Toronto, June 27.—A netition will go to-day to Hon. Mr. Aylesworth, minister of justice, bearing probably some thousands of signatures, praying for the release of Tim Flood, the Toronto second baseman, who was yestenday conteneed to fifteen who was yesterday sentenced to fifteen days in jail for assaulting Umpire Conway. The latter himself has signed an affidavit, stating that he believes the sentence to be severe, and that in the past Flood has protected umpires who were in danger of assault. Conway says he was designed as the convergence of assault.

Our Capital.

Ottawa, June 27.—The census and statistics department issued a bulletin today on the capital employed in manufacturing establishments in Canada. In 1905 the amount of capital in manufacturing industries was \$843.931,178, as compared with \$446,916,487 in 1900. This shows an increase for the five years of \$397,000,000, or about 90 per cent, while production increased by \$234,000,000 or about 50 per cent. The dispar-Ity in the ratio of increase is said to be due to the inability of recently established works to produce to their full capacity. In car and car works, for example, the ratio of production to capital in 1900 was 151, and in 1905 it was 101: on Portland cement works it was 86 and 65. in smelting works it was 67 and 32 and on electric light works it was 17 and 9 for each rangectively. TERRIFIC ELECTRICAL STORM PLAYS HAVOC WITH NEW YORK

Thirteen Persons Killed by Bolts, Church Steeple Ripped Off and Many Fires Started.

New York, June 27 .- A death-dealing electric storm yesterday afternoon followed a day of sweltering heat, soaked with humidity, swept over the city and surrounding territory, killing thirteen persons, injuring several, causing many fires and doing considerable damage. In this city two of the places struck were churches. The steeple of both were torn into frag-

ments by the lightning bolts. J. A. McKenna, of Newark, N. J., and his two young daughters were caught in the storm near Union, N. J. They took refuge under a tree, which a few minutes later was struck by a lightning bolt. The younger girl was

killed outright and the father and elder daughter severely shocked. At Fishkill, on the Hudson, Walter Dixonna, a negro, was struck by lightning and killed. A woman who accompanied him was stunned and burned. A lightning bolt hit John Lawless while he was at work on

MANY WITNESSES ON STAND

Testify to Murderer Having a Deep Seated Grudge Against Dead Man,

Boise, June 26.-Wm. F. Davis, of Goldfield, Nevada, one of the most important witnesses for the defense of Wm. D. Haywood, accused of the murder of Frank Steunenberg, was called to the stand at noon today, and his cross-examination had not been completed when court adjourned.

Harry Orchard testified that Davis led and commanded the mob that destroyed the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mine in 1889; inspired, as the agent of Haywood and Moyer, the Vindicator explosion and the train-wrecking plot at Cripple Creek, and was an accomplice in the Independent station crime. On direct examination by Clarence Darrow, Davis went over the story of his working life, and made positive denial of every statement of Orchard that involved him or his associates in any form of crime. Davis denied that he was even a member of the union when the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mine was blown up. At the conclusion of his general story, Davis swore that at Cripple Creek during the strike Orchard told him of the Hercules mine affair and threatened to kill Steun-

enberg. The cross-examination of Davis by Senator Borah was severe and searching. It was chiefly devoted, as far as it proceeded, to the Bunker Hill and Hon. Mr. Aylesworth and Geo under which Orchard made the threat

against Steunenberg. Davis asserted that he remained at Gem the day the Bunker Hill mill was blown up. While he saw the train in charge of the masked men arrive and depart from Gem, he could not name anyone on the train except En-





The confusion of the national situation is increasing. The consensus of conservative opinion in Lisbon is that England should interfere before either revolution or absolutism precipitate fatal struggle.

Vienna, June 26.—The crisis in Portugual is followed closely here. The contingent chances of Duke Miguel of Braganza in the event of a revolution are watched with the greatest interest. He is now visiting his sister, the Archduchess Marie Therese, sister-inlaw of Emperor Francis Joseph. It is said that Duke Miguel is ready to accept a call from Fortugal, but that he is also aware that a change of government there is unlikely to take the form of a change of dynasty. Interest in the situation so far as imperial circles are concerned probably centers chiefly in the effort which a Republican triumph in Portugal would be likely to have in Spain and on the dynasty there. There are reports that Austria and Spain are both bringing pressure on King Carlos to change his form of government to appease popular indignation with a view to preventing trouble which they believe would not be confined to the limits of his kingdom.


