St. Pierre Bulletins

Paris, Feb. 29, (Midnight).—Artillery activity in Soissons, Rheims, Champagne, Vosges and Belgium Sectors. North of Verdun cannonade continues on the Northern front but with less force. No infantry attack during the day. The enemy is entrenching on the northern slopes of Poivre Hill, the first crest of which is occupied by our troops.

In Belgium two German captive balloons of the Drachen type broke away from their moorings. One fell in the sea opposite La Panne, the other near Caudekerque. The aviators were captured.

Paris, March 1st 3 p.m.—In the district north of Verdun there is nothing further to report. During the night there was intermittent cannonade on different points of the front. We shelled the 2nd and 3rd German lines between Regnieville and Remenauville west of Port a Mousson. A German aeroplane was felled by our airships. The enemy machine fell ablaze in the German lines at La Bassée.

Official French Admiralty.—The auxiliary cruiser Provence II temporarily employed as a troop transport for Salonika; was sunk on the 26th in mid Mediterranean. Information received up to now reports 256 survivors arrived at Malta and 400 others arriving by French and English patrol ships which hurried to the scene on hearing wireless calls. Search continues on the scene of the wreck. Mr. Bakanowski, deputy of Seine, Staff Attache of the eastern army was a passenger on the ship. He declares that no periscope was seen, either before or after the accident. No torpedo wake, or stir of water noticeable at the time of explosion, and the lookout was very strict. The battery remained at their post until the last moment. The ship was armed with 5 cannon of 14 cm., 20 of 57 m.m.; and 40 of 47 m.m.

Petrograd, Feb. 16.—An official announcement has been made that the Russians have captured Erzerum. Grand Duke Nicholas has telegraphed the Emperor as follows:—"God has granted the brave troops of the army of the Caucasus such great help that Erzerum has been taken after a five days' unprecedented assault. I am inexpressibly happy to announce this victory to your Imperial Majesty."

German Admiral Von Pohl Dies in Berlin

Berlin, Feb. 24.—Admiral Von Pohl, whose retirement on account of ill health from the position of commander of the German battle fleet, announced two days ago, has died in Berlin.

Trenches Recaptured

Paris, Feb.—In the Champagne district the French troops have recaptured a portion of the advanced trenches occupied by the German on 18th of February.

Silence After Storm

London, Mar. 1.—No mention of fighting at Verdun is made in the Berlin official statement of today. The German offensive against Verdun which had brought the Crown Prince's army up to the inner line of French defenses has halted there, according to today's official statement from Paris. The lull which yesterday gave signs of setting in now extends along virtually the entire front. No important developments at any point during the night, the French War Office reports.




The Fall of Erzerum

Petrograd, Feb. 19.—A War Office communication as issued today says: Completeness of the defeat sustained by the Turks and the terrible losses they suffered at Erzerum fighting is becoming more and more clear. The forts in the fortress itself and in surrounding country are full of Turkish dead. Remnants of Turkish army pressed by our troops are fleeing in disorder, many at points in different directions. A severe snowstorm has failed to cool the ardor of our men in pursuit who are close on the heels of the enemy and who are taking prisoners at the tail ends of the Turkish columns.
We captured at Erzerum the entire fortress artillery and a large part of the enemy's field artillery. Up to the present we have counted two hundred guns. We have taken a huge quantity of artillery, ammunition and arms, several dozen motor cars, wireless apparatus and poison park. A number of other troops taken with Turkish soldiers captured in vast regions of Erzerum are being tabulated.
In the Black Sea our warships have continued their operations in the region of West Trebizond, permanent bridges have been demolished and 15 sailing ships destroyed.

New Yorker Warns Canada of Invasion

Ottawa, Feb. 7.—This letter was received here today:
New York, Feb. 5, 1916.
Gen. Sir Sam Hughes,
Ottawa, Canada.
Dear General:—A director of several large manufacturing concerns in this country making war supplies gave me the following information with permission to transmit it to you for what it is worth:
A German invasion of Canada is being planned in this country. To take place in about two months. Two hundred thousand Mauser rifles are packed in cases at several distributing points, with a quantity of ammunition, ready to be shipped on a moment's notice. A large number of trained German officers have recently arrived and are distributed throughout the country making arrangements to carry out their plans.
It has recently been discovered that nearly one-third of the munitions now under contract in the United States are controlled and being paid for out of German funds placed in several German banks under the control of a Dr. Albert.
Doubtless you have this or similar information already, but as my informant is a man of high standing and impressed with the truth of the information given me, I consider it my duty to transmit it to you with the suggestion that if you have not already been apprised of this danger you do not treat the matter lightly.

