OTTAWA, Feb. 8 .- After several divorce suit petitions had been introduced, includthat of C. F. Burrows, of St. Catharines, for separation from his wife, Florence J. We must have free corn." While Mr. Pope spoke, Mr. corn." While Mr. Pope spoke, Mr. Taylor, chief Government whip, had a long and anxious consultation with Sir John Thompson, and there was evidence of uncasiness in Ministerial circles, as the plea for free trade proceeded. There were loud cries of "Carried," but Dr. Sproule (Grey) rose and made a long speech against the motion, arguing that free corn meant a reduced demand for coarse grains. He asserted that few farmers could feed cattle, as they did not have the capital.

Queensland Floods Subsiding. two royal weddings in the coming spring

Queensland Floods Subsiding. BRISBANE, Feb. 8 .- The water is still falling slowly. The ruin and desolation revealed as the flood abates is beyond any thing caused by the last great flood in 1890. Some suburbs of the city have been thing caused by the last great flood in 1890. Some suburbs of the city have been almost annihilated. South of the river the city is still submerged. In the higher parts of the city from which the water is receding many buildings have collapsed and most of the others are damaged beyond hope of repair. The loss in Queen street, on which stand the Government offices, postoffice, principal banks, newspaper buildings and the opera house has been enormous. The buildings in the street were two-thirds submerged, the stocks in all the shops were ruined, and vast quantities of valuable documents were rendered illegible. The Victoria bridge at the northern end of the street was sweet away as well as the railway bridge which connected Brisbane with the suburb of Undooroopilly. The Provincial towns have suffered severely. Every hour brings fresh news of villages submerged, houses wrecked, lives lost and bridges swept away. The loss of life has been very heavy, but no opproximate estimate of the number drowned is yet possible. The Government is doing its utmost to help the sufferers from the floods, and has sent torpedo boats loaded with food and clothing up the river to the interior towns.

The secret has been well kept, but of the \$3,500,000 in American gold that was shipped to Europe last Saturday \$3,000,000 was loaned to the Sub-Treasury by the banks of this city. The entire supply of gold in the vaults of the United States Treesury to-day has been reduced to \$108,106,938. Of this only \$8,176,938 is free gold, and the remainder, \$100,000,000, must be by law held in the treasury for the redemption of a like amount of legal tender notes which have been issued against it. PORT STANLEY HARBOR.

OTTAWA, Feb. 9.—The London and Port Stanley delegation waited on Mr. Onlinet Minister of Public Works, this forencon They were introduced by Mr. Carling Mayor Essery, of London, stated the business of the delegation, which was to get a harbor of refuge established at Port Stanley and to have the harbor deepened and the piers extended. They wanted a public grant for a great public object.

Ex-Reeve Payue, Pert Stanley, explained that the harbor fees at Port Colborne and Port Dalhousie collected by the Government were only 2 cents per 100 pounds, and at Port Stanley 7 cents. The N. P., he added has taken trade away from the ports and taken it to railway centers. Port Stanley supported the N. P. through thick and thin, and got a thin share of benefit. They wanted something in return now.

Mayor Oill, St. Thomas, and Warden McKillep, Eigin, supported the proposed grant, and Capt. Ellison, Port Stanley, gave spractical explanations of the proposed works, and was asked by Mr. Onlimet what assistance the municipalities would give. "We have pretty hard times," explained the Minister. Capt. Ellison said the Government collected a large revenue from the counties of Eigin and Middlesex. TRAGIC FAMILY FEUD.

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 8.—Dr. C. O.
Probst, secretary of the State Board of Health, is giving serious consideration to the smallpox cases in Akron since he received notification of four new cases there this morning, with another just outside the city. He attended the Pastors' Union and gave some wholesome advice upon two important subjects, to wit, "promiscuous kiesing" and the "communion cup." He showed in the first place that women were doing too much kissing of one another, and of each other's babies, and that pastors were obliged to kiss too many babies; that contagion was being conveyed from mouth to mouth to a serious extent and advice was given to check this practice to some extent. Again Dr. Probst showed that the use of one cup for 100 or 200 members of a congregation during communion service was a bad and barbarous practice, which had a tendency to spread infection. He suggested that each member of the congregation be provided with his own cup. The pastors agreed with him to some extent and adopted resolutions thanking him and promising to take steps in the like of his suggestions.

THE SUPPRESSED REPORT OF THE RECIPROCITY NEGOTIATIONS.

If any evidence were required that the Dominion Government did not enter seriously into the negotiations for reciprocity with the United States, which they pretended had been initiated by the United States authorities on the eve of the election in March, 1891, it is to be found in the prolonged course of quibbling, denial, aye, duplicity, that culminated in the debate in the House of Commons on Monday night.

The men in power at Ottawa saw that the people were determined to have reciprocity with the United States, if it could oe obtained on honorable terms. They feared that the strength of the movement would overthrow them if not thwarted. So they rushed on the general election a year ahead of time, and engineered a mission to Washington with the avowed object of obtaining reciprocity in natural and other products. The late Secretary Blaine consented to receive the delegation, but he apparently suspected that the pilgrims intended to use the negotiations not so much for the purpose of improving the trade relations between the two countries as to tide them over the general election, then decreed, so he bound them down as honorable men to keep secret the preliminary, informal negotiations.

