Penian Friends

The Brooklyn Eagle of 13th inst. published what it claims to be the official history of James McDermott's connection with the Fenian Brotherhood, his betrayal of the Fenian conspirators, &c. It says McDermott conspired that Mr. Gallagher and his brother were going to England to blow up buildings and allowed them, having first obtained a letter from O'Donnovan Rossa authorizing him to correspond for his paper. In Dublin McDermott sought Mrs. Cody, who supplied food to the Fenian Park murderers, and by the lavish use of money wormed from her the names of the persons who paid her for supplying food to the assassins. She only gave him the names of the persons who were arrested of the parties whose names she gave him. Featherston Rossa, the accredited agent, was then in Cork, and McDermott did not succeed in entrapping O'Malley. McDermott convinced Featherston that he was not a spy and became quite intimate with him, although O'Malley warned him repeatedly. At a meeting of dynamite men, McDermott was blowing up and proposed to poison Capt. Plunkett, the resident magistrate for Cork. That night the plan for the Liverpool explosion was decided.

Next day McDermott left for London and met O'Connor under the name of Dalton. The day after his arrival at London Sir William Harcourt stated in Parliament that he had been offered information for £10,000 of numerous plots for the destruction of public buildings. McDermott showed Dalton all the public buildings, and he is the personage who gestured to the Fenian dynamite men in the company of Westminister Palace. It was disclosed by McDermott and Featherston that a box of nitro-glycerine should be brought up to Liverpool by Deasy. Deasy warned McDermott not to take any dynamite to Fenian, to whom the dynamite was consigned, but before he left McDermott gave him a note to Fenian signed with Featherston's name stating, "This is Deasy's, a good man, and the person who brings you nitro-glycerine." Deasy was arrested on his arrival, and the note led to the capture of Fenian and conviction of him and Deasy.

ART IN MILWAUKEE.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., 19th Aug., 1883.
To the Editor of the "MIRAMICHI ADVANCE."
Dear Sir,—Speaking with one of the principal lights of Milwaukee's chief daily, yesterday afternoon, at the 4th annual convention of Photographers of the United States, now being held in this beautiful, cool and quiet city, your correspondence was very interesting to me, and I was glad to see that you were so much interested in the art of photography on view at the Exposition Building. So, in company with a friend, an hour or two was spent in gazing upon the beauties of nature and art, for both were legions.

Numerous photographs taken by the electric light were exhibited by DIXON of Toronto, but they did not appear superior in any point. Two Montreal amateurs, one a Cavalier at the Victoria Skating Rink, and the other a game of Lacrosse, were fine specimens of "composition" photographs from the studio of Inglis, of Rochester, N. Y., late of Montreal. The former picture contained more than a hundred figures, all of which were so vividly portrayed as to elicit hearty admiration, while the latter was well deserving of the encomiums bestowed upon it.

Numerous instantaneous views of landscapes and animals were exhibited; also some marine views by Lincoln of Cambridgeport, Mass., taken in the same way, which were eminently worthy of more than a passing notice, the waves even on the point of breaking being minutely delineated.

The landscapes were highly admired, principally those of Hines, N. Y., displayed by Ryder, where art seemed to have reached its perfection in the rippling surface of the stream and the downpour of the waterfall. Views of mountain scenery in the picturesque country of Gunnison, and other portions of Colorado, struck the beholder with awe at the "sublimity of their grandeur." Architectural views were in abundance, some of which were exceedingly well-toned and finished, a fine specimen being the Court House of Quincy, Ill. A well-executed work of art was the interior of a library by Pennell of Brooklyn, the minutiae of which were truthfully depicted—the light and shade being noticeably perfect.

seemed to be in no way lessened by the camera. Strikingly prominent in this Department were the photographs displayed by J. H. Kent of Rochester, N. Y., the newly elected President of the Society, being rare productions in the art of Photography and acknowledged by all to be unequalled.

A novel feature in the exhibition was the plaque Photograph, which is a photographic imitation of a porcelain plaque, on a dark ground, and at a little distance, gives a very beautiful effect. It is manufactured by Clench of Lockport, N. Y. Some excellent specimens of Crayons were on view, but they were not numerous. Those exhibited, however, were considered fairly good. St. Louis bore off the laurels in this branch.

There was a large assortment of scenic backgrounds, cameras and other paraphernalia pertaining to the studio. The Convention closed this afternoon 500 members having been in attendance during the session. It has proved an important work in introducing new and improved appliances to the profession, and by the numerous interesting papers which have been read upon the subject by men of high rank in the art. Dr. Herman Vogel having journeyed from Berlin to attend the meetings. President Kent is of the opinion that the electric light will never come to be extensively used in photography, as for ordinary purposes, daylight is always to be had. All unanimously agree that this is the best exhibition of the best work of the best photographers ever held, and the "Cream City" appreciates her share of the honor. Cincinnati will be the rendezvous next year.

I cannot close without a tribute to the galaxy of natural beauties who thronged the Exposition Building and were as ardently admired as their pictured rivals, possibly more so by some interested individuals, if the intensity of their gaze could be an indication of their partiality for London beer and bricks, Milwaukee is prominent for her beauties.
