PORT STANLEY HARBOR.

The Local Deputation Interviews Minister Oulmet. Who Promises the Usual Careful Consideration. Mayor Esery, Capt. Ellison, Mr. Keeve Payne and others speak - Mr. H. Ivey sets forth important reasons why the work should be done. OTTAWA, Feb. 9. - The London and Port Stanley Delegation waited on Mr. Oulmet, Minister of Public Works, this forenoon. They were introduced by Mr. Carling, Mayor Esery, of London, stated the business of the delegation, which was to get a harbor of refuge established at Port Stanley and to have the harbor deepened and the piers extended. They wanted a public grant for a great public object. Ex-Révère, Port Stanley, explained that the harbor, built at Port Colborne and Port Dalhousie cost over 100 pounds, and at Port Stanley 7 cents. The N. P., he added has taken trade away from the ports and taken it to railway centers. Port Stanley supported the M. P. through thick and thin, and gets a thin share of benefit. They wanted something in return. Mayor Oill, St. Thomas, and Warden McKillop, Elgin, supported the proposed grant, and Capt. Ellison, Port Stanley, gave practical explanations of the project. Oulmet was asked by Mr. Carling what assistance the municipalities would give. "We have pretty hard times," explained the Minister. Capt. Ellison said the Government collected a large revenue from the counties of Elgin and Middlesex. He was practically got nothing back, he added. "We want something now," Mr. Jackson, reeve of Southwold, has spoken, Mr. Ivey, solicitor of the new lessees of the L. and P. S. Railway, explained the great enterprise they had undertaken on condition that the harbor is put in shape. The G. T. R. had contracted to take 400,000 tons of coal in the new route, and it was expected that the C. P. R. would take 100,000 tons this year, all delivered at London. The company intended to incorporate to supply coal as far east as Toronto, and as cargoes for the States they expected to carry lumber, nickel ore and other commodities. He was en route for Montreal to arrange for a line of boats between that point and Port Stanley. Mr. Carling and Messrs. Ingram, Dr. Roome, Marshall, Hutchins, M.P., supported the application. "The Minister advised the London and Port Stanley directors to consider how the harbor might best be managed in the future - whether as a Government work or as a present. He quoted a statement of the Minister of Justice that the Grand Trunk Railway was bound to leave the harbor in as good repair as when it was leased from the old London and Port Stanley board. Major Esery said the present owners could not but be enforced to view it if the Government took over the harbor, but the Minister said the Government did not care for litigation, as it always got the worst of it. He promised to carefully consider the whole matter in connection with the L. and P. S. Bill now before Parliament. TRAGIC FAMILY FEUD. A Brave Woman Revenges Her Husband's Death and is Riddled With Bullets. KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 9. - Two factions in Green county, Tenn., and Madison county, N. C., led on the one hand by Ed. Johnson and on the other by a notorious mountaineer, Jim Cole, have for many years been fighting each other through the courts, certain farming lands being at stake. Yesterday Jim Cole and a friend, Tom Hixon, visited Johnson's house, claiming a warrant for Mrs. Johnson's arrest. She called her husband to come to her assistance. His feet were frozen, but he managed to crawl out and open fire on Hixon and Cole. They returned the compliment, as Johnson was killed. Mrs. Johnson ran into the house and returned with a shotgun, the contents of which she emptied into Hixon's breast, killing him. She was then about to fire upon Cole, but he got ahead of her, and with a load of buckshot at close range almost riddled the woman. She fell lifeless across the body of her husband. The Johnsons have six grown children, who say they will revenge the killing of their parents. MORE SWEET THAN SALUTARY. Circumstances Under Which Kissing a Little More than a Little is by Much too Much - It Spreads Disease. COLUMBUS, Ohio, Feb. 8. - Dr. C. O. Probst, secretary of the Board of Health, is giving serious consideration to the smallpox cases in Akron since he received notification of four new cases there this morning, with another just outside the city. He attended the pastors' advice upon two important subjects, to wit, "promiscuous kissing" and the "communion cup." He showed in the first place that women were doing too much kissing of one another, and of each other's babies, and that pastors were obliged to kiss too many babies; that contagion was being conveyed from mouth to mouth to a serious extent and advice was given to check this practice to some extent. Again Dr. Probst showed that the use of one cup for 100 or 200 members of a congregation during communion service was a bad and barbarous practice, which had a tendency to spread infection. He suggested that each member of the congregation be provided with his own cup. The pastor agreed to do this, and has since adopted resolutions thanking him and promising to take steps in the line of his suggestions. The Good Old Times. The Times were long. APPARENTLY the idea on the Government side is that they can repeat their loyalty cry with success at the next general election.

Canadian loyalty should be loyalty to the interests of Canada; the constant question we should put to ourselves being, What is best for Canada?

One argument in favor of Canadian independence is that it would lift us out of these degrading discussions respecting the relative loyalty of opposing gangs of people poor-spirited enough to be content to remain Colonists.

These absurd loyalty shouters on both sides of politics are either sincere, or they are not. If they are sincere they deserve contempt for their servility; if they are insincere, they deserve contempt for their hypocrisy.

