Up to the time that the report was forwarded 20,000 rifes, 35 guns and 200 machine guns had been handed over to the Ukrainians.

She was reported rerting easily at her home yesterday and no serious results are expected from the injuries received. Motorman Mitchell received a severe cut on the side of his head and Motorman Smith complains of a sore back. It is not thought that either of these men are badly injured and may be back to their work today, or at least in a few days. The two cars were quite badly broken up and it was some little time before the tracks were cleared and the cars were sent to the barns for repairs.

There was great excitement at the time of the collision but after first ald had been rendered the injured persons they were conveyed to their homes.
