the garrison, as well as the relieving force advanced to meet the enemy; but it took us all day before we met Sir Colin. In consequence of this shelling, groves of trees and houses were laid low. Very hard fighting we had that day. We then returned to Alum Bagh. It was here that Sir Henry Havelock died and was buried.

What was the cause of his death? The want of nourishing food. He had to be held up on his horse for a while when leaving Lucknow, and later grew so Per Square, first insertion, weak that he had to be put in a palanquin. It was just after the burial of the gallant hero that we received intelligence that the Gwaloir contingent had attacked and recaptured Cawnpore. We consequently made a forced march of 44 miles. 
