(Canadian Press) London, July 18.—A despatch from Sydney to the Daily Mail on the new Anglo-Japanese treaty, says that there can be no doubt that, in expressing approval of the treaty as it now stands, the ministers of the dominions faithfully represented the constituents. The treaty is proof of the pacific tendencies of Japan. It is proof that she is resolved for ten years at least to abandon ideas of the extension of her territory.

LAVISH IN CHARITY, HE DIES IN WORKHOUSE

Grimbsy Merchant, Once Very Rich and Generous, Caved Too Freely and Ended Life as Pauper

London, July 18-A life of strange vicis-
situdes has just ended at Grimbsy, where
Robert Day Melbush, once the port's
principal fish merchant, has died a pauper
in the workhouse.

Going to Grimbsy as a poor lad, Mr.
Melbush soon gained a prominent posi-
tion in the fishing industry, at that time
undergoing revolutions as a result of the
advent of steam trawling. He created the
biggest private business in the industry
and amassed a huge fortune, but his suc-
cess was his own undoing.

His generosity was lavish and reckless.
While he gave huge sums for every form
of charity, often he would send his cart-
laden with choice fish to the poorer parts
of the town, where his men distributed
them. He was a great benefactor of the
poor, and when he was nominated for elec-
tion to the school board he headed the poll
with a majority of 6,000 over his nearest op-
ponent, and after the declaration he was
drawn around the town in a landau, pro-
ceeded by a great escort and the thousands
of cheering men and women.

Later he fought Grimbsy as a parlia-
mentary candidate, but was defeated. The
adversity overtook him and he became an
inmate of the work-house. His former
Prime Minister Aquilith was married in
the town, in which he died, but he drifted
back to the work-house, where he died.

WEST INDIES SERVICE

The Evening Chit-Chat

THE state of Missouri's Widows' Pension Law which was passed in the last session of the legislature is being put into effect.

In the famous reform bill of Chancellor Lloyd-George of England there is a clause providing for a pension or allowance for maternity cases.

By the Missouri law any needy widow is entitled to receive a sum not to exceed ten dollars a month for one child attending school and as much as five dollars a month for each additional one.

The idea of the bill is to enable poor widows to keep their children at school without being obliged to go out to work themselves and thus deprive the children of their birthright of a mother's care and a well-kept home. Incidentally it is said that such a scheme would cost no more than the board of the children if the widows were obliged to place them in asylums.

The idea of the maternity pension, as I understand it, is to supply state aid that directly before the birth of her child and to insure proper care and comforts at this time to the poorest mother in the land. In at least one state we already have a law making it illegal for a woman to work for a certain number of weeks before or after her child is born, and this maternity pension is surely the logical and inevitable corollary to such a law.

Now, don't you think these are two splendid bills? I do. And I am calling large to your attention today because I think that knowing about them will inspire you to want them in your own community.

Don't you think it would be splendid if destitute widows and motherless-children, incidentally the next generation-all over the world were protected by such laws?

Very well, then, why not do what you can to see that they are passed in your corner of "all the world"?

You don't know how you can do that? Well, do you belong to a woman's club or a big Sunday-school class or a Home Missionary Society or any large organization that could be brought to take an interest in such things?

If you do, why not tell the society at its next meeting about these laws and get it to pass a resolution approving them and ordering its secretary to write to its state representatives and senators asking them what can be done about such legislation?

Judge Porterfield, of Kansas City, Missouri, is putting the Missouri law into effect for the time, and he doubts would be glad to send a copy of it and information about its workings to any woman interested in it. And information about the maternity pension could surely be obtained from the English State Department.

Surely this is a subject in which any woman with the least bit of altruism in her makeup, that is, any woman whose usefulness extends beyond her love for her own immediate family and makes her care something what is to become of those myriad "sisters under the skin" who are less fortunate than she, cannot fail to be deeply interested.

Lord Pirrie, Head of The Harland & Wolff Shipbuilding Firm in New York Today-Some Facts About Him-A New French Minister

Lord Pirrie, who arrived in New York today, on board the Olympic, which is the biggest ship that has ever been launched from the great British shipyard of Harland & Wolff, which is in London, was born on this side of the Atlantic, and is a native of Quebec, although his people come from Little Glanville, in the county of Devon, in England. His principal business connection on this side of the Atlantic is J. Pierpont Morgan, who shares with him in the controlling interest in the Mercantile Steam Navigation Co., in the Elder- Dempsey Shipping Company, and in the West India Mail Service, which gives them the right to operate steamships between Great Britain and the West Indies.

