# **Enemy Is Slowly** Yielding Ground

**Allies Apparently Change Policy on West** to That of Constant Hammering—Fear Yet as to Russia—Scandanavia and Spain Working up Against Teuton

The German armies in France are slowly yielding ground before the relentless pressure exercised by Generals Haig and Nivelle and the vital question is as to whether their morale can be maintained under the terrific pounding to which they are subjected day and night. Apparently the allied commanders have abandoned the policy of sudden thrusts at chosen points and are relying on a constant hammering over a wide front in the belief that sooner or later the iron German ring must either break or crack.

While there is little immediate prospect of sensational developments in the battle area, the political situation remains fraught with many possibilities. The latest news from Russia indicates that the crisis in that country continues acute and the menace that Russia may withdraw from the Entente or be plunged into chaos still throws its shadow over the future. The Russian radicals are apparently as determined as ever to reject the war programme of England and France, but they show almost as much recultance as Berlin to define their precise aims. 

# GARDENING

HINTS FOR

(By W. Saxby Blair, Supt. Experimental Stat on, N. S.)

A warm, friable, rich soil should be selected for garden corn. The seed is sown in hills three and one-half feet apart each way, and five plants allowed to develop in a hill. The seed is sown soon after the middle of May. Early and late varieties should be planted to extend the supply of table corn into the fall. As is the case with peas and beans, constant surface cultivation to keep the weeds down and maintain a loose surface

PEAS. Garden peas may be sown as soon as the ground is fit to work. The land should be fall manured with ten to fifshould be fall manured with ten to fiftenn tons of well rotted manure per acre, and ploughed. This is well worked in the spring to a depth of five inches. The seed is usually sown in rows two and one-half feet apart, and the seed planted one inch apart in the row.

Dwarf and semi-dwarf varieties do not require staking. It is advisable to stake the tall-growing sorts.

If one variety only is used, successional sowings should be made every week or ten days until the first of June. The garden pea is a cool season vegetable, and

den pea is a cool season vegetable, and will not do well during the heat of sum-mer. The season may be extended also by planting late maturing varieties. The early seeding is usually made one to one and one-half inches deep; the later seeding, two to three inches deep.

The following interesting letter has come to her mother from Miss Agnes "Fruit-a-tives" Soon Relieved This Warner, who has been doing such good work in the war.

Ambulance Volant, France, April 28, 1917.

This has been a most strenuous week and we are feeling very tired, but happy, because so many of the men are getting well. Monday morning at five o'clock the alarm for gas sounded and about eight of the first cases came in and they kept on coming till midnight. We had more than 300 admissions. The worst were kept here and the others were sent on further after they had had first treatment here. There were many badly wounded also and we operated all day and all night. Nearly all of us were on duty thirty-six hours and then after six hours' sleep were on eighteen hour.







It seems a strange thing that the 62nd should be compelled to put up with inferior quarters when this building, which has all the modern advantages installed, is being left to fall into disrepair for lack of use. The days of muddle are ended and order has been evolved out of chaos. All that human agency can do has been and is being done to turn past failures to successes and prevent future break-downs in organization.

Communications by road, railway and Communications by road, railway and river have been laid out and developed on a well throught out plan. Facilities for the loading and unloading of vessels at

The feeding of the troops from the firing line to the base is excellent and in the army canteens there is an abundance of purchasable necessities and luxuries. These boats are used for the rapid evacuation of the wounded when bears factions. wounded when heavy fighting is going on. What is wanted for this purpose is as much clear deck space as possible and no frills. The boats are admirably designed, adequately staffed and equipped with every conceivable comfort. ped with every conceivable comfort. "Jumping Off" Place.

Sheik Saad is the jumping off place for troops, stores and munition brought up and, for the transfer from rail and light vessels to larger ships of sick and wounded going down to the base hospital. Sheik Saad itself has two large hospitals, one for light and one for Europeans and for Indians and one for Europeans and also a large casualty clearing station. Elaborate systems exist for feeding the wounded all along the line and on arriving at hail head, and though the sojourn at this point of casualties is usually of quite brief period, the conveniences are almost as complete as the best hos-

pital in England.

## IN JERUSALEM BY

THE END OF JUNE

London, May 21.-Indications are that he allied forces will occupy Jerusalem by the end of June. It is believed pro-bable that they will find it in ruins. Reports continue to come from Pales-tine telling of the Turkish persecution of the Jews. Hundreds of young Jews have been driven from Jerusalem and scattered over a wide territory, with the deliberate intention of forcing them to starve or succumb to sickness. The most reliable information does not hesitate to picture the misery of these people as worse than anything else so far reported. Even the massacres of the Armenians pale before the latest outrages perpetrated by religious fanatics. Wherever the Jews have attempted to defend their homes in the Holy City they have been taken out and hang-ed, their homes pillaged and all prop-erty of value taken and the remainder