Men possessed of a high sense of honor would have kept their promise, but the Government at Ottawa did not scruple to break through the tacit agreement. They used the negotiations as a campaign cry; they gave the public to understand that reciprocity on their own terms was within reach, drawing forth from the late Mr. Blain an indirect but stinging rebuke of their dishonorable conduct.

The negotiations came to nothing. It was never intended by the Ottawa Ministers that they should come to anything. But a most important, if informal, discus sion of some days' duration took place When Parliament met last year, all the papers were demanded by the friends of papers were demanded by the friends of reciprocity in the House of Commons. They were, however, kept back, and, much to the astonishment of every one who knew anything about the rights of Governments and of Parliaments, Mr. Foster, Finance Minister, undertook, in his budget dum, etc., believing that the people in public questions, apart the people in public questions, apart the people in public questions, apart from persons, would be increased, and speech, to give the House such a version of from persons, would be increased, and David Mills then very properly raised the question of the right of the Ministers, the servants of Parliament, the servants of the people, to initiate a discussion regarding the disposal of a great international question without first submitting to the duestion without first submitting to the House all the papers on the subject. The extraordinary nature of the course pursued by the Finance Minister is not generally understood. There is not an instance in the history of the British Parliament where the Government ever initiated where the Government ever initiated a discussion and suppressed the papers. Instances there are where private members have insisted on discussing a question before all the papers could be brought down, or when it was in the interest of the State or when it was in the interest of the State that some of the papers should be beld back; but when the Government have not laid all the papers before the House, the House has insisted on the postponement of To adopt the contrary the discussion. course, as Mr. Foster did last year, was nost unconstitutional and improper course, illustrating the shuffling, dodging character of that self-confessed man of weakness.

One would have thought, after the exposure twelve months ago of the uncon stitutional course pursued by the Govern ment so far, that immediate steps would be taken to have all the papers laid before Parliament. The policy of delay suited better, however, and as a natural course we

ernment has raised no objection to its pub-lication. Why suppress it then? Mr. Foster, in the recent debate, first labored to make it appear that this document did not exist, then Sir John Thompson quibbled over it as no statesman would, and finally blamed the British Government for not permitting the Dominion Government to make it public, though he had to confess that up till now he has made no effort to obtain the liberty. We cannot for one moment believe that any average government in Great Britain would object to let the Canadian people have the fullest information possible regarding this most important matter, and it is lowering to the dignity of the Dominion Premier, and an insult to the intelligence of the Canadian electorate, to ask them to accept that explanation as the true reason why the full report of the reciprocity negotiations at Washington have, so far, been suppressed. The fact is, the Ministers never intended that their turnings and twistings to keep intact the high tax system should be revealed, as it is believed they will be revealed, if ever the

THE PEOPLE'S CHOICE.

Official Counting of the Presidential Electoral Vote.

Great Crowds Attracted to Washingto -Preparations for Inauguration Begun.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 8.—Immense orowds were drawn to the capitol to-day by the formal ceremonies incident to the official counting of the electoral vote. The bright sunshine and tonic-bracing breezes which marked the day were boldly claimed as "Cleveland weather."

Inauguration visitors are already flocking into the city, and the stands on the streets in the line of the proposed procession are in course of erection. So to-day was made the occasion of the first public demonstration, and it was a most successful one in point of numbers and enthusiasm, though there was little in the actual proceedings to call out any excitement.

The actual ceremonies were nearly the same to-day as four years ago, with a slight difference in personnel. After the last certificate had been read and the results footed up, the Vice-President made the customary announcement that under the law this was a sufficient declaration that Grover Cleveland, of the State of New York, was elected President of the United States and that Adial E. Stevenson, of Illinois, was elected Vice-President of the United States, each for the term beginning March 4, 1893.

The total announced by the Vice-President were; Cleveland and Stevenson, 277; Harrison and Reid, 145; Weaver and Field, 22.

The Old Way of Catching Whales.

The whale being well harnessed to the boat by means of the tow-line, which is fastened to the flosh-imbedded harpoon, it may cither turn flukes and sound, or, bellowing at times like a bull—with a greater volume of voice, however—it may run, as it is termed, taking the boat in tow at a rate, it has been estimated, all the way from fifteen to twenty miles an hour, when it first starts off, butlesttling down to about eight or ten knots per hour, when it gets warmed up to its work. This is the old "Nantucket sleigh-ride." The whale having tired itself by running, the boat is hauled up by the line, and side by side the crew, with hair standing on end, and the affrighted whale, startled anew by the close proximity of so strange a load, rush through the surging and fast-receding waters. The officer "gots a set" with his hand-lance, and plunges about five or six feet of cold from into the lungs of the victim, and perseveres without ceasing in the up and down motions, familiarly known as "churning," as the boat persistently clings to the whale, until the spout of the unfortunate cetacean is tinged with the crimson of its own life blood. The muscles of the strong arms now relax upon the lance, the boat is laid off, and the dying whale awims round and round in an unbroken circle. This is the "flurry." Death is now merely a question of time. The blood ejected through the spiracles now becomes as thick as tar. A GOOD WORD FOR THE FRENCH.