Lord Pirrie is a great advocate of the policy of protection-for the United States. According to him, the English shipbuilding industry would receive an overwhelming and crushing blow, if Uncle Sam were to adopt free trade for the construction of ships to enter free duty. He declared on an memorable occasion in the House of Commons that he would not support any measure to establish our shipbuilding yards over there, and I have always had that possibility in view. How I do not regard it as "unreasonable."

Lord Pirrie formerly occupied a very important place in the Conservative circles here, when he was nominated as Knight of the Order of St. Patrick, some three or four years ago, all the other knights of the order, with the exception of Lord Castle- Mole, declined to attend the chapter meeting at Dublin Castle by the vicery for the purpose of investing him with the insignia of the order.

The consequence was that for the first time within living memory, a Knight of St. Patrick was invested privately by the vicery without any chapter, and without sponsorship.

The vicery, Lord Aberdeen, was said to have retaliated for this affront, by bestowing upon Lord Pirrie the com- plexion of the viceregal household, thus making him the principal dignitary of the court of Dublin Castle. As such, he took a leading part in the chapter of the Order of the Knights of St. Patrick held last week by King George at the castle. He was investing Field Marshal Lord Kitchener and the Earl of Shaftesbury, with the insignia of the order.

Whittaker Wright's Home

Lord Pirrie makes his principal home at Witley Court, in Surrey, which he purchased from the estate of the late Whittaker Wright, a promoter, who emigrated to New York on the collapse of his schemes, was arrested on landing, taken back to England, tried for fraud at the Old Bailey and committed suicide by swal- lowing a deadly poison in court while the presiding judge was in the act of pronouncing sentence.

Whittaker Wright had set out to construct for himself a home unsurpassed in splendor and at the time of his ruin, had spent more than \$8,000,000 on the place. The mansion is built of stone, in early English style, with half-timbered work, and in the laying out of the grounds, which extend over 3,000 acres, Whittaker Wright had had removed and lakes formed, according to his caprice. Among the features is a large circular constructed of glass, under the biggest lake, where, when set at gimmer, one is able to see fishes swimming above one's head.

Archduke Charles Francis

Young Archduke Charles Francis, nephew of the heir apparent (and in view of the latter'smorganatic marriage, destined to succeed him in the course of time) of the thrones of Austria and Hungary, will make his home with his future consort, after their marriage at the Castle of Hetzen-endorf in the suburbs of Vienna. His extensive grounds adjoin those of the Palace of Schoenbrunn. His bride, as already announced in these letters, is the blonde Princess Zita, of Bourbon, daughter of the late Duke of Parma and a niece of that Archduchess Maria Theresia, who is the stepmother of Archduke Francis. Ferdinand and his principal supporter, in his differences with the remainder of the imperial family, on the subject of his wife's position at court.

The Chateau of Hetzenendorf is a most picturesque place, where the young Archduke Charles Francis spent as a boy many of his summers, it having been placed at the disposal of his widowed mother as a suburban house for herself and her two boys. It was there, too, that Archduchess Mathilde succumbed to the terrible injury which she had received through setting fire to the small dress which she was wearing. She did this in her efforts to conceal a light cigarette, which she was smoking, from her father, old Archduke Albert, generalissimo of the Austrian army and a perfectly unscrupulously the room in which she was chatting and smoking with Princess Frederica of Hanover.

Emperor and Empress Frederick of Germany spent several months at the Chateau of Hetzenendorf, during their prolonged stay at Vienna in 1873, on account of the present Kaiser then a boy formed that close and intimate friendship with Crown Prince Rudolf, which was subsequently interrupted by the latter's death.

New French Minister

Justin de Selver, the new minister of foreign affairs of France, is a rather distinguished looking man, of sixty-three, who for the last fifteen years has been prefect of the Seine, that is to say, civil gov- ernor of the metropolis. As such, it has been his duty to recognize the views of the national government, of which he was the executive as far as Paris was concerned, with those of the various metropolitan mayors and of the municipal council of the capital.

