodies of not less than EIGHT PERSONS, to and from curling matches.

These rates are a *single trip fare* of TWO CENTS A MILE from station to station, and a *return trip fare* at the rate of ONE AND ONE-THIRD the ordinary single fare.

For the GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY, rate orders, entitling clubs to the above reduced fares, can be obtained upon application to the City Passenger Agent of the G. T. R., Toronto.

For the CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY, all the station agents of the C. P. R. have been instructed to issue tickets on the above-named terms, on requisition signed by secretary of club applying for same.

For the NORTHERN and NORTH-WESTERN RAILWAY, all the station agents have instructions to issue tickets on these terms to all clubs making application for same.

N.B.—As these rates are exceptionally favourable, curlers are requested to facilitate the work of the railway employes as much as they can, by being forward to secure tickets in good time, and assisting in handling the curling stones, etc.
