MUCH BUSINESS AT COUNCIL

Accumulation of Past Weeks Cleared Off—Summer Work Being Planned.

A meeting of the Town Council was held at the residence of His Worship Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McKay presiding.

There were present Couns. St. Onge, Moore, Belle Isle, Graham, Marquis, Duncan, Gilker and Matthews. The minutes of several meetings were read and confirmed. The clerk read the following communications:

Secretary School Board asking for \$37,000 for school purpose.—Filed.

Mrs. Morrison, Secretary Red Cross asking that a wife inspector be appointed.—Laid on table till next meeting.

Mrs. Sarah Smith, re taxes on personal property 1921.—Not entertained at this time.

A. A. Andrew, Sec. trustees Board Soldiers' Memorial Hospital asking that Council appoint a representative to act on the Board.—On motion His Worship was appointed.

A number of applications for positions were placed on file until such positions were about to be filled. J. M. Keith, Clerk of Executive Council wrote re certified copies of acts passed, also enclosed account of \$3.00 for same.—Account ordered paid and letter filed.

The City Engineer of Moncton in reference to the cost of street paving in that city.

A considerable discussion took place on this paving question. Coun. Belle Isle said that the Nairnville paving, according to the representative figures would cost \$84,500 per mile. Farrow would cost about \$25,000 per mile for a 35 foot street.

Coun. Moore said that he understood that price of paving Water St. to the Subway, and Lehigh St. would be \$90,000.

His Worship said that he understood that a thirty foot street could be put down for \$50,000 per mile. The company would also them a dollar per cubic yard for rock, crushed, but when spread on the street a cubic yard would cover five or six yards, and the company wanted to charge the town five or six dollars for the work of spreading and setting stone.—The letter was placed on file.

The McLennan Foundry & Machine Works submitted a price of \$155.00 for boring necessary work in connection thereto.—Referred to the Electric Light Committee.

Express Will Run From Campbellton to Edmundston Three Days Each Week.

Effective Monday, May 1st, train service will prove a great convenience to Edmundston, leaving Campbellton at 7:30 a.m., on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday, arriving St. Leonard at 12:35 noon, and reaching Edmundston at 1:30 p.m.

Train No. 38 will leave Edmundston at 12:30 p.m., on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, arriving at St. Leonard 1:25 p.m., leaving St. Leonard at 1:30 p.m., and reaching Campbellton at 6:25 p.m.

This extension of the passenger service will prove a great convenience to many travelers who have been for some time desirous of making this connection.

This was placed on file. Joseph Allard wrote in reference to his application for a loan under the Housing Act. Referred to the Housing Board.

H. G. V. Farrer wrote in reference to attending the annual convention of Electric Engineers. Referred to Electric Light Committee with power to act.

A number of applications for licenses were referred to the Police and License Committee. These applications brought out a discussion on the general over-charge in taxi fares.

Coun. Duncan thought non-residents should pay more than our own taxpayers. Clerk—They now pay double license fees.

Thm. St. Onge said that most peddlers paid only \$20.00 and they competed with our regular market. Should be taxed more.

Coun. Gilker said the establishment of a market would remedy this. The various departmental accounts were ordered paid.

During the passing of these accounts some instances of over-charges were pointed out and the whole system of buying was condemned.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported as follows:—

That in the case of George Hachey a reduction of \$500 on personal property be made, he having been assessed on an auto which he did not own.

That in the case of Emil Roy, his property valuation be reduced \$300. That in the case of Alex. Mowat, no reduction be made.

That in the case of Mrs. Elsie Robertson, a reduction of \$400 be made in her taxes.

This report was received and adopted. The Police and License Committee reported recommending that the Durick Drug Store be given a permit to sell on upon payment of \$15.00.—Report adopted.

The matter of the request of J. E. Dion for more pay was again taken up.

ENTERTAINMENT BY CONVENT PUPILS

Address and Presentation to Popular Pastor—Pleasant Time Enjoyed by All.

Dalhousie, April 24.—The pupils of the Convent gave a most enjoyable entertainment in their hall, on Thursday evening. The entertainment consisted of vocal and instrumental music, dramas, and drills. Much interest was aroused when it became known that the occasion was the feast of the much esteemed pastor of the parish, Reverend Father Hart.

Following a most interesting and amusing program, an address was presented to the Rev. Father Hart, accompanied by choice flowers and a most suitable gift, a Vatican Bearer. The address was read by Albert Godin, a former pupil, on behalf of the Sisters and the pupils, expressing their appreciation of the great interest taken in their welfare by the Rev. Father Hart, who in reply, thanked the kind donors for the choice flowers and the beautiful gift and for the good things said in the address. His desire was to advance education. He was working along the line laid down by his predecessor the Rev. Father Boucher, the founder of the institution, who is now the parish priest of West Bathurst.

Father Hart then called on the Rev. A. A. Brucier, who was present, to make a few remarks. The Reverend gentleman, on arising, spoke of the pleasure he felt in meeting so many old friends. He congratulated all concerned on the program presented, and then he spoke, at length, on the necessity of learning both French and English.