The mayors have mostly been socialists, and so, too, is almost invariably the majority of the municipal council. The result is that these city dignitaries and the national government, are constantly at loggerheads, and it had been the task of M. de Selver to keep the peace between them, but he has succeeded in doing so by the fact that he held the office of senator and that of Knight Grand Officer of the Legion of Honor. He is a member of that M. Charles de Freycinet, who has been frequently premier and who has held cabinet office since 1877 more often than any French statesman now living. In fact de Selver shares much of his uncle's suavity, kindness of character and utter freedom from official arrogance. He is very well to do, has a beautiful country place in the Department of the Vendee, and a wealthy wife in the person of Mlle Germaine, and was for six years postmaster general of France.

The civil governor of Paris it has fallen to his lot to welcome officially all the foreign monarchs and royal and imperial personages visiting the French capital, and thus it happens that there is hardly a single ruler in Europe with whom he is not personally acquainted, a matter of considerable advantage to him as minister of foreign affairs and incidentally to the country, when one hears in mind influential is the role played by sovereigns in influencing the foreign policy of their respective governments.

As prefect, too, he was in constant and intimate relations with the various foreign ambassadors and ministers accredited to France, and there is not one of them who does not rejoice in seeing his congenial friend de Selver, in the person of the Quai d'Orsay, in the place of those professional politicians who have occasionally been appointed to take charge of the international policy of France without any previous knowledge of diplomacy, of official procedure and etiquette, and often, too, ignorant of the most ordinary savoir faire and usage of the monarchs.

THE ELECTIONS

There is every reason to believe that Canada will be in the throes of a general election before the autumn has come and gone. The leaves of autumn will mercifully fall upon the dead hopes of the Conservative party, which will have received another mandate from the people to remain in the wilderness seeking a policy worthy of popular support.

The Liberals could ask no more favorable fighting ground. They are able to show that Sir John Macdonald, Sir John Thompson, Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. George E. Foster were eager for a renewal of the reciprocity treaty of 1854, and that up to the time the Liberals came into power the Conservatives entertained no fears whatever of evil to befall under such a trade agreement.

Nothing that has transpired since 1896 makes it less desirable for Canada to trade on more favorable terms with the great country lying along her borders across the continent. There is nothing in the reciprocity agreement to endanger any Canadian industry. The farmers, lumbermen and fishermen will be greatly benefited by the large free market opened to them, and what is to their advantage must help the whole country.

It is evidently the purpose of the opposition to obscure the issue as far as possible, and to pose as the saviors of the Empire. Sir Wilfrid Laurier is represented as one who seeks to shirk imperial responsibilities and withdraw Canada from the Empire. The absurdity of this charge in view of the perfectly plain facts of the case ought to be clear to the Conservative leaders, and no doubt it is; but they apparently hope that the people can be fooled and their prejudices stirred by assertions of any sort, where these are made with sufficient emphasis.

There is, however, but one great issue if the election fight is now forced by the Conservatives. It is the issue of improved trade relations, and that is something every country seeks for the good of the country. On that issue the Liberals hold an impregnable position. They give the mother country a preference, and after that they enlarge Canada's trade whenever a favorable opportunity offers. Such an opportunity has been offered by the United States, and it would be folly to reject an agreement so favorable to this country.

PORT HOWE We now learn from the Standard that Mr. M. E. Agar was the discoverer of Port Howe. The Times stated the other day that Mr. Agar was in favor of the conversion of Port Howe into a park, and the Standard now hastens to credit him with the original idea. Mr. Agar is so amiable a citizen that one would not like to deprive him of any honor justly his due, but there is really no evidence to prove that Champlain did not, when he visited St. John, mount to the summit of this hill and remark to his officers that it was an ideal site for a park.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

There will be a special election in Maine on September 11 to determine whether or not the people wish to retain prohibition. As the Republicans who have supported prohibition for years were swept from power last fall, the issue is considered to be in doubt.

Dr. Alvah H. Doty, health officer at New York, reports the cholera situation reassuring. There has been one death in twenty-four hours but no new cases have been reported.

Serious forest fires are reported at Upper Blackville, but no crown lands have been destroyed. Fires are also reported at McGivney's.

Chicago, July 17.—Judge Honors today reported to admit to bail Simon O'Connell, James Garvin, Thomas Kearney and Maurice Bright, Chicago labor leaders, under indictment for the murder of Vincent Altman, who was shot on March 22 last at the Briggs House, and whose killing was attributed to labor troubles.

Edinburgh, July 17.—King George and Queen Mary arrived in the Scottish capital today and received a rousing welcome.

