

At Port Arthur to-day, before Chief Justies Armour, Mrs. Nettie Carrothers was arraigned on the charge of having on Jan. 3, 1891, deliberately murdered her husband, Thomas Blake Carrothers, to whom she had been married but a few years. The trial promises to be of intense interest throughout the Province and specially so to residents of this section, where the parties directly concerned are well-known. Many of the relatives of the man alleged to have been murdered reside in Westminster and the adjoining townships. "While there is no doubt that a true bill for murder will be returned by the grand jury," says a correspondent, "it is by no means certain that the petit jury will commit the accused. Since Phose Campbell was hanged in London for the murder of her husband at the instigation of the hired man, Coyle, more than two decades since, no Ontario jury has sent a woman to the scaffold, though that there have been many cases where they were equally guilty with the sterner sex is evidenced by the Stillwell murder in Elgin, the Finlay tragedy in Sombra, the Davis murder in Belleville, and perhaps half a dozen others where woman's unfaith rulness to her marriage vows provided a motive for the "removal" of her husband."

BEFORE THE TRACEDY.

In February, 1886, Thomas Blake Carrothers, a resident of Blanshard township, Perth county, near St. Marys, Ontario, was married to Nettie Slack, daughter of a well-known farmer of that township. Three years later Carrothers was engaged by William Fotheringham to accompany

Three years later Carrothers was engaged by William Fotheringham to accompany him to Rainy River, there to manage his saw mill. In June, 1890, Carrothers and his wife arrived, and three months later reports began to circulate of the alleged intimacy of Fotheringham and Mrs. Carrothers. These reports reached the ears of the husband, and he taxed his wife with infidelity. She stoutly denied the accusation, but subsequent event lent color to the suspicions of the husband. On Dec. 14, 1890, Carrothers returned home unexpectedly and found Fotheringham in the house, but the latter gave a plausible excuse for his presence. Two weeks later Carrothers again found his employer in the house, and this time he was scuffling with Mrs. Carrothers. The angry husband told him to leave the place, and promised that he would kill him if he ever caught him in the house again. Fotheringham left for Rat Portage.

On Jan. 3, 1891, Carrothers was found dying on the floor of his cabin from the effects of two bullet wounds in his head.

Mrs. Carrothers told her neighbors that at 10:30 on the morning of the 3rd she had gone about 150 feet away from the house to draw a pail of water from the river, and upon her return she had found her husband in the condition described. A pistol lay beside him and he was nearly lieless when she discovered him. She also said that she did not hear any shots fired during her short absence.

Just after the shooting Fisher and Mrs.
Carrothers went up into the garden of the house and returned in about half an hour with a note, which they said they had found in the pocket of an old coat belonging to Carrothers. This note, which was written on a half-sheet of dirty note paper, read:





PRELIMINARY INVESTIGATION.

An inquest was held at Rainy River, but the jury disagreed, three favoring a verdict of murder, while the remaining eight, of whom Fisher was one, held to the theory of suicide. Parties who were not satisfied with the result of the inquest sent a petition to the Ontario Attorney-General's office, asking for a thorough investigation into the facts. Detective Murray was placed on the case, and he arrived at the conclusion that Carrothers had been murdered. On Aug. 13, 1891, he arrested Mrs. Carrothers at the house of a relative in Toronto, where she was visiting. She was taken to Raif Portuge, where she was finally committed for trial.

Cameron, of Morley township, postmaster

minutes later she called up Fisher, and

Connor O'Dea, of Toronto, an acknowledged expert on hand-writing, will swear that the note was written by a woman, and that the hand-writing is identical with that of letters which are ack-nowledged to have been written by the prisoner.

What the man Fisher will swear to is conjectural. Fisher arrived at Carrothers' house before the man died, but he claims that Carrothers was unable to speak. Mrs. Carrothers in her statement at the inquest testified that the tragedy occurred while she was at the creek obtaining a pail of water. Fisher will swear that there was no water in the house when he arrived, as ne searched for some to wash the deceased's face. He will further swear that there was no hole cut in the ice on the river, and that he had to return for an axe before he could obtain water. Fisher's account of the finding of the note in Carrothers' pocket is also regarded by the prosecution as important. When he went upstairs in response to her call he says he found her looking in a trunk for some papers, and it seemed to him as if her searching was like an aimless passing of her hands over the papers. She remarked that her husband must have left some paper and she wanted Fisher to help her find it. She then walked straight toward a large packing case, threw saids some bedelothes, and, picking up a black coat, held it towards Fisher and said: "Look in that." Fisher put his hand in the pocket and pulled out the note printed above. Fisher will testify that the woman did not seem at all perturbed about her husband's death, but spoke lightly throughout, her principal anxiety being as to the course she was to pursue to secure the \$1,000 insurance on his life. "They can not do anything to me after the inquest, can they?" was one of the queries she propounded.



