TWENTY THIRD ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twenty-third Annual Meeting of the above was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary street, on Thursday, October 27th, 1898.

His Worship, Mayor Shaw, presided.

The meeting was opened by prayer from Rev. Dr. Pearson.

The Mayor followed with encouraging remarks of the work done yearly.

The Managers' Report was read by the Secretary, Miss Hill.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton, presented her annual statement.

The Medical Report was read by Dr. G. B. Smith, in the absence of Dr. Dawson. That of the Sewing Room by Miss Grieg, Secretary-Treasurer of that department.

The several reports were moved and seconded by Messrs. Geo. McMurrich, W. B. McMurrich, de Warren Green, John Fensom, Dr. Palmer and Dr. Henwood.

Rev. S. Goodman closed the meeting with prayer, after which the audience dispersed to view the Home and partake of refreshments.

MANAGER'S REPORT.

In presenting the Twenty-third Annual Report of The Infants' Home and Infirmary, the Managers offer to the Heavenly Father their grateful thanks for the uninterrupted success enjoyed during the year. The renovations of last year have greatly assisted the health and comfort of the Home, especially the hardwood floors, the new kitchen range, and steam appliances for the laundry. We have been mercifully spared any epidemic, which we may greatly attribute to the spotless cleanliness in which the house is kept. The regular visiting of the Lady Managers is a great encouragement to the officers, to whose vigilance this grand result is due. To the tactful management of our Lady Superintendent, Mrs. Jordan, we cordially ascribe the smooth working of the whole institution, in which she is ably assisted by our Matron, Miss Scott, and Head Nurse, Miss Sylvester.

We have added to the comforts of the Home an elevator, which had long been felt to be a necessity. During the hot weather especially, the many stairs have always been too great a strain on our staff. And now also our children can be taken to and from the green where many hot hours are spent.

The number of children in the Home, September 30th, 1898, including 60 who remained in from October 1st, 1897, amount to 189.

Of women, including 30 who were in the previous year, we have had 86.

The first of October begins our year. We would draw your attention to the fact that on the night of October 19th, the first two foundlings of the year were brought in by the police, and between that date and April 12th, 1898, we had nineteen little waifs committed to our care, six of whom were under a week old, and most of them in a dying condition. Since April 12th to the present time we have had no foundlings, which is probably due to the fact, that several of the children were here identified, and the guilty and heartless deserters were traced, and though some of these could not be held by the law, the arrests had a very beneficial effect. Five children were brought in who were taken from the houses of those arrested.

The Lady Managers have interested themselves deeply with regard to the new Maternity House Act. A committee was appointed to confer with the Hon. E. J. Davis, M. P. P., for North York, consisting of Mrs. Featherstone Osler, Mrs. Thomas Hodgins, Mrs. Dyas and Mrs. John Lillie, to assist Mrs. Boulton, our Treasurer, who kindly and ably took the initiative of the negotiations in connection with it. We earnestly hope it will result in furthering the greatest aim of our institution, viz., the prevention of infanticide, and of the desertion of infants.

The wholesale traffic in infant life, caused by the system.

of adoption from baby farms and maternity houses has been exposed, and only such houses as are prepared to take proper care of their infants will be licensed. And, given sufficient time to get the new system into working order, we hope for a much surer protection of helpless infant life,

And should this Maternity House Act prove successful in all respects, ere long we hope to see all parts of the country adopt it, or that instead of permissive it may be made obligatory. At present, Toronto is the only city which has put the measure into operation, and to our worthy Mayor, Mr. Shaw, and the corporation of 1898, is due the honor of this great step in the cause of humanity and the prevention of crime.

We must not omit to name our happiness in restoring many young women to honest, respectable lives. It is not the older and determined wrongdoers with whom we deal, and with gratitude we say that a very large percentage go out into the world useful and respectable members of society, in many cases having learned under this roof to work so as to earn their living. Unfortunate married women, deserted wives and widows find shelter here and thankfully remain until their maternal cares are so lessened that they can seek work elsewhere. One part of our work which appeals very strongly to us is the care of the infants of widowers—men willing to labor and pay for the babes but unable to afford housekeepers or suitable protection and care at home. They are, of all our applicants, the most grateful to the Home. A walk through the wards will convince you of the care taken of these helpless ones, those who have strength and constitution unimpaired by drugs or neglect growing into the bonny children of our large nursery, from which so many

have been adopted into happy homes; and those who are brought in diseased, drugged, or hopelessly ill, breathe away their short lives in warmth and comfort, nothing being spared to save them suffering, and as a rule, with these alleviations, the little waifs pass away with a minimum of pain.

