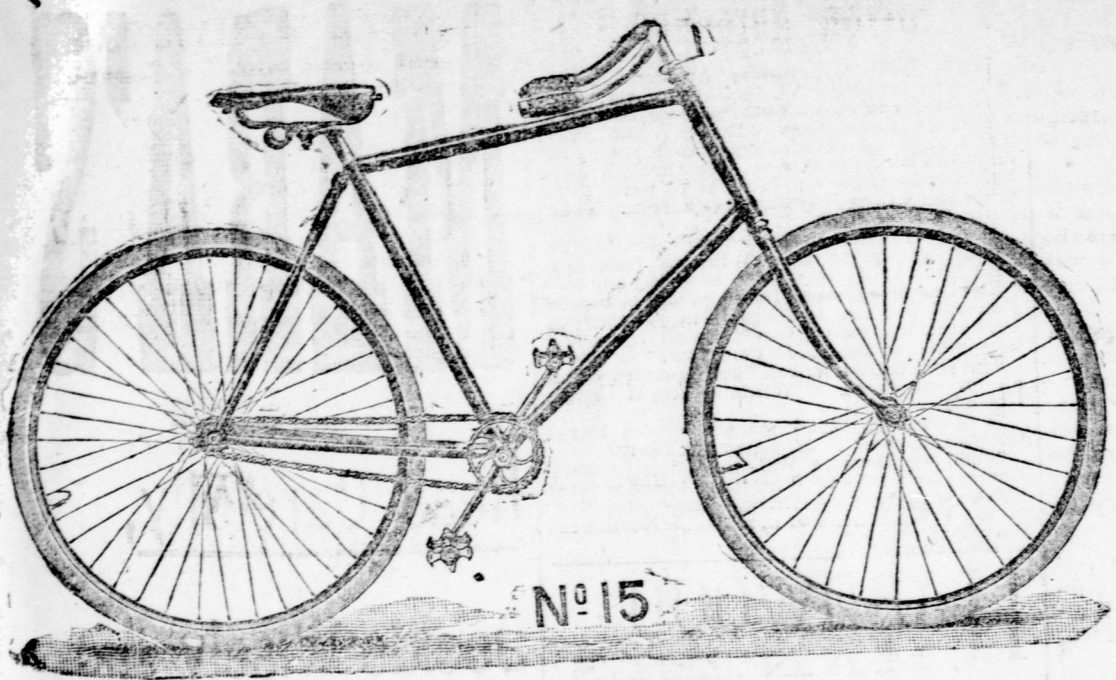

GOT AWAY WITH THE PLUNDER.

Seven Armed Men Rob a Bank in a Missouri Town.

The robbers were about ten minutes going through the bank. Afterwards they mounted their horses and started for the Nation at a full gallop. As they were leaving the outskirts someone fired several shots at them, killing a horse and wounding a robber. He immediately secured another horse from a farmer who was passing and followed his pals.