It is enough to sicken a horse to observe that the representatives of the people of Canada are still so tied up with Colonialism that they are not to be allowed even to have written particulars of what Canadian trade ambassadors to Washington have been doing.

Both political parties had better make up their minds as to how they propose to treat these cries of Loyalty! Loyalty! If either party thinks it can gain by emphasizing its feckless Colonialism, let the experiment go on.

If those who believe in Canada and Canada's right and ability to paddle its own canoe, are to run away from every little cur that barks Loyalty! Loyalty! they will soon discover that in the eyes of the large public nothing is more respected than courage, nothing more despised than cowardice.

THE SUPPRESSED REPORT OF THE RECIPROCITY NEGOTIATIONS. If any evidence were required that the Dominion Government did not enter seriously into the negotiations for reciprocity with the United States, which they pretended had been initiated by the United States authorities on the eve of the election in March, 1891, it is to be found in the prolonged course of quibbling, denial, eye, duplicity, that culminated in the debate in the House of Commons on Monday night.

The men in power at Ottawa saw that the people were determined to have reciprocity with the United States, if it could be obtained on honorable terms. They feared that the strength of the movement would overthrow them if not thwarted.

Men possessed of a high sense of honor would have kept their promise, but the Government at Ottawa did not scruple to break through the tacit agreement. They used the negotiations as a campaign cry; they gave the public to understand that reciprocity on their own terms was within reach, drawing forth from the late Mr. Blain, in indirect but stinging rebuke of their dishonorable conduct.

The negotiations came to nothing. It was never intended by the Ottawa Ministers that they should come to anything. But a most important, if informal, discussion of some days' duration took place. When Parliament met last year, all the papers were demanded by the friends of reciprocity in the House of Commons.

The long-distance marching competitions of volunteer soldiers in England are discontinued by the commander-in-chief in a recent order. He thinks they result in no practical good, and may cause individual harm through undue stress of effort.

THE GERRYMANDER. (From the Week.) One great good we believe we may safely predict as the outcome of Mr. D'Alton McCarthy's revolt.

A physician of New York whose recreations consist in the study of etching and of certain delicately wrought curios, holds that a technical knowledge of any one art or science will aid one in any other. He is sure that the discipline which came to him of making himself acquainted with the rules by which etchings are judged has vastly aided him in the study and practice of medicine, by fixing the habit of minute observation.

A student of comparative politics points out the fact that the Government of the United States is among the oldest of civilized governments now existing in the world, since most European countries have been to a considerable degree revolutionized since the first election of George Washington to the Presidency.

A petition signed by several bishops and a great body of the clergy of the Church of England has been presented to the Archbishop of Canterbury calling attention to the increasing financial difficulties of that rural diocese. It has been computed that there are now 3,600 benefices under £150 per annum, and 400 under £50.

French war office experts are divided in opinion concerning the value or danger of Eiffel's Tower in case of a siege of Paris. German staff officers have written quite freely about the matter, and the French view that the tower would afford a fine target. Some French officers agree with this view, others say the tower out of range, while it would afford an excellent post for observation. From the operations of an enemy could be observed for a radius of 44 miles.

"Some persons," said a proponent, "seem inclined to make sport of the young man who carries his cane by the middle with the head downward. My own impression is that this is a reasonable and sensible practice. Some people carry canes and umbrellas horizontally under their arms, and some swing them about thoughtlessly, to the danger and discomfort of others. There are many, however, who carry their canes carefully in a vertical position by their sides, and next to these, so far as the public safety is concerned, I should certainly class the young man who carries his cane by the middle. There is little to fear from a cane so carried, for though its head or crook is heavy enough to bring the cane on a line that is nearer vertical than horizontal, and it is almost certain to be carried steadily in one position and not flourished about."

An interesting feature of the January number of the Imperial and Asiatic Quarterly Review is a poem in Persian and Arabic entitled "Ave Kainsar-i-Hind" followed by an Urdu prize translation of the National Anthem. Persian and Arabic invocations take the form of choruses; that is, the numerical value of all the letters both in the Persian and in the Arabic verses make up the date 1893. Jan. 1, 1893, is the seventeenth anniversary of the Queen's assumption of the Imperial title Kainsar-i-Hind. The letters representing the date in Persian make up the words which are translated: "May the festival day of the Kaiser-i-Hind ever be blessed! By the name of Victoria may it be blessed!" The words of the Arabic chorograph are rendered in English: "Victoria, helped by God, is the Kaiser of India; may her good fortune ever continue! The National Anthem will not seem to English ears to be impressed as retranslated

from the Urdu prize translation. Here is the first stanza: May Kaiser remain lasting, May keep upon us standing (enduring) God, the Kaiser, Keep always victorious Happy and pleasant A sovereign ruler upon us, God the Kaiser.

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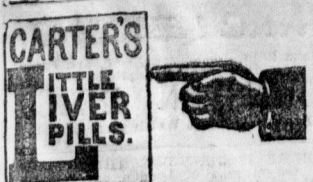
