REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES.

In presenting their customary Annual Report, the Trustees and Managers of the Toronto House of Industry have very great satisfaction in referring to the continued prosperity and usefulness of the institution. The prompt relief of our deserving poor, and providing shelter and maintenance for the homeless and the helpless of all ages, form the objects of the trust ; and these the Board have unceasingly kept in view. Owing to the continued liberality of the City Council, and of private individuals, very nearly the usual amount of aid has been given to all classes of recipients. The Reports of the Superintendent and the Medical Officer will, as heretofore, shew the nature and extent of this relief. It will be remembered that last year's Report referred to the fact of the Government grant being in arrears, and expressed the hope that all such arrears might soon be received. But, unhappily, the Board have thus far been disappointed in this. This circumstance has somewhat hampered the action of the Board ; but through careful and judicious management, it is hoped that the poor have not been allowed to suffer to any great extent from this cause.

Annexed will be found the Treasurer's Report, duly audited, as well as those of the Superintendent and Medical Officer. It is with sincere gratification that

the Board can again refer to the efficient discharge, on their part, of their respective functions ; as also to the satisfactory manner in which the matron has performed her duties.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT FOR 1868.

Owing to the continued closure of the Toronto General Hospital during the early part of the year, more than the usual number of sick and incurable cases were received into the House. Many of those admitted, having come from distant parts of the country, would undoubtedly have died by the way, if returned home, and were furnished with that shelter which, in too many instances, they could not obtain from their own wealthy Municipalities.

The establishment of an Infirmary, where the large number of incurables now in the House could be received and cared for, would relieve the Institution of a heavy burden, and add much to its efficiency.

All the inmates of the House were very much prostrated by the extreme heat of the past summer, and no less than nine died during the months of July and August ; while only six died during the other ten months.

During the year just closed I have visited the House one hundred and thirteen times, written and made up one thousand and ninety prescriptions. I have also visited and examined persons at their own homes, whenever requested to do so.