The falling off of contributions during these years of financial distress through which the country has been passing, has greatly added to the difficulties of our annual maintenance, and we earnestly hope that returning prosperity will bring with it returning generosity.

We have but now been obliged to almost renew the verandahs, which are such a boon to our children, excepting for just the few weeks that they can be on the green. The delicate and varied foods, the warmth, and the untiring vigilance, all necessary for the protection of infant life, are expenses which tax our Treasurer severely.

With great regret we record the loss of our kind and faithful friend, Dr. Burns. Mrs. Drayton was another worker for our Home whose death we mourn.

To the Medical Staff we extend our most cordial thanks, their new arrangements of substitutes in cases of emergency has proved a material benefit.

Grateful acknowledgments we would also render to the clergy at St. Luke's church, to the Rev. Dr. Pearson and to Mr. Green.

The Misses Gillespie, Miss Saunders and other ladies, for services and classes held with the women.

Mrs. Hodgins and her sewing club have contributed their yearly supply of garments.

To Mrs. Parsons, the tribute of a heartfelt resolution was accorded, which has been embossed and presented, in recog-

dition of the many years of quiet earnest work, and the hope that she may be spared for many more to continue her labor of love.

Mr. N. Miller, Mr. Holmsted, and our Advisory Board, have, as usual, responded to our call whenever needed, and to these and all we yield our warmest thanks.

MEDICAL REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :—

We have much pleasure in submitting to you the Medical Report for the year ending October 1st, 1898, being the twenty-third of the existence of the Infants' Home and Infirmary.

On October 1st, 1897, there were sixty children in the Home. One hundred and twenty-nine were admitted during the year, making a total of one hundred and eighty-nine, being an increase of five over the previous year. Out of this number nineteen were foundlings, or brought from some maternity home by the police. Most of them were under two weeks old. Two were admitted in a dying condition, and three of the foundlings were in a state of stupor, from which it was impossible to arouse them. They died in two or three days.

Out of the one hundred and eighty-nine children in the Home during the year, there were fifty-three deaths, a death rate of twenty-eight per cent., only four dying over one year of age; the greatest mortality being between one and three months.

The causes of death were from diseases usually fatal to infantile life, as affection of brain and lungs, convulsions, marasmus, cholera infantum, etc. During the summer time, as a rule, a large percentage of the children die of the latter trouble, but during the past summer the children of the Home suffered very little, if at all, from that troublesome

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money, the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and thirty other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society, according to the resolution adopted and recorded February 1st, 1898.

VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance, especially in the investment of funds.

VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings, summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys belonging to the Institution, and shall keep accurate account thereof with vouchers. It shall be her duty to deposit all receipts, from whatever source, in a chartered bank to the credit of the Institution, from which account withdrawals shall only be made by cheque, signed by the President and Treasurer; she shall also keep in the same or another chartered bank an account to be called the Maintenance Account, in the name of the Treasurer of the Infants' Home, which account shall not exceed \$500 at a time, and shall be opened and replenished from the General Account. Withdrawals from the Maintenance Account shall be made by cheque of the Treasurer only.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. All applications for positions on the active staff must be accompanied by satisfactory recommendations as to skill and fitness, and to be submitted to the staff for approval before being placed on record. No child or wet nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A committee of the whole to be called Committee of Investigation and Admission, shall meet on all the Tuesdays of the month following the Board Meeting at the hour of 11 o'clock a.m, their proceedings to be reported to the General Board once a month. At these meetings five Managers shall form a quorum, the weekly visitors inclusive. In the absence of the President and Vice-Presidents one of the Managers shall take the chair by vote.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES WITH CHILDREN.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the Lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends for six months, then the necessary papers will be filled in ready for their signatures.
