



With this fact confronting him, what did Mr. Pugsley no? Did he protest? Did he tell the other members of the Cabinet that if this Agreement went through his own pledged word to his constituents in St. John would be flagrantly violated? Did he point out that the progress and development of the shipping ports of Canada would not only be checked, but if the produce of the West continued to flow South to a foreign country the trans-Atlantic trade in natural products through the ports of Montreal, Quebec, Hallfax and St. John would be rained? There is no record of it. But we do know that Mr. Pugsley swallowed the Agreement and now comes back to the constituents whose confidence he has betrayed and, as if nothing unusual had happened, asks them to re-elect him as their representative.

The full meaning of the Reciprocity Agreement was known in January. It at once became apparent that if its provisions went into effect there would be something approaching a revolution in the system of transportation. It is not surprising, therefore, that in spite of his legal acumen and well known adroltness Mr. Pugsley failed.


