Lord Selborne, President of Eng-lands Board of Agriculture, Makes Appeal to Wemen

Lord Selborne, president of the Board of Agriculture, is a keen advocate of women taking the place of men on the land wherever possible. In an address which he gave a few weeks ago at Shrewsbury, he said he had seen what he believed nobody had ever seen in England—"a woman ploughing." "Women. of every class," he declared "must assist. The squire's wife and the farmer's, and the parson's wife, the wife and the daughter of the laborar, each in turn could make a contribution to agriculture in this year of war, and so work for victory just as husband, son or bother, in the fleet or in the trenches. I would make a special appeal to the wives and daughters of men who are fighting, because they are well cared for by the nation. They have not been grinding poverty whilst the men are left as are the German women in fighting the battles.


