"In the Piotrkow region the situatiin is unchanged.

"The lighting south of Cracow has continued tenaciously, presenting alterately offensive and defensive movements. The Germans twice attempted to reak through our fronts, but were repulsed with serious losses.

ENGLAND THROWS 250,000 BOY SCOUTS ALONG COAST

HEAD OF BRITISH BOY SCOUTS TELLS MARY BOYLE O'REILLY HOW ENGLAND LEANS UPON ITS BOYS, WHILE OLDER DE-FENDERS ARE RUSHED TO BELGIAN BATTLEFIELDS

for war.

"From the first day of danger seventy troops of sea scouts began coast patrol which will be permanent until the declaration of peace. Those who are under school age receive instruction in special classes during alternate weeks.

"Today 1,300 sea scouts are stationed from John o' Groat's to Dover keeping watch and ward along the East Coast. They are only boys, but they watch the North Sea through daylight and dark.

"Their job is to do their duty, to keep their mouths shut and their eyes open. They have won official recognition; the admiralty are paying for their subsistance; they serve as volunteers.

"Each patrol of six sea scouts is living with two coast guards in any handy shelter; tents, boathouses, shacks furnish emergency stations. Off duty patrols are building themselvec winter huts, the handy "men" fashioning sleeping boards, locker and mess tables. The sea scouts cook for themselves.

"The boy watcher of the coast knows the meaning of lights and the rig of every vessel; is primed with knowledge of the wind and tides; can act as a guide to troops billeted in "his" district, and pilot boats in "his" estuaries where buoys have been removed. He must know every rock and shoal within five fathom line on a four-mile stretch of coast. He must know places, lighthouses, storm signals, coast guard stations, life boats and rocket apparatus.

"They are trained on the sands in swimming, rope climbing, the handling of boats, and taking bearings. The older ones grow proficient in flag hoist signalling and wireless telegraphy. The, scouts are not playing now; some, expert with wireless apparatus, are on board steam trawlers today acting as guard boats against floating mines.

"A determined small boy in jolly looking knickers and khaki shirt gets about with amazing ease. A defence corps patrol holding "conversations" with flash lights can guard a score of back waters. British Fleet Sinks Three German Cruisers; Pursuing Two Others

London, Dec. 9, 10.10 p. m.—A British squadron, under command of Vice Admiral Sir Frederick Sturdee, chief of the war staff, engaged a German squadron, under Admiral Count Von Spee, off the Falkland Islands, in the South Atlantic, yesterday, and won a victory which is being acclaimed through.

THE BRITISH LOSSES WERE LIGHT.

The British losses were light, but beyond the fact that the British squadron was commanded by Vice Admiral Sturdee no information is vouchsafed regarding the ships engaged, and the newspapers are enjoined not to speculate as "other combinations may be effected."

The greatest enthusiasm prevailed in London over the victory, and the general impression is that it will be completed, as the Admiralty would not be likely to send ships that could not overtake the Dresden and Nurnberg, which are 24-knot and 23-knot vessels respectively, and probably even slower after their long service. They are at a disadvantage also because of their small coal capacity.

The British squadron which engaged the Germans left England without the knowledge of the general public, and until his name was mentioned it was believed that Vice Admiral Sturdee was serving in home waters. The fact that he was taken from the post of chief of the war staff in indicative of the determination of the British government to clear the Pacific and South Atlantic of all German warships. It is believed, therefore, that the British commander is at the head of a formidable squadron.

In addition to the Dresden and Nurnberg, only one German warship—the Karlsruhe—is now uncounted for in these waters, although there may be one or two armed chantmen which the Allies


Of India, whom the markets were latediscussing as the absorbent of all the orld's surplus gold, one London writer ow remarks that "the ability of India import large amounts of gold, as incent years, has greatly diminished. For ome time past that country has bought trge quantities of goods from abroad, and the excess of its exports over its nports has now fallen to figures which o not permit of the import of much old." VICE ADMIRAL SIR

Sir Frederick Sturdee, K.C.B., C.V.O., C.M.G., is a man of world-wide reputation and stands in Britain's roll of honor. He has worked hisoway gradually from the ranks, receiving his first commission in 1880 to the rank of lieutenant, and his career since that time has been rapid. During his years of service he spent two of them on the ill-fated Bulwark which was sunk off Sheerness a few weeks ago. At that time 1905-1907 he was chief of the staff to Lord Charles Beresford in the Mediterranean command.

Admiral Sturdee was promoted only last December to the exaited position of vice-admiral. He is the son of the late Captain Frederick R. Sturdee, R. N. C. (of the old navigating branch) and was born in June, 1859. He was promoted to lieutenant in February, 1860, with three first class certificates and in 1886 won the gold medal of the Royal United Service Institution for the prize navalessay submitted that year. He returned to the Vernon as a senior staff officer in 1889 and in the following January was appointed in command of the render, Vesuvius. He was advanced to commander in July, 1893 being at the same time selected for service as an assistant to the director of naval ordnance and torpedoes at the Admiralty. In this latter appointment he remained for more than four years and succeeded in winning the R. U. S. I. gold medal for the second time in 1894. He was in command of the Porpoise at the Australian station from November, 1897, to June, 1899, when he was advanced to captain in recognition of his service in command of the British forces at Samoa, which also won him the C. M. G.

He was assistant director of Naval Intellegence from October, 1899, to October, 1902, and was also a member of