Quebec, July 17.—Unexpected orders were received by the Niobe today to proceed to Yarmouth (N. S.) tomorrow. It had been expected that the Canadian warship would remain here for at least three weeks, and it was even stated that the vessel might take a trip to Montreal.

Toronto, July 17.—Baron Von Folmsen, of Berlin, Germany, announced today that the Porcupine Gold Mines, Limited, of which he is general manager, has just purchased three claims in the Porcupine, named the Joslyn, the Canadian Northern Explorers and the Kable, situated between the Red Sea and the Foley-O'Brien properties, and has paid \$30,000 for them.

Washington, July 17.—The revised house campaign publicity bill unanimously passed the senate today. It prohibits a senatorial candidate spending more than \$10,000, a congressional candidate \$5,000, and requires publication, before election, of all campaign pledges, all primary campaign expenditures, and all general election expenditures.

 Beat the yolk of one egg light, add one fourth cup of milk, two teaspoons melted butter, one teaspoon sugar, half saltspoon salt and flour enough to make a drop batter. Stir in one cup of par-boiled and drained raisins, and fry by spoonfuls in deep hot fat.

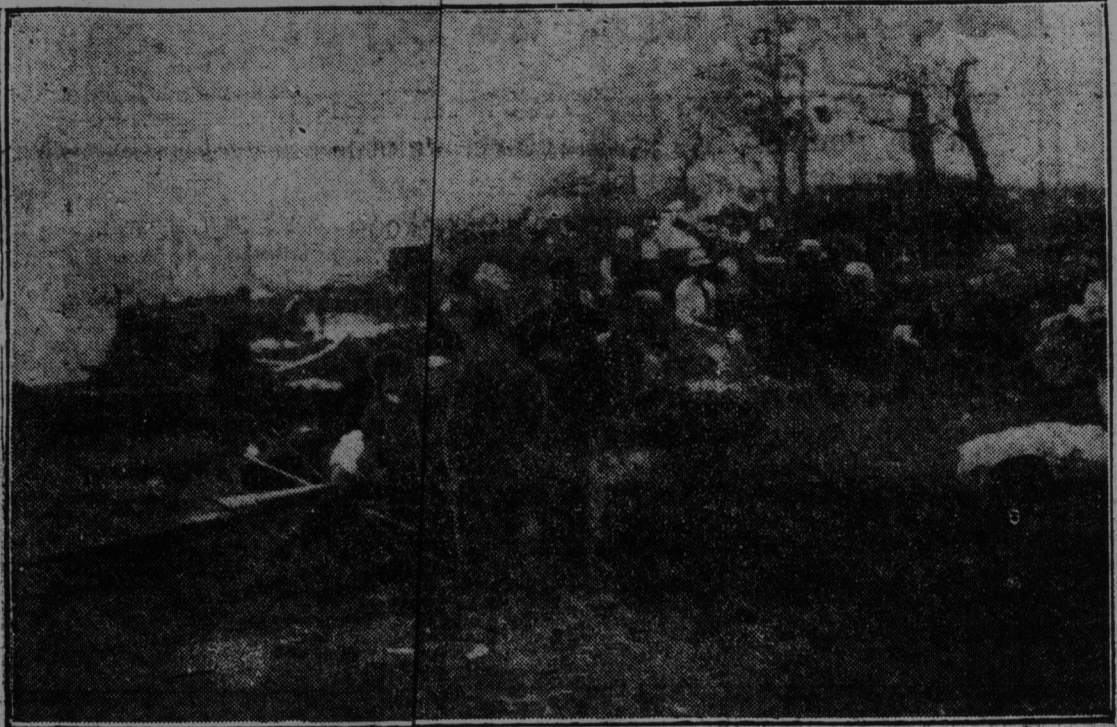

The last word coming out by Indian runners from the factor, "Steve" Lafreniere, was that the fire was coming across both sides of the river, and was all about the post, and that the Indians were leaving but that he would stay until the last stick was burned, or the fire had passed over. Lafreniere is a man well up in years who has been with the Hudson Bay Company many years and is well known and has many friends throughout the north country.

One prospector in North Ontario, who escaped from last week's fire tells a story of seeing a refugee in a mud hole where a black bear struggled up beside him until the fire passed over. It is hard to say which was the more frightened, the man or the bear, but he was hurried into the hole, after the fire had passed and the prospector got out to the stealer.

