## BEING A FOOTLIGHT FAVORITE Morning-Criminal Always Manages to Escape Life of the Stage and is

EERLIN, Feb. 15.—The mysterious attacks upon women upon the streets of Berlin recalling the notorious "Ripper" cases of other cities, continue. Five women of the working class were wounded in the city and in the suburbs yesterday, while this morning the wife of a merchant was wounded by an unknown assailant. None of the women were seriously hurt. # YOUNG TURK PARTY NOW IN COMPLETE CONTROL

Sultan Charges Hilmi Pasha With Formation of New Cabinet

Committee Repudiates Any Intention of Overthrowing Sultan



CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 14.—The constitutional regime has passed through a severe crisis which has resulted in the downfall of the aged grand vizier, Kiamil Pasha, and the complete triumph of the Young Turk party or committee of union and progress, which has virtually imposed upon the sultan a ministry of its own own nominees headed by Hilmi Pasha.

The committee has publicly repudiated any intention of overthrowing the Sultan or installing a military dictatorship, but the crisis and its outcome are regarded as not boding well for the stability of the throne or the success of the parliamentary government.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Feb. 14.—The Sultan has accepted Kiamil Pasha's charged Hilmi Pasha, minister of the interior and formerly inspector-general of Macedonia, with the formation of a new cabinet.

Halmi Pasha himself takes the portfolio of the minister of the interior, while the ministers of finance, justice, public works and commerce in the former cabinet have been retained. There have been some minor changes, but the general impression is that the whole ministry will be short-lived.