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

The Civil Service.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER:

Kindly answer the following questions:

1. How many years must a person serve in the civil service of Canada before he is superannuated?

2. What is the amount regulated?

3. What is the total number of paid employes of the civil service in Canada?

4. What is the civil service in Canada?

5. What is the number of holds and the average salary per amount?

5. What is the number of hours of daily work, holidays, etc.

6. Note—Any person who has served in an [Note—Any person who has served in an established capacity in the civil service for

ten years or upwards, and who is 60 years of age, or is incapacitated by bodily infirmity

from performing his duties, may be super-annuated on an allowance calculated on his average yearly salary during the then three last years-and not exceeding the following rates-i. e .. If he has served 10 years, but less than 11, an annual allowance of tenfiftieths of such annual salary; if for 11 and under 12 years, eleven-fiftieths-and in like manner a further addition of oneup to 35 years, but no addition shall be made for any service beyond 35 years. No person has an absolute right to such allowance, which is only to be granted for good and faithful service. The total number of civil service employes is large—the ADVERTISER has not the means of telling how many. The lowest annual salary is \$360, the highest is \$2,800—for chief inspectors in the postoffice \$2,800—for chief inspectors in the postoffice and inland revenue departments. We have not the data at hand to give the average salary. The work hours depend upon the nature of the office or service, and vary in the different departments. Six to eight hours is an office day's work. The holidays are the statutory legal helidays, besides two weeks' leave of absence at some convenient time during the year.—Editor Advertises.]

BINDER TWINE.

[From the Canada Farmers' Sun.] The grand officers last week at Hamilton reported that thus far the Grand Execu-tive Board has not been able to make any arrangement tor binder twine. Local dealers and members of the Dominion com-bine have all been approached, and the stereotyped reply, "not ready yet to quote rates," has been given. Correspondence with American manufacturers has resulted similarly reticence heigt the order of the

with American manufacturers has resulted similarly, reticence being the order of the day there as well as in Canada.

It is undoubtedly true that the combine has determined this year to quote no special prices to large buyers such as the Order of Patrons would be. In all parts of the country warerooms and storehouses are filled with twine ready to go into the hands of farmers, but not until the harvest is close at hand will the price be anyuounced by the controlling parties on the other side. Even the Canadian manufacturers are yet unaware what the rate per pound will be for the goods they have manufactured. "All the people can bear" will be the controlling sentiment with the greedy monopolists.

In the United States as well as in Canada there is discontent, and the loud nurmurings of Western and Southern farmers
caused a hasty meeting in Chicago a few caused a hasty meeting in Chicago a tew days ago, the president and secretary of the combine having been suddenly summoned from New York to conter with commissioners who had just returned from Texas. The first rumble of dissatisfaction in Canada comes from Hamilton, where last week a resolution was passed that proves the determination of farmers to throw off the shackles that have hitherto bound them so relentlessly in the power of the binder monopolists.

The situation is serious, but Patrons have The situation is serious, but Patrons have learned to await developments. Once more they may be made the victims of a monopoly, but before another season arrives it is possible for them to break the combine in binder twine as this year they have already broken the combine in salt. BINDER TWINE IN THE NORTH WEST.

John Nichols, a prominent settler in the Northwest, wrote last month to the Ontario press from Fort Qu'Appelle, Assinibola, re the binder twine tax. He says:

"Last year the price charged by the local machine agents here was 17 cents per pound cash for best Canadian twine. The Patrons of Industry, however, purchased an equally good article of American make at 13½ cents cash, or 14 cents till Dec. 1. But that was too much, as I will show. A short time ago I had occasion to write the supreme secretary, Patrons of Industry, to ask the price at which certain articles were furnished to members in the United States. Here is his reply—'Re binder twine—For best Red Elephant brand, anti-rust twine, we got last year 8 cents.' Eight cents to the American Patron, 17 cents to the average Northwest farmer! Even with the monopoly freight rates of the C. P. R. this twine, if duty free, could have been laid down here at 11 cents, or 6 cents per pound less than the Canadian article. See how this affects us here. A neighbor used over 1,000 pounds. His extra tax was over \$60. Nearly all the settlers here would use from 300 to 500 pounds each, or an extra tax on each one of from \$18 to \$30. What a grand way to promote the settlement of the Northwest!"