A GOOD WORD FOR THE FRENCH.

(Illustrated American.)

It is significant of the virtue of the French people, that even a charge of dishonor in office forces the most popular and beloved of party leaders to quit public life. No two men in France stood higher in public esteem than Floquet, the Epeaker of the Assembly, and De Freycinet, the Minister of War Minister almost continuously since the establishment of the Republic in 1877. Floquet was the Mirabeau of the Radicals—after Gambeite, the most interesting public man in France. But he owned that he had permitted the Panama plotters to contribute to the campaign fund, when the Orleanists and Boulangists were besetting the Franch electors to overturn the Republic. Though not a panny touched his own hands, it was enough that he had consented to defile his cause by equivocally gained money. He was rejected from the second highest place in the Government, and will in future have no voice in his party, though before the scandal he was reasonably certain of succeeding Carnot in the Presidency.

De Freycinet's fate is even more striking. He, after Gambetta, is conceded to have been the most dauntless shield and defender of France during the war and the Commune. He it was who organized the armies on the Loire and in the Southwest, which came within a hand's breadth of forcing the Germans to quit Paris in rout. He it was who got together the troops with which MacMahon dispersed the frantic legions of the Commune. A profound student of the art of war, the organization of armies, France owes to him the pre-eminence of her army to-day; yet, because he consented to the use of tarnished money, his party condemns him, the public denounce him, and he is torced into retirement. No such speciacle of public virtue has ever been witnessed in any land under any form of government.



THE NEW BOOK OF JOB.

First of the New Translations of the Bible Soen To Be Published.

Bible Soen To Be Published.

Battimore, Feb. 8.—Prof. Paul Haupt, of the oriental department of the Johns Hopkins University, has returned from Germany, where he has been in conference with the scholars making translations of the Bible under his direction. The American says that the first part of the Bible to be printed will be a critical edition of the Hebrew text of the Book of Job, edited by Prof. C. Siegfied, of the University of Jena.

The book has been reconstructed in order to enable the reader to better understand its putting verses in their proper position and sequence. Twenty-one pages of critical notes give the reasons for the various changes of the preceding 27 pages of the Hebrew text. Another thing explained by these notes is the reason for the use of the blue, green and red grounds upon which certain portions of the Hebrew text is printed in clear, black type. The blue ground indicates parallel compositions; the green ground, that certain polemical interpolations directed against the tendency of the poem were here made, and the red, certain correcting interpolations conforming the speeches of Job to the spirit of the orthodox system of retribution.

PROGRESSIVE PRESBYTERIANS.

Annual Meeting of Knox Church Congregation.

Satisfactory Progress of the Different Branches - Reports - Election of Officers-Presentation to Mr. James Stewart.

The congregation of Knox Presbyterian Church, South London, held their annual meeting last evening. The attendance was large. Prior to the commencement of business the Women's Association served a bountiful tea, which was much appreciated and enjoyed. Mr. Thos. Alexander was chosen chairman and Mr. John Macpherson secretary. recretary.
The annual statement showed satisfac-

secretary.

The annual statement showed satisfactory progress in the various branches. Forty-three new members had been received, the net increase being 20, making the total number of communicants on the roll 207. The service of praise had been efficiently conducted by Mr. E. Green, and the members of the choir had been faithful in their attendance.

The amount contributed to the mission schemes of the church was \$337 43, as compared with \$200 for 1891.

The Women's Association contributed \$346 09 to the reduction of the church debt; \$342 49 was received from the extra cent a day fund, and \$32 15 was the proceeds of Mrs. Macpherson's concert. A balace of \$30 72 remained on hand.

The Sunday school roll contained the names of 218 scholars, an increase of 3 over the preceding year. The average attendance was 139; teachers and officers, 22; 64 volumes were added to the library and the total revenue of the school was \$170 47, \$55 of this amount being expended for mission schemes.

The Women's Foreign Missionary So-

of this amount being expended for mission schemes.

The Women's Foreign Missionary Society increased its membership by 12, making it 44. The total income of the society was \$86 61. In addition a box of valuable elothing was sent to the Indians at Kes. Koos, N. W. T.

The Christian Endeavor [Society had a membership of 59, an increase of 13. The total receipts were \$144 40, of which \$100 was donated to the church debt and \$5 to the canal mission.

The weekly offerings by envelopes amounted to \$1,959 86, and loose collections \$176 55. The total from all sources was \$3,321 11. The disbursements included \$1,526 86 for salaries and stipend, \$495 for interest on mortgage, and \$350 99 for ordinary expenses. The actual reduction of the church debt was \$270 18. The amount due on the church mortgage is \$9,000.

Mr. James Stewart, secretary-treasurer, was presented with a valuable gold watch, the inscription on which was: "Presented to James Stewart by the congregation of Knox Church, in appreciation of his valuable services as secretary and treasurer." Mr. Stewart repled feelingly and the meeting was dismissed with the henediction.
