

THE CZAR'S DOMAIN How It Is Represented at the

Exposition. SURPRISES THAT ARE DELIGHTFUL

Marvelous Beauty of the Enamels of the Boyars-An Art of the Ancients Revived istics Which Run Throughout All Russian Work at the Exposition.

World's Fair, July 22. — [Special.] — One of the most delightful surprises of this exposition is Russia. Few of us ex nto the mental habit of viewing the czar's where a few feudal lords rule many mil ions of serves. We could not get out of our mind the notion that Russia is wild, factures building with a feeling that duty and curiosity are driving us to spend a few moments inspecting the back-country exhibits of the steppes of eastern Europe. nagine our surprise when we find the the highest form of art and skill.
You can tell the Russian pavilion as far as you can see it down the great Columbian avenue. No flag, no imperial crest, o sign board is necessary to enable you o'determine where Belgium leaves off on the one side and Norway on the other. marks Russia in every line of its dark cimbers, left in natural color, in every form used in the strong, angular architect-

ure. One beauty of Russia's display here is that everything she has is marked with the same strong characteristics. The Russians are a people to themselves, their art, their architecture, their designs, their methods, are things apart from the remainder of Christendom. The pavilion dates nearly three centuries back. It is cathedral-like. One corner has a great vestibule, wherein you see examples of iling and wall decorations in vogue in of the pavilion runs a broad platform, decorated with urns and vases of hewn marble and other hard stones from the exile

mines in Siberia.

Passing within, one is drawn by some fascination to the huge cases in which the silversmiths of Moscow and St. Petersburg present the first of the delightful surprises which we are to encounter here. It is the enamel ware. We think we have seen enamel work in the Belgian section, in the Italian, the Austrian and elsewhere. Here we learn, moreover, that to the Here we learn, moreover, that to the Russian must be given the credit of reviving a lost art. Enameling on silver was an art with the ancients. Then for ages it disappeared. Twenty years ago the Russians revived it, developed it, and it must be admitted have perfected it.

I regret my inability to describe the beauty of these enamels for you, but the prices will in a measure serve to give you a hint. Prices do not always do this, for it is as easy to say five thousand dallars as

One is a magnificent medallion, framed in
carved oxidized silver, which was presented to the czarowitch by his regiment

giant punch bowl of gilt, enameled, striking in design, magnificent in workmanship. It is one of the finest specimens of Russian classic art, and is claimed to be expected to find his own bedelothing. the most noteworthy thing of the sort ever

No other workers have attempted to do that in enamel which appears easy to these artisans of the far east. They enamel large surfaces with such perfect adhesion that if the silver underneath should be bent or indented the enamel would follow it without a break. In the making of transparent enamel, so thin that the light shines through it and produces effects most charming, they are absolutely unique. None of their imitators have attempted, much less accomplished, this difficult feat. The Russians produce some marvelous effects in the imitation of napkins in silver. Across a bowl or plaque lies what on casual observation appears to be a linen napkin. You might, if circumstances favored, pick it up, or try to do so, but it is of silver. Near by is a beautiful napkin of what appears to be silk. It also is solid silver.

The Russians are imitated, but they do not often imitate. This is true of their bronzes, as well. Here again one is surprised at the manifestation of Boyar skill. After the dainty and sometimes finicky bronzes of other European nations, with their endless play upon the female figure and allegorical illustrations, it is a great delight to turn to the bronzes of Pinsia.