Duncan McDonald of Estevan tells a story of standing five hours in the water of South Porcupine with the water reaching high and five hundred human beings gasping for breath. McDonald says that about 2,000 people were in the water.

At the same time the scene was terrific when the shaft house succumbed to the flames. The air was shut off in the shaft and men were almost asphyxiated. Baseball.—Hal Chase, His Hard Luck.—Six times in his big league career Hal Chase has been disabled either by illness or injury and compelled to stay out of the game for weeks at a time. Before he had the smallpox in the spring of 1909 Chase says he never was ill a day. There is nothing fatal about Chase, so he says, but he has been conspicuously unlucky in being laid up.

Chase's first mishap was in 1905 in Detroit. Jack Powell then on the New York team was hitting a ball out to the outfield in preliminary practice. The leather went on a line and struck Chase over the eye as the latter was stooping. That accident laid the king of first basemen up for six weeks. In 1906 he broke some small bones in his hand in sliding, and was out of commission for three weeks. In 1907, he was spiked on the right arm and was incapacitated for a week. He carries a long scar from that wound.

The smallpox visitation was in 1909, and in 1910 Chase was taken ill in Detroit and had to take a three weeks' rest. He attributes the later hospital experience to having returned to the ball field too soon just after convalescing from the smallpox. The after effects of playing ball again before he had fully recovered his strength, he thinks, told him in the following season. This year he was again taken sick in Detroit, and kept out of the game for three weeks.

Upheaval at Yale. New Haven, Conn., July 17.—It is generally believed here that a big upheaval is impending in Yale athletics. The belief is quite general that an upheaval is necessary. Yale has lost every series in the four major sports this year, except football, and in this it is tied for defeat with Harvard, and was defeated by Brown and West Point. For the first time the track team was defeated by Princeton, the baseball team lost to Harvard and Princeton series, and the crew was defeated by every eastern university of any importance except Columbia.

CASE DISMISSED The case against John O'Regan, of this city, charged with causing the entrance of liquor into Westmorland county, a Scott Act territory, was dismissed yesterday morning in the court at Moncton by Magistrate Kaye. J. A. Barry, of this city, acted for Mr. O'Regan, and Mr. Stevens, of Moncton, for the prosecution.

IN THE COURTS

Argument in Vaughan vs. Mosher; Judgment Reserved — Several Cases Today

Before Mr. Justice McKeown in chambers this morning, argument was heard in the case of Vaughan vs. Mosher. Mr. Baxter, for the Mr. Mosher, contended that no negligence had been shown, and if negligence had been shown, the plaintiff was not entitled to more than \$120.

Mr. Wilson, for the plaintiff, argued that there was a clear case of negligence. He said the boiler had not been inspected for seven years, and during that time had never been insured; that two years ago it had partially collapsed; that it had been repaired and put in operation on the fall without being inspected; also that the mill came under the factory act which required that the boiler be inspected at least once a year, and in case of neglect, the owner was liable for all damage resulting therefrom.

Mr. Wilson also argued that the plaintiff was entitled to pay for 126 weeks at \$6 a week.

His Honor reserved judgment. A. A. Wilson, K. C., is for the plaintiff, and J. B. Baxter and D. King Hassen for the defendant.

The case of Butt vs. the C. P. R. which was to have been tried this morning, was adjourned until next Thursday morning. Baxter & Logan are for the plaintiff; C. F. Inches for the defendant.

Before Mr. Justice Barker in chambers this morning application was made in the case of Gietty vs. Magee to amend some of the papers in the suit in consequence of the death of some of the parties. The application was granted. J. P. Byrne is solicitor, and Dr. W. B. Wallace, counsel.

In the case of the estate of Scott Fairley, application was made by Dr. W. B. Wallace to appoint a receiver in the place of the late Warren C. Winslow, and distribute the assets of the estate. The application was granted and made returnable at the next chancery court, in August.

DIED IN THE STATES

Sad news came to Albert Winchester, superintendent of streets, this morning, when a telegram was received from Nassau, N. H., announcing the death of his daughter, Mrs. Spencer Foss, who left here about five years ago. She was in her twenty-ninth year, and was married about two years ago, and had been living in Nassau. Besides her parents she is survived by five brothers, and one sister, Marguerite, of this city. The brothers are Alexander, Simon, Robert, and William, of St. John, and Walter, of Toronto. The funeral will take place at Nassau, N. H.