Using Glass Boats To Find Submarines

Army Surgeon Declares 17 German Underwater Boats Were Netted
New York, Feb. 10.—Dr. M. S. Inglis, a Canadian army surgeon, who arrived today on the Anchor Liner Cameronia from Liverpool, declared that he had knowledge of the capture in British nets of seventeen German submarines and told how the crew of one of them had been found shot to death after it had been towed ashore. Dr. Inglis said he had been allowed to descend into this submarine and had seen the bodies.
"To save them from death by suffocation," he said, "the commander had shot all his men and then himself, apparently."
Dr. Inglis said the British are now making use of glass bottom boats with more or less success in scouting for submarines, in conjunction with a hydroplane. The glass used, he said, gives a clear view of the water to a depth of fifty or sixty feet.

Germans Are Anxious Now To End The War

New York, Feb. 10.—A special cable to the Tribune from London, says: "Fresh evidence that Germany is anxious to end the war as soon as possible comes to light every day. There is no question but that she is feeling the pinch hard.
"It can now be stated with assurance that she has made a frantic and flattering offer to Belgium, which King Albert has declined to accept, after a conference with Lord Curzon and Sir Douglas Haig, who were sent at his special request for information from the Allied Governments.
"Aside from a promise to restore the Kingdom as it was before the war, Germany offered to return King Albert to the Belgian throne, and pay a big indemnity. Germany reserved the right to hold Antwerp and Ostend as German ports. Naturally, neither Albert nor Great Britain was willing to grant this concession under consideration, so that the offer has been flatly turned down.
"With the Germans out of Belgium more men would be available for other fields, while the West front would be cut down materially. These conditions would be of decided advantage to Germany. King Albert as soon as he was assured of the continued support of the Allies, declared that a separate peace was impossible."

One of the big four thousand-ton transport steamers engaged by the Admiralty, nearly came to grief some time ago while laying at anchor at Sydney. But it was one of the closest shaves the transport ever had.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.
Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radii of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.
Telegraph messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

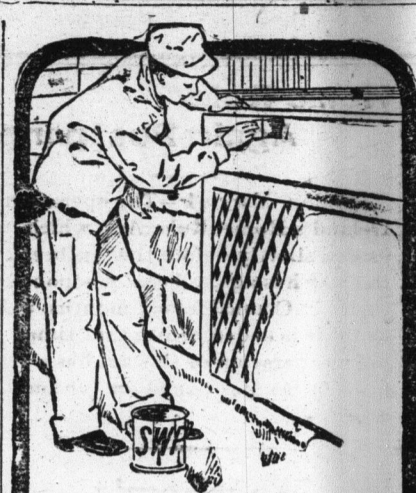

Yearning for Peace in Germany

EVIDENCE IN CAPTURED CORRESPONDENCE

An interesting collection of letters was taken from prisoners captured by the French at Hartmannsweilerkopf. These letters throw a vivid light on the general state of mind, not only of the German civilian population, but also of the men with the colors. Sometimes it is an echo of a complaint that has come from the trenches which shows itself in a letter from home. This a wife writes to her husband:-

"We are so sorry that you have all the hard work to do, and have only dry bread to eat. I should like to send you butter every week, for I would do anything for my husband, but I can't. There are the children, who are always hungry."

Sometimes there are letters from one soldier to another, fighting at different points, which show discontent with the German commissariat. A letter dated December 17 contained the following sentence: "The men had to eat potatoes without salt or fat; they had no more bread. That was in Russia." Here are more typical letters:-

November.
Yesterday we had a man from the 70th Regiment here. He told us terrible stories. For six or seven weeks they had practically nothing to eat until they were ordered to seize everything they could find.

December 8.
You know that I am compelled to send parcels to Johann. It is in the 12th Regiment that they are the worst off. They have practically nothing to eat. They say that they have a non-commissioned officer who is a perfect beast, and tortures his men in every way. Then they have very little bread—not enough to satisfy their hunger.

Two curiously contradictory letters—written to soldiers on the western front—show that the discontent is widespread, though not universal. One letter, written on December 9, says: "I am so sorry for you. To have to fight and have nothing to eat is really too much."

While another letter says: "Who is on the British front, and says that all his comrades would be thankful for the end of the war, no matter what that end might be, has very little to eat. I am so glad that you have enough."