The Rev. Father Legacy, parish priest of Balmoral, spoke briefly. He was delighted with the good pronunciation of English by the French pupils and he also encouraged the study of both languages.

The Rev. Father de La Garde, parish priest of Nash's Creek, was also present, but he made no address as he time was getting so late.

A most pleasant evening came to a close with the singing of the National Anthem.

That the Electric Light Department be authorized to adopt a rate for the supply of electric current for cooking purposes on the following basis: For less than 100 K. W. H. per mo. 06 For 100 to 200 K. W. H. per mo. 04 For 200 or over K. W. H. per mo. 03 1/2

That each service be charged a minimum of \$1.00 per month with 25 cents per month meter rent.

Coun. Belle Isle said that he would at the next meeting move for the purchase of an oil fitter for the Electric Light Station. Also for the installation of a self measuring oil tank.

His Worship submitted quotation for supply of hard coal. The lowest was \$14.50 f.o.b. Campbellton. The Town Clerk was authorized to have bonds printed in denominations of \$200 and \$1000.

The council then adjourned.

DELAYED ACTION ON LOT PURCHASE

Town Council Gave Proposition re Purchase of Legere Lot One Month Hoist

A special meeting of the Town Council was held at the residence of His Worship Mayor McKay on Thursday evening.

Present Couns. Gilker, Belle Isle, St. Onge, Moore, Marquis, Duncan, Matthews and Graham. His Worship said that the meeting was called for the purpose of taking necessary steps for the purchase of the J. B. Legere lot on Patterson St. in anticipation of the Central street subway.

Coun. Belle Isle explained that Mr. Legere had purchased the lot for \$750 and intended to build a residence thereon last year, but was persuaded not to because it was felt that this lot was required for the Central street subway. He was willing to sell for \$1000.

Coun. Graham moved in amendment to the proposition that the matter of purchase of Legere lot be laid over for one month.

Amendment carried—For: Graham, Moore, Marquis, Gilker, Matthews, Duncan, St. Onge, Belle Isle, and the council then adjourned.

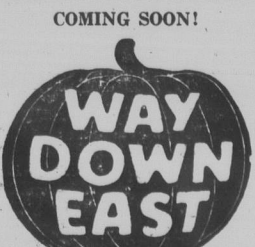

Dear Sir:
On the issue of the Campbellton Graphic of April 20th, I have read a letter in answer to my letter of March 23rd, and I will say, as hundreds of others say, that the writers words are fierce, uncalled for, and absolutely untruthful. My letter of the 20th of March is the truth from beginning to end. That I am prepared to prove at any time or place. As far as drunkenness is concerned, that is news to me and something that no man or woman ever heard of before.

Now in regard to the tragedy in Campbellton in 1911. As far as I was concerned I only delivered the verbal message I was told to deliver and if the result was fatal that was absolutely no fault of mine, as I am absolutely innocent of any wrong in the sad case.

Next in the reading of his letter, one would think that I meant all the good people of Esquimaux and the other points. But that is not so, as my enemies and all the rest of the goose hunters are not more than four or five per cent, and perhaps if the truth was told I have as many friends in Esquimaux and vicinity as Mr. Gaudin has. He accuses me as a law-breaker. Now I ask him, how many geese have I shot this last twelve years. Simply because I have great respect for rifle bullets and my life is worth more than a goose to me. I have been fired at scores of times, and so have many others. They did not get me, but it was no fault of theirs and if all the bullets fired from the shores under cover of darkness had a human target the population of N. B. would be greatly depleted.

Mr. Gaudin again brings up the matter of H. Fair, bringing my son out of the Kempt Road forest for illegal hunting and had him fined. Now I will say again this was a cowardly outrage and a gross mis-carriage of justice. As I am a bona-fide resident of Bonaventure for about five months for six or seven years. But what was the matter with H. Fair last July when a Cow Moose was slaughtered and eaten in Kempt Road, and nothing ever done and this very winter and spring Campbellton was amply supplied with moose meat brought from across the River.

Now I will ask H. Fair to inquire into this matter and ask Thomas Rattle how many sled loads of moose meat was hauled out of Esquimaux this season.

If the Local Quebec government want to annihilate all moose in Bonaventure that is immaterial to me, but why make fish of one and fowl of other. However, I have nothing to fear, for a vast majority of the public are my friends and we will leave the public in this controversy to judge for themselves who is right or who is wrong for the public are good judges. My enemies are few and fierce, but I fear them not, they are jealous and vindictive and when they stab they stab in the dark and when they shoot they shoot in the dark.

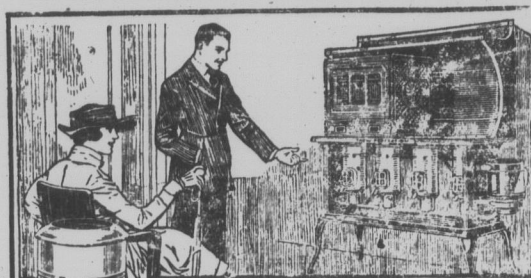
