Judge Lawrence said to the prisoner: "In my opinion the crime is as great as if you had abstracted the sum from Lieut. Clay's pocket, or had bur-glarized Mr. Lewis' office and had stolen it. If it had been some wretched clerk, with a wife and seven children, who had incurred a heavy loss and had helped himself at his master's till, I am afraid there would have been no one to speak in extenuation; but the higher position the person holds, the higher his responsibilities. I am sorry to say I have looked in vain for extenuating circumstances. It is as bad a case of fraud as it is possible to conceive. You have brought shame and

forfeited the position you held in the world, and which should have been a guarnatee of your honesty, at least, if India." Lord George Hamilton, secretary of state for India, replied. He vere. Mr. Beck then launched into a long detailed review of Mr. Beck's career, from his birth up to the present. He made the announcement that he was born in Baden, Waterloo county, which village his father founded, and where his father and mother established a large business. Misfortunes overtook them. He and his brother had a fair, ordinary common school education, and were taught what Germans usually were taught—a trade. He learned to work and be honest, and to treat others as he would have them treat him. He had no money at his back—he had not an inheritance as other people had he an inheritance as other people had. He had a trade, and health and strength. Mr. Beck related how he borrowed money, and was enabled, with his brother, to start business in a sawmill at Galt. They came to London, and his brother afterwards went to Montreal. Beck concluded this family history by saying that when all the branches of his factory were running they would employ 150 hands, and have \$100,000 inested. He had no money—not even money to carry on this campaign against the inheritance. He was running on his own personality and merits, representing one of the best and most honorable associations—the Conservative Association of London. Mr. Beck denied that he had discharged one of his employes on account of his religious or political views. The young man's salary had been raised from \$8 to \$10 per week, but he had left his employ on his own account, or been induced to leave it so as to give the opposition a chance to say that there was discontent between him and his employes. He did not ask his employes

how they were going to vote.

Continuing, Mr. Beck said he had been accused of being a horseman. He was not ashamed of it. Col. Leys had seen fit to say in the Jewish synagogue that he (Mr. Beck) was a horseman and a gambler. 

## TREND OF TRADE.

Business in Ontario Showing Increased Activity. Toronto, Feb. 15.-Bradstreet's review says: Business here has shown acid

increased activity, and as the season advances trade continues to broaden. Drygoods are selling more freely, and prices are firmly maintained in ali nes. A feature is the demand for silks and more expensive dressgoods than were selling a year ago. American cottons and printed goods continue to offer here at low prices, but they seem to be hurting trade in English rather than Canadian goods. Drygoods imports here for January shows an increase of \$202,000 over last year. Metals and hardware, including mining outfits, are selling more freely. Hides are scarce and firm, and some are being imported from Liverpool. Sugars are firm at an advance of 1-16c; general groceries in good demand, country remittances are better than a year ago. The prospects for trade are bright, but wholesale men say business is not as active in Ontario as it is in the Northwest and the Eastern Provinces. The security markets have

been very active this week and firm.

"When ready to leave, and it was not long, the Indian guide said, 'Do as I do,' and proceeded to tuck his clothes under him, seated himself in the snow on the edge of the slope, and away he went down the side of the mountain. I followed. The experience was exiciting, and after crossing the level plateau we took another slide, reaching the bottom in less than a minute, while it had required more than an hour to mount. So far as the personal allusions of the late minister to the president are concerned, the incident is undoubtedly closed. No demand has been or will be made, according to the present intentions, for a disavowal of them, but the inferences in the letter, which bring in question Spain's good faith on questions of reciprocity, and inferentially autonomy for Cuba, if not disavowed diplomation of further diplomatic correspondence. A special from Washington says: The De Lome incident is still unsettled. The cipher dispatch from Minister Woodford was not entirely satisfactory.

A dispatch from Havana says: There is a rumor that the palace authorities have a letter written by Consul-General

Lee, the contents of which are as in-teresting, even exciting, for Spain, as De Lome's letter to Canalejas was for the United States. Another rumor was set afloat that General Lee had resigned. A strong effort is being made to get General Lee into the same boat with De Lome. The members of the autonomist party don't like him. Lome's resignation is really considered here as a severe blow to Spain. The Cubans are jubilant. Madrid, Feb. 15.—The Liberal, com-menting on the De Lome letter, says it

was a private document, of which the government understood the text. It is semi-officially stated that official claims cannot be founded on a private letter, that Spain acted rightly in accepting the resignation of Senor Dupuy de Lome, and the ministers, it is added, declare that any claims whatever are

TAMPERING WITH MAILS. New York, Feb. 15.-It is now known on the highest authority that the real reason for sending the United States torpedo boat Cushing to Havana was that the Spanish authorities have been tampering with mail sent to the battle ship Maine in Havana harbor, says the Washington correspondent of the Her-ald. This resulted in Capt. Sigsbee, of the Maine, sending a protest to Washington, with a suggestion that a regular service be established between Key West and Havana by means of torpedo boats. On the strength of this protest the Cushing was dispatched to Havana.




