ON THE IRISH COAST.

The gale is raging in the south of Ireland with great fury. Many houses at Skibbereen and some at Oldicourt have been greatly damaged. A fishing smack sailing from Ramsgate reached home yesterday morning. She was caught in the full fury of the storm. Four of her crew were swept verboard. There was great excitement in outhport, on the Irish Sea, over the fate of a crew of lifeboat men who went out to attempt to save the crew of a vessel which was in distress off that place. They manked to reach shore all right, but no trace of the distressed vessel they had gone to succor could be found.

Several vessels were wrecked at Fecamp on the English Channel. The rescue of the crew was attended with exciting scenes. Only one man was drowned. The fishermen along the coast suffered heavy losses in boats and gear. Two smacks of Cherbourg with their crews, numbering ten men, are missing. A hospital at Lorient took fire fluring the gale, and the flames spread with such rapidity that the ordinary means of exit were cut off and the patients had to be rescued from the windows. Many of the patients were injured. The force of the hurricane extended as far as Marseilles, on the Mediterranean Sea.

BOILOGER, Nov. 13.—Nothing but a tough estimate can be made of the damage flone by the terrible storm which set in here Ruesday night, and which, without abatement, lasted until Wednesday night. A large aumber of houses in the town were unrofed and outbuildings were blown down. Up and down the coast the loss of life and property must have been very heavy. In the vicinity of Boulogne many fishing boats were caught in the gale far from port, and they have not returned.

New York, Nov. 13.—The Times says:

"A letter has been received in this city within the last few days from an officer on the general staff of the German Emperor, which declares that war in Europe cannot be postponed beyond next spring. The importance of this letter is all the greater in view of the fact that it has been received by an official of the United States Government. The communication is understood to have been dictated by the Emperor himself. It declares there is no doubt about the massing of the troops of the Czar on the frontiers of Austria, Germany and Roumania. It is known at the Berlim War Office, it is said, that the Russian force put on the frontiers represents 90 per cent. of the effective strength of the Russian army.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—The North German Gazette, commenting on the recent speeches of Lord Salisbury and the Marquis di Rudini, concludes that Great Britain and Italy are equally resolved to throw into the scale a weighty word to maintain an equilibrium in Europe if peace should be threatened. The Gazette warmly commends Lord Salisbury's decision not to loosen the English hold in Egypt.

Hon. Mr. Ballantyne spoke on Judge Finkle's decision re the responsibility for supplying good milk to the cheese factories, in otner words, the Mathleson case decision. Mr. Ballantyne said it was an unfortunate decision, and intimated that it would necessitate action on the part of the Dairymen's Association. He declared that the intention of those who framed the law was to make the man who was paid for pure milk responsible for delivering it to the factory, and that the fact of deterioration should be taken as evidence of guilt when there was no evidence of a direct nature. Professor Robertson holds the same view, and like the inspectors, both agree that should the judgment in question hold good, the usefulness of the milk in spectors and of the law against deterioration will be greatly weakened. Mr. Ballantyne also declared that the practice of returning whey in the milk cans to the patrons was a dangerous one; that in the past the flavor of whey was distinctly perceptible in the product of many factories, and that the practice should cease throughout the whole country. This view was held by other speakers and had the warm approval of all the makers and buyers and of most of the patrons present. most of the patrons present.

Friends carried him to the office of Dr. Craigen, the county physician. The doctor examined the wound, and, after dressing it, put several stitches in it, and then asked for his pay, which was \$2. The men were surprised, as they thought, he being the county physician, there would be no charge. The doctor said if they did not pay him he would undo his work. They insisted they were penniless, and the doctor then cut the stitches, thus undoing his work. The mayor will call the attention of the State's attorney to the matter. Dr. Craigen is the physician in charge of the jail, almshouse and insane asylum, and is also a member of the United States Pension Board of Examining Physicians for this district. He Got No Fee.

This prayer has been said to be composed in part of petitions found in previous Jewish literature. This is quite possible. As the law, Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyles, was Christ's selection from the ancient law, so what is commonly called the Lord's Prayer may be a selection of the previously expressed desires of humanity. At all events, it expresses, not the Lord's desires for his own, but humanity's desires for his own, but humanity's desires for his own, but humanity's desires for his own, but humanity a pagan as well as by a Christian. It is, indeed, the istical rather than Christian. It asks nothing for Christ's sake nor in Christ's name. It presupposes faith in God, but not faith in Christ. This, so far as I know, has no parallel in either the pagan or the Jewish literature of devotion; and yet this is rather a modification of a universal desire than an inspiration to an entirely new one. The second Lord's Prayer is recorded in John, xvii. It is Christ's prayer for his own. It is uttered in the presence of his disciples at the end of his ministry and on the eve of his passion and death. It is nbsolutely unique in its spiritual quality. No one has ever suggested that it is composed of petitions to be found in any previous literature.

absolutely unique in its spiritual quality. No one has ever suggested that it is composed of petitions to be found in any previous literature.