WELCOME RAIN IN RIVER COUNTIES

Reports From Provincial Points Today—North Shore Did Not Get Benefit of It Rain fell heavily for a short time this morning but more would have been welcomed. The downfall was general in the river counties but not on the North Shore. The following are reports to the Times from various places in the province:—Edmundston.—Raining hard since about 4 a. m. Woodstock.—Rain commenced about 3 a. m., still raining. Fredericton.—South-east wind, raining hard for some hours. St. Stephen.—Rained hard during night and until 8 a. m.; showers since. Moncton.—No rain; cloudy and cooler. Chatham.—Raining a little. Campbellton.—Fine.

U. N. B. MEN IN FORESTRY WORK FOR GOVERNMENT

With the names of students of the Forestry department of the University of New Brunswick, the last copy of the Canadian Forestry Journal, published in Ottawa, contains an outline of the work projected by the Dominion forestry branch of the department of the interior. Seven parties in all are engaged in survey work of various kinds.

Of these parties two will be engaged in a continuation of the work of determining the eastern boundary of the Rocky Mountain reserve. Both of these parties are in general charge of G. H. Edgcombe, B. Sc. F., son of G. A. Edgcombe of this city. He is a graduate of the U. N. B., and has had a varied experience in engineering and forestry work. P. Z. Campbell, a forestry graduate of the U. N. B., is in charge of the party working on the 11th base line, a point due west of LaCombe, Alta., which will be the limit of the southern party. G. A. Randolph of Fredericton, a third year student of the U. N. B., is the leader of the northern party.

Kenneth R. Machum, of St. John, a second year student of the U. N. B., and A. K. Shivers are under E. G. McDougall in making a survey of the Porcupine Hills in Alberta.

H. C. Kinghorn, a Fredericton graduate will have charge of a party, including G. H. Prince, a U. N. B. forestry junior, to continue the work of inspecting timber limits within the railway belt of British Columbia.

H. B. Murray of Moncton is a member of a party working in the Porcupine Mountains of Saskatchewan. John W. Currie, B. Sc. F. of Andover, a graduate of the U. N. B. in forestry, will continue an expedition of the timber suitable for pulpwood along some of the watersheds in Kewatin territory.

P. Z. Campbell, B. Sc. F. (U. N. B.), will this year be engaged in inspection work of fire ranging, especially along the lines of railway.

KING STREET BUILDING SALE REVIVES RUMORS

Various rumors were afloat this morning concerning the purchase of the Oak Hall building, corner of King and Germain streets, occupied by Scovil Bros. Ltd., by A. H. Hanington, K.C., of the legal firm of Hanington & Hanington. One report was to the effect that the purchase had been made for the C. P. R., but this was not believed.

Frank C. Smith, of the firm of Scovil Bros., said this morning that his firm had a five year lease on the building. Because of this it was said today that the purchasers were not the C. P. R. and another reason was that the Oak Hall had acquired the building adjoining and were not purposing to be bought out, but to expand and rebuild the building at a cost of \$50,000.

Mr. Hanington would not say as to whether he was acting for other parties or not, nor what was being planned in connection with the building.

F. W. Kaye and G. E. Fairweather are the trustees of the Vernon estate to whom the building belonged and E. G. Kaye acted as solicitor. Nothing could be learned from them as to purchasers.

PICKFORD & BLACK MAN HERE TOMORROW

Another meeting of the West India committee of the board of trade is to be held this afternoon at 4:30 o'clock in connection with the service to the West Indies. W. E. Anderson, secretary of the board, had a telephone message this morning from Pickford & Black, of Halifax, to the effect that one of the members would arrive in the city tomorrow morning to discuss the matter of service with those interested among the members of the board. It is probable that the committee will meet the steamship company's representative tomorrow afternoon.

GOLD HEADED CANE FOR J. F. GREGORY

A pleasant time was spent last evening at the home of J. F. Gregory in Millidgeville, when officers of St. Matthew's Presbyterian church, Douglas avenue, of which Mr. Gregory is an active member, called upon him, and presented to him a handsome gold-headed cane as a token of esteem and remembrance in commemoration of his birthday.

Rev. J. J. McSkellin, pastor of the church, made the presentation, and Mr. Gregory replied suitably. Afterwards a delightful social hour was enjoyed.
