

CIVIC CONTROL SUCCESS ASSERTS BRITISH M. P.

(Toronto World)

M. P., Labor representative for Gorton,
Lancashire, in the British house of com-

Mr. Hodges, who came to America to atend the International Federation of La-bor Convention at Norfolk, Va., has ar-rived here from Chicago on his way back

bor Convention at Noricis, Va., has arrived here from Chicago on his way back to England.

"We have a municipally owned lighting plant in Manchester, and despite the proviso in taking it over that the conduits should be extended to all the suburbs, the city has been enabled to increase its surplus by a few thousand pounds every year, while making considerable reduction in the price of power," said Mr. Hodges. He added that the price for power in Manchester was now only 4 1-2d per unit for ordinary household use, while it was 5 1-2d in London, where private ownership ruled, and that he knew of one town where the price was only 3d under municipal ownership.

As to gas service, the year book for Great Britain showed that the price of gas under municipal control was cheaper than under private ownership, although corporations exacted meter rates.

Wherever a municipality had the opportunity it was taking over tram lines, markets and water service.

In Manchester, where the gas service had been municipalized, there was a yearly surplus of from £60,000 to £65,000 after providing for a sinking fund and all other charges.






