SEEK METHOD TO DETECT PRESENCE OF SUBMARINE

London, June 26-The question of whether there exists any scientific me hod of detecting the presence of a subnerged submarine, which was raised during the Lusitania enquiry, is now engaging the attention of the Admiralty. Suggestions have been made by a rominent Canadian to Donald Macmaster, K. C., who represented the dominion government at the enquiry, and Mr. Macmaster has submitted these to the Admiralty and to Lord Mersey, and the latter has promised to give encouragement to any experiments in the direction of settling the question.

Washington, June 25—As a result of the commander of the French cruiser Descartes having landed marines at Cape Haytien, Hayti, to protect foreign interests there, the navy department has ordered the armored cruiser Washington from Vera Cruz to the Haytien port.

No United States ship was available in Haytien waters to send a landing force ashore because of fighting between government and rebel troops, and the French commander did not stand on ceremony, but put his marines on the beach promptly. The naval yacht Eagle was supposed to be observing the Haytien situation, but had gone to Guantanamo to coal.

Admiral Caperton, commanding the squadron on the east coast of Mexico, is taking his flagship to Hayti, so by virtue of seniority on his arrival he will be able to take charge of the situation. It is expected the French will be promptly withdrawn, and Admiral Caperton will then thank them for their services in the interests of foreigners.

The situation in Hayti is reported to be even worse than it was a year ago, when the administration had under consideration proposals for strong measures in Hayti which would restore law and order.