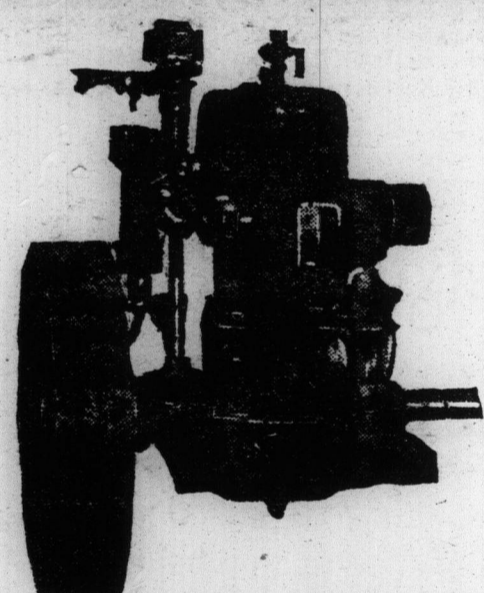

A feature of the evening was the welcome given to Naval Reservist **Azariah Mercer**, who had just returned from England, where he had been doing his "bit" for the past year or two on cruiser, trawler, etc.
He was invited by the chairman, **C. E. Russell, J. P.**, to the platform, and all those who desired to give him a welcome home were asked to stand. Everybody rose. Reservist Mercer replied, thanking them for their welcome, and intimated that he would be returning again to the front a little later on.
The programme was concluded at 10:40 by the singing of the National Anthem. The receipts of the two evenings amounted to \$65.30.

Notes and Comments

King George has now completely recovered his health, and his medical advisers have given him permission to resume his visit to troops in training.
Over 100,000 women up to now have taken the places of men in British industrial life, thus releasing as many men for service in the Army. These figures have been compiled by the Statistical Department of the Board of Trade. They fall short of the correct total, as many firms have not yet made returns. Women predominate in factories which they never entered before the war, and work metal lathes and drills quite like old hands.
Talk about being conservative and following the beaten track and pursuing old methods and plans. We want to say that if the fishermen of this country wish to secure fair play and justice things have got to be turned upside down. A right about face policy will have to be pursued, and every outport man will have to take his stand shoulder to shoulder and demand fair play, equal consideration and justice. Don't be content with merely electing members to represent you, and a government to manage the country's affairs, but see to it that they do the will of the people of this Commonwealth. See to it that they become your servants and not your Masters, as it is at present.

Winter Feed for Horses

Work Horses Entitled to a Share of the Best the Farm Affords
Too often the faithful old horse is neglected and not allowed his rightful share of the grain and hay. Of course, it is right to suppose that the horse should be wintered as cheaply as possible, but it should be remembered that he is entitled to a share of the best the farm affords; to keep up his health and strength, and a comfortable shelter from the cold and wet of the season.
Oat straw in small proportions with timothy hay and oats is all right for the horse when not worked, but the horse which is asked to do a day's work needs just as much consideration in winter as in the months while it is worked in the field. Clover hay which is free from mold and dust is the best and most digestible thing for the horse.
The horse enjoys a change of food and should have it now and then. A hot bran mash and a few sliced potatoes will be appreciated.
Blood mares do well on a ration of oat straw and corn stalks to pick at between meals. They should also receive a liberal feed of grain. A brood mare needs exercise in the open air every day as do all the horses, and it is a good plan to turn them in a small yard and give them a few stalks to pick over; it will take up their attention and they will feel the cold less. Horses should never be allowed to eat from the straw stacks with the cows, as it is not good for either the cows or horses. Oat straw often has bad colds, and the discharge from their nostrils is caught in the straw. Horses should not swallow it, as it is almost sure to create disease. On the other hand the cows do not enjoy being driven about by the horses; who are nearly always "bossy," and do not allow the cows a chance to eat as they ought.

Home Rule Again Postponed

London, March 1.—The operation of Ireland's Home Rule Act which was passed shortly before the outbreak of the war has again been postponed by Order in Council for six months, unless the war is ended before that time. The operation of this act has already been twice postponed on account of war.

Hun Losses at Verdun are 45,000

New York, Feb. 29.—A news agency despatch from London, published here today, says:
"More than 45,000 Germans were killed in the assault on Verdun, according to a Central News despatch from Amsterdam today, quoting Dutch sources as authority. On one 2-mile front, the despatch stated, were found 8,000 German corpses. One regiment has been formed from the fragments of eight German regiments nearly wiped out in the fighting around Haumont. Scores of trains of wounded from the German front are reported arriving at Metz. The hospitals at Coblenz, Treves, Cologne and other German cities were said to be overflowing with wounded."

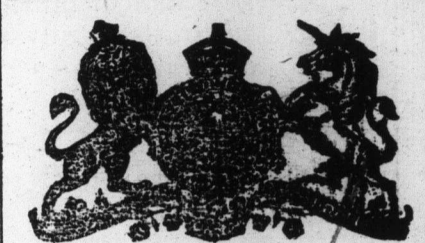
NEWS IN A LINE