There are two aspects in which this prayer may well be studied: as a revelation of Christ's prayer for us; as an indication of what we should pray for, for ourselves and our loved ones. In this chapter we draw near to the gate of that garden where he is ever praying for his Church, and listen to his voice, and know what is the dearest and most sacred wish of his heart for us. But we, too, are sons of God. This prayer is a model for our praying, as his life is a model for our living.

No request here: Give us this this day our daily bread. No petition here for deliverance from pain and sorrow, from suffering, sickness and death; no request even to be delivered from temptation; no prayer even for forgiveness. For this is a prayer of a Redeemer for his redeemed. He who has received the answer to the prayer of humanity, the first Lord's Prayer, enters in this chapter into the Holy of Holies to be taught to seek something beyond, far beyond, anything which uninspired humanity has ever sought or even desired for itself.

Cease to do evil is not the end, but the beginning, of a Christian life. THE PLURAL MARRIAGE SYSTEM IN THE STATES DOOMED.

Is polygamy in Utah dead? This question is answered in the affirmative by Chief Justice Zane, of the Supreme Court of Utah, in the November Forum. When Joseph Smith became leader in the Mormon Church he declared that the Almighty had revealed to him that polygamy was right, and he adopted it as a doctrine. Smith promulgated the view entertained by polygamists, both ancient and modern, that certain traditions in the Old Testament warranted the taking of more than one wife. The article of faith soon became firmly entrenched among the sect, which, settling in a district far removed from the thickly-peopled portion of the country, multiplied with amazing rapidity, both through natural growth and accessions by immigration. Europe and even Canada was scoured for converts. The majority of the recruits were obtained from across the Atlantic. Canada was never a fertile field for the promotion of the doctrine of polygamy though at various times disciples of Smit have threatened to practice it, and defy popular sentiment, on the ground that it is part of their religion, and that they are as anch entitled to adopt the doctrine as are the Mahommedan subjects of Queen Victoria. There is a Mormon colony in the Northwest Territories, the managers of which, while outwardly obeying the law, continually threaten to practice polygamy. Popular feeling is strong against any in fringement of the marriage law, and it is not likely that the authorities will be permitted to do more than grant the new settlers leave to live in a monogamou

It has been said, in parody of a well the mass been said, in paroly of went-knownadae, that "railway communications corrupt good Mormons," and history is verifying the extemporized proverb. It was not till the modern distance annihilator eached Utah and the Gentiles began to flock into that country that the popular feeling in the States was strong enough to demand the repression of the system. As a result of the law of 1862, which defined plural marriage as a crime, an attempt was made to combat the system; but it was not until after the passage of the more stringent and comprehensive national enactment of 1882 that the fight fairly began. That law also defined and punished unlawful cohabitation as a crime, and under it the polygamist were hunted and ostracised. Still another law, designed to be more effective than its

predecessors, was passed in 1887.

Judge Zane shows how opinion progresse both inside and outside the Mormon Church since these laws began to have a modifying effect. It was not till after more than 1,300 men had been sent to prison for violation of these laws that the President of the Mormon Church published a mani-

festo containing this language: festo containing this language:

"We are not teaching polygamy or plural marriage, nor permitting any person to enter upon its practice. "Inasmuch as laws have been enacted by Congress forbidding plural marriages, which laws have been pronounced constitutional by the court of last resort, I hereby declare my intention to submit to those laws and to use my influence with the members of the church over which I preside to have them do likewise. "And I now publicly declare that my advice to the Latter Day declare that my advice to the Latter Day Saints is to refrain from contracting an marriage forbidden by the law of the land. This was the president's declaration. The church backed it up with this significant

indorsement:

"I move that, recognizing Wilford Woodruff as president of the Church of Jesus
Christ of Latter Day Saints, and the only
man on earth at the present time who holds
the keys of the scaling ordinances, we consider him fully authorized, by virtue of his
position, to issue the manifesto which has
been read in our hearing and which is dated
Sopt. 24, 1891; and that as a church in gan-Sept. 23, 1891; and that as a church in general conference assembled, we accept his declaration concerning plural marriage as authorative and binding."

Judge Zane found a very different demeanor in people awaiting sentence for violation of plural marriage laws. It was the judge's habit to be lenient, and even to syncrasies, be of incalculable advan-tage, by removing all causes of friction, to Great Britain, to the United States, to agreed thereafter to obey the law implicitly. The bishop said he changed his mind when the church changed its doctrine. It thus became apparent, in the judge's eyes, that polygamy was dying. Te-day it is the belief of this experienced observer that the institution of polygamy, so far as Utah is concerned, is dead. It has been repudiated of the annexation of Canada to the United by the church and the people who founded States.




