## GERMANS CONTINUE TO GAIN GROUND ON NORTHERN PART OF BRITISH LINE

## HEAVY FIGHTING CONTINUES IN THE LYS RIVER SECTOR

Enemy Attacks in Great Strength and Forces WIMFN WILL Back British to the Line of Wytschaete, Messines Ridge and Ploegsteert-Germans Reach Left Bank of the Lys at Certain Points and also Cross the Lawe at Lestrem but he is Driven Back Across Latter Stream-Huns Claim to Have Captured 6,000 Prisoners.

London, April 10.-Maintaining their powerful attacks in the northern part of the British line, the Germans continu ed to gain ground today. The official report from Field Marshal Haig says that the British troops were forced back to the line of Wytschaete, Messines Ridge and Ploegsteert.

The text of the statement reads: Following upon the bombardment already reported, the enemy this morning launched a fresh attack in strength against our positions between the Lys river and Armentieres and the Ypres-Comines Canal. Heavy fighting has been taking place in this secto throughout the day as well as on the whole front of yester-day's attack north of La Bassee Canal. North of Armentieres the weight of the enemy's assaults pressed our troops back to the line of Wytschaete-Messines Ridge and Ploegste ert. Bodies of German infantry who had forced their way into Messines were driven out this morning by er-attack.

"South of Armentieres the enemy succeided after a proof struggle in establishing himself on the left bank of the Lys river at certain points east of Estaires and in the neighborhood of Bacstamur.

This morning the enemy also crossed Lawe at Lestren but was counter-attacked by our troops and driven out of

the village and back across the river.

Between Estaires and Givenchy our positions have been maintained. On other parts of the British front the day again passed comparatively quietly.

## ONLY FOUR LARGE MERCHANT CRAFT SUNK LAST WEEK

London, April 10—The sinking of British merchantsmen by mines or submarines last west reached the next lowest level of any week since Germany began her intensive submarine campaign early in 1917. Four vessels of more than 1,600 tons two of less than 1,800 tons and two fishing poats were sent to the bottom. ## THE ENEMY EXTEND

# IN THE VICINITY OF LA BASSEE

Germans Extend Sector of Tuesday's Attack Northward by Launching Drive Against British Between Armentieres and Messines-Huns Gain Ground at Givenchy.

With the British Army in France, April 10-(By the Associated Press)-The Germans this morning extended the sector of yesterday's attack in the Northward by launching a drive against the British between Armentieres and Messines.

Once yesterday and again last evening the Germans gained some ground at Givenchy, but each time the British threw themselves so fiercely on the invaders that the latter were forced to withdraw the last time, leaving upwards of 800 prisoners behind them.

The battle which began yesterday morning between La Bassee and Fleurbaix, the correspondent says, is continuing today with unabated violence.

The artillery duel has extended southward to Arras, while the Germans also are attacking between Armentieres and Messines on the Belgian border

The enemy has brought into action a tremendous concentration of artillery and is throwing his infantry in dense masses. The Germans the writer declares, plainly are making another effort to break through the British positions.

### British Statement.

London, April 10 .- In their new attack on the front of the Somme battlefield, the war office announces, the Germans yesterday forced their way into Givenchy, but the British recaptured the town.

Fierce fighting continued during last night on the front north of La Bassee Canal. The British troops are standing on the line of the Rivers Lawe and Lys and are engaged in heavy fighting with the Germans at the river crossing at Es taires and Bac St. Maur.

The German front of attack is extending today. Early this morning a bombardment was begun of the British positions from the Armentieres region as far north as the Ypres-Comines Canal. On the southern part of this front infantry fighting is reported to have begun.

## French Hold the Line

Paris, April 10.—German troops last night delivered a heavy attack on the French lines near Hangard En Santerre which were met by a French counter-attack, preventing the Germans from gaining any advantage. West of Castel and west of Noyon German efforts to advance failed

Even from their present small supplies they have been saving Italy from collapse through hunger.

Since shipping must be concentrated on the shortest routes, Canada and the United States must continue to be practically the only source of supply.

Canada must provide wheat and meat in increasing lantities to meet a situation th the war.

Men who can be spared for work on the farms must serve in this way. Those who are obliged to remain in the city or town can at least raise vegetables in their gardens or on vacant lots.

An increased spring acreage in wheat and other grain is vitally needed.

Stock raisers are asked to provide the greatest possible production of meat, especially pork.

The Dominion and Provincial Governments will help to supply labor where needed.

Starvation is threatening our Allies. Everyone in Canada must fight by doing his or her utmost to produce and to conserve food.
